## BOARD OF CITY RECORD.

Board of City Record, Governor's Room, City Hall, New York, Tuesday, 2 p. m., August 25, 1903.

The Hon. Charles V. Fornes, Acting Mayor; George L. Sterling, Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel; and N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy Comptroller, the officers designated by section 1526, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, met this day.

The minutes of the meeting held August 10, 1903, were approved as printed.

The Acting Supervisor, Charles S. Hervey, presented the resignation of Joseph A. Gleason, as Office Boy.

By concurrent action of the Board, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That this Board accept the resignation of Joseph A. Gleason from the position of Office Boy in the Office of the Supervisor of the City Record, said resignation to take effect on August 10, 1903; and

Resolved, That Harry A. McNeill, of No. 88 Oliver street, Manhattan, who has been duly certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible for such position, be and he hereby is appointed to the position of Office Boy in the Office of the Supervisor of the City Record, said appointment to take effect on and after August 24, 1903, the rate of compensation for such services to be \$300 per annum.

Resolved, That Annie L. Patterson, of No. 207 Congress street, Brooklyn, who has been duly certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible for such appointment, be and she hereby is appointed to the position of Stenographer and Book Typewriter in the Office of the Supervisor of the City Record, said appointment to take effect on and after August 17, 1903, the rate of compensation for such services to be \$750 per annum.

The Acting Supervisor asked for the temporary appointment of a Tabulator, under the provisions of rule 7, section 4, Rules and Regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, to assist in the preparation of the stationery contract for 1904.

By concurrent action of the Board, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Supervisor of the City Record be and he hereby is authorized, subject to the approval of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, to contract with a competent person to compile and tabulate the supplies of stationery required for the use of the City Government during the year of 1904, at an agreed contract price, not exceeding \$150, the same to be charged to the appropriation for "Printing, Stationery and Blank Books for City Departments and Offices, and Arrearages, 1903."

The Acting Supervisor presented a communication from A. M. Edson, Acting City Superintendent, Department of Education, in reference to the necessity of printing the daily contagious disease lists of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, making a strong protest against the discontinuance of printing said lists.

On motion of the Acting Mayor, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of City Record favors the continuance of the contract for the publication of the daily list of contagious diseases, but under a special agreement to be made by the Supervisor, subject to the approval of the Board, for the year 1904.

By concurrent action of the Board, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Jewish Abend Post, the Jewish Morning Journal, the Jewish Gazette, the Evening Journal, the Evening World, the Acorn and Das Morgen Journal be and hereby are added to the list of newspapers designated by this Board on July 31, 1903, to publish:

(1) A notice of the Receiver of Taxes, under date of September 1, 1903, required by section 38, chapter 908, Laws of 1896, asking taxpayers to make written requisition for their bills for the payment of taxes for 1903.

(2) The notice required by section 914 of the Greater New York Charter, to be given October 1, that the assessment rolls of real estate, personal property and bank stock of the several boroughs of The City of New York for the year 1903 have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes, and that the taxes indicated by the said assessment rolls are due and payable.

(3) The notice respecting unpaid taxes, required by section 918 of the Greater New York Charter, to be given November 1.

(4) The notice respecting unpaid taxes, required by section 919 of the Greater New York Charter, to be given after December 1.

An application was presented from the New York Realty Journal for designation as one of the official weekly newspapers.

The Acting Supervisor was directed to notify the said New York Realty Journal that the two newspapers prescribed by section 1526, Greater New York Charter, had been designated on June 30, 1903.

Relative to the recent action of the Commissioner of Bridges and of Supervisor Cowen in sending advertisements to papers not previously designated, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That this Board designate the "Railroad Gazette" for the purposes of the advertisements printed therein by direction of the Commissioner of Bridges on November 28 and December 5, 1902; and also designate the Wall Street Review for the purposes of an advertisement inserted therein by Supervisor Cowen on January 15, 1903.

Relative to a letter presented from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, requesting extra insertions for Local Board hearings, the following was submitted:

The Honorable the Board of City Record:

Gentlemen—I submit a letter from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, requesting extra insertions for Local Board hearings.

Inasmuch as the papers of the Boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond receive only one insertion each, and the official papers of the Borough of Manhattan receive none at all, it would appear that the Supervisor should have specific instructions from the Board before making such a radical departure in the matter of Bronx advertising, from the rule observed in the other boroughs.

