ACQUIRING LAND FOR PARK IN FOURTEENTH, FIFTEENTH AND SEVENTEENTH WARDS, BROOKLYN.

The following communication from the Corporation Counsel and report of the Bureau of Real Estate of the Finance Department were presented:

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL, NEW YORK, January 4, 1904.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Herewith I transmit for passage by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment resolutions vesting title in two parcels of land within the limits of the new park located in the Fourteenth, Fifteenth and Seventeenth Wards, Borough of Brooklyn.

The owners of these parcels have applied to the court for writs of mandamus to compel the Superintendent of Buildings to issue permits for the construction of certain buildings upon the property. These applications will undoubtedly be granted by the court. Should the buildings be erected, the City would be compelled to pay the owners the additional cost of construction and would therefore suffer a severe financial loss. Under the circumstances the wisest course would seem to be to vest title in the City and thus prevent the erection of any additional structures. This course, I understand, has been approved by you.

APPROACH TO BRIDGE OVER BRONX RIVER TO YONKERS.

Copy of report of the Principal Assistant Topographical Engineer dated and approved by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx, December 16, 1903, is enclosed herewith.

REPORT No. 1717.

NEW YORK, January 11, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The President of the Borough of The Bronx has, under date of January 5, submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a plan showing the location and grades of East Two Hundred and Forty-first street (or Becker avenue), from the New York and Harlem Railroad to the centre line of the Bronx river, as an approach to a bridge over the Bronx river opposite Wakefield avenue, in the City of Yonkers.

Becker avenue is laid down upon the maps of the Borough of The Bronx as a street 100 feet in width, extending from Baychester avenue to the Bronx river. Proceedings to open this street, between White Plains road and the centre of the Bronx river, were initiated by the Local Board of the Chester District during the past year, and were considered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 3, 1903, when the matter was, at the suggestion of one of the members of the Local Board, referred back to that Board, there having been a number of protests against opening proceedings on the ground that it would involve assessments too excessive for the property owners in the neighborhood to bear, as they have already been called upon to pay numerous assessments, especially those for opening and improving the White Plains road.

There are at present no adequate means of crossing the Bronx river north of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, and the City of Yonkers has improved Wakefield avenue, carrying it to the Bronx river at a point opposite Becker avenue (or East Two Hundred and Forty-first street), and is prepared to pay its share of the cost of erecting a suitable bridge across the river at this point. The object of the plan submitted by the Borough President, which plan lays out about 378 feet of this street as a bridge approach, is to provide for the acquisition and improvement of this street as an approach to the proposed bridge without imposing any assessment upon the abutting property owners.

The need of the bridge is unquestioned. That a serious burden would be imposed by a regular opening proceeding cannot be denied. The laying out of this street as a bridge approach is certainly a change in the City map, although the Borough President's communication is not accompanied by a resolution of the Local Board, nor is such action required under section 442 of the Charter, which gives to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment full power to initiate such changes in the map.

The report of the Topographical Engineer, however, states that the Local Board of the Chester District did, on December 24, 1903, pass a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the purchase of the land between the railroad tracks and the Bronx river for the purpose of a bridge approach, and to authorize an issue of Special Revenue Bonds to an amount not exceeding \$25,000 for the completion of a suitable bridge, and as a result of this request the attention of the borough authorities was called to the fact that the map of the City must first be changed by laying out such a bridge approach.

In view of the fact that the City of Yonkers is prepared to do its share toward the building of this bridge, and that it is unquestionably a public necessity, the approval of the proposed change in the map is hereby recommended after a public hearing.

The centre line of East Two Hundred and Forty-first street, from the New York and Harlem Railroad to the Bronx river to be in the prolongation westerly of the centre line of Becker avenue, as the same is located on the ground from White Plains road to First street.

The width of the street to be 100 feet.

2. Grades of East Two Hundred and Forty-first Street.

The elevation of East Two Hundred and Forty-first street at the western property line of the New York and Harlem Railroad to be 68 feet above mean high-water datum.

The elevation at the intersection of the northern line of East Two Hundred and Forty-first street with the eastern line of the Bronx river, which point is 311.36 feet westerly of the New York and Harlem Railroad, to be 71 feet above mean high-water datum.

Resolved. That the President of the Borough of The Bronx cause to be prepared for submission to this Board three similar maps or plans for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible the nature and extent of the proposed change and the location of the immediate adjacent or of intersecting open or established streets, roads, squares, or places, sufficient for the identification and location thereof.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change at a meeting of this Board, to be held in the Old Council Chamber (Room 16), City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 29th day of January, 1904, at 10:30 o'clock a. m.

PARK ON AMSTERDAM AVENUE, BETWEEN ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY-FIRST AND ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY-SECOND STREETS, MANHATTAN.

The following communications were presented:

July 23, 1903.

Mr. W. T. GOUNDIE, Collector of City Revenue, Comptroller's Office, New York City:

DEAR SIR—Referring to our conversation of this morning as to the possibility of the City's converting into a public park the property now owned by it on Amsterdam avenue, West One Hundred and Fifty-first and West One Hundred and Fifty-second streets, which is referred to in your letter to Secretary Stanton of the Comptroller's office of July 10, I beg to say that it seems to me that such a course would be wise for the following reasons:

The plot is occupied at present by three frame and two brick houses, all owned by the City, and for which it receives, as shown in your report above referred to, an aggregate annual rental of \$1,770. This sum is almost absurdly small when the value of the property in this neighborhood is taken into consideration, yet, owing to the fact that both the old and the new Croton aqueducts pass under this property it would be inadvisable to sell it for private use, or to use it for any other than public purposes.

The proposal to locate a park in this vicinity would probably, under ordinary circumstances, receive little consideration, as it is only a thousand feet distant from the Colonial Park, less than 400 feet distant from the Trinity Cemetery, and only 1,500 feet distant from the proposed extension of Riverside Park. It is probable, however, that the general public would derive a benefit from the free use of this area as a park or playground, representing much more than the annual rental.

The present shape of this plot is unfortunate, and to make it available for treatment as a park it would seem as though an additional plot located at the northwestern corner of Amsterdam avenue and West One Hundred and Fifty-first street, having a frontage of 150 feet on the latter street and a maximum depth of about 75 feet, should be acquired. I have not had an opportunity to look up the assessed value of this plot, but it appears from the atlas of that part of the City to be occupied by one frame building, so that its value cannot be very great.

