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#### BROOKLYN BRIDGE.

The bridge railway and vehicular traffic on the bridge have been maintained during the quarter with the usual regularity, but the surface car service has been frequently suspended on Sundays and at night, in order that the surface car tracks might be renewed and the carriageways repaved.

Progress has been made in the matter of obtaining relief to the overcrowding which has prevailed on the loop tracks for surface cars at the Manhattan terminal of the bridge. The railroad companies have made contracts for the construction of four additional loops, which will be built in substantial conformity with a suggestion contained in a report and plan submitted September 23, by a special Commission of Engineers, consisting of the following named gentlemen: George B. Post, J. C. Brackenridge and William Barclay Parsons, who were appointed by the Mayor to consider plans for relief presented and advocated by the Manufacturers' Association of Brooklyn. The Commission disapproved the plans presented, and under authorization from the Mayor submitted an alternative plan, which was accepted and approved, showing the location of four additional loops, the widening of the roadways, and the position of new galleries for passage to and from the bridge railway platforms; the new galleries being located directly beneath the platforms and above the surface cars. Considerable delay has been experienced in obtaining the steel girders and beams, but it is expected that the work will be completed in the spring of 1903.

On November 10 a careful count was made by the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company of the number of passengers carried on the bridge railway and surface cars. On the same day a count was made by the employees of the Department

of Bridges of the number of vehicles on the carriageways, and the number of people who walked over the bridge on the promenade. The following statement shows the total number and direction of the people who crossed the bridge in twenty-four hours:

Of these 329,645 people who crossed the bridge on November 10, 1902, about 85,000, or almost 26 per cent., crossed between the hours of 7.30 and 8.30 a. m., and 5.30 and 6.30 p. m.; and over 50 per cent of the entire traffic on the bridge is concentrated into one-sixth of the day.

#### General Repairs.

Surface Car Tracks—During the quarter the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company relaid, with new rails, etc., the surface car tracks on the north and south roadways on the Brooklyn approach, and replaced the paving between and on the sides of the track.

Paving—The work of taking up and relaying the granite block paving on the carriageways of the bridge approaches was carried on, as weather permitted, during the quarter. The paving on the approaches, with the exception of about 200 lineal feet on the north roadway of the Brooklyn approach, is now in good condition.

Superstructure—All the bent or buckled portions of the bottom chords of the stiffening trusses have been straightened out and reinforced with steel channels and cover plates. The examination and repairs to suspender stirrups and rods have been completed on the river span of the bridge, and almost completed on the Manhattan land span. Repairs have also been made to wrapping wire, overflow stays, loose rivets, slip joints, etc. The wearing or surface planking on the roadways of the superstructure is being relaid as fast as new material can be obtained from the contractor furnishing the same.

Painting—The interior of the Manhattan Station, on the gallery and promenade floors, has been painted a light color. The interior of several of the warehouses has also been cleaned and painted.

#### WILLIAMSBURG BRIDGE.

Cables—Nearly all the cable bands had been placed on the cables and most of the suspenders were in place, and a large portion of the waterproofing had been applied when the fire occurred, on the evening of November 10, burning the waterproof covering off of the cables over the saddles on Cables A and B, injuring about 200 wires on Cable A and about 500 wires on Cable B, and completely wrecking the footbridge. New working platforms have since been completed, one on each side of all of the cables, the waterproofing has been resumed, and the work of removing the wreckage of the footbridges has been practically completed. The Board of Experts may be expected to report on the repair of cables and fireproof flooring early next month, and the cables should be completed as far as practicable before the completion of the suspended structure, and be fully repaired early in February next.

Brooklyn Approach—The grading and finishing of the approach streets have been completed. The repairs to the dwellings on Driggs avenue will be finished next month, and some progress has been made on the alteration of the Savings Bank building. The steel structure and masonry approach are now practically completed.

Manhattan Approach—The terminal masonry has been practically completed and the grading work on the approach streets is more than one-half done. The bad weather will probably prevent the laying of the Kosmocrete sidewalk until spring. The curbing is, however, completed, and cinders will be deposited and form a reasonably satisfactory sidewalk during the interval. The lower section of the steel structure is completed and painted, and the upper section has been started, but much delayed during the quarter for lack of material. The shops are now doing better on the work and it is expected that erection will begin in a week or two with much vigor.