The advertisements referred to by President Haffen are short notices required by law, calling attention to advertisements in the "City Record," a copy of which advertisement is appended hereto.

date. In reply, under date of July 31, William D. May, Esq., President of the Paper Association of New York City, addressed a letter to the Mayor, and also to the Supervisor, submitting a list of papers regarded by a committee of this association as being "equal to" the papers suggested by the Supervisor. Under date of August 1, 1903, I received a letter from his Honor the Mayor, directing me to accept this list for the purposes of the City Record office, in lieu of the one heretofore in use.

I am informed by Mr. Wright, of Miller, Sloan & Wright, a member of the committee of the said paper association, which prepared the schedule in question, that the basis of said classification was the trade price of the various papers selected. The committee, Mr. Wright informs me, considered the plan of a series of tests, tensile and otherwise, as a basis for more accurate classification, but abandoned the idea later because of the time which would be required to complete the tests, which time the members of the committee did not feel disposed to devote to the matter.

Subsequent to the receipt of the letter of the Paper Association previously referred to, and with a view of having on file in the office of the City Record adequate information upon which to base the selection of papers to be used by the City, supported by tests of the various grades submitted, I communicated with twenty-eight of the principal paper dealers doing business in The City of New York, requesting them to furnish me with samples of ledger and bond papers. In my request I classified the ledger papers on a basis of price, asking these dealers to submit to me samples of the best ledger papers which they handled costing approximately 25 cents, 20 cents, 15 cents and 10 cents. I have received replies from all of those to whom these communications were addressed, each concern transmitting a number of samples of paper of various cost prices per ream in case lots. I have caused all of these papers to be subject to tests on the Morrison & Herron paper testing machines in the office of the Supervisor of the City Record, which machines are used by the United States Government in fixing standards for the purchase of paper and are very generally employed in the paper trade throughout the country. The tests include a test for weight, for thickness and for tensile strength.

As a result of the examination of this large number of samples I have reached a classification of ledger papers based both on price and test as to strength and thickness which appear to meet the needs of the City in respect to grades and afford ample opportunity for competition among the paper dealers of the City in furnishing said papers to the various contractors who may be bidders for the "City Record" work.

In determining the papers to be included in a particular class I have disregarded entirely the concern furnishing the same, but have taken the papers quoted to me at a given price per pound which test the highest, and made the average of those tests the standard for each class. Injustice may be done by this plan in some instances, but it is the only one of many methods of selection which would appear to be applicable to the conditions presented. It is necessary in any event that all papers included in any one class shall be of the same price, else the cheapest paper will have the monopoly, as the contractor will invariably select the paper which is the cheapest. If the papers in a class are all equal in price, each has a fair chance with the other for use by the contractors.

The papers included in the first grade under the classification which I have reached are the same as that of the Paper Association of New York, and is the paper which has been used for many years in the books of record of the City. The paper is obtainable from practically all of the paper dealers in business in New York City.

The paper selected for the second grade, "Advance Linen Ledger," was submitted to me by nine different paper dealers doing business in this City as the best 20-cent paper carried in stock by them. The nine dealers submitting samples of "Advance Linen Ledger" were as follows:

This paper has also been very generally used in City printing for a number of years past. The fact that it is almost universally obtainable from the trade and also that nine of the leading paper merchants of the City indicate it as the best twenty cent paper sold by them would seem to justify its use. It meets the special need in the City printing, being employed for large ruled blanks and for statement paper.

Grade 3 includes three papers quoted to me originally at 16 cents, but upon which the price later was amended to 15 cents. The variety of paper included in this class is sufficiently great to give the various contractors abundant latitude in the purchase of paper stock when said grade is called for. The same is true of the papers selected in Grade 4.

In Grade 5 are five papers testing in tensile strength from fifteen to eighteen points higher than the Grade 5 established by my predecessor in his use of Oneida. Two of these papers were quoted to me at 10 cents and two others at 9½ cents. The price of all now is uniformly 9 cents for use in City printing.

I present herewith said classification of ledger papers in such form as would be available for official use by the Supervisor and submit the same for the consideration of the Board. Two or three of the papers included in said schedule are not now water marked, but will be water marked by the dealers in case the paper is called for by City contractors.

It is sure that the work of the Knickerbocker Press will possess the desired style and character. Respecting the work of the Martin B. Brown Company, the Committee cannot reach a full assurance; therefore it cannot withdraw its previous recommendation.