SIR—In reply to your request to supply diagrams and information in relation to the aqueduct property on Amsterdam avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-first and One Hundred and Fifty-second streets, I have to submit the following diagrams attached hereto, as follows:

Parcel 1. Located on the southeast corner of One Hundred and Fifty-second street and Amsterdam avenue is a two-story frame house leased to William Montgomery at \$405 per annum. The lease expires May 19, 1905, subject to the thirty-day clause if the City needs the property for public purposes.

Parcel 2. 100 feet east of Amsterdam avenue on One Hundred and Fifty-second street; a two-story and basement frame house, rented to Mary Connolly for \$33.33 per month, subject to the thirty-day notice to vacate.

Beginning at a point on the easterly side of Guernsey street distant fifty-two (52) feet two and one-half (2½) inches southerly from the southerly side of Bedford avenue, running thence easterly at right angles to Guernsey street one hundred (100) feet; thence southerly parallel with Guernsey street one hundred and fifty (150) feet; thence westerly at right angles to Guernsey street one hundred (100) feet to the easterly side of Guernsey street, and thence northerly along the easterly side of Guernsey street one hundred and fifty (150) feet to the point or place of beginning, together with all the right, title and interest of the owner or owners of said premises in and to the streets lying in front of and adjacent to said premises, should be acquired at a fixed or specified time, hereby directs that title to said parcel above described shall vest in The City of New York upon the 16th day of January, 1904.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Queens—15.

Whereas, On June 5, 1901, the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York approved of the acquisition of the lands and premises bounded by Berry street, Nassau avenue, Lorimer street, Driggs avenue, Manhattan avenue, Leonard street, Bayard street, Union avenue and North Twelfth street, in the Fourteenth, Fifteenth and Seventeenth Wards of the Borough of Brooklyn for use as a public park, and requested the Corporation Counsel, with the consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to apply to the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment to ascertain the compensation which should be made to persons entitled to or interested in said land; and

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, pursuant to section 990 of the Greater New York Charter, deeming it for the public interest that title to one of the parcels of land lying within the lines of said park, to wit:

All those certain lots, pieces or parcels of land in the Seventeenth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn in The City of New York, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northerly side of North Fourteenth street, distant two hundred and twenty-five (225) feet easterly from the corner formed by the intersection of the northerly side of North Fourteenth street with the easterly side of Bedford avenue; running thence northerly at right angles to North Fourteenth street one hundred (100) feet; thence westerly parallel with North Fourteenth street seventy-five (75) feet; thence southerly at right angles to North Fourteenth street one hundred (100) feet to the northerly side of North Fourteenth street, and thence easterly along the northerly side of North Fourteenth street seventy-five (75) feet

to the point or place of beginning, together with all the right, title and interest of the owner or owners of said premises in and to the streets lying in front of and adjacent to said premises, should be acquired at a fixed or specified time, hereby directs that title to said parcel above described shall vest in The City of New York upon the 16th day of January, 1904.

GRADE CROSSINGS OF PORT MORRIS AND NEW YORK AND PUTNAM RAILROADS, THE BRONX.

The following report from the Chief Engineer was presented:

REPORT NO. 1719.

NEW YORK, January 13, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—Inquiry having been made as to the next steps necessary to carry out the provisions of chapter 523 of the Laws of 1903 so far as they relate to the abolition of grade crossings of the Port Morris and Spuyten Duyvil Railroad and the New York and Putnam Railroad, in the Borough of The Bronx, I beg to call the attention of the Board to the fact that all the necessary preliminary work required by the act above quoted has been done, and upon inquiry at the office of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, I am advised that the plans for the construction of the necessary abutments, retaining walls and bridges for the High Bridge and Morris Heights crossings are now being prepared.

Assuming that the President of the Borough of The Bronx will make the necessary plans for the approaches to these bridges, it is recommended that he be requested to proceed with the preparation of such plans, and that he also submit the necessary maps showing such additional lands as it will be necessary for the City to purchase to provide for these approaches.

It was understood that the approaches to the railroad crossings at Fordham Heights would be included in the plans of the Department of Bridges for the new bridge across the Harlem river at East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, and it is also suggested that the Bridge Department be requested to complete these plans as soon as practicable and submit copies of them to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and to this Board.

ACQUIRING FRAUNCES' TAVERN, MANHATTAN.

The following communication from the Bureau of Real Estate of the Finance Department and report from the Department of Taxes and Assessments were presented:

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, October 23, 1903.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—At a public improvement meeting held by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 19, 1902, the following resolutions were adopted in the matter of the proposed purchase of Fraunces' Tavern, located on the corner of Front and Water streets, for the acquisition of the same as a public park:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out a public park in the westerly end of the block bounded by Pearl street, Coenties slip, Water and Broad streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to lay out the aforesaid park as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northerly side of Water street, distant 102.28 feet westerly from the intersection of the northerly line of Water street with the westerly line of Coenties slip, and running thence westerly along the northerly side of Water street for a distance of 131.75 feet to the intersection of the northerly line of Water street with the easterly line of Broad street; running thence northerly along the easterly side of Broad street 113.81 feet to the intersection of the easterly line of Broad street with the southerly line of Pearl street; thence easterly along the southerly line of Pearl street a distance of 112.75 feet to a point on the southerly side of Pearl street, distant 102.94 feet westerly from the intersection of the southerly side of Pearl street with the westerly side of Coenties slip; thence southerly for a distance of 108.05 feet to the point or place of beginning.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-mentioned proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York, by laying out said public park, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Board of Aldermen for its action thereon."

That such resolution was adopted by the Board of Aldermen January 27, 1903, and was thereafter approved by the Mayor, February 3, 1903; and at a public improvement meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held February 6, 1903, a resolution was adopted directing the Secretary of the Board, in pursuance of section 443 of the Greater New York Charter to certify the three similar maps which the President of the Borough of Manhattan has caused to be made and submitted to this Board, and to file one copy so certified in the office of the Register of New York County, one copy in the office of the Corporation Counsel, and one copy in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

I have had an interview with the representatives of the owner of the property known as Fraunces' Tavern, Messrs. Strong & Cadwalader, and have been told by them that the owner will not sell the property to the City at private sale. That being the case, I would respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution authorizing the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the property.

