Brooklyn Public Library—Request for Issue of Special Revenue Bonds, \$375, to Pay Assessments and Water Rates on Site of Old Fort Hamilton Branch.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, Municipal Building, New York City
Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Brooklyn Public Library, held Tuesday, November 21, it was voted that the Board of Aldermen be

Dear Sir—In order that the Board of Aldermen may understand the reason for the Brooklyn Public Library's request for the issue of revenue bonds, I suggest that a copy of this letter be sent to them.

On June 9, 1910, the Fort Hamilton Free Library transferred all its books, etc., to the Brooklyn Public Library and also gave a deed of its real property on Stewart Avenue. The deed stated that it was free from all encumbrances except taxes. Since said date the City of New York (through the Brooklyn Public Library) has maintained a branch at Fourth Avenue and Ninety-fifth Street, serving the same section, and the Fort Hamilton Free Library has gone out of existence.

The Brooklyn Public Library has lately sold the piece of land on which the Fort Hamilton Free Library formerly stood, and at the time of closing title certain water rents and assessments were found to be unpaid and still a lien upon the property. This matter was taken up with Mr. Hadlock, Deputy Comptroller, and the contract closed upon the understanding that the Brooklyn Public Library would see that these liens were wiped off the records and request made for their payment by the City of New York.

The contract of the City of New York and the Brooklyn Public Library, among other things, provides: "That the City of New York will appropriate and pay for the maintenance and support of said Brooklyn Public Library, such sums as may be required for the proper maintenance of the libraries." It also provides in paragraph sixth, "for the purposes of this agreement, however, it is understood that any taxes and assessments upon any of the property of said Brooklyn Public Library are to be regarded as part of the cost and maintenance of the said free library system."

We respectfully ask that said revenue bonds be authorized to pay these assessments and water rates and interest.

We point out that the water tax of 1903 and 1904 and the sewer assessment of 1908 were liens before the Brooklyn Public Library became the owner of the property sold and are really assessable against the Fort Hamilton Free Library, which has gone out of existence. The City of New York, however, has for the Brooklyn Public Library, taken over the books and property of this institution and these two back water rates and assessment may fairly be claimed to be in the cost of maintenance.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner, Department of Street Cleaning:

No. 1035.

Commissioner of Street Cleaning—Proposed Amendments to Code of Ordinances Relating to Snow Removal, Etc.

November 27, 1916.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Dear Sir—In the revision of the Code of Ordinances which was adopted March 30, 1915, no provision was made for the enforcement of section 21, article 3 of chapter 22, with reference to the duty of property owners to remove snow and ice from the sidewalks within four hours after the termination of a snowfall. Previously this neglect was punishable by a fine or imprisonment for one day. (Old Code of Ordinances, section 418.) The omission of this provision from the Code of Ordinances has greatly handicapped this department in the work of clearing snow from the roadways, since householders frequently clear the sidewalks after the roadways have been cleaned and in some instances they fail to clean the sidewalks at all.

The civil penalty provided by section 1 of article 1 of chapter 22 is not an effective means of enforcing prompt compliance with the requirements of the Ordinance. Accordingly, I have prepared a draft of a new ordinance, which you will find enclosed, and which I would thank you to submit to the Board of Aldermen for consideration. Briefly, it proposes to restore to section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 the old provision, giving jurisdiction to a police magistrate to impose a fine or imprisonment for failure to comply with the ordinance, and to add another provision requiring householders, in the event of an emergency caused by an extra heavy snowfall, to clear snow and ice from one-third of the width of the roadway in front of their premises, and to pile the same either in the centre of the roadway or on the sides thereof, within forty-eight (48) hours after such snowfall ceases. I should be glad to appear before the Committee of the Board to which this ordinance is referred, and to make a full explanation regarding the necessity for this provision.

Section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 was amended on July 16, 1915, by providing that in case a property owner failed to remove snow from the sidewalk within four (4) hours after cessation of the storm, the President of the Borough in which the property was located might do so, instead of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, as theretofore. At the same time, section 1 of article 1 of chapter 22 was allowed to stand and still remains in force. This section requires that in case the property owner fails to remove the snow and ice it shall be the duty of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning to do so. In other words, the two existing ordinances are utterly inconsistent. Apparently an error was made in amending section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 instead of amending section 1 of article 1 of chapter 22. I have accordingly prepared an amendment to the latter section to cure this defect and have provided for its omission from the former section.

