Added Points-Honorable Mention and Medal (or Roll of Merit and Medal), add 3 per cent.; Honorable Mention or Roll of Merit Class, A, B and C, add 2 per cent.; Commendation, or Roll of Merit, Class D, add 1 per cent.

Deducted Points-For each day's fine between January 1, 1908, and January 1, 1911, deduct 1/4 of 1 per cent.; for each day's fine after January 1, 1911, deduct 1/2 of 1 per cent.; reprimands or caution to count as one-half one day's fine; fines and reprimands previous to January 1, 1908, not to be considered.

Battalion Chief, to be open to all Captains who shall have served for not less than six months in the grade on the day of the mental examination. Subjects and weights of examination to be the same as those for Deputy Chief.

Pilot, to be limited to men who will be First Grade Firemen not later than the day of the mental examination, and who hold Masters' Licenses for vessels of at least

three hundred tons. Subjects and Weights-Experience and Class of License, 8; duties, 2; total, 10.

The recommendations were approved.

A report dated May 6 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner, recommending that an examination be ordered for promotion to Assistant Superintendent of Telegraph, Police Department, also recommending the following subjects and weights for use in the examination:

75 per cent. required on the technical paper; 70 per cent on the mental examination; 80 per cent on the total.

Record and Seniority-Beginning with the date of appointment to the lowest position to which the examination is open, 80 per cent.; for each three months add 1/4 of 1 per cent. or 1 per cent. a year, making at the end of fifteen years a maximum of 95 per cent.

Deducted Points-For each day's fine between July 1, 1908, to and including June 30, 1911, deduct 1/4 of 1 per cent.; for each day's fine after July 1, 1911, deduct 1/2 of 1 per cent.; reprimands to count as one-half of one day's fine.

The examination to be open to all ranks of positions in the uniformed force of the Police Department. Patrolmen to be eligible must be in the First Grade. The examination will be limited to men who have had at least five years' electrical experience, which must be shown at the time of filing applications.

The technical examination will consist of practical questions concerning all electrical apparatus in use in the Bureau of Telegraphy, wiring, the installation and care of underground electrical conduits, and the care and operation of minor electrical machinery. Candidates are expected to be familiar with the general operating and construction work connected with the Bureau of Telegraphy of the Police Department.

The recommendations were approved. 

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

THIS CONTRACT, made this day of 19, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and The Yonkers Electric Light and Power Company (hereinafter called the Yonkers Company), the Westchester Lighting Company (hereinafter called the Edison Company) (hereinafter called the Edison Company), and The United Electric Light and Power Company (hereinafter called the United Company), parties of the second part (which companies when referred to collectively are hereinafter called the referred to collectively are hereinafter called the grantees), witnesseth:

If the grantees shall determine to exercise the privilege of renewal they shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The de-termination of the revaluation shall be sufficient agreed to in writing by the grantees and the

If the grantees and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the grantees shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:
One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen

by the Board; one disinterested freeholder, shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the grantees and their officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual compensation shall, in any event, be less than that required for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual compensation shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the annual compensation theretofore prevailing shall continue until the new rate shall be determined, and the grantees shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual compensation then determined over the previous annual compensation. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the grantees, each paying one-half thereof.

Second-As compensation for the privilege hereby granted the grantees jointly and severally agree to install equipment and furnish electrical current to the City without charge to it, as follows:

Eighth-The transmission line hereby authorized shall be used only for the transmission of electrical current to and within the Counties of Westchester and Putnam of the State of New York, and shall not be used as a portion of or in connection with a transmission line extendon of the York nor into any portion of any other state; provided that the Board may by resolution authorize the use of such transmission line for the transmission of electrical current from, to and within districts outside of said Counties of Westchester and Putnam, but the Board may, upon the adoption of such resolution, require such compensation for the additional right and prescribe such terms and conditions to govern the same as in its discretion it may deem proper.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expira-

tion of the contract period. The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., pur-chased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the pur chase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its depart-ments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according

to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or headen interested disastly as indirectly as become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties mak ing the estimate that the several matters stated berein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or con-sideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or Na-tional banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of

the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either inclosed in a separata envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