Suspended Span—About 93 per cent. of the material for this span has now been delivered at the shops, and about 22 per cent. is manufactured, ready for shipment. Several hundred tons have been delivered at the site, and a large portion of the structure required at the steel towers has been erected. The bottom chords and floor beams have been erected on both sides of the river for two panels out from the towers and the large travelers for further erection have been built and will soon be ready for operation.

Brooklyn Anchorage—Excellent progress has been made in the completion of the main anchorage contract, and it is probable that the contractors will complete this anchorage within the limit of time allowed them for this portion of the work under the contract, or that it will be completed during next month.

Manhattan Anchorage—The contractors have cut a large quantity of granite for this work and have erected some derricks and their plant at the site. It is now expected that the work will be pushed with some energy during next month.

The table below will show the proportion of work completed to date, and the portion of work which has been done during the quarter on all contracts on which work has been done during the quarter, all as measured by the value of the work at schedule prices.

All existing contracts on which work has been done during the quarter, 84 2-10 per cent., 77 4-10 per cent., 6 8-10 per cent.

The Brooklyn tower foundation for this bridge was completed on December 22, 1902, and arrangement was made with the contractor to leave the temporary pier in place until after the proposed addition on top of the pier shall have been made.

An appropriation of \$2,920,000 for this bridge became available on October 16, 1902, and bids for the foundation and pier on the Manhattan side were invited soon after, and on December 13, 1902, the contract was awarded to John C. Rodgers.

Plans and specifications are in preparation for the construction of both anchorages—one in the Borough of Brooklyn and the other in the Borough of Manhattan. The plans require, however, the approval of the Art Commission before such contracts can be made, and the plans are now being prepared for submission to the Art Commission.

#### BLACKWELL'S ISLAND BRIDGE.

The work of construction of the masonry piers has advanced satisfactorily during the last quarter; 126-10 per cent. of the contract time elapsed and 14 per cent. of the work was accomplished.

On December 10, 1902, Professor William H. Burr, Mr. Henry W. Hodge and Director Palmer C. Ricketts, the Commission appointed by your Honor to report on the capacity and arrangement of the roadways, tracks and promenades for the Blackwell's Island Bridge under the original plans and under the revised plans, made its report, which contained the following recommendations:

"That two sidewalks, each not less than eleven (11) feet in width, be placed on the upper deck inside of the trusses and adjacent to them; that the two lines of elevated railway be placed on the upper deck, one on each side of the centre line and as close as possible to the sidewalk; that the lower deck be arranged with two trolley lines on overhanging brackets, one outside of each truss, and with two additional trolley lines outside of the trusses, one line being adjacent to each truss; that a roadway be placed in the middle of the lower deck, with complete separation between it and the trolley lines on either side, and that the clear width of this roadway between guards shall not be less than thirty-six (36) feet, and without columns, requiring a clear width of not less than fifty-six (56) feet between trusses.

"We further recommend that a solid floor on buckle-plates be used on the lower deck between the main trusses, and that the lightest, practicable, continuous fireproof flooring be used on the sidewalks, the two elevated railway tracks and the spaces between the overhanging and the adjacent trolley tracks. The remaining portions of the overhanging trolley tracks should have an open fireproof floor as light as practicable. The central space between the elevated railway tracks should be entirely open to admit light and air to the roadway below. It is the opinion of the Commission that this material decrease in the dead weight of the floors will fully compensate for the small increase in weight resulting from the increased separation of the trusses, without increasing the cost of the structure. It is further the judgment of this Commission that the capacity afforded by this plan is not beyond reasonable provision for the future requirements of the locality served by the bridge."

The plans have been revised accordingly, in order to be submitted to the Art Commission for its approval.

An appropriation of \$1,627,000 became available on October 16, 1902, for this bridge. This will enable contracts to be made for part of the superstructure as soon as plans for the same have been approved by the Art Commission.

