No. 694.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Amended Greater New York Charter, to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), the proceeds whereof, or as much thereof as may be necessary, to meet the extraordinary expenses incurred by the City on account of the disaster to the steamer "General Slocum," on Wednesday, June 15, 1904; all expenditures on account of the fund hereby created to be under and by direction of the Mayor.

Whereas, The Surrogate's chambers and court-rooms in the Hall of Records have recently been repaired and are now ready for occupancy except for the furnishing thereof; and

Whereas, There is not time to advertise for bids on the contracts for the purchase of carpets for the Surrogate's chambers and court-rooms in the Hall of Records,

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of Brooklyn be and is hereby authorized to expend without public advertisement a sum not to exceed \$1,800 for the purpose of furnishing carpets for the chambers and court-rooms of the Surrogate in the Hall of Records, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Brooklyn states that it is desirable that a contract entered into between The City of New York and J. Charles Weschler on August 31, 1903, for installing Medina sandstone pavement, in accordance with prevailing city specifications on Adams street, from Johnson street to Tillary street; from Concord street to Sands street, and on Concord street, from Fulton street to Adams street, and from Pearl street to Jay street, shall be so modified as to permit the contractor to install granite block pavement instead of Medina sandstone pavement, in order that the work upon those streets may be completed without delay,

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York does hereby authorize the President of the Borough of Brooklyn to so modify the contract entered into on August 31, 1903, between The City of New York and J. Charles Weschler for installing Medina sandstone pavement, in accordance with prevailing city specifications, on Adams street, from Johnson street to Tillary street; from Concord street to Sands street, and on Concord street, from Fulton street to Adams street, and from Pearl street to Jay street, as to make the requirements for paving material granite block, laid according to city specifications, instead of Medina sandstone, laid according to city specifications. The contract with regard to foundation, curbing, tar and gravel joints, price, etc., and all other items except the said Medina sandstone and the said granite pavement not to be modified or changed.

AN ORDINANCE granting permission to John S. Sills & Sons to lay, maintain and operate one spur railroad track across Thirty-seventh street, between Eleventh and Twelfth avenues, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 18, 1904, granting permission to John S. Sills & Sons to lay, maintain and operate one spur railroad track across Thirty-seventh street, between Eleventh and Twelfth avenues, in the Borough of Manhattan, upon the terms and conditions therein contained, to wit:

Resolved, That the consent of the Corporation of The City of New York be and the same is hereby given to John S. Sills & Sons to lay, maintain and operate a single spur railroad track across Thirty-seventh street, between Eleventh and Twelfth avenues, in the Borough of Manhattan, as shown and indicated upon a map marked "Map showing proposed track crossing West Thirty-seventh street, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, to accompany the application of John S. Sills & Sons for the right to construct and operate same." Note.—Track for which application is made shown by red lines. Dated October 11, 1904, and signed John S. Sills & Sons, by Howard L. Sills for the firm. Copy of which map is annexed hereto and which is made a part hereof, upon the following terms and conditions:

First—Such consent shall be for a term of fifteen (15) years from the date when this consent is approved by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal for ten (10) years; provided, however, that The City of New York, acting through either the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or the Board of Aldermen, may cancel such consent upon one year's notice in writing.

Second—The said John S. Sills & Sons, their successor or assigns, shall pay into the treasury of The City of New York the following sums of money:

During the first five years the annual sum of.....	\$63 00
During the second five years the annual sum of.....	66 00
During the third five years the annual sum of.....	70 00

Such sums shall be paid into the treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year; provided, however, that the first payment shall be only that proportion of \$63 as the time between the approval of this consent and November 1 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Third—The terms for the renewal term shall be fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment six months prior to the expiration of the third term of five years as above, and shall not in any event be less than the amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually during the third term of five years as above, and no renewal of this consent shall provide for a further renewal.

Fourth—Upon the revocation or termination of this consent the said firm, its successor or assigns, shall forthwith remove the plant and property, with its appurtenances, from the street, and the surface of the street shall be restored to a condition equal to that of the surrounding surface or pavement. In default of the performance of this condition by the said firm, its successor or assigns, the proper local authorities may cause such track, property and plant to be removed from the street aforesaid and the surface thereof to be restored in the manner above described, at the expense of the said firm, its successor or assigns, and such expense to be recovered by The City of New York by action or otherwise.

Fifth—The consent hereby given shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the acts of John S. Sills & Sons, their successor or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—The said railroad track may be used and operated by locomotive steam power or by any other motive power which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners, in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law, excepting overhead electrical power.

No car, motor or engine shall be permitted to remain stationary within the limits of Thirty-seventh street at any time, and no loading or unloading from said cars shall take place while the same are within the limits of the said street.

Seventh—The railroad track constructed under this consent shall be maintained and operated solely for the purpose of the transportation of goods, wares and merchandise and for no other purpose, and especially for no purpose in connection with passenger traffic as commonly understood.

Eighth—Such railroad track shall be constructed, maintained and operated in the latest improved manner of street railroad construction and operation, and solely upon the terms and according to the lines and surveys of the character of the rails and other parts of the construction approved by the President of the Borough of Manhattan. Such railroad track of the said firm, its successor or assigns, shall be maintained in good and safe condition throughout the terms of this consent.

Ninth—Such railroad tracks shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of The City of New York.

Tenth—The said firm, its successor or assigns, shall, during the existence of this consent, keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the said street between the rails of its track and two feet in width outside of such rails, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of the said street, and in that event the grantee, its successor or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Eleventh—The said firm, its successor or assigns, shall at all times keep the street between the rails of its track and two feet in width outside thereof free and clear from ice and snow.

Twelfth—Said firm shall be liable for all damages to persons or property and to the street by reason of the construction or operation of said railroad track, and it is a condition of this consent that The City of New York assumes no liability to either persons or property on account of this consent.

Thirteenth—This consent is upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted relating to surface railroads operating in The City of New York, shall be strictly complied with.

Fourteenth—The said firm, its successor or assigns, shall commence the construction of the railroad track under this consent and complete the same within one year from the date when it has obtained the necessary permits and resolutions of the City officials and departments, and on or before November 1, 1905; otherwise this consent shall be forfeited forthwith and without any proceedings either at law or otherwise for that purpose; provided, however, that such time may be extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a period not exceeding six months.

Fifteenth—This consent is upon the express condition that the said firm, within thirty days after it has been duly authorized to construct, maintain and operate its railroad track hereunder and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City of New York the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150), either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance of the terms and conditions of this consent, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the consent, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality or construction of the railroad track. In case default in the performance by said firm of such terms and conditions, the City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said firm.

In case of any drafts so made upon the security fund the said firm shall, upon thirty days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150), and in default thereof the consent hereby given may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Sixteenth—This consent shall not become operative until said firm shall duly execute an instrument in writing wherein said firm shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this consent fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within thirty days after the signing of this resolution by the Mayor.

Seventeenth—The compensation herein reserved shall commence from the date of the approval of this resolution by the Mayor.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 21, 1904, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding seventy-three thousand dollars (\$73,000), to provide means for the widening and improvement of that portion of One Hundred and Tenth street, between Fifth and Seventh avenues, known as Cathedral Parkway, Borough of Manhattan, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding seventy-three thousand dollars (\$73,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

BOARD OF ELECTIONS.

Meeting of the Board of Elections held Tuesday, November 29, 1904, at 12 o'clock M.

The following communications were received and disposed of as stated, viz.:

From Thomas Hassett, Assistant Secretary, Office of the Mayor, dated the 25th inst., acknowledging receipt of communication from the Board to the Mayor, under date of the 23d inst., in relation to the leasing by the Board of certain premises for storage purposes, and stating that the said communication has been transmitted to the Secretary of the Sinking Fund Commissioners for consideration by that body. Filed.

From N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy Comptroller, dated the 28th inst., stating that a protest has been filed in the Department of Finance by Isadore Stark, of No. 99 Wil-

loughby street, Brooklyn Borough, in regard to the payment of the compensation for the use of the rooms at No. 105 Willoughby street, Borough of Brooklyn, as the polling place in the Fifth Election District, Tenth Assembly District, Kings County. To be answered and filed.

From J. F. Gouldsbury, Auditor of Accounts, Department of Finance, dated the 25th inst., stating that the claim of the Mail and Express Company for publishing the lists of polling places and boundaries of election districts for the days of registration and general election, which was transmitted to said Department by the Board of Elections, has been audited at an amount less than the face thereof. Referred to the Deputy Chief Clerk of the Board for investigation and report.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him herein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made with or any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
