

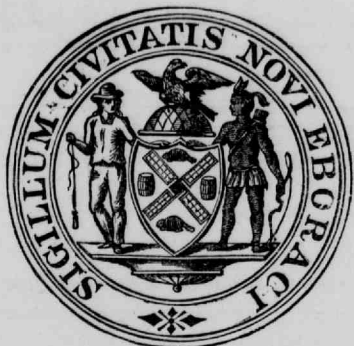

The Board met this day.

The weekly report of assistant sanitary engineers on the plumbing and drainage of new houses was received and ordered on file.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 3, 1882:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,659, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 739 tenement-houses, 96 private dwellings, 57 other dwellings, 19 manufactories and workshops, 22 stores and warehouses, 33 stables, 47 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 2 roadways, 39 sunken and vacant lots, 63 yards, courts and areas, 88 cellars and basements, 174 waste-pipes and drains, 219 privies and water-closets, 26 streets, gutters and sinks, 7 dangerous stairways, 10 smoky chimneys, 5 cesspools, and 9 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors was 534.

During the past week 170 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

79 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

131 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 168 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 143 houses, 143 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

13 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 486 births, 42 still-births, 258 marriages, and 719 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 3, 1882; this shows an increase of 21 births, 44 marriages and 31 deaths, and a decrease of 15 still-births when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 64 births, 110 marriages and 59 deaths, and a decrease of 11 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 5; measles, 10; scarlatina, 8; diphtheria, 5; croup, 1; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 2; inanition, 4; rheumatism and gout, 5; pneumonia, 7; marasmus, Tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; convulsions, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and pretermatural births, 4; suicides, 3; while the deaths from whooping cough increased 5; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 10; diarrheal diseases, 6; alcoholism, 2; bronchitis, 3; heart diseases, 9; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 16; drowning, 4. The number of deaths from typhus fever, cancer, phthisis pulmonalis and aneurism was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 140 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 203 under two years, 299 under five years, and 42 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 5 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 41.59 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 160 were in institutions, 274 in tenement-houses, 169 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 133 on the first, 173 on the second, 127 on the third, 84 on the fourth, 26 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth. 696 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 23 non-residents; 71 were stated to be single, 156 married, 73 widowed, and the condition of 419 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 719; still-births, 42; bodies in transit, 17; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 74 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 486 births; 258 marriages; 42 still-births; 719 deaths; 17 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 78 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and - transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 50 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 3, 1882, was 66.8 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.702, the mean humidity was 59, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,391, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.78 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 655 deaths and still-births, or 86.07 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 12; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 265; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 88; Greenwood (undenominational), 59; Lutheran, (undenominational), 94; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 22; Evergreen (undenominational), 45; Woodlawn (undenominational), 30; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 11; Union (Methodist Protestant), 6; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 7; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 4; Washington (undenominational), 5.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending May 27, 1882, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 16; Second, 2; Third, 3; Fourth, 12; Fifth, 7; Sixth, 8; Seventh, 22; Eighth, 33; Ninth, 43; Tenth, 27; Eleventh, 40; Twelfth, 89; Thirteenth, 23; Fourteenth, 23; Fifteenth, 13; Sixteenth, 16; Seventeenth, 40; Eighteenth, 25; Nineteenth, 105; Twentieth, 40; Twenty-first, 42; Twenty-second, 49; Twenty-third, 10; Twenty-fourth, 6.

The actual mortality for the week ending May 27, 1882, was 694; this is 21 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1881, and 153.2 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.28 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,276,004.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia was 24.81; St. Louis, 16.05; Boston, 18.81; New Orleans, 35.12; Charleston, 35.36; Dayton, 16; Savannah, 16.71; Lowell, 22.73; Worcester, 12.13; Cambridge, 14.79; Fall River, 16.98; Lynn, 13.58; Springfield, 18.72. REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending June 3, 1882, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending May 27, 1882.