Beginning at a corner formed by the intersection of the easterly side of Broad street with the southerly side of Pearl street; running thence easterly along the southerly side of Pearl street 55 feet 6 inches; running thence southerly 37 feet; thence westerly 20 feet; thence again southerly 1 foot 6 inches; thence again westerly 37 feet to Broad street; thence northerly, along the easterly side of Broad street 42 feet 2 inches to the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less, being the same premises conveyed by Eugene Keteltas, Malvina, his wife, and Jane de Dion, to Thomas McCarty, Perry McCarty, Henrietta Hutton, wife of Charles G. Hutton, and Rosalie M. Steele, by a deed dated November 1, 1873, and recorded in the office of the Register of the County of New York in Liber 1279 of Conveyances, pages 18 to 31, January 16, 1874, and being the premises known on the land map of the County of New York as Lot No. 35, in Block 7, section 1.

Resolved, In pursuance of section 980 of the Greater New York Charter, that the entire cost and expense of said proceeding shall be borne and paid by The City of New York.

ACQUIRING LAND FOR BRONX APPROACH TO WILLIS AVENUE BRIDGE.

The following communication from the Commissioner of Bridges was presented:

DEPARTMENT OF BRIDGES, }
January 14, 1904. }

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, No. 280 Broadway, Manhattan:

GENTLEMEN—On November 9, 1903, my predecessor in office recommended to your Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment that title to the land necessary for an approach to Willis Avenue Bridge from the Southern Boulevard be vested in the City on March 1, 1904. The letter was as follows:

"The proposition to build an approach to the Willis Avenue Bridge from the Southern Boulevard has gone so far that a certain sum of money has been appropriated for beginning the work, and proceedings have been taken to acquire title to the necessary property. The building of the approach now waits upon the vesting of title in the City."

"The Commission of Appraisal was appointed March 18, 1903, and has been at work since that time, but there is not yet any definite prospect of its work being finished; therefore I beg to recommend in order that this much-needed improvement may be speedily accomplished, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under authority of chapter 21, section 1439 of the Charter, direct the Southern Boulevard, Brown place and East One Hundred and Thirty-second street, commencing 245 feet west of Brown place, running 575 feet to Willis avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward, of the Borough of The Bronx, and shown on the plan approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 12th day of September, 1902, vest in the City of New York on March 1, 1904."

Under section 1439 of the Charter title to improved property cannot vest in the City in less than two months, and I therefore beg to recommend now that a resolution pass the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that title to this property vest in the City two months after the date of said resolution.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 16th day of January, 1903, adopted a resolution requesting the Corporation Counsel to acquire title, whenever the same has not heretofore been acquired, for the use of the public, to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending the approach to the Willis Avenue Bridge, Twenty-third Ward, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York; and

Whereas, It appears to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, from the surveys made and information furnished to it that there are buildings upon the lands that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending said approach; and

Whereas, The said Board has received written notice from the Corporation Counsel that Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have been appointed by the Supreme Court, in proceedings to acquire title to said approach, and that the oaths of said Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were duly filed as required by law, on the 18th day of March, 1903; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 990 of the Greater New York Charter, directs that upon the 15th day of March, 1904, the title to each and every piece or parcel of land lying within the lines of said approach to the Willis Avenue Bridge, Twenty-third Ward, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, so required, shall be vested in The City of New York.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and the President of the Borough of The Bronx—14.

SEWER EASEMENT IN VANDEROORT AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

The following communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and accompanying reports were presented, and the matter was referred to the Chief Engineer:

THE CITY OF NEW YORK,

January 14, 1904. }

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, New York City, N. Y.:

Sirs—For many years past in the vicinity of Knickerbocker and DeKalb, Centre and Eldert avenues, Hamburg avenue and Woodbine street, and Evergreen avenue and Halsey street, during heavy rainstorms, there has been great damage wrought to property and, eventually, fixed upon the City, because of the inadequacy of the sewer accommodation in that region. The Engineers of the Department of Sewers have labored diligently to discover a means whereby these recurring floods could be controlled so as to save the property owner and the City from damage. It has been determined by said Engineers that if the City would acquire an easement in Van-

dervoort avenue, from Knickerbocker avenue to the Canal, including the abandoned sewer therein located, that this would in all reasonable probability take care of all ordinary floods and relieve the aforementioned district. The relation of this Vandervoort avenue sewer, the advantage of its purchase and utility can best be ascertained by reference to the letter of Mr. Henry R. Asserson, Chief Engineer of the Sewer Department, which is hereto attached, and a brief reference to the map submitted herewith will show the advantage of this purchase.

Therefore, under section 396 of the Charter, I request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller of The City of New York to immediately acquire whatever rights the present owners have in and to the abandoned sewer and an easement in the property running from Knickerbocker avenue to the canal.

The price heretofore asked for this property by the present owners (Mr. Theodore Jackson and others) is \$30,000. It has been conceded by all that this price is more than the property is worth for any other purpose except the purpose which the City should now use it for, to wit, as a sewer outlet.

The Board of Estimate heretofore authorized proceedings to acquire an easement in Porter avenue for the same sewer outlet as this, but it has been determined by careful calculation that this will cost as much as \$40,000, so that the practical and wise policy for the City to pursue is undoubtedly to authorize the Comptroller to acquire this abandoned sewer and an easement in Vandervoort avenue, which has been an abandoned street since 1873.

Mr. ARTHUR J. O'KEEFFE, Superintendent of Sewers:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the procurement for the City's use of the old Vandervoort avenue sewer, I respectfully state that said sewer is 90 inches in diameter and in perfect condition, and exists within the old lines of Vandervoort avenue, extending from Knickerbocker avenue to the Newtown Creek canal.

This length of sewer was the temporary outlet for a considerable territory, extending as far south as the Eastern parkway, this section having built up much more rapidly than the territory north of Johnson avenue, through which territory the main outlet was to extend, skirting Newtown Creek canal and discharging into the East river at the foot of Dupont street, in Greenpoint.

The extension of this outlet was abandoned, and the sewage in 1886 was conducted through sewers in Johnson avenue and South Fifth street to the East river. When this latter project was built Vandervoort avenue was stricken from the map of the old City of Brooklyn, pursuant to an act of the Legislature, chapter 400, Laws of 1873, and chapter 186, Laws of 1885. This procedure resulted in the ownership of the sewer being obtained by citizens, and, as I now understand, said sewer is owned by Theo. F. Jackson, John T. Burr and Mrs. Caroline B. Knapp, as executors and trustees of the late Andrew E. Burr.

