To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

At a regular meeting of the West End Woman's Republican Association of The City of New York, held at the Hotel Astor, Thursday, February 8, 1906, the following resolutions were offered:

"We believe that the vast majority of the women of New York have come to realize the deadly menace of the evil of street noises of the city. It does not seem that the majority of men, as yet, have a knowledge of the enormous aggregate of ill-health and death caused by unnecessary street noises.

"We speak for the women of the homes, the wives and mothers in the residence districts of the city. The majority of them are the first of the household to arise in the morning and it is late at night when their work is finished. At intervals during the day they would and should rest. The fact that they are women caring for their homes should of itself be the great reason why they should rest at intervals during the day.

"Are there any men of average brains and hearts in this city who do not know that the women of the homes must have rest and quiet at times each day? Are there any men who do not know of the frightful scourge of nervous prostration that grows worse in this city and threatens New York impossible as a place for mothers to live?

"It is notoriously true that a woman at home in this city may rarely have an uninterrupted hour of quiet and rest throughout the day. If she sits down or lies down to rest there comes up from the streets and from the back yards an incessant jangling, howling shrieking that tortures her very soul. It is not the playing of the children in the streets that she objects to, but the unnecessary roaring and discord made by street tradesmen, and of these the vegetable and fruit hucksters are the most intolerable offenders.

"The Police and Health Departments are in possession of complete data regarding the nuisance of howling hucksters. The officers of this association have pleaded time and again with public officials for an abatement of the nuisance. The police and health officers readily extend sympathy, but declare they are helpless by reason of the City laws which permit the practice of huckstering as it is carried on"; therefore be it

Resolved, That the West End Woman's Republican Association, on behalf of the wives and mothers of New York, do petition the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, that the ordinances be so changed and amended as to make it an offense punishable by fine and imprisonment for any person to cry out his wares for sale upon the public streets of this city, excepting certain streets which may be set aside and upon which hucksters may operate; and

Resolved, That the President appoint a committee of five members of this association, in conjunction with the president, with power to act, to confer with members of the Board of Aldermen and other City officials, and to meet with similar bodies from the other women's clubs and associations of this city, for the purpose of organizing a united movement of the women to bring about this relief from the nuisance of street noises.

Honorable FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Commissioner of Correction:

Dear Sir—I have this day carefully inspected the New York City Reformatory of Male Misdemeanants, Hart's Island, and respectfully report as follows:

The factory should, at the earliest possible moment, be properly equipped to place it in working conditions, and the pavilion known as No. 4 should be renovated and altered to house the inmates and keepers in compliance with section 305, Laws of 1905.

The following is a synopsis of what, in my judgment, would be required to properly equip the factory:

First—The shoe and knitting machinery are now installed and ready to operate, as far as the hand machinery is concerned, but the power machinery necessary to complete the merchandise to be manufactured has yet to be installed, such as shafting, motors, etc.; the electric wires, switch box, etc., both for power and lighting, have been installed inside of this building, but a new main feed wire, etc., from the engine room must be installed to operate the motors, etc., to operate the power machinery.

Second—Electric heating irons for finishing the shoes, such as polishing the heels, soles, etc., must be installed. I recommend electric iron, for the reasons that we have no gas on this island, and, further, it is the safest under all conditions.

Third—Steam, return and vapor connections are necessary to the dry room, for shrinking and shaping the stockings.

Fourth—Additional parts for all machinery should be on hand, to provide for any breaks that will occur, so repairs can be made immediately, on the premises.

The items set forth under paragraphs one to four, respectively, must be provided before this industry can be successfully operated, and the approximate cost will be \$5,000.

Alterations and Additions for Dormitory.

Pavilion No. 4 which has been selected as a dormitory is the only available building on this island that can be altered for that purpose.

The following is a synopsis of what in my judgment will be required to make this pavilion habitable.

First—Thoroughly renovate the interior of this structure, repairing woodwork, plaster, etc., and repaint the entire interior.

Second—A proper size wash room for the boys should be installed.

Third—A hospital ward properly equipped should be established.

Fourth—A fully equipped kitchen and mess hall.

Fifth—New electric lighting wires and lamps should be installed for the proper lighting of this dormitory.

Sixth—All wooden ceiling should be made tin ceilings to render the same fireproof.

Seventh—Sleeping quarters, dining room, etc., for Keepers.

Eighth—Baths, toilets and wash rooms for Keepers.

Ninth—All entrances to this building require iron barred doors with master keys and iron window guards.

Tenth—A fireproof room should be constructed for the storing of clothing.
Eleventh—The outside of this entire building should be repaired and painted and the roof properly repaired and painted.

Twelfth—An automatic fire alarm system connecting with the Keeper's quarters and the main dormitory on both floors should be installed for the purpose of notifying all Keepers in case of fire.

The above in connection with what has already been done during the past with institution help, will place this building in first class condition and well appointed for the purpose intended.

I might add that these extensive alterations are due to the fact that these buildings were originally built and occupied by the insane a number of years ago, and their age and general construction necessitated this change to make them what they should be.

The approximate cost will be \$15,000.

I therefore recommend that the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be asked to set aside an appropriation of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for the purposes above stated.

Dear Sir—Hon. Francis J. Lantry, Commissioner, Department of Correction, in communication under date of January 19, 1906, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$20,000, for the construction, improvement and permanent betterment of the buildings on Hart's Island to be occupied by inmates of the New York City Reformatory of Male Misdemeanants.

I would report that the work proposed to be done is the equipment of a building for factory purposes, and renovating the building known as Pavilion No. 4, to be used for dormitory purposes.

All of the work I consider necessary, and can properly be performed by money raised by the issue of Corporate Stock, and if the financial condition of the City warrants the expenditure, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$20,000, for the equipment and permanently bettering buildings on Hart's Island to be occupied by inmates of the New York City Reformatory of Male Misdemeanants.

Sir—The request of the Comptroller that the salary for the position of Deputy Auditor of Accounts in the Department of Finance be fixed at the rate of \$3,000 per annum, which was referred by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen for consideration and report, having been submitted to the Investigations Division, I beg to report as follows:

There are at present three positions in the Department of Finance designated as Deputy Auditor of Accounts, two at a salary of \$2,500 per annum, and one at a salary of \$2,100 per annum. The duties of Deputy Auditors, as defined in section 151 of the Charter, are to take the place and perform the duties and exercise the powers of any or all of the Auditors who may be absent on account of illness or other causes, when and to the extent he or they may be authorized so to do in writing by the Comptroller.