I have also incorporated in this proposed amendment a provision taken from (ordinance No. 182) No. 983, introduced by Alderman Haubert, providing that instead of the Corporation Counsel suing for a penalty he shall file a lien against the property.

I enclose, also, an additional proposed amendment to section 23 of article 3 of chapter 22, to permit employees of the Department of Street Cleaning to use salt for the melting of snow on the streets. This ordinance was originally intended for the protection of the feet of horses using the streets, but owing to the prevalence of motor traffic this is no longer a serious objection. The use of salt would be of great aid to the department in the work of snow removal, particularly in view of the present condition of the labor market.

Kindly submit all three amendments to the Board of Aldermen.

Department of Street Cleaning, of the City of New York, Office of the Commissioner, Municipal Building, New York City, November 23rd, 1916.

My Dear Alderman—I desire to secure your co-operation in meeting the problem of snow removal this winter. You know that it is almost impossible to secure labor for ordinary work at the present time, and the Department will need 15,000 laborers in addition to its regular force for rapid clearing of snow from streets during and after heavy snowfalls. Two years ago, when there was marked lack of employment in private industries, more than 40,000 laborers registered for snow removal work in this city. Last winter the number so registering was but 13,500, and this winter it is doubtful if laborers will be procurable.

Should a heavy snowfall block the movement of freight on the railroads and prevent vehicular traffic on city streets, the result to this city would be disastrous, because the storage of food and fuel is so limited. Even more dangerous than this situation would be the fire risk, due to impassable streets.

The Street Cleaning Department is doing everything possible to organize all

forces which may be employed on the removal of snow, but it seems to me that an emergency exists which will require the help of the Board of Aldermen in the passage or modification of ordinances relating to this work. I beg to suggest for your consideration three proposals:—

(1) That the Department of Street Cleaning be permitted to use salt for melting snow. This is now prohibited by an old ordinance, but conditions have decidedly changed since the former objection to this method prevailed. Automobiles have almost entirely displaced horses on many of the main arteries, and the use of salt on such streets will materially assist in preventing congestion of traffic, with only temporary inconvenience.

(2) The existing sidewalk snow removal ordinance is defective, in that prompt action looking toward the removal of snow from sidewalks cannot be enforced by the police. The offender summoned to court may decline to pay the fine of three dollars imposed by the ordinance, and the Judge will have to allow the offender to go free, as no alternative imprisonment sentence is provided in the ordinance.

(3) Should a heavy snowfall occur and life and property be in danger through the risk of conflagration or a shortage in food and fuel, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning should have the power, by proclamation or otherwise, to call upon all citizens and owners or occupants of property to open passageways for vehicles in front of abutting property. A reasonable time should be allowed before those failing to comply with the proclamation are called to account; but it is doubtful if extreme measures leading to fine or imprisonment would be necessary, except in a few cases, as every citizen with any regard for public welfare would be glad, I believe, to do a small part toward meeting the emergency.

I have drafted ordinances which I will submit to the Board of Aldermen in the foregoing matters, and will be glad to have from you any suggestions or comments on the plans herein set forth.

Ord. No. 199.

An Ordinance to Amend Section 1 of Article 1 of Chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Reimbursement for the Removal of Rubbish or Snow.

AN ORDINANCE to amend Section 1 of Article 1 of Chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances relating to reimbursement for the removal of rubbish or snow.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1 of Article 1 of Chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. Reimbursement for the Removal of Rubbish or Snow.