Bridges Over Harlem River and in the Borough of Manhattan.

No new construction has been done during the quarter except on the bridge from One Hundred and Forty-fifth to One Hundred and Forty-ninth streets, work on which is still being delayed by the Rapid Transit Tunnel.

A shop and storehouse built on the fender pier of Macomb's Dam Bridge has added greatly to the efficiency of the repair gang, for which a sufficient equipment of tools is being bought, as experience shows them to be necessary.

The asphalt roadway of Macomb's Dam Bridge has been repaired at a cost of \$907.50 and that of Third Avenue at cost of \$481.25.

A solid fender of yellow pine timber has been bolted against the north side of the Willis Avenue Bridge centre pier to protect our electric lighting cables from passing vessels and to prevent the latter from rubbing against the sharp corners of the masonry offsets below water.

This was a slow and expensive piece of work, but promises to be satisfactory and permanent.

Several small jobs of painting have been done, at Willis Avenue, Macomb's Dam and Ship Canal, and Third Avenue Bridge is well along toward completion with one coat.

Four snowstorms during December cost for the hire of extra men and trucks \$756. A large part of the snow which falls on Madison Avenue, Third Avenue and Willis Avenue Bridges has to be carted away and dumped into the river. During December 264 cubic yards of snow was carted away from these three bridges in the Department carts and 3,183 cubic yards in hired trucks.

It has not been possible to procure anthracite coal during the last three months, and soft coal has been bought from time to time on the best terms to be had. No complaints have been received at this office on account of the smoke.

The average number of draw openings per day for this quarter are as follows: Ship Canal, 5 64-100; Macomb's Dam, 3 14-100; Madison Avenue, 5 6-100; Third Avenue, 9 73-100; Willis Avenue, 13 24-100.

#### Bridges Over Newtown Creek.

Vernon Avenue Bridge Construction—The temporary bridge at East avenue was opened for traffic on the 26th of December. The present Vernon Avenue Bridge is being taken down and removed, and the preliminary work of constructing the new bridge has been begun. The property required for the site vested in the City was turned over to the contractor on the 24th of October.

Grand Street Bridge Construction—The new bridge was opened for traffic December 26. It has not been finally accepted by the City, but will be fully completed within a few weeks.

Repairs have been made upon the Greenpoint and Meeker Avenue Bridges, and both are in good condition.

#### Bridges in the Borough of Queens.

Repairs have been made upon the Borden Avenue Bridge, and it is now in fair condition.

Flushing Bridge is in fair condition, but is too light for the traffic. Plans are in preparation for a new bridge on its site, of which the estimated cost, including land, is \$270,000.

Strong's Causeway and Little Neck bridges have been repaired, and are in good condition.

#### BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Repairs have been made and painting done on Hamilton Avenue, Third Street, Union Street, Harway Avenue, Washington Avenue and Metropolitan Avenue bridges.

Plans have been completed for new bascule bridges over the Gowanus canal at Hamilton avenue, Third street and Union street. Plans for the Ninth Street Bridge will be completed in a few days.

The hours for opening the five Gowanus canal bridges were changed November 1, in response to a petition by a number of people doing business on the canal. The change appears to have given satisfaction.

On Thanksgiving Day Bridgetender Breen rescued a man from drowning, near the Metropolitan Avenue Bridge.

#### BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

Repairs have been made at the Fresh Kills Bridge.

#### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

##### Bridges Under Maintenance.

Five draw bridges and two small fixed bridges were maintained and repaired. On December 15 an additional crossing in Pelham Bay Park, consisting of one draw span, two iron arches, and a causeway approach with two small timber spans, was transferred from the Department of Parks to our care.

One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street Bridge Over Mott Haven Canal—Several improvements have been made during the quarter. The electric motor was installed, and a temporary overhead service wire conveys the current from the lines of the Union Railway Company at Third avenue. A conduit has been laid for permanent use, and as soon as cables are laid therein the pole system will be discontinued.

The counterweights have been adjusted, a bridgetender's house built, and a roof has been made to protect the motor, etc. An iron ladder has been set up in the tail pocket, and two manholes put in to make accessible the racks, gears and other machinery.