The three Deputy Auditors of Accounts now in the Department are all assigned to important parts of the work of passing upon claims against the City, one being attached to the Division of Law and Adjustment, one in charge of the contract certifications, liens, etc., and the other acting as principal assistant to the Chief Auditor of Accounts. All three of these men are reported to be most capable and efficient officials.

The Comptroller asks that the additional grade of \$3,000 be established so that the men now holding the positions may, when their record and services merit it, be advanced to the higher grade, as may now be done with Inspectors, Examiners, Auditors and other classes of employees of the Department of Finance.

I would therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to approve the application of the Comptroller fixing the salary of the posi-

tion of Deputy Auditor of Accounts in the Department of Finance at the rate of \$3,000 per annum.

Sir—Examination has been made in the matter of the request of the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the establishment of the position of Law Clerk in the office of said board, with salaries at the rate of \$1,200, \$1,350 and \$1,500 per annum, and the following report is respectfully submitted:

There is at the present time no grade of the position of Law Clerk established under the jurisdiction of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as a board. When, at the close of the year 1905, certain employees of the Department of Finance, comprising what was then the Bureau of Franchises of said department, were transferred to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to constitute a Bureau of Franchises for said board, the titles of these employees fitted with designations and grades already made for employees of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, except in the matter of Law Clerks. Apparently to permit the transfer of John Loew (formerly a Law Clerk in the Department of Finance assigned to the Franchise Bureau) to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the title of said Loew, as shown by the records of the Department of Finance, was changed from that of Law Clerk to that of Clerk on December 30, 1905, and he was transferred to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment office staff under that title at a salary of \$1,500. In the instance of another Law Clerk of the Department of Finance, assigned to the work of the Franchise Bureau, at a salary of \$1,200, it appears that his title was not changed but that, though still an employee of the Finance Department and on the payrolls of this department, he has since the first of the year been detailed to work in the Franchise Bureau of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Mr. Loew, in a communication to the Comptroller, states that his present employment under the title of Clerk is a hardship and would prevent his future transfer to another department as Law Clerk, if opportunity offered. Should the position of Law Clerk be created for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at \$1,500, it would permit his return to his original title which, as noted, was changed to that of Clerk, as your Examiner assumes, to permit his transfer to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Acquiescence in the request of the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will, of course, operate in the office of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment towards the multiplication of minor clerical positions similar in character to positions in departments over which the members of the board individually preside. But as the present instance has some special features, namely, that the work of the Franchise Bureau will undoubtedly be interfered with in case of non-action, and as the request also would seem to be in the interest of two employees of the city who, because of their training in the work of franchise investigation in the Department of Finance, are especially desired for the work of the Franchise Bureau of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and cannot be so employed under present conditions without detriment to their future prospects, I would respectfully recommend that the request of the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be granted.

Sir—In regard to the communication from the Commissioner of Public Charities, dated January 19, 1906, requesting that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve the creation of the position of Superintendent of the Municipal Lodging House, with salary of \$2,400 per annum, referred to the Investigations Division for examination, I beg to report as follows:

The position of Superintendent of the Municipal Lodging House, if created, would appear in the exempt class of the Civil Service with Superintendent of the Bureau of Dependent Adults in the Department of Public Charities.

A representative of the Department of Finance learned at the Department of Public Charities that the former Commissioner recommended the advance of salary of the "Investigator in Charge" from \$1,800 to \$2,400 per annum. The present Commissioner recommends the creation of the position of Superintendent of the Municipal Lodging House, to take the place of the Investigator in Charge, with salary of \$2,400. The present "Investigator in Charge" has been in the Department ten years, and in charge of the Municipal Lodging House for eight years.

It appears that the duties of a man in charge of the Lodging House are of a peculiarly delicate character, and require the exercise of excellent judgment and tact. The responsibilities increase with each succeeding year. The Superintendent supervises the sheltering, feeding, bathing and fumigating of clothing of this homeless army of men, women and children. Much of the work is technical, such as sorting from among the many inmates those who have been proven by investigation and the records to be vagrants, and sending them before a Magistrate for commitment to the workhouse or penitentiary. Others are sent to the Bureau of Dependent Adults, the women and children being forwarded to the Bureau of Dependent Children. Care is taken that no injustice is done these unfortunates in sending them to Court as vagrants, etc.

It appears that the present Investigator in Charge enjoys the confidence of all the prominent charitable organizations of the City, and also that during his entire term of service he has not availed himself of the privilege of a vacation.

It is respectfully recommended that the request of the Commissioner of Public Charities for the creation of the position of Superintendent of the Municipal Lodging House be granted, and that the salary be placed at \$2,400 per annum.

Of the above 28 Keepers not affected, 6 are receiving at the present time \$1,200 each per annum, the maximum salary, and 22 have been in the service less than one year.

In addition to the increase of \$44,800, there would be increases during the year 1906 among the 38 Keepers who have served less than four years at the present time, for the reason that at some time during the year they will enter a new grade because of the increase in their period of service. This increase would approximate \$1,500, making the total amount required to inaugurate the graded system and pay the salaries of the Keepers for 1906 approximately \$46,300.

The request embodied in the petition of the Prison Keepers is the same as was made by Commissioner Lantry, of the Department of Correction, in his departmental estimate for 1906, which was not granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in making appropriations for the present year. The approval of the petition would render necessary the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$46,300, approximately the amount required over and above the Budget allowance made to the Department of Correction for the payment of salaries in 1906.

The proposition to pay the Keepers according to their length of service is, in the main, a fair one, but the petition submitted would seem to make it compulsory for the Commissioner to advance a Keeper's salary simply because he passed from one period of service to another, without any consideration as to the manner in which the Keeper may have performed the duties of his position. No advance should be made in any salary without the approval of the Commissioner. The mere passing from one service period to another should not be the sole ground on which the advance is based. A Keeper's qualifications for his position, the manner in which he performs his work, should be considered in connection with length of service.

As an alternative proposition for that of the Keepers, the following is submitted. It decreases the number of grades, but lengthens the periods of service, as follows:

To this amount, \$40,400, should be added \$650, the approximate amount required to pay for increases among those Keepers who will pass from one service period to another during 1906, making the total amount required to inaugurate the graded system under the alternative proposition and pay the salaries of the Keepers for 1906 \$41,000 over and above the Budget allowance made to the Department of Correction for the payment of salaries in 1906.

Commissioner Lantry, of the Department of Correction, strongly advocates the adoption of a graded system for the payment of the Keepers in his Department. Keepers are on duty at all times, Sundays and holidays included; the hours of service are long, being from 70 to 90 hours a week. Their work is dangerous and they are liable at all times to meet with injury at the hands of those who are under their charge, and a number have been injured in the discharge of their duties.