SIR—There were 719 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 3, 1882, which is an increase of 31, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 34 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending May 27, 1882, was 694, which is 153.2 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.28 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,276,004.

Whereas, By virtue of the power vested in the Finance Department by section 31, chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, the Comptroller has decided to remit the penalties imposed by this Department against Holmes Brothers for non-completion of work within the time agreed upon under his two several contracts, as follows: for repairing piers at Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Thirty-fourth, Fortieth, Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Twenty-ninth streets, North river, dated September 14, 1881, and for which there was deducted the sum of \$1,250 from audited claim No. 7216, on December 14, 1881, and for building Pier, new 55, North river, dated February 18, 1881, and for which there was deducted the sum of \$6,350; as follows—from audited claim No. 6996, on August 24, 1881, \$1,050; from audited claim No. 7022, on September 7, 1881, \$1,350; from audited claim No. 7076, on October 12, 1881, \$1,550, and from audited claim No. 7187, on December 14, 1881, \$2,400; therefore,

Resolved, That a requisition be and hereby is directed to be drawn on the Comptroller for the sum of \$7,600, being the amount now due to the said Holmes Brothers, under said contract consequent upon the penalties being remitted, and that the Bookkeeper charge the amount to the said contracts, so that the accounts of the Department shall exhibit estimates No. 2 and final under contract for repairing piers at Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Thirty-fourth, Fortieth, Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Twenty-ninth streets, North river, as settled and paid for in full in the sum of \$17,795.09, and estimates Nos. 3, 4, 5 and 6, under contract for building Pier, new 55, North river, as settled and paid in full in the sum of \$6,280 each.

Whereas, It is desirable that the work of the Department in the improvement of the East river front on the plan heretofore adopted by the Commissioners governing the Department of Docks, and

approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, may be proceeded with without any interruption or hindrance on the part of alleged owners of property affected by such improvements; and Whereas, It is alleged and claimed that the title to the easterly half of Pier 2, East river, Pier 3, East river, and the westerly half of Pier 4, East river, is vested in the estate of Peter Goelet, deceased, and various owners, therefore be it

Resolved, That the owners or alleged owners of the easterly half of Pier 2, East river, Pier 3, East river, and the westerly half of Pier 4, East river, be and hereby are requested to furnish to this Board any evidence, papers or documents in their possession establishing their right and title to the said premises, and also to communicate in writing to this Board, at an early day, the lowest sum or price for which they will dispose of the said property to the City, with any and all right, title and interest they may have or possess in and to the same, and to all land under or over the water adjacent to and between said piers.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request Mr. Cruikshank, the agent of the owners of the said premises to meet with the Board on Friday, at 1 o'clock P. M., to confer in relation to the matter.

RULES AND REGULATIONS ESTABLISHED for the government and proper care of piers, bulkheads, slips, and other wharf property, under the provisions of subdivision 7 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, by the Board of the Department of Docks, and published, to take effect on and after

MAY 1, 1882.

The said subdivision 7, among other things, provides as follows:

"The violation of or disobedience to any rule, regulation, or order of said Board shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, on complaint of said Board."

And every person guilty of a violation of or disobedience to any of the following rules or regulations, in addition to the penalties thereby fixed and imposed, to be recovered in civil actions, is liable to be prosecuted for a misdemeanor and to be punished by such fine and imprisonment, or by both.

No. 1.—No piles shall be driven, nor shall any platform be erected, nor shall any filling-in of any kind be made on any part of the water-front of the city, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars, for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant of any pier or bulkhead, or of any water-front property or right, who shall cause or permit any such work to be done upon his premises before such permit therefor has been obtained, and under the further penalty of fifty dollars for each and every day which shall elapse before any piles so driven, or platform so erected, or material so filled-in, without such permit being first obtained, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time which may be allowed for such removal, by a notice served upon such owner, lessee, or occupant, by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, to be also recovered from such owner, lessee, or occupant.