§1. [Wherever] In the event that any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person having charge of any building or lot abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved, shall fail to comply with [any provision of this chapter] the provisions of any ordinance of the City of New York for the removal of snow and ice, dirt, or other material, from the sidewalk and gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which such building or lot abuts [the Commissioner of Street Cleaning or the Borough President of Queens or Richmond, as the case may be], the President of the Borough in which such building or vacant lot is located may cause such removal to be made, meeting [such] the expense thereof from any suitable street cleaning or highway fund, and thereafter the expense of such removal as to each particular lot of ground shall be ascertained and certified [by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning or by the President of the Borough of Queens or Richmond] by the said Borough President to the Comptroller, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may authorize such additional expenditures as may be required for the said removal of [the] such snow, dirt or other material, to be repaid to the fund from which the payments were made [or, instead, in the Borough of Queens or Richmond, to the special fund for restoring and repaving in said boroughs, if the Presidents thereof so elect], with proceeds from the issue and sale of revenue bonds, which shall be sold by the Comptroller, as provided by law. [The Commissioner of Street Cleaning or the Borough President of Queens or Richmond, as the case may be.] The said Borough President shall as soon as possible, after the work of such removal is done, certify to the Corporation Counsel the amount of the expense chargeable against each [piece of property] lot of ground affected [who shall sue and recover the amount of such expense from the owner of such property, together with a penalty of Three Dollars for each offence.] The Corporation Counsel is hereby directed and authorized to immediately thereafter prepare and file in the office of the Clerk of the County in which the particular lot of ground is located, a notice of lien in favor of the City of New York for the amount paid for the removal of such snow and ice, dirt or other material, and in addition thereto the further sum of Three Dollars (\$3.00) penalty for each offence against the particular lot of ground affected; said lien to remain such against said property until paid. The Corporation Counsel shall serve, or cause to be served, by mail upon the owner of the property affected a copy of said notice of lien contained in a securely closed post-paid wrapper, addressed to such owner at his last known place of residence. Upon payment of such lien, the Corporation Counsel shall execute and deliver a satisfaction piece of such lien and turn over the amount so received and collected by him to the City Chamberlain to the credit of the general fund of the City of New York for the reduction of taxation.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Ord. No. 200.

An Ordinance to Amend Subdivisions 1 and 2, Section 21 of Article 3 of Chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Snow and Ice, as Amended.

AN ORDINANCE to amend subdivisions 1 and 2, section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to snow and ice, as amended.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Section 21 of Article 3 of Chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows.

Section 21—Property Owners.

§1. Must clear sidewalks and one-third of roadway.

Every owner, lessee, tenant, agent, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the City, abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved, shall, within four [4] hours after the snow ceases to fall, or after the deposit of any dirt or other material upon said sidewalk, remove the snow and ice, dirt or other material from the sidewalk and gutter, the time between 9 p. m. and 7 a. m. not being included in the above period of four [4] hours; provided, however, that such removal shall in all cases be made before the removal of snow and ice from the roadway by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, or by the Borough President of Queens or Richmond, or subject to the regulations of said Commissioner of Street Cleaning, or of said Borough President of Queens or Richmond, for the removal of snow and ice, dirt and other material; except that in the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond any owner, lessee, tenant or occupant or other person who has charge of any ground abutting upon any paved street or public place, for a linear distance of 500 feet or more, shall be considered to have complied with this section, if such person shall have begun to remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk and gutter before the expiration of the said four [4] hours, and shall continue and complete such removal within a reasonable time.

[Whenever any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved, shall fail to comply with the provision of any ordinance of the City for the removal of snow and ice, dirt, or other material from the sidewalk and gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which such building or lot abuts, the President of the Borough in which such building or vacant lot is located, may cause such removal to be made, meeting the expense thereof from any suitable street cleaning or highway fund, and thereafter the expense of such removal as to each particular lot of ground shall be ascertained and certified by the said Borough President to the Comptroller, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may authorize such additional expenditures as may be required for the said removal of such ice and snow, dirt or other material, to be repaid to the fund from which the payments were made, with proceeds from the issue and sale of revenue bonds which shall be sold by the Comptroller, as provided by law.

The said Borough President shall, as soon as possible, after the work is done, certify to the Corporation Counsel the amount of the expense chargeable against each piece of property.

The Corporation Counsel is hereby directed and authorized to sue for and recover the amount of this expense, together with Three Dollars (\$3.00) penalty for

each offense, and when so recovered the amount shall be turned over to the City Chamberlain to be deposited to the credit of the general fund of The City of New York for the reduction of taxation.]

[C. O., No. 414, amend. July 16, 1915.]

In case of an emergency caused by an extra heavy snow fall, resulting in congestion of traffic, upon receipt of notice from the Commissioner of Police, or any police officer, owners, lessees, tenants, agents, occupants, other persons having charge of any building or lot of ground in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, abutting on any street or public place where the roadway is paved, shall clear snow and ice from one-third of the width of the roadway in front of said premises, and pile the same either in the centre of the roadway or on the sides thereof, as may be directed by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, within forty-eight (48) hours after the snowfall ceases.