The Legislature of the State of New York on two occasions has acted favorably upon bills authorizing the payment of keepers upon a graded system, but in both instances the bills were vetoed by the Mayor of The City of New York on the ground that they were contrary to the principle of home rule.

I therefore respectfully recommend the adoption of the alternative proposition submitted, with the understanding that no increase in salary shall become operative until it has received the approval of the Commissioner.

If said alternative proposition is approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and by the Board of Aldermen, it will then be necessary before the proposed increases become operative for the Commissioner of Correction to apply to the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the authorization of an issue of Revenue Bonds to meet the increases in salaries caused thereby. It is not probable that these preliminaries can be completed before the first of April, and the cost of the increases for the remainder of the year, beginning on April 1, 1906, would be approximately \$40,000.

I would respectfully recommend the adoption of the resolution attached to this report relating to the petition of the Keepers of the Department of Correction for the grading of their salaries.

Gentlemen—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of January 19, 1906, a

"Resolution of the Board of Aldermen recommending that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment readopt the resolution adopted December 18, 1905, establishing the position of Director of Children's School Farms and Playgrounds, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, at a salary of \$2,500 per annum, and eliminate from the new resolution the reference to 'playgrounds,'"

—was referred to the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board.

In regard to the above matter I beg to report that I have learned from the Park Department that there is but one Children's School Farm in The City of New York.

It is located in De Witt Clinton Park, Eleventh and Twelfth avenues, Fifty-second and Fifty-fourth streets, Borough of Manhattan.

In the same borough children's playgrounds are located in twelve parks, eight of which are also equipped with gymnasium apparatus, and another playground will be opened during 1906. These playgrounds are in operation and use the greater part of the year.

The School Farm is in operation for only about six months each year, which would hardly warrant the establishment of a position of Director of School Farms alone, at a salary of \$2,500 per annum.

This subject was discussed in a lengthy report, dated December 15, 1905, made to the Comptroller by Mr. Charles S. Hervey, Auditor of Accounts in the Department of Finance, from which report it appears that Samuel Parsons, Jr., the then Commissioner of Parks for Manhattan and Richmond, requested that the position of "Director of Children's School Farms and Playgrounds" be established at a salary of \$2,500 per annum, for the reasons that the Commissioner found that the playgrounds were in need of proper supervision, and he believed that owing to the satisfactory manner in which Mrs. Henry Parsons was conducting the School Farm, it would be best to extend her supervision to the playgrounds, and Mr. Hervey recommended that the Commissioner's request be approved by your Board.

The resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated December 18, 1905, from which the Board of Aldermen in their resolution of January 9, 1906, recommends the elimination of the reference to "playgrounds," was adopted on that recommendation.

From the foregoing it would appear that approval of the recommendation to eliminate the reference to "playgrounds" would remove the only reason for establishing the position at a salary of \$2,500 per annum, as requested by former Park Commissioner Parsons.

I therefore recommend that the recommendation of the Board of Aldermen that your Board readopt the resolution in an amended form, by eliminating the reference to "playgrounds," be disapproved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that the resolution of December 18, 1905, be rescinded, and the entire subject referred back to the present Commissioner of Parks for Manhattan and Richmond for his consideration and action.

This disposition of the matter would be in line with the action taken by your Board with respect to similar requests for the establishment of new positions and salaries, emanating from former heads of departments.

Sir—Reporting further on the matter of the establishment of a new position under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, to be known as Director of Children's School Farms and Playgrounds, I beg to state that the Board of Aldermen on January 9, 1906, voted to reconsider a resolution adopted December 19, 1905, creating such position and fixing the salary for the same at \$2,500. The resolution has been returned to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Board of Aldermen, with the recommendation that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment readopt the same, eliminating therefrom all references to playgrounds.

In a report made by the Investigations Division under date of December 15, 1905, all of the facts then obtainable regarding the Children's School Farm, which was established about four years ago in the De Witt Clinton Park and has been in opera-

tion since, were fully set forth. There was then pending before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a request from the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, for the creation of a position or grade of Director of Children's Farm Gardens for the Park Department, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond. Accompanying this request was a recommendation by former Commissioner Samuel Parsons, Jr., that the compensation of such position, when established, be fixed at the rate of \$2,500 per annum.

In an interview with Commissioner Parsons in relation to the request for the establishment of a new position, your representative learned that thus far the services of Mrs. Parsons had been confined to superintending the work at the Children's School Farm in the De Witt Clinton Park; that she had been receiving various sums out of unexpended balances in appropriation accounts, and had had sole charge of the work, employing whatever instructors, attendants or assistants she might have required from time to time in the farm work. The actual time devoted to superintending the work at the Children's School Farm would appear to extend ordinarily from May to the latter part of September.

After further consideration of the matter, former Commissioner Parsons suggested to a representative of the Investigations Division that his application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment before referred to be amended so that the new position to be created include the superintendence and direction of the work of attendants and others employed in the several playgrounds under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond. He stated that in his experience he had found that some competent and immediate supervision was required for the public playgrounds and he had concluded that Mrs. Parsons, by reason of her experience in the Children's School Farm, would perhaps be most competent to supervise the playgrounds. He therefore requested that the position, when established, be designated as Director of Children's School Farms and Playgrounds for the Department of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond.

From the action of the Board of Aldermen in its resolution of January 9, 1906, it would appear that some objection has been made to the proposition to include in the duties of the position the supervision of the playgrounds connected with the Department of Parks. Your representative has been informed by a son of Mrs. Parsons that the ground for the objection is the fact that it might not be proper to place a woman in charge of playgrounds and athletic fields where a great many men attend.

Mr. Moses Herrman, the present Commissioner of Parks for Manhattan and Richmond, has been conferred with regarding this matter, but not having had sufficient opportunity to inquire into the matter, is not prepared to make any specific recommendation.

If the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on January 9, creating the position of Director of Children's School Farms, eliminating the playgrounds from the jurisdiction of the Director, I would respectfully recommend that the salary for the position be fixed at \$1,000 per annum, with the understanding that the question of increasing the compensation will be considered as the work is extended and increased and new school farms established, if that course be taken.

Sir—In the matter of the requests of Mr. Samuel Parsons, Jr., Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, relating to the proposed establishment of a position of Supervisor or Director of the children's school farm and playgrounds of the Department, I beg to report as follows:

Under date of November 28, 1905, the Commissioner of Parks addressed the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as follows:

"I beg to request that your Honorable Board will create and establish the position or grade of Director of Children's Farm Gardens for this Department, in the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

"It is necessary that a person familiar with and competent to conduct and manage work of this character should be placed in charge of the farm garden work as established in De Witt Clinton Park, and its possible extension to other parks, as now held in contemplation."