I submit a sketch with this writing, showing old Vandervoort avenue, within the limits where this sewer exists, and the territory immediately adjacent thereto, to elucidate that which I write about.

You will note thereon that the 90-inch sewer in old Vandervoort avenue extends from the Canal to the Knickerbocker avenue sewer. To use same would require merely the breaking down of the bulkhead at the connecting point with the 120-inch sewer in Knickerbocker avenue and the removal of an earthen bulkhead of about 30 feet in extent at the outlet of the sewer at the Canal.

The use of this sewer is desired to assist in preventing the recurrence of flooding premises in flooded districts of this Borough, in the vicinity of Knickerbocker and DeKalb avenues, Central and Eldert avenues, Hamburg avenue and Woodbine street, and Evergreen avenue and Halsey street, which is caused by the insufficient sectional area of the 120-inch and 144-inch sewers, shown in the sketch, in Knickerbocker avenue and Johnson avenue, respectively, said sewers being practically level, of flat bottom, and continually collecting deposit to the extent that their efficiency is reduced at least 38 per cent.

The alteration and reconstruction of said sewer from George street and Knickerbocker avenue to Johnson avenue to Humboldt street should speedily be made, but as this is the subject of another proceeding, I mention it here to this extent only to show the necessity of the immediate procurement of the old Vandervoort avenue sewer.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have authorized the construction of a sewer in Flushing avenue, from Knickerbocker avenue to Porter avenue, to the Newtown Creek Canal, said sewer to be 60 inches in diameter, but said authorization was intended to be an alternate expedient, providing the Vandervoort avenue sewer could not be procured. Its award in contract is being held in abeyance, as the Vandervoort avenue sewer is much more to be desired, being capable of carrying for seven times the volume of water that the Porter avenue sewer will care for, if constructed, and to somewhat lessen the expense of the alteration of the sewers I have before mentioned.

It seems, however, that the proceedings for the procurement of the Vandervoort avenue sewer were not made an alternate measure in the resolutions adopted for relief sewers, although the former President of the Borough endeavored to procure a perpetual easement from the owners of the said Vandervoort avenue sewer, which were not concluded. The owners of the sewer were willing to grant a perpetual easement to The City of New York for \$30,000, providing a suitable trap basin was built at the outlet of same, adjacent to the Newtown Creek Canal, and that the City would keep in repair the bulkhead of the dock, and to maintain a depth of water of ten feet at mean low tide. It was required also that only storm water should be conducted in the old sewer by tapping the Knickerbocker avenue sewer at an elevation of 30 inches above its invert. This feature, however, is required by law, pursuant to section 392 of the Charter.

I indicate on the sketch on Block No. 206, Lot No. 46, under which the Vandervoort avenue sewer projects about a foot and a half, which I am informed is now or was lately owned by Frank Darmstadt. It would appear that an easement would necessarily have to be obtained for this portion of the property also. It also appears from the draft of the proposed easement of Messrs. Theodore F. Jackson et al. that their ownership of sewer and land extends only to Grattan street. If so, the easement would have to be procured in Block 207, Lot No. 39, as the sewer there extends to a considerable depth under the cellar of a house there situated.

The procurement of the use of this sewer by easement proceedings, under section 396 of the Charter, would, in my opinion, result in its use in the shortest space of time. The expense of \$30,000 for this purpose is an economical one for the City, when it is considered that many thousands of dollars are being expended in the settlement of damage suits against the City. Ten thousand dollars would be saved by the non-construction of the Porter avenue sewer, but it would require this amount, plus \$5,000 additional, to build the trap basin mentioned in the easement procedure by Mr. Theodore F. Jackson et al.

Of course the sewer is of no value to any one excepting the City, and Mr. Jackson could not procure a purchaser elsewhere. The building of the trap basin is not an absolute necessity, and I would suggest that every endeavor be made to procure an easement, if such procedure follows without this stipulation.

Marginal street, west side, between Eighteenth and Twenty-third streets.

Twenty-second street, between Marginal street and Avenue A.

The construction of all of these sewers, excepting only the first named, has been authorized with the understanding that the map now offered should be submitted for approval, and such action is hereby recommended.

Will you kindly see that these maps and reports get into the hands of Mr. Lewis, in accordance with the request he made to me?

REPORT No. 1720.

NEW YORK, January 18, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, accompanied by a plan and technical description, recommending certain changes of grade in the territory bounded by Thatford avenue, Newport street, Amboy street and Blake avenue.

The necessity for these changes of grade arises from the fact that the grade charts of the former Town of New Lots (now the Twenty-sixth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn), and of the old Town of Flatlands (now the Thirty-second Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn), were each made independently of and with no regard to the other, the result being that along the boundary line of the wards there are grades which are irreconcilable.

The demand for adjustment at the present time is brought about by a contemplated improvement of this territory by sewerage and paving the streets, and before this work can proceed it is necessary that permanent and satisfactory grades should be established.

The greatest change is along Rockaway avenue, which avenue is crossed by the ward boundary line at Livonia avenue, the present chart grade being lowered 3.44 feet, and at Riverdale avenue, the present grade being lowered 4.15 feet. The new grades, which are proposed seem to be reasonable ones, will provide for surface drainage, and will be better adapted to existing conditions than the present legal grades.

No resolution of the Local Board accompanies the plan, but such a resolution is not required by the Charter; and, while it has been the practice of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to refer all changes of the map to the Local Board having jurisdiction, there is a precedent for action by this Board without reference to the Local Board in the case of the extension of Flatbush avenue as an approach to the Manhattan Bridge.

If the Board concludes to take the initiative in this case, it is recommended that a public hearing be given, and that the plan which has been submitted be approved.

The following communication from the Corporation Counsel was presented:

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL,
NEW YORK, January 14, 1904.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIRS—I am in due receipt of a communication, bearing date January 11, from J. W. Stevenson, Esq., Secretary to your Board, stating that he had been directed by you to request my opinion upon the following questions:

1. Can resolutions of the Local Boards, adopted prior to January 1, 1904, be legally acted upon by the present Board of Estimate and Apportionment?

