The Secretary presented the following communication from the Interborough Rapid Transit Company:

NEW YORK, December 6, 1907.

Mr. W. R. WILLCOX, Chairman, Public Service Commission, 154 Nassau Street, City: DEAR SIR—Schedules being prepared for the operation of trains to Borough Hall, Brooklyn, have developed that the most satisfactory service can be given by the following arrangements:

1st. Operate all of the West Farms express trains through to Borough Hall, Brooklyn.

2nd. Operate all Broadway express trains around the South Ferry loop as at present.

3rd. After midnight, when express trains are withdrawn, operate West Farms local trains through to Borough Hall station, Brooklyn.

4th. After midnight, when express trains are withdrawn, operate all Broadway local trains around the South Ferry loop.

In order to install this character of service, it becomes necessary to close the City Hall loop station for local trains from about midnight until about 7 A. M. A careful count has been made to ascertain the number of people who exit from the City Hall station between 12 o'clock midnight and 7 A. M., and we found that there were only about 17 people per hour leaving the trains at this station during the time mentioned; so it is very evident that very little inconvenience will be experienced on the part of any one by discontinuing the train service at City Hall station during the hours named, the distance not being great from that station to the Brooklyn Bridge station.

The character of service here outlined will permit us to operate trains so that all of them will stop at the Bowling Green station, north and south bound, in both directions.

The schedule for the West Farms express trains during rush hours to Borough Hall, Brooklyn, will be on a three minute headway.

The schedule for the Broadway express trains during rush hours under this schedule will be on a four and one-half minute headway.

Proper notice will be given you of the date upon which we will ask permission to open up that portion of Contract No. 2 to Borough Hall, Brooklyn, which we trust will be inside of thirty days.

In the meantime we would like approval of the plan here outlined for a discontinuance of local trains around the City Hall loop between the hours of midnight and 7 A. M., in order that our schedules may be properly prepared and tried out before opening.