Writing further on the subject, the Commissioner, under date of December 12, 1905, sent the following communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"Referring to my communication of the 28th ult., requesting the establishment of the position or grade of Director of Children's School Farms for this Department, in the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, I beg to add the recommendation that the compensation of such position, when established, be fixed at the rate of \$2,500 per annum."

Owing to the limited time allowed the Investigations Division for this examination the Finance Department representatives have been able to confer only with Mrs. Fannie Griscom Parsons, who for four years past has conducted as an experiment the Children's City Farm at Fifty-third street and Eleventh avenue, and Mr. Samuel Parsons, Jr., Commissioner of Parks. No opportunity was afforded your Examiners to make any extensive examination as to the character of the work thus far undertaken and accomplished.

It was learned from Mrs. Parsons that the Garden or the "Children's School Farm," as it is called, was first established in 1902, Mrs. Parsons having received from the Commissioner of Parks a special permit permitting her to utilize a portion of the land at Fifty-third street and Eleventh avenue, which was then being transformed and developed for park purposes, and later to be known as De Witt Clinton Park.

During 1902 and 1903 the cost of maintaining the gardens, which included salaries of a few Teachers and the purchase of tools, implements and materials, was met solely by private contributions. It was not until September of 1904 that the first moneys were appropriated by the City in connection with the work done at the gardens. The sum of \$3,000 was then made available for the payment of salaries, etc. In 1905 the sum of \$5,000 was provided, this amount being taken from the income from the sale of Revenue Bonds under the terms of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen, and approved by the Mayor May 19, 1905. In 1904 and 1905 contracts were entered into between Mrs. Parsons and the Park Department.

By the terms of these contracts Mrs. Parsons was required to furnish all the necessary Teachers, as well as the implements and supplies used in maintaining the children's farm. The moneys were paid to Mrs. Parsons in installments of \$1,000 upon the presentation by her of vouchers and receipted bills. In 1904 it appears that there was an unexpended balance amounting to \$282.57, which Mrs. Parsons has since paid to the City Chamberlain by her own check and for which amount she now holds a receipt from the Assistant Secretary of the Park Department.

The area now occupied by the gardens in the De Witt Clinton Park, under the direction of Mrs. Parsons, is equal to about three-quarters of an acre. There were 458 separate garden plots, dimensions 4 feet by 8 feet, within this area.

The attendance during the past two years has greatly increased and the work has become much more popular. This has rendered it necessary to extend the area somewhat, and in consequence resulted in the employment of more Teachers and other help, thus increasing the salary account, until as in this season (1905) the salary schedule submitted by Mrs. Parsons to your representative shows that \$3,652.52 was expended in salaries. There were seventeen persons in all employed during the summer, five of whom, however, were engaged for very short periods.

With the completion of the De Witt Clinton Park it was possible also this year to begin the first planting or sowing of seed in May. This has extended the season over a much longer period than that in 1902, 1903 or 1904. Another fact which has also tended to increase the expenditure for salaries during this year is that the officials of the Department of Parks requested that the school farm be kept in operation until the formal opening of the De Witt Clinton Park, which occurred on November 4 last. The compensation paid to persons employed on the farm ranged from \$3 a week, which amount was paid to an office girl, to \$5 a day, the latter being the compensation of a son of Mrs. Parsons, who acted as a supervisor and instructor to the teaching force.

The season is divided into two parts, the first beginning in May and the second in August. A record of attendance kept by the Teachers was submitted by Mrs. Parsons, and it shows that during the first half the attendance of boys averaged 240 daily, and that of girls 226. During the second half, or the latter part of the season of 1905, the attendance of boys averaged 348, and that of girls 286. There being a rule against any of the pupils attending the first half from being admitted to classes in the second half, the whole number of pupils for the year appears to be 1,100.

The records submitted by Mrs. Parsons would appear to show that not only is the work of instructing city children in nature study appreciated by the children in the immediate neighborhood of the experimental farm or garden at the DeWitt Clinton Park, but the work has also attracted the attention and approval of educational authorities throughout the city and country. Although at first there appeared to be some doubts and misgivings as to the practical value of her work, it now seems that the local school authorities have recognized its value as an adjunct to the instructional courses in the theory of agriculture and horticulture.

Several times during the past season, as well as during 1904, the farm has been visited by classes of the New York and Brooklyn Training Schools for Teachers, the Teachers' College, as well as all the pupils and teachers from various public schools and public school kindergartens in the neighborhood. Demonstrations are given by the teachers accompanying the pupils in nature study, and many specimens have also been furnished to the classes for use in connection with the regular courses of study.

Since the establishment of the Children's School Farm in DeWitt Clinton Park four years ago it has been learned that similar gardens have been opened in Philadelphia, Yonkers, East Orange, Newark, N. J., Hartford and other places. In Philadelphia there have already been established two such gardens under the direction of the Department of Education, with a salaried superintendent in charge, the superintendent of the Philadelphia gardens being a former assistant of Mrs. Parsons in DeWitt Clinton Park.

After having obtained the facts hereinbefore mentioned from Mrs. Parsons, your Examiner conferred with Samuel Parsons, Jr., Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, and the Commissioner gives it as his judgment that the work done by Mrs. Parsons is one that should be commended and encouraged. He recommended Mrs. Parsons highly as a woman of great energy and devotion to the work which she had in hand. The Commissioner also asks that his application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment made in communications of November 28 and December 12, before referred to, be amended so that the new position to be created take in the superintendence and direction of the work of Attendants and others employed in the several playgrounds under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks of Manhattan and Richmond. He said he had found in his experience that some competent and immediate supervision was required over the public playgrounds, and he had concluded that Mrs. Parsons, by reason of her experience in the school farm, would be perhaps most competent to supervise the playgrounds.

The Commissioner therefore requests, in taking action on this application, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall establish the position of Director of Children's School Farms and Playgrounds for the Department of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond.

The question of providing funds to pay the salary for the proposed new position, \$2,500, was suggested to Commissioner Parsons, who said that he would ask that this be made the matter of a special appropriation to be provided by the issue of Revenue Bonds, as he had not sufficient funds in any of the appropriation accounts of the department from which the said amount might be taken.

The appropriation of \$5,000 made for 1906 for the Children's School Farm would also appear to be sufficient only to meet the expenditures for salaries of teachers and the purchase of supplies, implements, etc., judging from experience of this year.