2. In case it is necessary for the Local Boards now existing to initiate all proceedings for local improvements to be submitted to the present Board of Estimate and Apportionment, is it necessary that new petitions be presented to the Local Boards, or can said Boards act on petitions presented prior to January 1, 1904?

3. Can resolutions adopted by the Local Boards prior to January 1, 1904, and pending on the Calendar of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at the time of a change of the administration, be legally taken up and passed, or do they lapse?

4. Do all matters pending before the Local Boards prior to January 1, 1904, continue before the Local Boards of 1904, or do they lapse? If proceedings begun in 1903 lapse with the administration before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and Local Boards, to what extent are they of no effect?

In answer to this communication I have to say that the subject covered by these questions is one which has been several times carefully considered and passed upon by the Law Department under my two immediate predecessors, Hon. John Whalen and Hon. George L. Rives, and the conclusions at which said Department has arrived are as follows:

The provisions of the Greater New York Charter in reference to the authorization of public improvements requiring the action of both the Local Boards and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment clearly imply that the action of the two Boards constitute a single proceeding of which the act of the Local Board only forms the first step.

I do not think under the Charter provisions that it can be said that the action of the Local Board is a proceeding complete in itself, and that the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is another proceeding, also complete.

If this view is correct the expiration of a Board of Local Improvements by change in its membership causes all proceedings before it to lapse, and in like manner all proceedings in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment presented to that body after action by the Local Boards must lapse by the termination of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by change in its membership.

Not only have the foregoing conclusions been reached by this Department after careful consideration, but it has also been much impressed by the importance of extreme care in the initiation and progress of proceedings having for their end the authorization of improvements which are in the larger part payable by assessments.

As you are, of course, well aware in attempting to enforce an assessment upon the property of citizens, every intendment is against such assessing power, and all presumptions are resolved against that power.

It is, therefore, of the utmost importance that there should not be the smallest cloud upon any part or step of any proceeding instituted to carry out local improvements payable by assessments.

Bearing these considerations in mind, I proceed, therefore, to answer your questions.

The answer to the first question must be in the negative.

The answer to the second question must be that as has been stated by my predecessor, Hon. George L. Rives, in a communication addressed to Hon. Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx, under date of February 6, 1902, the safer course is to require the presentation of new petitions to avoid any possible doubt as to the legality of the proceedings.

The answer to the third question must be that the resolutions referred to lapse.

The answer to the fourth question must be, of course, that as the proceedings mentioned have lapsed, they are of no effect whatever.

I believe the foregoing answers the questions asked by you.

PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York was held in Room 16, City Hall, on Friday, January 29, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock in the forenoon.

LAYING OUT AN APPROACH TO THE BRIDGE TO WAKEFIELD AVENUE, YONKERS, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

In the matter of the proposed laying out and establishing the grades of East Two Hundred and Forty-first street (Becker avenue), from the New York and Harlem Railroad to the centre line of the Bronx river, as an approach to the bridge over the Bronx river opposite Wakefield, Yonkers, the report of the Secretary was presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

The Hon. C. W. Clark, Alderman for the Seventh Ward, City of Yonkers, appeared in favor of the proposition, urging that the bridge be constructed as early as possible. Nobody appearing in opposition, the hearing was closed.

The Comptroller moved that the consideration of the matter be temporarily postponed, and taken up after No. 4 on the Calendar had been disposed of, which motion was unanimously adopted.

CHANGE OF GRADES IN TERRITORY BOUNDED BY THIRD AND HAMILTON AVENUES, GOWANUS CANAL AND FIFTEENTH STREET, BROOKLYN.

REPORT NO. 1723.

JANUARY 25, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Under date of January 12, 1903, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, through his Secretary, has submitted to the Board a plan and technical description providing for changing the grades of certain streets in the territory bounded by Third avenue, Gowanus canal, Fifteenth street and Hamilton avenue. There is no resolution of a Local Board accompanying the plan and communication, the request being made that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment initiate the change in accordance with the authority given it by section 442 of the Greater New York Charter.

The occasion for this request is that a number of streets in the territory referred to were improved years ago by grading, curbing, and, in a number of instances, paving with cobble-stone. It is impossible now to determine whether these streets were graded to a lower elevation than required by the legal grades, or whether there has been a settlement of the material; the latter is scarcely probable, as the surface is, in most cases, regular and shows few signs of unequal settlement.

Buildings have been erected along a number of these streets, and with the demand for new improvements comes the perplexing question as to whether the grades of streets already paved should be made the legal grade, or whether the new streets should be improved strictly in accordance with the present legal grades and the old streets, with their curb and pavements, readjusted. The latter course would involve much expense and considerable damage to property, and, inasmuch as the present surface is sufficiently high to accommodate sewers and to provide ample surface drainage, it is proposed to legalize these surfaces and to change the grades of intersecting streets not yet improved so that they may conform with the streets now paved.

The principal change is along Second avenue, where it is proposed to lower the legal grade by an amount varying from 6 inches to 1½ feet. There is no reasonable objection to this course, and it is recommended that the grades now proposed be adopted after the public hearing required by the Charter.

Thirteenth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of Third avenue and Thirteenth street the grade to be 24.50 feet as heretofore; thence to the intersection of Second avenue and Thirteenth street the grade to be 12.30 feet; thence to the intersection of Thirteenth street and the bulkhead-line of Gowanus canal the grade to be 5.00 feet.

Fourteenth Street.

REPORT No. 1724.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The President of the Borough of The Bronx, in the accompanying letter, dated January 5, 1904, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to fix a date for the vesting of title in The City of New York to the land required for the opening or widening of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, between Webster avenue and the Bronx river.

Proceedings to open this street were initiated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 6, 1903, the object being to acquire the necessary land for the construction of a much-needed bridge across the Bronx river and over the tracks of the Harlem Railroad and those of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, eliminating thereby a very dangerous grade-crossing. In the resolution authorizing these proceedings it was provided that the entire expense should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited. Recognizing, subsequently, that this was an improvement affecting the general public and from which the abutting owners would in no way benefit, the proceedings were discontinued by this Board and begun anew with the provision that the entire expense be borne by the City at large, these latter proceedings being authorized on July 31, 1903. The Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have been appointed, and their oaths were filed on November 30, 1903.