The bridge now works well. It is operated at about high tide only because the water in the canal is held by gates at other times, and boats cannot enter. On this account all the traffic on the stream passes at once, with resulting delays to vehicular traffic. The boats are now towed by hand, but the President of the Mott Haven Canal Docks has promised to install a power capstan.

Westchester Avenue Temporary Bridge—The end and centre bearings were adjusted, and small repairs were made in the planking and to the pavement of the east approach. The bridge will give fair service until the permanent bridge is completed.

Unionport Bridge—Small repairs were made to the flooring. An order has been placed for steel posts, etc., to reinforce the trusses, and the material will arrive in February.

Eastchester Bridge—The floor was patched, and small repairs made to the trusses. The middle panel of the bottom chord of one of the trusses that had been damaged by a passing tow was straightened and reinforced.

City Island Bridge—This bridge has been maintained in good order. The pavement on the approaches needs repair, and will be resurfaced in some places as soon as the frost is out of the ground. An improvement that will better the service and reduce its cost is the proposed installation of an electric motor to turn the draw. The engineers of the Westchester Lighting Company are working on a plan to demonstrate that an efficient motor can be operated on their circuit, and if their proposition is feasible, an electric equipment will be installed at once.

Pelham Bridge—This structure was transferred from the Park Department to our care on December 15, 1902. It needs immediate repair, and a report on its condition is now being made.

Farmers' Bridge and King's Bridge—Farmers' Bridge is still closed to traffic on account of the construction of the Broadway trunk sewer across the east causeway. King's Bridge needs a few repairs to the planking.

##### Bridges Under Contract.

Westchester Avenue Bridge, Over Bronx River—The piers for the track girders were completed and the steel superstructure erected. The bridge is blocked up in place, but the riveting has been suspended until the trucks and other unfinished machinery are delivered. Little work remains to be done on the east bank, excepting the above mentioned items and the erection of the trestle approach. The west abutment cofferdam was driven during the quarter, and the excavation reached rock at about twenty feet below mean high water. Concrete is now being deposited within the dam. If the weather continues mild, this work should be finished in about three months. The cost of work done to December 31st was \$38,401.50. Negotiations are now in progress between the President of the Borough and the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company for the immediate construction of the bridge over the railroad tracks.

Removal of Piers of Old City Island Bridge—This work was finished on October 31. There is now a fair channel through the narrows between Eastchester and Pelham bays; it will probably be used most frequently by yachts and other sailing vessels. The cost of removal was \$5,813.04.

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the Week Ending Saturday, January 24, 1903.

The following communications were received and ordered on file, action being taken thereon as stated, to wit:

From the Corporation Counsel—  
First—Stating that the Atlantic Transport Line is entitled to a renewal of lease of Pier, new 40, North river.

Second—Stating that it would be inadvisable to apply for an injunction at present to restrain the operation of ferry between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, East river, and College Point by the New York and College Point Ferry Company, and requesting to be advised if the operation of boats is commenced before the granting of a ferry franchise.

Third—In relation to the revocation of permit granted the Manhattan Transport Company for the maintenance of dump south of East Twenty-ninth street, East river, and as to whether the owner of private bulkhead has the right to maintain a dump without permission from the Department.

Fourth—In relation to the application of Henry Leo Connell and Edward P. Herrman for transfer as Rodmen, and advising that it is legal to increase the number of Chainmen and Rodmen without the consent of the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment if the Civil Service rules and regulations are complied with.

Fifth—Advising that if the change from position of Topographical Draughtsman to that of Assistant Engineer was merely a change of title, no vacancy occurs in the former position, but if a vacancy existed in the position of Assistant Engineer or a new position created, there would then be a vacancy in the position of Topographical Draughtsman, to which promotion might be made with the consent of the Civil Service Commission.

Sixth—Requesting the address of Jacob Voorhis, against whom the Department has a claim for three months' rental of property between West Twelfth and West Thirteenth streets, North river. Secretary directed to furnish.

Seventh—Approving form of lease of 359 feet of bulkhead with return at Sherman's creek, Harlem river, to the Fort George Coal and Lumber Company.