This provision of \$5,000 for 1906 is the first allowance by the City to be made in the way of a regular Budget appropriation, and its disbursement will be by the Finance Department on vouchers approved by the Department of Parks. This will apparently result in the enforcement of Civil Service regulations, so far as the employment of assistants is concerned, and may increase the cost of the same.

I would respectfully recommend the approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the request of the Park Commissioner for the establishment of the position of Director of Children's School Farms and Playgrounds, Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, in the exempt class at a salary not to exceed \$2,500 per annum. This recommendation is made after a further conference with the Commissioner of Parks, the conclusion having been reached that the duties of the position described in the designation originally asked for are not such as would require the attention of the person holding it throughout the year, while the work of supervising the several playgrounds under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, as well as the Children's School Farms, would call for the payment of a salary such as is proposed to be paid.

Sir—In the new Repair Shops Building, erected at the northeast corner of Twelfth avenue and Fifty-sixth street, Manhattan, into occupancy of which this department entered on the 1st inst., there have been installed ten electric motors; and in recommending the employment of an Electrician in connection with their operation, care and maintenance, the officer in charge of repair shops reported to me, under date of the 3d inst., as follows:

"There are in service the following electric motors:

"One 35-horsepower on elevator.
"One 25-horsepower on elevator.
"Four 20-horsepower on machine and woodshop.
"Two 5-horsepower on wood and smith shop.
"One 3½-horsepower on wood shop.
"One 15-horsepower on smith shop.

"Our mechanics are inexperienced in electrical work. The number of motors in use and the large amount of electrical wiring in the shop for motors, rheostats, electric

lighting, telephones and gongs, makes an electrician to care for the electric installation a necessity. The position is an important one and an incumbent should have ample experience in motors and wiring."

The position of Electrician does not exist in this department, and therefore in order to permit of this addition to the working force at the repair shops, I have the honor to request that, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the establishment of the position of Electrician in this department, and recommend to the Board of Aldermen the fixing of the salary or compensation thereof at the rate of four dollars and fifty cents (\$4.50) per diem.

It was learned at the headquarters of the Fire Department that in the new repair shops building ten electric motors have been installed; that the other mechanics are inexperienced in electrical work; that the number of motors in use and the large amount of electrical wiring in the shop for motors, rheostats, electric lighting, telephones and gongs made an electrician to care for the electric installation a necessity.

Additional reasons for the creation of the position of Electrician in the Department are given in the communication from the Fire Commissioner making the said request.

The prevailing rate of wages for electricians appears to be \$4.50 per diem.

Gentlemen—Referring to your communication of the 15th instant, I would respectfully request that you recommend to the Board of Aldermen the establishment of an additional grade in the position of Draughtsman in this Department at \$2,100 per annum.

As stated in your communication of December 18, 1905, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, there have heretofore been established grades of \$1,200, \$1,400, \$1,600 and \$1,800 per annum. Experience has shown that the maximum rate of \$1,800 per annum has often proved inadequate, with the result that when a man had become thoroughly experienced in the work of the Department and his services became very valuable he would leave to accept a position with some private concern at a higher compensation. The request for the establishment of the additional grade is for the purpose of overcoming this difficulty.

Sir—In regard to the communication of the Department of Docks and Ferries, dated January 18, 1906, requesting that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment establish in that Department an additional grade of Draughtsman at \$2,100 per annum, referred to the Investigations Division for examination, I beg to report as follows:

The Civil List shows that in the City Departments the majority of Draughtsmen receive \$1,500 a year or less, a good percentage receiving as much as \$1,800 a year or more. Following are the highest rates paid to Draughtsmen in the various Departments:

The Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries stated to a representative of the Department of Finance that the establishment of the new municipal ferry and the growth of other important work had emphasized the necessity for first-class Draughtsmen in the Department. From time to time valuable men threaten to resign on account of more liberal inducements offered by other City departments or by private concerns.

It is not proposed at present to advance the salary of any Draughtsman to \$2,100, but it is desired to have a grade fixed at that rate in order to be prepared for an emergency. In case a Draughtsman is offered an advance above the present maximum salary of \$1,800, the Department will be in a position, if necessary, to increase the salary to \$2,100 and retain a competent man.

It appears that Draughtsmen who excel in their line are in demand by private concerns and that when a man has become experienced and his services valuable in a City department he is frequently persuaded to leave and accept a place outside at a higher compensation. This has been the experience of more than one department of the City government.

It is, therefore, respectfully recommended that the request of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries for the establishment of an additional grade of Draughtsman at a salary of \$2,100 per annum be granted.

Sir—In the matter of the application of the Justices of the Court of Special Sessions, Second Division, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to establish the position of Female Probation Officer for that Court at \$1,200 per annum, referred by you to the Investigations Division for examination, I beg to report as follows:

Under the provisions of chapter 382, Laws of 1902, the employment of a Female Probation Officer by the Court of Special Sessions, First Division, was authorized "by and with the consent and concurrence of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment." There is one so employed at a salary of \$1,200.

In the event of the establishment of the position of Female Probation Officer at a salary of \$1,200 for the Court of Special Sessions, Second Division, the position, your Examiner is informed by a representative of the Civil Service Commission, would have to be filled in accordance with the Civil Service rules. As an examination for Probation Officers has recently been held, an available list will be ready in the near future.

Chapter 508 of the Laws of 1904, which amends the Code of Civil Procedure, provides that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment "may, in their discretion, determine whether women appointed to act as Probation Officers, not detailed from other branches of the public service, shall receive a salary, and if they shall so determine they may fix the amount thereof and provide for its payment."

As a measure of the probable need of such an employee attached to the Court of Special Sessions, Second Division, I beg to call your attention to the duties which have, since May 12, 1905, been performed in such Court without pay, by Miss Frances E. Leitch.

Miss Leitch received her appointment under the authority of section 707, subdivision 6, of the Charter of Greater New York, which empowers Courts of Special Sessions to appoint either men or women to serve as Probation Officers, and as many as the Courts may deem necessary "to serve during the pleasure of the Court appointing them and without pay."

She attends the sessions of the Court every Monday, Wednesday and Friday and also visits the jail during the afternoon of those days. On Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays she visits the jail and interviews prisoners awaiting trial. At other times during the week she investigates cases referred to her, verifies statements made by prisoners awaiting trial and those convicted, and of those whose sentences have been suspended. The officers of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, with which Miss Leitch is connected, while certifying to her diligence, carefulness and aptitude in the performance of her duties as Probation Officer, join with the Justices in emphasizing the need of continuing this work in that Court.