No. 2.—No shed, building, office, tally-house, or other structure shall be erected, nor shall any derrick, hoisting-mast, coal-hopper, sign, or advertising device, or other erection or obstruction of any kind be placed or maintained upon any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, nor upon any reclaimed land, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board; and if the owner, lessee, or occupant of any such premises, or the owner, lessee, or agent of any such structure, erections, or obstructions, shall fail to comply with a notice served by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district to remove any such structure, erection, or obstruction, after the expiration of the time allowed by such notice for the removal, such owner, lessee, occupant or agent, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day, which shall elapse before any such structure, erection or obstruction, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time for the removal thereof specified in said notice.

No. 3.—No cargo shall be discharged from any vessel upon any bulkhead or wharf structure, at which such vessel is being unloaded, after service by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, upon the owner, consignee, master, or other officer, or stevedore, of such vessel, of a notice that such bulkhead or structure will be endangered by the placing of additional cargo thereon, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars for every such offense, and a further penalty equal in amount to the damages of every description which shall be caused by the further discharging of cargo upon such bulkhead or wharf structure, after the service of the said notice, both of such penalties to be recovered from such owner, consignee, master or other officer or stevedore, severally and respectively.

No. 4.—All goods, merchandise, and materials of every kind, landed or placed on any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, or upon reclaimed land, must be removed therefrom without unnecessary delay, and within twenty-four hours after the Corporation Wharfinger for the district shall have served upon the owner, shipper, or consignee, of such cargo, a notice to remove the same, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day for each and every day, during which any part of said cargo shall remain upon such pier, bulkhead, structure, or land, after the expiration of the said twenty-four hours, to be recovered from such owner, shipper, or consignee, severally and respectively.

No. 5.—All goods, merchandise and materials of every kind encumbering any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, or reclaimed land, after the time designated for the removal thereof shall have expired, will be liable to be removed by the Board to any warehouse or yard, at the sole risk and expense of the owner of any such property, and all expense incurred for such removal and storage or otherwise, shall be and become a lien thereon, and such goods, merchandise and materials will not be delivered to the owner until the expense of such removal and storage has been paid.

No. 6.—No person shall construct or maintain any engine-house, tally-house, or other small structure, under a permit of the Board, on any unshedded pier, or other wharf structure, unless the same be placed on wheels so as to admit of easy removal thereupon when required, and to prevent the accumulation of dirt or refuse thereunder, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day which may elapse before the discontinuance of such offense.

No. 7.—No vessel of any kind shall be loaded or discharged by horse power, nor shall stones or similar cargo be discharged from any vessel, upon any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, unless proper plank-

ing be provided to protect the surface of such pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure from injury consequent upon the travel of the horse, or the throwing of the stones or similar cargo thereupon, under a penalty of five dollars a day for each horse so employed, and of twenty-five dollars for each offense of discharging such stones or like cargo, upon such pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 8.—No sand shall be discharged from any vessel unless canvas or similar material be extended from the vessel's side to the bulkhead or wharf structure at which such vessel is being unloaded, to prevent the falling of the sand into the water, and if the surface of any such wharf structure is not sufficiently tight to prevent the sand dumped thereon from going through into the water, then no sand shall be discharged thereon from any vessel, unless canvas or similar material be first laid thereon to receive the sand, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 9.—The owners, lessees and occupants of every pier, wharf and bulkhead in the City of New York shall keep the same in good repair, and the slips adjacent thereto properly dredged; and whenever, in the judgment of the Board, it shall be necessary so to do, written notices, signed by the President or Secretary of said Board, shall be served upon the owners, lessees or occupants, or collector of wharfage of any such pier, wharf or bulkhead, or the slip adjoining the same, on or in which repairs or dredging are required by said Board, specifying the nature and extent of the repairs or dredging so required, and the time within which such repairs must be made, or such dredging done; and in case the owners, lessees or occupants so notified, fail to comply with the terms and requirements of such notice, they shall forfeit and pay a penalty of fifty dollars per day for every day which shall elapse before they comply with such notice.