Eighth—Requesting to be furnished with information relative to piles driven at Pier, new 36, North river, in controversy between the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company and the Clyde Steamship Company.

Ninth—In relation to sale of machinery contained in the buildings between Twentieth and Twenty-second streets, North river.

From the Comptroller—  
First—Stating that the arrangement suggested for personal messages over telephones is satisfactory.

Second—Transmitting opinion from the Corporation Counsel to the effect that heads of Departments are not limited with regard to the number of their subordinates to the number fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in April, 1902, but that additional employees may be appointed upon compliance with the Civil Service rules and regulations if the salaries of such additional employees do not differ from those assigned to the positions by the said Board, and the additional expense is within the limit of the appropriation of the Department.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—  
First—Stating that no examination is necessary in connection with the increase of salary of Patrick F. Crowley, Hydrographer, from \$1,200 to \$1,500 per annum.

Second—Certifying from the preferred list for reinstatement the name of John F. Murray, Jr., of Bedford Park, N. Y., for appointment to the position of Clerk, at \$900 per annum. Request an additional list, Murray having declined appointment.

Third—Transmitting copy of opinion from the Corporation Counsel advising recognition of increases in compensation of persons who passed examination under the rules and grading in force May 10, 1902.

Fourth—Stating that Robert J. Roberts cannot be reinstated in the Department as Laborer.

Minutes of Special Meeting of the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, Borough of The Bronx.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, met on Saturday, February 14, 1903, at 10.30 a. m., at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Municipal Building, Crotona Park, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue.

Present—President Haffen in the chair; Alderman Harnischfeger, Alderman Leitner, Alderman Peck, Alderman Goldwater.

Absent—Alderman Longfellow.

Public Hearing on Locating an Incinerating Plant in the Borough of The Bronx.

Communications dated February 2, 1903, and February 7, 1903, from Mr. Hermann G. Friedmann were read by the Secretary.

Those who appeared in opposition to the locating of an incinerating plant at St. Joseph's street and Whitlock avenue were: Messrs. Anthony McOwen, Hermann G. Friedmann, David Welch, Mrs. Lester, S. S. Randall and a large delegation of property owners.

On motion, the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, A public hearing was duly held on the 31st day of January, 1903, by the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, Borough of The Bronx, on the locating of a garbage incinerating plant at Whitlock avenue and St. Joseph's street, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, and

Whereas, A further adjourned public hearing was held thereon on this, the 14th day of February, 1903, and

Whereas, Many residents, taxpayers, citizens, and taxpayers' associations and other representative bodies, appeared, objected and protested against the locating thereof; therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, that it is the sense of this Board that the said site selected by the Commissioner of Health and the Commissioner of Street Cleaning for the erection of a garbage incinerating plant in the Borough of The Bronx is not a proper one; and be it further

Resolved, That this Board respectfully recommends that the said Commissioners and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment select another site less occupied for manufacturing and residential purposes and less objectionable for such a plant, as, for instance, Riker's Island, or some such place, until the plant has been shown not to be a nuisance.

No. 272.

Prospect Avenue Paving, from Southern Boulevard to Crotona Park, South.

On motion, the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement, described below, has been received by the President of the Borough of The Bronx; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board, and he has caused a notice to be published in the "City Record" that said petition has been presented to him and is on file in his office for inspection, and of the time when and the place where there would be a meeting of this Local Board, at which the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Board, which time was not less than ten days after the publication of this notice; and

Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board, which did duly consider the same and give a full hearing thereon; and

Whereas, On the 6th day of November, 1902, the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, passed the following resolutions:

"Now, therefore, it is resolved, By the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, Borough of The Bronx, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, that the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

"Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

"For paving of Prospect avenue, from Southern Boulevard to Crotona Park South, with sheet asphalt with concrete foundation, except where grade exceeds two and one-half (2½) per cent., when asphalt block with same foundation to be substituted, space twenty (20) feet in width between streets the entire length of the avenue to be left for ornamental purposes, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York"; and

Whereas, The said resolutions did not include the setting and resetting of curbstones where necessary.

