### MESSAGE FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message of his Honor the Mayor:

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, February 11, 1886.

Honorable Board of Aldermen :

The Honerable Board of Aldermen:

You have been specially called together for the purpose of taking appropriate action upon the very sudden death of General Hancock. As the General has been for so many years a resident of this city, known personally to many of us and respected by all, it is specially fitting that you should pay proper tribute to his memory. He has been a prominent figure in our social life, and his rare social qualities will make his loss most keenly felt among a large circle which has learned to know him and to love him.

It has been said that General Hancock was a born soldier. He was indeed, a soldier! A soldier without fear, and without reproach, brave in battle, generous in victory. But he was more than this. He was above all things an admirable man. His rectitude of purpose has always been above suspicion. His character was chivalrous to a degree, and his personality was so marked as to draw to him all men with whom he came in contact. No figure in the late war is more attractive than was his. No commander was more beloved by his men.

These qualities, rare in themselves, remforce that claim upon our gratitude and our affection to which General Hancock's splendid services to his country entitle him. Those services can never be forgotten and need not be described, though they serve to deepen that sense of loss which all of us feel and which is almost personal in its nature. His memory is a rich legacy and one which his countrymen will ever cherish.

In connection therewith Alderman Ryan offered the following:

Whereas, Major-General Winfield Scott Hancock died at his residence on Governor's Island, in New York Harbor, on Monday, the 8th inst., in the sixty-second year of his age, and the sad event imposes upon this Common Council, for themselves and as the representatives of the People of this metropolis, the duty of taking such proceedings as will best tend to manifest sorrow for the death, and respect for the memory, of the deceased soldier; and

Whereas, In the death of Major-General Hancock, the republic loses another illustrious son—one that has shed lustre upon our Republican institutions, and left an indelible impress of greatness upon the epoch in which he lived, second only to that of the other illustrious soldier who preceded him in death only a few months, General U. S. Grant; and

Whereas, To enumerate here the services of the deceased soldier to his country; to portray his character; to recount his noble deeds, his great sacrifices; his fidelity to duty, his love of country, and devotion to its welfare, would be entirely superfluous, as his name and fame are cherished in every household in the land, and extends to every country and clime. As a soldier, he was simply "Hancock the Superb." Dignity and simplicity were inseperably blended in his nature, and his commanding yet benign presence attracted and attached to him all who came within the influence of his personality. He was the Bayard of the American army—a chevalier without fear and without reproach; and

Whereas, One characteristic and eventful act of his brilliant career has, probably more than any other, endeared him to every lover of free government, and has placed his name, in the temple of Fame, next to that of the immortal Washington: Clothed with despotic and unrestricted power as Military Commander of the Department of the South, after the close of the civil and the term held of a military despotism, or restore to them the blessings of self-governments, at his own will and pleasur

Whereas, In the general grief for the death of such a man, it is the sad duty of the People and Government of this city to participate, and this Common Council should adopt such measures as will tend to show the estimation in which he was held, to manifest sorrow for the irreparable loss inflicted upon our country, to give expression to our attachment to his memory, and to sympathize and condole with his bereaved family and sorrowing friends; be it therefore Resolved, That out of sorrow for the death, and respect for the memory of Major-General W. S. Hancock, it is hereby recommended that our citizens close their respective places of business and refrain from any secular employment on Saturday (to-morrow), the 13th instant, that being the day set apart for the funeral ceremonies; that the public offices of the corporation be closed on that day, except those specially required by law to be kept open; that the flags be displayed at half-staff on all the public buildings in this city; that the owners of private buildings, and the owners or masters of vessels in our harbor, be requested to display their flags at half-mast on said day, and that a special committee of five members of the Common Council be appointed, with instructions to invite the co-operation of his Honor the Mayor, and the heads of the several executive departments, to represent the City Government at the funeral of the deceased; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolution be suitably engrossed, duly authenticated by the corporate seal of the city, attested by the Clerk of the Common Council, and transmitted to the family of General Hancock, as an additional evidence of respect for the memory and sorrow for the death of the illustrious soldier.

In seconding the adoption of the preamble and resolutions, Aldermen Morgan, Quinn, and Mooney paid tributes of respect to the memory of General Hancock, and President Nooney, before putting the question to the Board, alluded to the grant loss sustained by the country, a

To the Board of Docks :

GENTLEMEN-I have the honor to submit the following report of the work under my supervision for the quarter ending January 31, 1886.

Battery Section-North River.

BOAT LANDING.