§ 2. May use ashes, etc.

In case the snow and ice on the sidewalk shall be frozen so hard that it cannot be removed without injury to the pavement, the owner, lessee, tenant, agent, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground as aforesaid, may, within the time specified in the preceding subdivision, cause the sidewalk abutting on the said premises to be strewn with ashes, sand, sawdust, or some similar suitable material, and shall, as soon thereafter as the weather shall permit, thoroughly clean said sidewalks.

§ 3. Any person violating any provision or regulation hereof shall, upon conviction thereof by any City Magistrate, be fined for such offense not more than Three Dollars (\$3.00) or be imprisoned for a period not exceeding one day, or may be both fined and imprisoned.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

An Ordinance to Amend Section 23 of Article 3 of Chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances Relating to Salting Tracks.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 23 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances relating to salting tracks.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Section 23 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

§23. Salting tracks.

No person, excepting a duly authorized employee of the Department of Street Cleaning, shall throw, expose or place, or cause or procure to be thrown, exposed or placed in or upon any street or public place, except upon the curves, crossings or switches of railroad tracks, any salt, saltpetre or other substance, for the purpose of dissolving any snow or ice which may have fallen or been deposited thereon; nor shall any person throw or place upon the curves, crossings or switches of railroad tracks any salt, saltpetre or other substance for the purpose of dissolving snow or ice, unless permission therefor be first obtained from the Borough President having jurisdiction.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE to amend subdivision 2 of section 13 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, relating to "Rules of the Road," particularly to "Restricted Streets," by adding thereto a new sentence.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:
Section 1. Subdivision 2 of section 13 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, relating to "Rules of the Road," and particularly to "Restricted Streets," is hereby amended by adding thereto a new sentence to read as follows,

Section 2. *No peddler, hawker or huckster shall be permitted to cry his or her wares, or stop or remain on St. Ann's Avenue, between 133rd and 141st Streets, or on 139th Street between Brook and St. Ann's Avenues, in the Borough of the Bronx.*

Section 3. *This ordinance shall take effect immediately.*

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of nine hundred dollars (\$900), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Committee on Privileges and Elections, for the purpose of bringing to completion the work of said Committee, in the main the necessary to provide for stenographic services.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

Report of the Committee on Finance—

No. 953.
Report of the Committee on Finance on Proposed Budget for 1917.
The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on November 14th, 1916 (page 199), the proposed budget for the year 1917, respectfully

REPORTS:
That this budget, amounting to \$211,115,016.82, has been under consideration by this Committee during the twenty days provided by the Charter for its review by the Board of Aldermen. The Committee held a duly advertised public hearing to the end that all interested citizens might be heard. After this public hearing the Committee met a number of times for the consideration and discussion of the budget and its large number of items, which, for the purpose of this report, may be divided into two classes, first, the cost of supplies and materials, and second, salary increases, new positions and useless places. With regard to the first mentioned, the Committee, because of the uncertainty of the cost of supplies and materials, has not endeavored to check up any of the allowances provided for these purposes, being assured that the Sub-Budget Committee and the Budget Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with the information at hand from the various agencies of that Board, had made an exhaustive study of these questions and had registered their careful opinion in the appropriations made for the various departments, boards and commissions in the line of supplies, materials, equipment, repairs and replacements. With regard to Number 2, the Committee begs leave to report that it has scrutinized such items as thoroughly as possible, with the idea of presenting for the consideration of the Board such reductions as it believes should be made for the best interests of the citizens and taxpayers of the city. Because of the increased cost of living in our city, it is the opinion of the Committee that many of the increases to the small salaried employees are necessary. Particularly do we approve of the increases to the uniformed forces of the Police and Fire Departments, who, in addition to their living expenses, must buy their own uniforms.

SALARY INCREASES.
Because of the present burden upon the City and its taxpayers, the Committee does not think it wise to increase the salaries of any employees receiving four thousand dollars, nor can it approve of any salary increase that brings an employee beyond

that point. In many cases it has made reductions where it appeared to the Committee, after consideration, that the employees affected were being sufficiently compensated for the duties performed. The Committee further finds that some of the allowed increases brought the occupant above positions similar in title and character, thus defeating the principle of standardization so earnestly advocated in the formation of other budgets.

