

# HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

Report for the Quarter ending December 31, 1890.

WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections and reinspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police was 112,626.

The number of causes of complaint returned was 6,507.

The number of complaints received from citizens was 3,40°

All of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation

and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent, during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 650 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 156 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 24 permits to land rags (in bulk), under bonds; and 109 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code. The death-rate of the quarter was lower than for the corresponding quarter of the past five years, being only 21.00 against an average rate since 1885 of 22.89, the next lowest rate being 21.55 in 1889.\* The total number of deaths was also lower than in 1886 or 1888, being 8,660 against 9,555 and 8,933, respectively.

There was a marked decrease in the prevalence of zymotic diseases, as compared with the average for the past five years, not only the death-rate but the number of deaths being below the average, in every case. As compared with 1889, the deaths from diphtheria\_were\_328 in 1890, against 264, from measles 151 against 46, and from scarlet fever 104 against 65, while there was a decrease in the deaths from enteric (typhoid) fever (112 in 1890 against 121 in 1889), and from malarial fevers (46 in 1890 against 65 in 1889).

The deaths from diarrhoeal diseases were less than in any of the preceding five years; the deaths from cancer show a slow but steady increase, very nearly in proportion to the increase of population, while the deaths from phthisis numbered only 1,234, less than in any year since 1885. The deaths from pneumonia show a tendency to increase from year to year, and during this quarter were 1,180, representing a death-rate of 2.86 against an average rate of 2.66 for the preceding five years.

The deaths of children under five years of age were 3,099, less than in 1886, 1887 or 1888, and representing a death-rate, based upon the entire population, of only 7.51 against an average rate of 8.54 for the past five years.

#### OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY-NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending December 31, 1890, the number of notices issued by the Board was 6,035. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

The subjects of the notices of the Board above referred to are as follows:

Air shafts cleaned, disinfected, graded, paved, connected with sewer.



The 748 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.52, against 24.73 for the previous week and 28.46 for the corresponding week of 1890.

Diphtheria, scarlet fever and measles show an increase for the week, the reported cases being respectively 103, 146 and 453, against 90, 134 and 413. The increase of diphtheria is most marked above Twenty-sixth street, on the east side, and between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets, on the west; of scarlet fever in the southeasterly part of the city as far up as Rivington street, and mostly descreasing elsewhere; of measles the east side, between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, and above Eighty-sixth street on both sides, with a tendency to descrease elsewhere.