Resolved, That the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, Borough of The Bronx, does hereby amend said resolutions so that the same shall read as follows:

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

For paving of Prospect avenue, from Southern Boulevard to Crotona Park South, with sheet asphalt with concrete foundation, except where grade exceeds two and one-half (2½) per cent., when asphalt block with same foundation to be substituted, and that curbstones be set and reset on said avenue wherever necessary, and that a space twenty (20) feet in width between streets the entire length of the avenue be left for ornamental purposes, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York; and it is hereby

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

Adopted by the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, on the 14th day of February, 1903, Alderman Harnischfeger, Alderman Leitner, Alderman Peck, Alderman Goldwater and the President of the Borough of The Bronx voting in favor thereof.

Sec. 2. The grant of this franchise is subject to the following conditions:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets, avenues, highways, parkways and public places to the construction and operation of said railroad shall be obtained by the grantee, or in the event that such consent cannot be obtained, the grantee shall obtain the favorable determination, confirmed by the Court, of three Commissioners, appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, before said railroad is built or operated.

Second—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railroad by itself, and not to include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successor or assigns. It shall be in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successor in authority. One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railway company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder. The three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railway company. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Third—Upon the termination of the said franchise, right or privilege hereby granted, whether original or renewal, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee necessary for traction purposes upon the streets, avenues, roads, highways, public places, bridges and viaducts, including power, house, equipment, tracks and appurtenances, which plant and property shall be and become the property of The City of New York on the termination of such grant and the payment to the grantee of such valuation. Such payment shall be at a fair valuation of the said plant as property, excluding any value derived from the franchise, and such value shall be determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority.

Fourth—The New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company, its successor or assigns, shall pay for this franchise to The City of New York the following sums of money: During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$15,000, and which shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$15,000; during the remaining twenty years of the term, an annual sum which shall not be less than \$30,000, and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$30,000; for the use of the four bridges described above, during the first term of five years the annual sum of \$4,000 for each bridge; during the second term of five years the annual sum of \$4,500 for each bridge; during the third term of five years the annual sum of \$5,000 for each bridge; during the fourth term of five years the annual sum of \$5,500 for each bridge; and during the last term of five years the annual sum of \$6,000 for each bridge.

Such sums shall be paid into the treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year, after the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railroad, provided, however, that the first payment shall only be for that portion of the above sums as the time of the commencement of operation of any portion of the road, before September 30th next preceding, shall bear to the whole of one year. The fiscal year shall end on September 30th next preceding said date of payment, and the provisions of the Railroad Law as it now exists, or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies shall be strictly followed. The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns to The City of New York for the rights and franchise hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the grantee, its successor or assigns of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute, referring particularly to chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892.

Fifth—The said annual charge or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway company providing for payments for street railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sub-lease of the rights or franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herefor, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sub-lease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute of the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant.

Sixth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto or right, interest or property

therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company, its successor or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—The said railway may be operated by overhead electrical power substantially similar to the system of overhead electrical traction now in use by the Union Railway Company, or by the underground electric system now in use by the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, and by any other motive power except locomotive steam power or horse power which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners, and consented to by the owners of property in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law. Provided, however, that as to such portions of the route of the said railroad which are within the limits of the Borough of Manhattan such railroad shall be operated as soon as practicable by underground electrical power substantially similar to the system of underground electrical traction now in use on the railroads in Second, Sixth, Eighth, Lenox and Madison avenues in the Borough of Manhattan. And, provided further, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, upon giving to the grantee, its successor or assigns, one year's notice in writing, may require it or them to operate its railroad upon the whole or upon any portion of its route by underground electrical power substantially similar to the system now in use on the railroads in the Borough of Manhattan above referred to, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets, highways, bridges and public places of The City of New York.

Eighth—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York, who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and the railway and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.

Tenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall be five cents, and said company shall not charge any passenger more than said sum for one continuous ride from any point on said railway or a line or branch operated in connection therewith to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of The City of New York. The rates for the carrying of property upon the cars of the grantee shall in all cases be reasonable in amount and shall be subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice and hearing to the grantee, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon said grantee, its successor or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such services than provided for by it.