Board of Aldermen—

With regard to the increase in salary for the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Committee as a general proposition is in accord with the Board of Estimate, but the President of the Board himself, in requesting that this be not allowed, declared for a sound and consistent principle, with which this Committee was unable to quarrel. The President succeeded to the office pursuant to the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, and was elected this fall. He regards his incumbency of the office as filling an unexpired term and does not believe that the salary of any elected officer should be increased during and in the term for which he was either appointed or elected. This principle, it seems to us, is sound, particularly in view of the fact that he has it within his power to twice vote for his own salary increase.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Committee on Education—

In this department the budget allows for an Educational Expert the sum of \$10,000. This is intended to continue payment for the services of one William Wirt, who has been engaged to consult with the educational authorities of the city for the purpose of installing in our educational system what is known as the "Gary System." Your committee, without seeking to underestimate the value of his services, cannot help commenting upon the fact that for the services he rendered he has been paid \$1,000 a week. It is a sad commentary on our educational system, costly as it is to the taxpayers, that it does not contain in its supervising and teaching force, a single person capable of evolving this plan after three years of consultation with so high priced an expert from the State of Indiana. Your Committee cannot go too strong on the record as favoring any scheme that will give to the children of our city the fullest possible benefit of our free institutions, but, in justice to our own officials, we do believe that the number of consultations required for the completion of this scheme, could be so reduced as to make \$5,000 an ample appropriation for this purpose.

Commissioner of Accounts—

Reports of former Finance Committees have advocated the abolition of the so-called "Efficiency Staff" in the office of the Commissioner of Accounts. This Committee, after consultation with the Mayor, through its Chairman, has decided to retain the places, but cannot approve of the salary increases sought to be given to nine members of the staff.

NEW POSITIONS.

Board of Estimate—

The proposed budget provides for the creation of a position of chemist in the Bureau of Public Improvements in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Inasmuch as there exists at present a well organized laboratory under the direction of the Bureau of Contract Supervision in this same department, employing 17 chemists, the Committee feels that this new position is not needed.

President, Borough of Manhattan—

This office is already provided with 41 engineers at a cost of \$108,410 per annum, and 37 draftsmen at a cost of \$50,820 per annum. Your Committee believes that this force is entirely adequate to deal with all the engineering problems in the office of the Borough President, and cannot agree with the proposal to create an Assistant Engineer at \$2,700, an Assistant Engineer at \$1,920, and two Draftsmen at \$1,820 each. It is, therefore, disallowed.

Department of Education—

In the Department of Education it is proposed to establish the position of Executive Manager at an annual salary of \$10,000. This is an entirely new departure in the method of controlling the business affairs of the Board of Education. It seems to the Committee that this is a radical step toward the centralization of functions which properly come under the supervision of committees. These committees are composed of representative men and women appointed as unpaid members of the Board of Education, pursuant to statutory provisions, and this action may result in lessening the interest heretofore displayed by unselfish and devoted citizens. Year after year legislative proposals from official and unofficial sources, recommending a change in the existing method of handling the business affairs of the Board of Education have been defeated. The Committee is informed that the Board of Education itself is divided on this question. Therefore, the Committee recommends that the creation of the position of Executive Manager, at an annual salary of \$10,000, be disallowed.

The Committee's action in this matter is not influenced in any way by the allegations made in the public press to the effect that the position in question has been created for the sole purpose of providing a \$10,000 place for a certain member of the Board of Education.

In addition to the above there is sought to be created an additional place, with the title Architectural Draftsman, at \$1,570 per annum, in the Bureau of Supervision of Building Construction and Alteration. As there are now fifty-six architectural draftsmen in the same bureau, drawing salaries amounting to \$107,330.12, this new position seems absolutely unnecessary. There is also sought to be created the position of Supervising Engineer, at \$4,000 per annum, for the stated purpose of controlling the consumption of fuel in the schools and the supervision of janitorial service. This also seems to be entirely unnecessary. Therefore, your Committee recommends that these positions be disallowed.