No. 10.—No ashes, refuse, offal, fruit, vegetables or any other substances, shall be thrown into the waters surrounding or adjacent to any pier or bulkhead, or any other part of the water-front of the city, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant, severally and respectively, of any pier, bulkhead, wharf structure, or other property, from which any such substance shall be thrown, or from the person actually throwing the same; or if any such substance be thrown from any vessel lying in waters within the jurisdiction of the Department, whether berthed or not, then such penalty to be recovered from the owner, consignee, or master of such vessel, severally and respectively.

No. 11.—No snow or ice shall be dumped into the waters adjacent to the water-front of the city, except from the piers, bulkheads and other places designated from time to time, by the Board, for such dumping, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee or occupant of any pier, bulkhead or other wharf property, from which any such snow and ice shall be dumped, or from the person actually dumping the same, severally and respectively.

No. 12.—All lumber, brick, or other material in bulk discharged on any bulkhead not shedded, shall be at once removed, or, if not so removed, shall be placed at least twenty feet from the edge of the bulkhead, pending removal, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day, for each and every day such lumber, brick or other material shall remain on the bulkhead, to be recovered from the owner or consignee of such lumber, brick or other material, or from the person placing, or causing the same to be placed, on such bulkhead, severally and respectively.

No. 13.—The charges for wharfage and dockage of all vessels admitted to any of the piers or bulkheads constructed under the new plans adopted by the Department, shall be at the same rates as are now, or shall hereafter be, fixed and established by laws of this State, until otherwise ordered by the Board.

No. 14.—The term "Board," when used in the foregoing rules and regulations, shall be taken to mean "The Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New York," and the term "Corporation," when so used, shall be taken to mean "The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York."

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF HUBERT O. THOMPSON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

"The said Commissioner of Public Works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of Croton water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law."—Chap. 574, Sec. 5, Session Laws of 1871.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family the sum of one dollar per year shall be charged.

Each flat or suit of rooms for one family shall be charged ten dollars per year where they have hot and cold water, stationary wash-tubs, bath, and water-closet, with the privilege of using meter.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

BAKERIES—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, the sum of three dollars per annum.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding houses, bathing establishments, and barber shops.

BOARDING SCHOOLS shall be charged at the rate of from fifteen to fifty dollars each; and school houses at the rate of from ten to twenty dollars each per annum.

BUILDING PURPOSES—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COW STABLES—For each and every cow, the sum of seventy-five cents per annum.

FOUNTAINS or jets are prohibited.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows:

HORSES, PRIVATE—For two horses there shall be charged the sum of six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, the sum of two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, the sum of one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, the sum of one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART—For each horse, the sum of one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS—For each trough on sidewalks, the sum of twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste, this must be kept in order.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PORTER HOUSES, TAVERNS AND GROCERIES shall be charged an extra rate of either ten to twenty-five dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works. LAGER BEER SALOONS, with no water fixtures in the saloon, five dollars per annum.

PRINTING OFFICES AND REFECTORIES shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SLAUGHTER HOUSES shall be charged at the rate of five cents for every bullock slaughtered.

STEAM ENGINES shall be charged by the horse-power as follows: for each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, and about stables, is prohibited, because it is absolutely necessary to save water for more necessary purposes. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the Police or Inspectors may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge, each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets or urinals in which the Croton water from any service pipe or hydrant connecting with a privy vault or man-hole shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

WATER-CLOSET RATES—For hoppers, of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each per year twenty dollars.

For any pan-closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe waste, as provided by the Board of Health Regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 73, chapter 335, Laws of 1873 (City Charter), water meters, of the pattern approved in accordance with said section 73 of the Charter, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 73, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet for all manufacturing or other purposes.
