

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 4, 1876: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,532, as follows, viz. : I public building, 705 tenement-houses, 85 private dwellings, 41 other dwellings, 17 manufactories and workshops, 51 stores and warehouses, 54 stables, 30 slaugh-ter-houses, 6 markets and market places, I bone house, 28 fat-rendering establishments, 13 piers and bulkheads, 5 manure dumps, I public drain, I brewery, 13 sunken and vacant lots, 55 yards, courts, and areas, 70 cellars and basements, 173 waste-pipes and drains, 117 privies and water-closets, 41 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 10 dangerous stairways, 2 coal yards, 2 cisterns and cess-pools, 3 pig-geries, 3 dangerous chimneys, 2 violations of Code, 11 other nuisances, together with 2 visits to cases of contarious disease. of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 490.

During the past week 60 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

65 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

52 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 27 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and funigated 20 houses, 20 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. I case of small-pox was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending November 4, 1876, there were issued from this Bureau 432 bur-ial permits for city deaths, 21 for bodies in transitu, and 42 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 432 deaths, 170 marriages, 471 births, 42 still-births, 21 applications for transit permits, and 48 returns from Coroners. There were 9 searches of the registers of births, mar-riages and deaths, and 1 transcript of birth record, 5 of marriage, and 20 of death, were issued from this Bureau from this Bureau.

During the past week 33 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 35 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

47 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-smks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 32 premises where contagious diseases where found, and have disinfected and fumigated 22 houses, 22 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

4 cases of small-pox were removed to hospital by Ambulance Corps.
