place and keep a taxicab stand, size 3 feet wide 2 feet deep 7 feet high, at the northeast corner of Longwood ave. and Westchester ave., Borough of The Bronx, provided the said taxicab stand shall be erected so as to conform in all respects with the ordinance in such cases made and provided, not to be used for advertising purposes. The work to be done at his own expense under the direction of the President of the Borough, such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen.

Dear Sir-1 most respectfully submit a report of the City Prison, Borough of Brooklyn, for the quarter commencing July 1, 1910, and ending September 30,

The old stable in the prison yard has been torn down. Electric lights have been installed in the Administration Hall, Counsel Room, Warden's, Head Keeper's and General Office and Head Keeper's apartments. The prison kitchen has been moved from the building in the yard to the Administration Building and an iron grill thoor cut through from the male prison to the kitchen. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Ridders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawling of construction work may also be seen there. figures.
