#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 4, 1876: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,532, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 705 tenement-houses, 85 private dwellings, 41 other dwellings, 17 manufactories and workshops, 51 stores and warehouses, 54 stables, 30 slaughter-houses, 6 markets and market places, 1 bone house, 28 fat-rendering establishments, 13 piers and bulkheads, 5 manure dumps, 1 public drain, 1 brewery, 13 sunken and vacant lots, 55 yards, courts, and areas, 70 cellars and basements, 173 waste-pipes and drains, 117 privies and water-closets, 41 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 10 dangerous stairways, 2 coal yards, 2 cisterns and cess-pools, 3 pigeries, 3 dangerous chimneys, 2 violations of Code, 11 other nuisances, together with 2 visits to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 490.

During the past week 60 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

65 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

52 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 27 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 20 houses, 20 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

1 case of small-pox was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending November 4, 1876, there were issued from this Bureau 432 burial permits for city deaths, 21 for bodies in transit, and 42 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 432 deaths, 170 marriages, 471 births, 42 still-births, 21 applications for transit permits, and 48 returns from Coroners. There were 9 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 1 transcript of birth record, 5 of marriage, and 20 of death, were issued from this Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 11, 1876: The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,355, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 733 tenement-houses, 47 private dwellings, 32 other dwellings, 4 other buildings, 5 manufactories and workshops, 10 stores and warehouses, 43 stables, 2 market and market places, 54 slaughter-houses, 2 soap works, 1 stock yard, 2 fat-rendering establishments, 2 manure-dumps, 1 coal yard, 19 sunken and vacant lots, 53 yards, courts, and areas, 68 cellars and basements, 120 waste-pipes and drains, 98 privies and water-closets, 33 street-gutters and sidewalks, 7 dangerous stairways, 2 dangerous chimneys, 8 other nuisances, together with 12 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 398.

During the past week 33 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 35 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

47 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 32 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 22 houses, 22 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

4 cases of small-pox were removed to hospital by Ambulance Corps.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH AN ORDINANCE OF the Common Council, "In relation to the burial of strangers or unknown persons who may die in any of the public institutions of the City of New York," the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction report as follows:
