Gentlemen—Your proposition of March 31 for papering the cottage to be occupied by Dr. G. T. Stewart, Superintendent of Metropolitan Hospital on Blackwell's Island: Parlor—The walls to be purlashed, sized, lined with suitable lining paper and papered with a Swiss, washable, mahogany colored tekko up to the picture moulding now on. Ceiling and frieze to be prepared and papered with a plain pulp tint paper to harmonize with side walls.

Dining Room—Walls to be purlashed, sized and papered with a plain, solid, blue duplex paper, and to have a frieze 40 inches wide of a hand printed grape trellis decoration, the lower part to be divided from the upper part by a plate rail. In this room there is already a metal ceiling; nothing to be done to ceiling.

Library—Walls to be purlashed, sized and lined with a suitable lining paper; to be covered with a green silk tekko material up to picture moulding now on. The ceiling and frieze to have a plain pulp tint paper to harmonize with side walls.

Billiard Room—Walls to be purlashed, sized and papered within 30 inches of the ceiling with plain red duplex paper; to have a frieze 30 inches wide, consisting of the deer hunt scenery decoration, with an inlaid stile top and bottom, which is to be separated from the lower wall with black strap and nails. Ceiling to be prepared and papered with plain pulp tint paper to harmonize with side walls.

First Floor Sleeping Room—Walls to be purlashed, sized and papered with imported rose trellis design. Ceiling to be prepared and papered with white mica daisy ceiling paper.

First and Second Floor Halls—Walls to be prepared, purlashed, sized, lined with suitable lining paper and covered with golden brown tekko material, as selected, up to moulding now on. The ceilings of the halls are done in rough plaster and cannot be prepared.

Dr. Stewart's Room—Walls to be prepared, purlashed, sized and covered with green silk moire paper, finished at the top with lilac cut out border. Ceiling to be prepared and papered with white moire ceiling paper.

Mrs. Stewart's Room—Walls to be prepared, purlashed, sized and papered with a pink silk corduroy stripe, with cut out rose border. Ceiling to be prepared and papered with white moire ceiling paper.

Son's Room—Walls to be prepared, purlashed, sized and covered with blue imported cornflower design. Ceiling to be prepared and covered with white moire ceiling paper.

Daughter's Room—Walls to be prepared, purlashed, sized and papered with pink clematis design. Ceiling to be prepared and papered with white moire ceiling paper.

Bath Room off Room Over Library—Walls to be purlashed, sized, lined with suitable lining paper and covered with the bird, sanitary, washable paper. Ceiling to be prepared, purlashed, sized and covered with plain pulp tint paper to harmonize with the side wall.

The above work to be done in the best workmanlike manner, and to cost, as specified, the sum of \$438. This price does not include plastering any of the walls or ceilings. It does include thoroughly preparing and purlashing to kill the paint on all the walls and ceilings that require same.

Above proposition is accepted, and you are hereby directed to proceed with the work.

The communication of the Corporation Counsel advising the Board of Health of its power, pursuant to the provisions of section 1182 of the Greater New York Charter, to delegate to the Sanitary Superintendent and Assistant Sanitary Superintendents of the Department of Health, full power to pass upon complaints and recommendations of Inspectors and to make orders thereon, which orders should be finally issued by the Secretary of the Board in the name of the Board, laid upon the table by the Board at its meeting held February 28, 1906, was taken from the table and on recommendation of the President, it was

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 1182 of the Charter of the City of New York, power and authority is hereby delegated to the Sanitary Superintendent and to the Assistant Sanitary Superintendents, assigned to the respective Boroughs, as follows:

Whenever any building, erection, excavation, premises, business pursuit, vehicle, vessel, water craft, matter or thing in The City of New York, or the waters adjacent thereto over which the Board of Health has jurisdiction, shall, in the opinion of the Assistant Sanitary Superintendent assigned to the borough in which such condition exists, whether as a whole or in any particular, be in a condition or in effect dangerous to life or health, or a nuisance, said Assistant Sanitary Superintendent shall take and file what he shall regard as sufficient proof to authorize the declaration that the same, to the extent he may specify, is a public nuisance or dangerous to life or health, and he shall thereupon enter the same as a nuisance, and make and issue an order in the name of the Board of Health that the same be removed, abated, suspended, altered, or otherwise improved or purified, as in such order specified; and such order, when so made and issued, shall be the order of the Board of Health, and shall have the same force and effect as orders issued directly by the Board.

All orders issued as herein provided shall be under the direction and supervision of the Sanitary Superintendent, who may at any time modify, change or revoke any of them.

Resolved, That in each borough, objectionable and unsanitary conditions shall be reported by the Inspectors of the Department of Health, in writing, on blanks furnished by the Department, and that said Inspectors shall, at the same time, recommend what they shall regard as necessary to remedy the objectionable or unsanitary conditions so reported.

All reports and recommendations of Inspectors in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn shall be approved or disapproved in writing by the Chief Sanitary Inspector, who shall refer them, with all papers and proofs in connection therewith, to the Assistant Sanitary Superintendent.

In each case, upon receipt of the papers, the Assistant Sanitary Superintendent shall examine the complaint, reports, recommendations, and all other proofs submitted to him, and if, in his opinion, the reported condition is dangerous to life or health, or in effect dangerous to life or health, he shall enter the same as a nuisance in a book kept by him for that purpose (which book shall be a record of the Board of Health), and shall, in writing on the Inspector's report, declare such condition a public nuisance, or dangerous to life or health, and shall immediately make and issue an order in the name of the Board of Health that the same be removed, abated, suspended, altered, or otherwise improved or purified, as specified in said order; the order so made to bear a number corresponding to the number on the report and complaint (if any). The original order, with all papers and proofs relating thereto, shall be filed as records of the Board of Health.

A memorandum containing a proposed ordinance in respect to blowing whistles on boats and vessels, laid upon the table by the Board at its meeting held February 28, 1906, was taken from the table and, on recommendation of the President, was ordered on file.

A copy of a preamble and resolution adopted by a Committee of the Medical Advisory Board, appointed to advise concerning the "smoke nuisance," reading as follows:

"Whereas, The escape of dense and of unnecessary and of unusual amounts of smoke from buildings and excavations in The City of New York into the external air is of common occurrence, causing the air to be unwholesome for breathing purposes, subversive of personal comfort and detrimental to health, constituting a nuisance, be it, therefore,

"Resolved, That the Department of Health be and hereby is advised to enforce the Sanitary Code and to amend it, if necessary, so as to secure prompt and effective abatement of the smoke nuisance"—was received and on recommendation of the President, the following amendment to section 96 of the Sanitary Code—"Every furnace employed in the working of engines by steam in any building shall be constructed so as to consume the smoke arising therein or therefrom"—was submitted and approved and laid upon the table for one week.

John McDermott, Sergeant-in-Command of the Sanitary Company, Steam Boiler Inspection and Engineers' Bureau of the Police Department, appeared pursuant to request, and at the direction of the Commissioner of Police, and conferred with the members of the Board with reference to the establishing of a higher standard of efficiency in the requirements prescribed for licensed firemen, and assured the Board that in future the examinations given persons seeking firemen's licenses would cover the question of operating furnaces with a minimum of smoke.

Whereas, Land with numerous buildings thereon has been acquired by The City of New York at Otisville, Orange County, New York, for the purpose of establishing thereon a Sanatorium and other buildings and structures for the care and treatment of persons afflicted with tuberculosis, to be under the jurisdiction of the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York, and

Whereas, It is of imperative necessity that certain improvements shall be made immediately so that persons afflicted with tuberculosis may be sent from The City of New York for treatment with all convenient speed, and

Whereas, A sum not exceeding \$20,000 is required for the purpose of preparing the Sanatorium for the occupancy by patients by June 1, 1906, and in making repairs and alterations in the present buildings on the site so acquired and in the erection of tents and portable houses, a storehouse and dining-hall, a laundry, in building roadways and providing drainage and water supplies, and in the acquisition of furniture and furnishings for the said Sanatorium and buildings and in making such other necessary temporary arrangements for fitting the premises for immediate occupancy; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board deems it for the public interests that a sum not exceeding \$20,000 is necessary for the purpose aforesaid; further, be it

Resolved, That it is not practicable to do the said work and furnish the said supplies by contracts founded on sealed bids or proposals made in compliance with public notice as provided by section 419 of the Greater New York Charter; further, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York be and is hereby requested to order the said improvements, repairs, alterations and furnishings made other than by contract or contracts founded on sealed bids or proposals made in compliance with public notice; further, be it

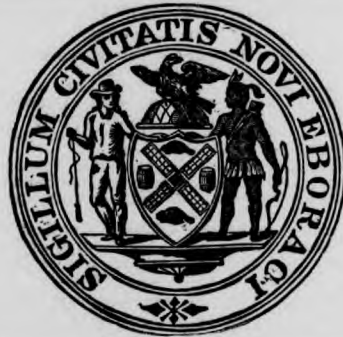

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held April 11, 1906, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 178 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 178. Spitting upon the sidewalk of any public street, avenue, park, public square or place in The City of New York, or upon the floor of any hall in any tenement house which is used in common by the tenants thereof, or upon the floor of any hall or office in any hotel or lodging house which is used in common by the guests thereof, or upon the floor of any theatre, store, factory, or of any building which is used in common by the public, or upon the floor of any ferry boat, railroad car or other public conveyance, or upon the floor of any ferry house, depot or station, or upon the station platform or stairs of any elevated railroad or other common carrier, or into the street from the cars, stairs or platforms of the elevated railroads, is hereby forbidden.

"The corporations or persons owning or having the management or control of any such building, store, factory, ferry boat, railroad car or other public conveyance, ferry house, depot or station, station platform or stairs of any elevated railroad or other common carrier, are hereby required to keep permanently posted in each of said places a sufficient number of notices forbidding spitting upon the floors and calling attention to the provisions of this section.

"It is hereby made the duty of every corporation or person engaged in the manufacture of cigars, cigarettes or tobacco, or conducting the business of printing in The City of New York, where ten or more persons are employed on the premises, to provide proper receptacles for expectoration. Such receptacles are to be in proportion of one for every two persons so employed, and they are to be cleaned and disinfected at least once in every twenty-four hours.

"A copy of the preceding paragraph must be kept posted in a conspicuous place in every factory or printing office mentioned therein."

### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.