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment make provision for the employment of a Female Probation Officer for the Court of Special Sessions, Second Division, at an annual salary of \$1,200.

This coal will be needed at various points in the borough, and as there are few suitable places in which to store same, it is impracticable to purchase large quantities at one time; besides the City does not secure advantageous terms, for the reason that the dealers are not inclined, at this time, to quote low prices on contracts for deliveries throughout the year, owing to the fear of fluctuation in the wholesale prices.

The coal for the Bureau of Highways is required for operating steam rollers, for which no permanent supply depot can be established. The Bureaus of Street Cleaning and Sewers use coal at their several disposal works, and the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices in heating the widely scattered public buildings in this borough.

I therefore request authorization to purchase in open market, upon order from month to month, coal to an amount not exceeding five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and request that the inclosed resolution be submitted to the Board to that end.

The Committee on Street Cleaning and the Special Committee of five, to whom was referred, on February 6, 1906 (Minutes, page 661), the annexed resolution introduced by Alderman Grifenhagen (Introductory No. 149) directing an investigation into the provisions made by the Street Cleaning Department for merchants, trades people and store keepers to dump their rubbish and waste, respectfully

REPORT:

That a public hearing was held by the Street Cleaning Committee, with whom the Special Committee of five co-operated, at the City Hall on February 16, 1906, at which there was presented sufficient facts verbally and by letters to, in the opinion of your Committee, not only warrant an investigation into the provisions made by the Department for the disposition of rubbish and waste, but into the conduct of the entire Department of Street Cleaning. That your Committee is of the opinion, however, after careful consideration, that the scope of the investigation under the resolution of Alderman Grifenhagen (Introductory No. 149) is limited to the provisions made for merchants, trades people and store keepers to dump their rubbish and waste and therefore recommend the adoption of the annexed resolution.

Whereas, The Committee on Street Cleaning and the Special Committee appointed by the Board of Aldermen at its meeting held February 6, 1906, to co-operate and act with the said Committee in the investigation of the Department of Street Cleaning, has reported to the Board of Aldermen upon the results of a public hearing held by the joint Committees and have advised the Board that the original resolution is too limited in scope for an effective investigation; and

Whereas, Section 54 of the Charter provides for a departmental investigation by a Special Committee only;

Said Special Committee to have power to subpoena, examine and compel the attendance of witnesses and access to the books and records of the City or of any Department or officer thereof, and with power to retain the necessary subpoena servers, stenographer, counsel or other employees who to them may seem necessary for the purposes of the said investigation.

The Committee on Salaries and Offices to whom was referred on January 16, 1906 (Minutes, page 250), the annexed resolution in favor of fixing salary of Superintendent of Highways, in office of President of Borough of Brooklyn, at \$5,000 per annum, respectfully

REPORT:

Inasmuch as this resolution creates a new position at the large salary of \$5,000 a year in a bureau of the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, which has been heretofore under the direction of the engineer in charge, the committee has given special study and considerable time to the matter. President Coler appeared before the committee and urged a favorable report, stating that the new appointee would be of great use to him in his departmental policies, and asserting that he (the Borough President) was willing to assume the entire responsibility for the creation of the position. The committee has since been in correspondence with Mr. Coler respecting the duties which he intended the new Superintendent to perform. Mr. Coler writes as follows:

"The Superintendent of Highways would have a general supervision over all the highways of Brooklyn, would attend to the appointment, suspension and dismissal of the forces employed in that bureau; would look after the correspondence of the bureau, determine matters of policy, sign vouchers and attend to the thousand and one little details of administration which come up in such a bureau. His position in this respect would be similar to that of the Superintendent of Sewers in this borough. He would be in command of not only the constructive forces of the bureau, but of the various subdivisions, such as the Topographical Bureau, Map Room, Corporation Work and other things of like character."

Mr. Charles Frederick Adams, Secretary to the Borough President, appeared before the committee at the first hearing on this matter and presented the views of the Borough President in general upon the subject. On February 19 Mr. Van Vleck, the Assistant Commissioner of Public Works, who is now in charge of the Bureau of Highways by direction of the Borough President, appeared before the committee and told of his own experiences in the office. He said that the work of the position was such as to occupy his time so as to leave practically nothing for his regular duties. Mr. Van Vleck was very positive in his statement that the position would not be a sinecure, but would be one of actual value to the borough, and that the work would be of an engrossing nature. The committee would add that the position of Superintendent of Highways now exists in all of the other boroughs.

The committee recommends the adoption of the resolution.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held January 12, 1906, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the establishment of the position of Superintendent of Highways in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, that the salary of said position be fixed at the rate of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) per annum."

The resolution was recertified to the present Board of Aldermen, and upon the recommendation of this Committee, was returned to the present Board of Estimate and Apportionment for further consideration. The Board of Estimate has now, by unanimous vote, adopted this resolution, and your Committee has given careful consideration to the matter. It realizes that the position is an important one, being practically that of the executive head of the administrative business of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the Committee is also satisfied as to the qualifications of the incumbent of the office who will hereafter receive the salary, if this resolution is adopted, and who will presumably resign his present salaried position of Commissioner of Accounts. Various members of the Committee had some question as to the size of the proposed salary, but inasmuch as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is in a sense a co-ordinate branch of the municipal legislature, the Committee thinks that as a matter of comity the Board of Aldermen should not attempt to criticize or interfere with its employment of so important and intimate an attache as its Secretary.

That in order to obtain information in reference to this matter, the Committee requested the presence of Commissioner Bensel of the Department of Docks and Ferries. Owing to various circumstances the hearing was not held until Monday, February 19, when the Commissioner appeared and stated the general nature of the application. The item \$6,165 was asked for in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices Budget for 1906, and cut out by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. It comprehends, among other things, salaries for employees of the new Duffield street interior bath building, which was opened in the latter part of 1905, and which salaries, by reason of the reduction by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, is now being paid from the Bureau's inadequate budget.

Items \$4,162.50 and \$3,363, for prevailing rates of wages, explain themselves.

The items \$2,970 and \$1,375 represent amounts necessary for the salaries of additional help for the new addition to the Kings County Hall of Records—help that cannot be done without if the Bureau is to be properly cared for.

The items \$5,912.50 and \$4,125 are for the purpose of equalizing the salaries of Attendants in this borough with those in the Borough of Manhattan, where all male Attendants receive not less than \$900, and all female Attendants not less than \$750. We have some male Attendants at \$900 per year, some male Attendants at \$750 per year, and some female Attendants at \$750 per year, and some female Attendants at \$600 per year.