Inasmuch as there are buildings within the lines of the street, it follows that under the provisions of section 990 of the Charter title cannot be vested until six months after the date of the filing of these oaths, or on May 30, 1904. Inasmuch as the railroad company is prepared to proceed with the erection of the bridge across its tracks, and it is important that it be assured of the date on which possession can be obtained, it is recommended that the Board adopt a resolution at the present time providing that the land required for the widening of the street shall vest in The City of New York on May 31, 1904.

Whereas, It appears to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, from the surveys made and information furnished to it that there are buildings upon the lands that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending said East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, and

Whereas, The said Board has received written notice from the Corporation Counsel that Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have been appointed by the Supreme Court, in proceedings to acquire title to said East Two Hundred and

Thirty-third street, and that the oaths of said Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were duly filed as required by law, on the 30th day of November, 1903; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 990 of the Greater New York Charter, directs that upon the 31st day of May, 1904, the title to each and every piece or parcel of land lying within the lines of said East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, between Webster avenue and the Bronx river, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, so required, shall be vested in The City of New York.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the President of the Borough of The Bronx—14.

FILING SECTIONAL MAPS EAST OF BRONX RIVER, THE BRONX.

The following report from the Chief Engineer was presented:

REPORT No. 1725.

JANUARY 25, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—On May 29, 1903, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, after several hearings, adopted what was described as “a general design for a system of streets, avenues, public squares and places, etc.” in that part of the Borough of The Bronx lying east of the Bronx river. This was a general plan without street grades or dimensions. In many cases the widths of the streets were not designated; and the plans were not filed in the offices in which final maps are required to be filed.

On the same date the Board adopted the following resolution:

“Resolved, That the President of the Borough of The Bronx cause to be prepared for submission to this Board in suitable sections and drawn to a larger scale, three similar copies of the adopted general plan of the street system, for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible, in a general way, the nature and extent of the proposed changes, amendments, laying out and extending of streets, roads, avenues, squares or places.”

In accordance with the authority contained in this resolution, the President of the Borough of The Bronx has prepared and forwarded to the Board eight of these sections, designated as sections 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 38, 39 and 47, all of which have been certified by the Secretary of the Board and have been filed in the offices of the Corporation Counsel, of the Register of the County of New York, and of the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

The Borough President has also prepared and forwarded six other sections—namely, sections 34, 36, 39, 41, 45 and 49. None of the last-named have been certified for filing, the reason being that while the first eight sections which were filed provided for a street system in accordance with that which was approved by the Board on May 29, it was found that sections 34 and 36 provided for a large addition to the park areas of the Borough of The Bronx, section 34 indicating a large new park including what is known as Seton Falls, while section 36 indicated an extension of Bronx Park by the addition of about 100 acres. Although these two additional park areas were indicated upon the tentative map of May 29, the Board probably did not intend to approve of so substantial an addition to the public parks of the borough, which already comprise 15 per cent. of its entire area.

The consideration of this question has resulted in raising some doubt as to the method of procedure which has thus far been followed, and as to what constitutes a final map. It is therefore suggested that the advice of the Corporation Counsel be asked as to whether it will not be necessary, or at least more prudent, to have each one of these sections submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its formal and specific approval before these sectional plans are certified and filed in the offices of record designated in section 442 of the Charter.

The sectional plans referred to show the widths of streets, but they do not give either block dimensions or grades, and it is suggested that the Corporation Counsel be also asked to advise this Board whether such a plan is a final map within the meaning of the Charter, or a map upon which street opening proceedings can be based.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

LAYING OUT APPROACH TO BRIDGE OVER BRONX RIVER TO WAKEFIELD AVENUE, YONKERS, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The matter of laying out and establishing the grades of an approach to the proposed bridge to Yonkers, which was laid over temporarily, was taken up.

On motion of the Comptroller, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the map be referred back to the Engineer for the purpose of showing a 50-foot bridge approach instead of a 100-foot approach.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the President of the Borough of The Bronx—14.

On motion of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest so to do, proposes to change the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out and establishing grades of East Two Hundred and Forty-first street (Becker avenue), from the New York and Harlem Railroad to the centre line of the Bronx river, as an approach to the bridge over the Bronx river opposite Wakefield, City of Yonkers, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, more particularly described as follows:

TECHNICAL DESCRIPTION FOR THE LAYING OUT OF A BRIDGE APPROACH WITHIN THE LINES OF EAST TWO HUNDRED AND FORTY-FIRST STREET (OR BECKER AVENUE), BETWEEN THE NEW YORK AND HARLEM RAILROAD AND THE CENTRE LINE OF THE BRONX RIVER, IN THE BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

1. Location of Bridge Approach.

The centre line of the bridge approach to be the prolongation westerly of the centre line of Becker avenue (or East Two Hundred and Forty-first street), as the same is

located on the ground, from White Plains road to First street, the width of the bridge approach to be 50 feet, extending 25 feet on each side of the said prolongation of the centre line of Becker avenue (or East Two Hundred and Forty-first street).

2. Grades of the Bridge Approach within the Lines of East Two Hundred and Forty-first Street (or Becker Avenue).

The elevation of the bridge approach at the westerly property line of the New York and Harlem Railroad to be 68 feet above mean high-water datum.

The elevation at the intersection of the northerly line of the said bridge approach with the easterly line of the Bronx river to be 71 feet above mean high-water datum.

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of The Bronx cause to be prepared for submission to this Board three similar maps or plans for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible the nature and extent of the proposed change and the location of the immediate adjacent or of intersecting open or established streets, roads, squares, or places, sufficient for the identification and location thereof.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change at a meeting of this Board, to be held in the Old Council Chamber (Room 16), City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 26th day of February, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions and a notice to all persons affected thereby that the proposed change will be considered at a meeting of the Board, to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 26th day of February, 1904.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the President of the Borough of The Bronx—14.

EASEMENT FOR SEWER IN VANDERVOORT AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Chief Engineer was presented:

REPORT NO. 1721.

JANUARY 21, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on January 15, 1904, there was referred to the Engineer of the Board a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated January 14, asking that the Comptroller be authorized to acquire whatever rights the present owners may have to the abandoned sewer lying in what was formerly Vandervoort avenue, between Knickerbocker avenue and the Newtown creek canal, and also to acquire an easement permitting the maintenance of this sewer and the construction of a silt basin and outlet between Johnson avenue and the canal. This letter is accompanied by copies of communications from the Superintendent of Sewers and the Chief Engineer of Sewers of the Borough of Brooklyn, and a plan showing the location of the property affected.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has already authorized the construction of a system of relief sewers for the Borough of Brooklyn which are designed to prevent the flooding that has so frequently occurred after heavy rain storms and which has involved the City in many suits for damages. The main system of relief sewers was authorized on July 8, 1903, while on July 29 the construction of an additional outlet through Flushing avenue and Porter avenue was authorized; and on July 31, 1903, the acquisition of an easement permitting the building of an outlet for this sewer at the foot of Porter avenue was also authorized.