The masons at work during the quarter pointing the boat-landing and bulkhead adjacent on the north, under Secretary's Order No. 3319.

Pier " A," North River.

Exposed portions of iron work of pier were painted and tarred and some of the fender-piles were painted and wearing-pieces placed on sides of piles where required.

Building on Pier " A."

Building on Fier "A."

Mr. Charles O. Brown, contractor for erecting building on Pier "A," under contract No. 225, carried on work during the quarter, and nearly completed the same.

A boiler for steam-heating has been erected at the outer end of the building by the Babcock & Wilcox Company, and fitted up with tools, etc., all in accordance with their agreement. The main steam-pipe and return for heating the building have been erected, all but four radiators have been placed and connected, steam-trap and four waste-traps have been connected with boiler, and a pump has been furnished by Matthew Thompson, under his contract therefor (No. 227, class 3).

The plumbing for the building has been done by John Spence, under his contract therefor (No. 227, class 1), and it is nearly completed.

Under the contract for gas-fitting, all the gas-pipes have been put in and partly painted, and two brackets and lamps for the outer end of the pier have been furnished by Moody & Bracken, under their contract therefor (No. 227, class 2).

The office window shutters and doors were repaired.

The New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company made repairs to the roadway in front of shed between Piers, new 20 and 21, North river, and repaired the plank roadway leading to Pier, new 20, and relaid the plank roadway leading to Pier, new 21, North river.

Chambers Street Section-Resolutions of Board, November 27, 1877, and November 21, 1878.

Beach Street Section-Resolution of Board, July 16, 1879.

Additional fender piles were driven at north end of Section to protect the same.

Laight Street Section - Resolutions of Board, July 30 and November 3, 1880.

The Union Dredging Company continued dredging in half slips on each side of Pier, new 27, North river, under contract No. 132.

New silt basins to connect with marginal sewer were placed in new pavement near Piers, new 37, new 38, new 39, new 40 and new 41, North river, being six in number, under Secretary's Orders Nos. 4766, 4767, 4768, 4769, 4770 and 4783, and the necessary repairs to the pavement in connection with the same were made.

Bulkhead between Piers, new 41 and 42, North River.

The cobble pavement on bulkhead between Piers, new 41 and 42, North river, was repaired from time to time as required, under Secretary's Orders Nos. 4874 and 4986.

Pier, new 42, North River.

The pavement at entrance to pier was repaired under Secretary's Order No. 5024.

A new iron cover was placed on silt basin on newly paved land near the foot of Barrow street, North river, under Secretary's Order No. 4806.

Pier, new 43, North River.

An area of about two hundred and fifty square yards of pavement south of south cross-walk leading to Pier, new 43, North River, was relaid by George F. Doak, under Treasurer's Order No. 11719, the force of the Department taking up blocks and refilling the joints of same with coal-tar

and gravel.

The lifting gate at entrance of shed was repaired under Secretary's Order. No. 4699, and some bracing-piles and a spring-pile along the south side of the pier was repaired, under Secretary's Order. No. 5088.

Pier, new 46, North River.

The backing-log and water-pipes on Pier, new 46, were repaired under Secretary's Order No. 4639, and the hoisting gate at inner end of pier was repaired and some glazing in office was done under Secretary's Order No. 4732.

West Twenty-third Street Section-South End-Resolution of Board, November 5, 1880.

Replaced and refastened backing logs which were displaced by the high tides, on bulkhead veen Piers, new 56 and new 57, North river.

West Twenty-third Str.et Section-North End-Resolution of Board, June 28, 1882. Replaced and refastened the backing-logs on approach to Pier, new 60, North river.

West Thirty-first Street Section-Resolution of Board, 8th August and 19th September, 1883.

Received and placed 73 loads of earth filling in rear of bulkhead wall by tickets. Total to date 15,545 loads.

West Thirty-second Street Section-Resolution of Board, 22d October, 1885.

BULKHEAD WALL.

DREDGING.

The Union Dredging Company excavated and removed to,804 cubic yards of material from site of bulkhead wall.

Messrs. Brown & Flemming delivered and deposited 1,513 cubic yards of rip-rap stone, and 1,206 cubic yards of cobble stone on site of bulkhead wall, and stored 837 cubic yards of cobbles on bulkhead wall north of Pier, new 60, for future use on work.

PILING AND WOOD-WORK.

Began driving piles for this section of wall and 208 vertical piles, 24 bracing piles have been driven, and I binding frame made. Also drove 7 mooring piles to secure the pile-driver in place.