The \$12,137.08 is for repairs and supplies contemplated during the year 1906, when the 1906 Budget was prepared, but which, for some reason not apparent, was cut out by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. This amount should be provided for if absolutely necessary matters are to be attended to this year.

The \$50,000 item is the estimated cost of a new comfort station that has been requested to be erected on the Williamsburg Bridge plaza. It is a desirable proposition, and its necessity has been emphasized by a local board of trade.

The \$1,000 item is intended to pay for changes in the construction of the two upper floors in the old Montauk Theatre building for Municipal Court Justice Bayles' court room. In providing funds for Judge Bayles' necessities, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment did not take into consideration the cost of repairs to the building in which the court was to be located, for the reason, perhaps, that the Board did not know at the time just where the Sixth District Municipal Court was to be provided with quarters. The City owns the property, and, if it is to be made habitable as a court room, improvements necessitating an expenditure of a thousand dollars are absolutely necessary.

The item \$10,665 is to pay for new metallic furniture for the county officers located in the Hall of Records, furniture that was not provided for in a contract arranged when the order was given to the Van Dorn Iron Works Company, of Cleveland, Ohio, and which contract was paid for out of a special appropriation for enlarging and furnishing the building. This fund is now depleted, and if the county officers are to be provided with furniture to answer their requirements, this appropriation should be made.

The item \$15,000 is asked for to defray the cost of very necessary repairs, such as painting, tiling, electrical and carpentry work for the Borough Hall, the building which the Borough President's offices are located in, and which has not received any extensive consideration in the repair relation in over two years.

It having come to my attention that, through a clerical error, some of the items included in the total stated represented expenditures to which the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds cannot be applied under the law, I desire to amend my communication so as to read as follows:

The Honorable, the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I would respectfully make application to you for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$21,000, the proceeds to be used by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for the following purposes:

No. 1. To make up shortage in the appropriation for salaries and wages for 1906 in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, due to the failure of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in allowing the appropriation for 1906 to provide for the payment of wages and salaries in the Duffield Street Interior Public Bath. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in making its estimate as to the amount of money needed by the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, based its calculations upon the July payroll for 1905 for that bureau. At that time the Duffield Street Bath was not in operation. The amount needed for this purpose is \$6,379.

No. 2. To provide for an increase of wages for twenty-five Enginemen from February 1, 1906, to December 31, 1906, in order to comply with the prevailing rate of wages law, \$4,163.

No. 3. To provide for the increase in wages of twenty-two Stokers from February 1, 1906, to December 31, 1906, in order to comply with the prevailing rate of wages law, \$3,363.

No. 4. To provide for the salaries of nine new female Cleaners for the enlarged Kings County Hall of Records, at the rate of \$360 per annum, no provision having been made for the payment of salaries to these Cleaners in the appropriation for 1906, for salaries and wages in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, \$2,970.

No. 5. To provide for the salaries of two new male Cleaners in the enlarged Kings County Hall of Records, at the rate of \$750 per annum, from February 1, 1906, to December 31, 1906, \$1,375.

No. 6. To provide for salaries of two new Watchmen for the enlarged Kings County Hall of Records, at the rate of \$900 per annum, from February 1, 1906, to December 31, 1906, \$1,650.

No. 7. To cover expenditures for alterations in the Old Montauk Theatre Building in order to provide for a Municipal Court under the provision of the law, \$1,100.

MAJORITY REPORT.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on January 9, 1906 (Minutes, page 187), the annexed ordinance in favor of an issue of Corporate Stock, \$500,000, for a new municipal building, Borough of Brooklyn, respectfully

REPORTS AS FOLLOWS:

From the history of this matter, as set forth in the accompanying letter of Chandler Withington, Principal Assistant Engineer of the Comptroller's office, and from the uncontested statements made before your Committee, it appears that in the spring of 1903 an appropriation of \$32,000 was duly made to President Swanstrom of the Borough of Brooklyn for the purpose of obtaining plans for the construction of a municipal building for that borough. The Borough President thereupon had Mr. Desporadelle, a leading American architect, to hold a public competition among leading architects, and as a result the plans of one Washington Hull were selected, and upon said plan being approved by the Municipal Art Commission, the President thereupon entered into a contract with said Hull for the construction of the municipal building, and applied to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an appropriation to carry on the construction. The plans selected provided for an eight-story office building, upon City land, and to cost about \$1,500,000.

Before the appropriation was granted President Swanstrom was succeeded by President Littleton, who, although at first interested, made no official move in the matter until under date of October 31, 1905, within two months of his termination of office, he sent a letter to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment asking for an appropriation of \$3,000,000 for the construction of a municipal building under plans prepared by Architects Messrs. McKim, Mead & White.

Upon this application the sum of \$500,000 was appropriated by the last Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 5, 1905, and this proposition is now before the Board of Aldermen for its approval.

Your Committee has given very earnest consideration to this matter and has held two public hearings, to which ex-Presidents Swanstrom and Littleton and President Coler were invited, but only the last of these attended. At these hearings Mr. Washington Hull appeared personally and by attorney and protested against the approval of the present appropriation, as it is for the McKim, Mead & White plans, and totally disregards his rights under the 1903 competition and contract under which he has repeatedly tendered his services. Arthur A. Stoughton, as Chairman of Committee on Architecture of the Fine Arts Federation of New York, which included thirteen architectural societies, appeared and presented a resolution of said federation protesting against the action of President Littleton in so disregarding the action and contract of his predecessor in selecting said Washington Hull. The Manufacturers' Association of Brooklyn, who protested on the same grounds. The Merchants' Association of New York, who protested against this appropriation as it was to provide for a three-story, \$4,000,000 building, necessitating \$750,000 additional land, while under Hull's plan an eight-story building, no additional land, would be built for less than \$2,000,000. President Coler stated that he wanted the appropriation and he would have additional plans. The Corporation Counsel, at the request of the Committee, upon the question of the validity of the 1903 contract with Hull, stated that his office had rendered several opinions, one in favor of it, but that the last was against it, upon the technical grounds that no appropriation had yet been made.

Your Committee for its conclusions wish to first emphatically record its earnest and absolute approval of the very early construction of a new municipal building, indeed not only in Brooklyn, but also in Manhattan. It would like to report in favor of the appropriation if it believed that a suitable building were to be erected under it.