The entire problem of securing an outlet for these relief sewers has been so fully reviewed in various communications that have been submitted to the Board, that only the briefest possible outline will be here given. More than thirty years ago it was expected that the main outlet for the large Knickerbocker avenue sewer would be located in Vandervoort avenue, through which it would find its way to the Greenpoint section, reaching the East river through Huron street; and that portion of this outlet between Knickerbocker avenue and what was then a tidal creek just north of Johnson avenue was constructed. The general plan was then changed, and the sewer was carried down Knickerbocker and Johnson avenues to find its outlet through the great South Fifth street tunnel sewer. Soon afterward Vandervoort avenue was closed by a special act of the Legislature, and the sewer already built therein seems to have been forgotten until it was discovered during the recent construction of a sewer in Johnson avenue. Upon examination it was found to be in good condition, and available as an outlet for storm water if a connection could be established with the basin at the head of the Newtown creek canal, which had been bulkheaded and otherwise improved by the present owners of the abutting property. Negotiations looking to the acquisition of an easement permitting the building of this outlet were not successful, and as an alternative proposition, the building of the sewer above referred to, through Knickerbocker avenue and Porter avenue, with an outlet in this same basin at the foot of Porter avenue, was authorized on July 31, last.

This plan was never considered entirely satisfactory; the measure of relief which it would furnish would be only a fractional part of that which would be given by the Vandervoort avenue sewer, nearly all of which is already built, and there is required only the right to maintain it and to construct a silt basin and outlet.

Two distinct means of acquiring this right suggest themselves. First, the replacing on the City map of Vandervoort avenue between Knickerbocker avenue and the basin at the head of the canal and acquiring the same as a public street; a street 50 feet in width would be ample to accommodate the sewer, but the laying out and opening of such a street would probably be strongly opposed by the owner of the property through which it would pass, especially if the expense of the opening were assessed wholly or in part upon the adjacent property. Secondly, the acquisition of an easement permitting the maintenance of the sewer already built, and the construction of the necessary basin and outlet.

Inasmuch as time is an important element, it might be desirable to secure this easement by negotiations between the Comptroller and the owner, and it is stated in the letter of the Borough President that the value set upon this easement by the owner is \$30,000. The restrictions that would be imposed upon the City in connection with such an easement, and the precautions which the City might properly take for the protection of its interests, have been carefully considered in the reports already submitted to the Comptroller by Mr. Andrew J. Provost, Jr., of his own engineering staff.

If the Board decides that the saving of time is too important to permit of the laying out and opening of Vandervoort avenue, it is recommended that the Comptroller be authorized to secure, by negotiation with the owner or owners, an easement permitting the use and maintenance of the sewer in Vandervoort avenue already constructed and abandoned, and the construction of a silt basin and outlet at the foot of said avenue; and if this be done it is also recommended that the proceedings initiated on July 29, 1903, for the construction of a sewer in Flushing avenue, between Knickerbocker avenue and Porter avenue, and in Porter avenue, between Flushing avenue and the basin of the Newtown creek canal, and the proceedings initiated on July 31, 1903, for the acquisition of an easement at the foot of Porter avenue, both be discontinued.

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Brooklyn has requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to acquire, for the purpose of maintaining an outlet to the relief sewer in Knickerbocker avenue, an easement in certain lands situated in the said Borough of Brooklyn, more particularly described below.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in pursuance of the provisions of section 396 of the Greater New York Charter, hereby directs that The City of New York acquire an easement for the use of the public, for the purpose of constructing said outlet sewer, in the following described lands and premises, viz.:

A strip of land twenty (20) feet in width, lying ten feet on each side of the centre line of what was formerly Vandervoort avenue, and running from the easterly

side of Knickerbocker avenue, just south of Grattan street, to the southerly side of Johnson avenue; and to a strip of land sixty feet in width, following the lines of the old Vandervoort avenue, running from the northerly side of Johnson avenue to the basin at the head of the Newtown creek canal.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he hereby is authorized to acquire such easement on behalf of The City of New York, and such rights as the owners of the land may have in the sewer lying within the land covered by said easement.

Resolved, That the entire cost and expense of acquiring the said easement shall be borne and paid by The City of New York.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

CHANGE OF STREET LINES IN TERRITORY BOUNDED BY CONEY ISLAND AVENUE, CHURCH AVENUE AND OCEAN PARKWAY, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Chief Engineer was presented:

REPORT NO. 1728.

JANUARY 25, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—In February, 1903, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn submitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, providing for closing and discontinuing East Seventh street, between Caton place and Ocean parkway. The Engineer of the Board in reporting upon this resolution called attention to the fact that in the territory bounded by Coney Island avenue, Church avenue and Ocean parkway there was a great deal of confusion in the street plan, and recommended that instead of changing the lines of East Seventh street the entire territory be considered, and a new plan submitted which would do away with the present uncertainty and confusion.

This suggestion was acted upon, and in September of last year a new plan showing the rearrangement of these streets was submitted. A defect was, however, found in the technical description accompanying this plan, to which the attention of the Borough President was drawn. This has now been remedied, and the plan is submitted to the Board for adoption.

Before the adoption of a map of the former Town of Flatbush there was a system of streets in this territory which was ignored in making the new map, a new street plan being superimposed upon the old one with no regard whatever to existing lines and improvements. In some cases buildings have followed the original street lines, and in others the new lines, and it is to remedy this chaotic condition that a general rearrangement of the street plan was proposed. This is now before the Board, and the work has been done in such a manner as to cause the least possible disturbance of existing improvements.

The plan and technical description are herewith submitted, with a recommendation that they be adopted after the public hearing required by the Charter.

1. Montgomery street, from Coney Island avenue to East Seventh street; Montgomery street to be 50 feet wide, and to agree with the street as at present in use.

2. Johnson street, from Coney Island avenue to Ocean parkway; Johnson street to be 60 feet wide, and to agree with the street as in use at present, from Coney Island avenue to Bowne street; thence to be prolonged westerly in a straight line to Ocean parkway.