Eleventh—The cars on the said lines as proposed shall run at intervals of not more than thirty minutes, both day and night, and as much oftener as the reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the City ordinance.

Twelfth—The said railway company shall apply to each car run over said railway a proper fender and wheelguard in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Thirteenth—All cars on said railway shall be heated through the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Fourteenth—The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side of said streets, free and clear from ice and snow.

Fifteenth—The said railway company, as long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said street, avenues, highways, parkways, public places, bridges or viaducts, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of said streets, avenues, highways, parkways, bridges and viaducts, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer at its own expense and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Sixteenth—The said railway company so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said streets, avenues, highways, bridges and viaduct shall cause to be watered the entire roadway of each of the above streets, avenues, highways, bridges and viaduct, except when the width shall exceed 60 feet between curb lines, when a roadway of 60 feet shall be watered at least three times in every twenty-four hours when the thermometer is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit.

Seventeenth—In case of any violation or breach of failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this grant may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railway company.

Eighteenth—If any of the streets, avenues, highways, public places or bridges above referred to, or described, shall not now be open or in use as public highways, no right or franchise shall vest in the grantee by virtue of this ordinance until after such streets, avenues, highways, public places or bridges shall be legally opened as a public highway. Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed as an obligation on The City of New York, in respect to the opening of such streets, avenues, highways, public places and bridges.

Sec. 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of Article 4 of the Railroad Law, applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted affecting the surface railroads operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Sec. 4. The grant of this franchise shall not affect in any way the right of The City of New York to grant a similar franchise upon the same or other terms and conditions over the same bridges and their approaches, and the viaduct and over the streets and highways within a distance of 1,000 feet from the end of such approaches to said bridges and viaduct, to any

other person or corporation, and in such case the use of the street railway, including tracks, wires and other equipment constructed thereon by the New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company, aforesaid, shall be granted by such company to any person or corporation which The City of New York may hereafter grant the right or franchise to use any portion of such viaduct, such bridges and their approaches for the street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum which shall not exceed the legal interest on one-half the cost of the construction of such portion of such street railway, and the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars of such company thereon and one-half the cost of maintenance of the tracks, wires and other equipment of the New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company used by the said grantee, including the watering, paving and all the other duties imposed upon the New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company in connection with the maintenance of the portion of its road used by said grantee. And such persons and companies shall have the right to make all track and other connections which may be requisite and necessary to connect with the tracks of the grantee, its successors or assigns, it being intended by this provision to restrict to two the number of tracks upon the bridges above described and the approaches thereto, including the viaduct in West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street.

Sec. 5. The portion of the route above described which passes over the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct and the Central or Macomb's Dam Bridge and its approaches shall be operated by the grantee, its successors and assigns, solely upon the street railway, erected in such streets, bridges, approaches and viaduct by the Union Railway Company of The City of New York, and not otherwise, and upon such terms of payment as may be agreed upon in the manner fixed by the provisions of a certain grant of a street railway franchise to such Union Railway Company of The City of New York, approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 1903 provided that such grant is accepted by said Union Railway Company and in case such grant shall not be accepted by such company then the operation of the Inter-Borough Railway Company over such bridge and viaduct shall be carried on in such manner as may be provided for by subsequent legislation.

Sec. 6. Said railway company shall commence construction within six months from the date when it has obtained complete legal authority to begin construction, including necessary permits from the City officials and departments, and shall complete the construction of at least twenty-four miles of double-track railway on or before July 1, 1905, otherwise this grant shall be forfeited. Provided that such time may be extended under and for causes specified in section 99 of the Railroad Law, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may extend such time for period or periods not exceeding one year if, in their discretion, it seems best so to do, and that the City officials or departments who or which shall at the time of such construction have authority over the said avenues, streets, roads, highways, bridges and viaducts may extend such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year further, if reasonable, in their judgment, by reason of requirements as to the manner of construction imposed by the City officials.

Sec. 7. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Sec. 8. This grant shall not become operative until said railway company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York.

Sec. 9. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