It disapproves, however, of the appropriation under the present application, principally for the reason that the building proposed to be erected is to cost the taxpayers over \$4,000,000 and will be only three stories in height, necessitating the acquisition of additional land at the cost of \$750,000, while a building for which the City has already contracted for in good faith, approved by members of the Art Commission, will only cost between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000 and will be eight stories in height, and will not require the purchase of substantially any land, and will have at the least 30,000 square feet of additional floor space. Your Committee take this opportunity to state its positive disapproval of the construction of high priced two or three-story municipal office buildings on very costly land, when an eight or nine-story building, necessitating proportionately less land, sufficiently artistic to be approved by the Municipal Art Commission, at much less cost, will answer the needs of the City, as it believes that proper economic, more than extreme artistic principles, should be followed to the end that the taxpayers' interests should be jealously guarded.

President Coler's statement that he would not be bound to build the McKim, Mead & White's plans are not concurred in by the undersigned members of the Committee, as they believe that this appropriation was made upon the application of President Littleton upon the McKim plan, as the annexed letter shows.

It further disapproves of the appropriation under this application as it feels that Mr. Washington Hull's rights under his alleged contract should be better settled, as

the Corporation Counsel himself does not deny the merits of his claim, but defends on technical grounds, and should he win in the courts the City would lose over \$100,000 in fees. The present Board of Estimate and Apportionment has never had this matter before it and your Committee feel that it should be sent back to it for further investigation.

For these reasons, substantially municipal economy, your Committee recommend that the said ordinance be rejected and sent back to the Board of Estimate.

They therefore recommend that said ordinance be rejected.

MINORITY REPORT.

The undersigned, a minority of the Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on January 9, 1906 (Minutes, page 187), an ordinance providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$500,000 for a new municipal building in the Borough of Brooklyn, respectfully dissent from the findings of the majority, and reports as follows:

That the appropriation involved in this ordinance is one of great importance to the Borough of Brooklyn and should be acted upon favorably by your Board. There is absolutely no reason why the question of any controversy raised by any architect should in any way affect the action of the Committee or of the Board itself. The Corporation Counsel has stated that the architect, who has in this instance appeared before our Committee to oppose a favorable report upon the ordinance is absolutely without a contract of any kind. Even if his statement that he had a just claim against The City of New York were true, he has his remedy in court proceedings and, incidentally, he has not neglected to avail himself of that remedy. Indeed, the question of his rights in the matter is now before the courts and it is absurd for this Board to concern itself at present with that question. The only point before this Board, it seems to the undersigned, is whether or not it is desirable and wise to provide for a new municipal building in Brooklyn. We do not think there can be any question upon that point. The ordinance before us does not name any architect and the selection of an architect is a matter within the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn by the terms and provisions of the Charter. It is true that when the ordinance under discussion was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that Board did at the same time adopt a resolution authorizing the President of the Borough of Brooklyn to make a contract for architect's services with the firm of McKim, Mead & White. This resolution, however, is in no sense binding upon the President of the Borough of Brooklyn. He is at perfect liberty to select his own architect, and to accept such plans for the construction of the building as may seem to him wise, his power of discretion in this matter being modified only by the Charter provisions with relation to the Municipal Art Commission. The undersigned therefore, as a minority of this Committee, respectfully report in favor of the said ordinance.

The resolution would give the Departmental Inspector an increase of \$450 per annum, and it is attempted to be justified by comparison with the salaries of Chief Inspectors in other Departments and Bureaus. The Committee is of the opinion that the title of this position is a misnomer, and does not properly reflect the duties of the office. The Departmental Inspector does not seem to be in charge of or responsible for subordinate Inspectors; his duties are of a very general and not very important nature. In a general way he looks after the Janitors and Cleaners in the several public buildings, and passes upon the Janitors' reports of the "time" of their helpers. The Committee thinks that this is a case for consideration by the Committee on Salaries, lately appointed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and therefore recommends the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That Introductory No. 73 be and it is hereby returned to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with a request for a further examination of the merits of the application for an increase of salary.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held January 12, 1906, adopted the following resolution:

A communication was received from Asa Bird Gardiner, Vice-Commander of the Veteran Corps of Artillery of the State of New York, of date January 25, 1906, making requisition for lockers to be placed in the quarters assigned to that organization in the new Seventy-first Regiment armory.

Referred to the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx.

The Secretary presented a report from the Committee on Armories as follows:

New York, January 26, 1906.

To the Honorable GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Armory Board:

Dear Sir—A meeting of the Committee on Armories was held in the Stewart Building this day, at 11 o'clock a. m., and considered the following matters which had been referred to them by the Armory Board:

A communication from Messrs. Pilcher, Thomas & Tachau, architects, of date December 23, 1905, transmitting drawings and specifications for electric and gas fixtures for Squadron "C" armory, with an estimate of the cost. The architects' estimate for such fixtures is \$14,280, including architects' fees, which comes within the limit of the original appropriation for the armory, so that no additional moneys need be appropriated therefor.

The Committee recommend the amount as reasonable.

Communication from Messrs. Clinton & Russell, architects for the new Seventy-first Regiment armory, transmitting the application of L. Plaut & Co. for changes and additions to some of the lighting fixtures in that armory, now under contract, at an additional cost of \$410.

A representative of the architects was present, and explained the reason for the changes and additions.

The Committee do not recommend such changes.

Communication from Captain John F. Klein, commanding the Seventeenth Separate Company, making requisition for furnishings for the new armory of his organization, situated in the Borough of Queens, was then considered. The building is approaching completion, and has been erected and furnished with lockers, gun racks, lighting fixtures and so forth by the State, and the amount of \$4,000 is asked for to provide furnishings for it, as per schedule presented.

The Committee recommend the amount as reasonable.

In the matter of the extension of the Thirteenth Regiment armory, the Committee recommend that the rifle range be eliminated from the specifications, and that the architects be requested to amend their specifications and present the same, with an estimate of the cost.

A communication was presented from Lord & Hewlett, architects for the Second Battalion Naval Militia armory, recommending the substitution of reinforced concrete stairs with slate treads, in place of cast-iron stairs specified, for the four flights from the drill room floor to gallery floor, at the east end of the armory. The architects stated that, in their opinion, the substitution was desirable and of equal cost, and recommended the same.

The Committee recommend the change.

A representative of Clinton & Russell appeared before the Committee and asked the authorization of other changes in the specifications for the Seventy-first Regiment armory, to which the Committee recommended that the architects make a formal request by letter, itemizing the changes referred to.

Captain Erlandsen, commanding the First Signal Corps, appeared before the Committee and petitioned for an appropriation to furnish his quarters in the new Seventy-first Regiment armory.

The Committee recommend that the architects be requested to send a detailed specification and estimate for such furnishing, at a cost not exceeding \$12,000, including architects' fees.

The Committee suggest that the Secretary be directed to carry out the recommendations contained in this report.