West Seventy-eighth to Eightieth Street, North River-Resolution of Board, January 30, 1884.

1,229 cart loads of stone chips and small stone and 4 loads of large stone were received and placed behind the new bulkhead between Seventy-eighth and Eightieth streets, North river.

West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

Blacksmith, making and repairing iron work for different sections and floating property, and carpenters stripping and setting up moulds for concrete blocks for use at West Thirty-second street

The usual receipts and issues of stores, materials and supplies were carried on at this yard, and us cement tests have been made.

East Seventeen'h Street Yard.

The yard has been maintained and the property there taken care of,

The derrick "City of New York" has had repairs made to the steam-pipes, flanges, water-gauge and machinery, and old pieces have been cut out of the deck planking and circle pieces, and new ones put in. Bolts in tower have also been screwed up, and the boiler was tested by the Police Department on the 11th November, 1885.

The ten-ton derrick has pumped out the pocket mud scows, and the inside of the house on it has been painted and the machinery and engine cleaned and kept in order.

Dredge No. 3 remains in possession of Union Dredging Co.

Dredge No. 4 lies near foot of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, Harlem river.

The ten pile drivers have been kept in order.

No. 1. Had machinery and engine cleaned.

No. 2. Ways repaired, made plugs for pump holes and machinery, and engine cleaned.

No. 3. Machinery and engine cleaned and inspirator repaired under Treasurer's Order 11684.

No. 5. (Used as pile cutter) Machinery and engine cleaned and fitted out suction pump.

No. 6. Machinery and engine cleaned.

No. 7. Engine and machinery cleaned and plugs made for pump holes.

No. 9. Machinery and engine cleaned and inspirator repaired under Treasurer's Order 11684.

No. 10. Machinery, engine and water tanks cleaned; repaired hatches, made ladder and repaired machinery.

Tug "Manhattan" has been laid up for repairs since August 15, 1885. Contract No. 226 A, for deficient therefor a brackets and lamps for the outer end of the pier have been furnished by Moody & Bracken, der their contract therefor (No. 227, class 2).

Pier, new 1, North River.

At work pointing joints in granite, under Secretary's Order No. 4057. Work nearly completed.

No. 11. Machinery and engine cleaned.

Tug "Manhattan" has been laid up for repairs since August 15, 1885. Contract No. 226 A, for additional repairs than those specified in the contract was given to the same persons, who have repaired the hull in a thorough and complete manner, so that now it is as good as new.

The machinery has been thoroughly repaired under Contract No. 226 B, by Mr. John W. Sullivan, and two new brass condensors have been put in by him also. All these repairs were completed on the 25th January, 1886.

The necessary towing of the Department while the "Manhattan" has been laid up, has been done by hired tugs of Mr. V. Vierow.

The nine deck scows are laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard; they are all in good order and condition; repairs having been made in particular to scows B and C.

Small divers' scow is laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

Nine dredging machine mud scows, Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 11 and 12, were sold at public auction at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, North river, on Saturday, 28th November, 1885.

The boring machine "Woodcock," had machinery, etc., cleaned, and is now laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

Various other small pieces of miscellaneous work was done in connection with the floating property and machinery of the Department.

### Surveying Party.

The surveying party has given all the lines and levels necessary for the various work of the

Department.

Two surveys have been made on the North river water front, four on that of the East river, and eight on the Harlem river, two of which on the North river, two on the East river, and four on the

Harlem river, were in connection with the supervision of work being done by private parties under permit from the Board, and plots of the same have been made for the records of the Department.

18,076 disk soundings have been taken by the surveying and sounding parties in 85 slips, and 163 rod soundings in 4 slips, of which 11,115 disk soundings in 49 slips and 163 rod soundings in 4 slips were on the North river, and 6,061 disk soundings in 36 slips were on the East and Harlem rivers. These soundings are all recorded.

### Survey of the Harlem river under Secretary's Order No. 4548.

The necessary rangers have been set from time to time and the tide gauges have been kept in order by the surveying party.

184 borings were made on the Harlem river above the Third Avenue Bridge, and the "Woodcock" borer finished for the season on 28th December, 1885.

6 borings were made on Cromwell's Creek between One Hundred and Sixty-first and One Hundred and Sixty-fifth streets with the "Woodcock" borer and 1,430 hand rod borings were made in the same locality. A section of the One Hundred and Sixty-first Street Bridge was taken out and replaced to allow passage through of the boring machine. Finished borings 7th November, 1885.