3. Henry street, from East Eighth street to Ocean parkway; Henry street to be 50 feet wide, and to agree with the street as in use, from East Eighth street to Bowne street; thence to be prolonged westerly in a straight line to Ocean parkway.

4. Caton place, from Coney Island avenue to Ocean parkway; Caton place to be 70 feet wide, and to agree with the street as in use.

5. East Eighth street, from Church lane to Johnson street, and from Johnson street to north line of former Caton avenue; East Eighth street to be 50 feet wide, and to agree with the street as in use.

B—Striking from the Map of the City.

East Seventh street, from Henry street to Ocean parkway; East Eighth street, from Church lane to Caton avenue; Caton avenue, from Coney Island avenue to Ocean parkway.

The lines of these streets to be taken from the City map as indicated on the accompanying map.

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of Brooklyn cause to be prepared for submission to this Board three similar maps or plans for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible the nature and extent of the proposed change and the location of the immediate adjacent or of intersecting open or established streets, roads, squares or places sufficient for the identification and location thereof.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change at a meeting of this Board, to be held in the Old Council Chamber (Room 16), City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 26th day of February, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions and a notice to all persons affected thereby that the proposed change will be considered at a meeting of the Board, to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 26th day of February, 1904.

ACQUIRING FRAUNCES TAVERN, MANHATTAN.

The following report from the Chief Engineer was presented:

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at its meeting held on January 15, 1904, instructed the Engineer of the Board to prepare a plan showing a change in the public park including Fraunces Tavern, which was placed upon the map of the Borough of Manhattan on December 19, 1902, and comprising the westerly half of the block bounded by Water, Broad and Pearl streets and Coenties slip. This change was to consist in showing only the lot occupied by Fraunces Tavern as a public park, and removing from the map of the City the additional area placed thereon as a park by the resolution of December 19, 1902.

In accordance with these instructions I beg to submit herewith a plan and technical description indicating the change suggested, for such action as the Board may decide to take.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest so to do, proposes to change the map or plan of The City of New York by closing and discontinuing so much of the public park in the block bounded by Water, Broad and Pearl streets and Coenties slip as is not occupied by the building known as Fraunces Tavern, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northerly side of Water street 102.28 feet westerly from the intersection of the northerly line of Water street with the westerly line of Coenties slip; running thence westerly along the northerly side of Water street for a distance of 131.75 feet to the intersection of the northerly line of Water street with the easterly line of Broad street; running thence northerly along the easterly side of Broad street 71.64 feet more or less to the southerly side of the lot occupied by Fraunces Tavern; running thence easterly along the southerly side of the said Fraunces Tavern 37.25 feet more or less; running thence northerly along the said Fraunces Tavern 3.7 feet more or less; running thence easterly along the southerly side of the said Fraunces Tavern 26.08 feet more or less to the southeasterly corner of the said Fraunces Tavern; running thence northerly along the easterly side of the said Fraunces Tavern 37.42 feet more or less to the southerly side of Pearl street; running thence easterly along the southerly side of Pearl street 57.5 feet more or less to a point on the southerly side of Pearl street distant 102.94 feet westerly from the intersection of the southerly side of Pearl street with the westerly side of Coenties slip; running thence southerly a distance of 108.05 feet to the point or place of beginning.

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of Manhattan cause to be prepared for submission to this Board three similar maps or plans for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible the nature and extent of the proposed change and the location of the immediate adjacent or of intersecting open or established streets, roads, squares or places sufficient for the identification and location thereof.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change at a meeting of this Board, to be held in the Old Council Chamber (Room 16), City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 26th day of February, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.

CHANGE OF LINES OF JAY STREET, RICHMOND.

The following communication from the President of the Borough of Richmond and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOROUGH OF RICHMOND,
NEW BRIGHTON, N. Y., October 29, 1903

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City Hall, New York City:

GENTLEMEN—It was found in the development of the track system of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company that the main east-bound track would overrun the point of intersection of the proposed new easterly lines of Jay street and Richmond terrace, as adopted on the map filed with you some months ago for the widening of Jay street, and other ferry approach streets at St. George.

As the absolute location of the line at this point is of very little moment, we agreed in conference with the railroad company to recommend a slight modification by connecting Jay street with Richmond terrace by means of a curve instead of the intersection of the street lines. This would place the easterly new line of the streets as widened a sufficient distance to the west of the tracks so as not to interfere with their development. At the point in question the property of the railroad company is so narrow that the City's taking the portion referred to would be a very serious matter.

I have therefore caused to be prepared the accompanying map, which I submit herewith, one tracing and three prints. This has been prepared so as to show the property to be abandoned and the property to be taken, as compared with the originally adopted map, and was prepared in consultation with the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and the Bureau of Street Openings.

I would suggest, therefore, the adoption by the Board of this map, and that the Board direct the Corporation Counsel to take such steps as may be necessary for the acquisition of properties at the point in question based on the new map rather than on the one as filed.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The President of the Borough of Richmond, with the accompanying letter dated October 29, 1903, presents a plan showing a slight change in the lines of Jay street, between Hamilton avenue and Stuyvesant place.

The change consists simply in substituting curves for an intersection of straight lines at the deflection in Jay street where it becomes Richmond terrace.

On April 17, 1903, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, after a public hearing, adopted a plan laying out adequate approaches to the ferry terminal at St. George. In this action the Board of Aldermen subsequently concurred.

The reason for the proposed change is to avoid interference with the plans for development of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company, and, inasmuch as the change improves the alignment of the street, the adoption of the plan herewith submitted is recommended, after a public hearing as required by the Charter.

SIR—In the accompanying letter, dated January 15, 1904, the Secretary to the President of the Borough of Queens asks that the drainage plan for Sewerage District No. 9 of the Third Ward (formerly the town of Flushing), Borough of Queens, which was submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment last year for its approval, be considered by the present Board and approved.

On October 6, 1903, a report was submitted upon this plan, and the matter was placed upon the calendar of the Board for November 13 following, but consideration of it was not reached. Inasmuch as this plan did not originate in a Local Board, but was prepared by the President of the Borough of Queens as a duty imposed upon him by section 444 of the Charter, it is recommended that the plan with the report already submitted be taken up by the Board for consideration at the present time.