Department of Plant and Structures—

In this department, by the provisions of the budget, it proposes to create three new positions, as follows:

Examiner	\$4,140 00
Confidential Clerk	3,500 00
Confidential Inspector	2,500 00

The power was given the Board of Estimate by the Legislature for the creation of the Department of Plant and Structures in the belief that the merger of the activities of various departments into one would tend to keep down the cost. While the department is only in process of formation, the Committee does not believe that its working force should in any way be added to, particularly in view of the statement of the Commissioner himself, that these places are asked for, contingent upon some future happening. In view of the fact that the bridge system of the city, on a large scale, is about completed, it seemed to your Committee that the present force is entirely adequate to deal with existing conditions.

Municipal Courts—

Under this heading there is provided in the budget a new position, with the title of Secretary to the Presiding Justice, at \$1,800 a year. This is disapproved for the reason that in the opinion of your Committee there is a sufficient number of clerks, any of whom may be called upon to perform this character of work.

USELESS PLACES.

Under this heading your Committee begs leave, after careful consideration of the services performed, to recommend the following:

Public Employment Bureau, Department of Licenses—

In this bureau the city is duplicating a function now performed by the State through its Labor Department, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 181 of the Laws of 1914. The State Labor Department has already within the greater city established a branch of its bureau of employment. We, therefore, recommend that the force be reduced to a stenographer and three clerks until such time as the State takes the work over entirely, thus doing away with the position of Superintendent and such other positions as now make the budget \$14,700, and recommend the retention of a stenographer and three clerks, as aforesaid, at an expense to the city of \$3,150, effecting a total saving of \$11,550, without impairment of the service.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment—

In this department your Committee found a temporary force engaged in what is known as City Planning, receiving salaries totalling \$9,150. Inasmuch as the bulk of this work is already completed and adopted by the Board of Estimate the necessary routine work of providing changes in it from time to time can well be carried on by the permanent force of nine persons now receiving in the aggregate \$13,460 per annum. Your Committee, therefore, recommends the abolition entirely of the temporary force.

Department of Health—

Your Committee fully appreciates the importance of this department to the health and well being of the community, and hesitates to offer amendments tending to the

reduction of its force. It cannot help suggesting the elimination of two places that seem to be entirely useless. One is the Director of Public Health Education, at \$5,000 a year. It is difficult to imagine of what possible benefit this place can be, when editorial work necessary to the publication of the various bulletins issued by this department may well be performed by the staff already employed in this bureau, or, better still, by the Departmental Librarian, and when it is of unusual importance it might well be supervised by the head of the Municipal Reference Library, who is capable and willing to render this service at any time. The other position in this department sought to be eliminated is that of Assistant Engineer, at \$2,700, which service, were it allowed, would be devoted to the supervision of ordinary repairs to buildings and equipment. This suggests a duplication of functions with other departments of the city government, and could, at any rate, be cared for by the Inspectional force of the department.

Tenement House Department—

Your Committee recommends the abolition of the position of Secretary to the Department at \$3,750 per annum. The reason for the creation of this place originally was to the end that he might reorganize the office and field force of this department. Two years have elapsed and your Committee is reliably informed that in all of this period no action or suggestion has come from him in this regard. This department, because of its very nature, should not, as time goes on, be more costly to the taxpayers. While it is our desire to maintain it to the fullest of its efficiency, nevertheless, the fact is that many of the abuses which it was organized to remedy do not now exist, and while constant supervision is necessary, increased cost, however, cannot be properly justified.

Central Purchase Committee—

In view of the fact that this bureau is only in the experimental stage, your Committee has deemed it wise to allow it to remain where the Board of Estimate put it, under the supervision and direction of the Commissioner of Accounts, until such time as it proves itself capable of successful operation. Until that time, there seems to be no need for the position of Director at \$5,000 a year. It would seem absurd to have the bureau head directing the activities of the Commissioner of Accounts. It is, therefore, disapproved.

The Committee offers this report for the earnest consideration of the Board. It may be that in its work of scanning the Budget the Committee has omitted to make certain reductions which may have occurred to some of the members, but it calls attention to the fact that it invited each member of the Board to present to it any suggestions which might occur to him in his perusal of the Budget and the accompanying documents, which were submitted at the meetings of November 14 and 21, 1916, respectively. It submits herewith a list in detail showing each item of reduction.

It recommends that the accompanying resolution, amending the Budget, be approved.

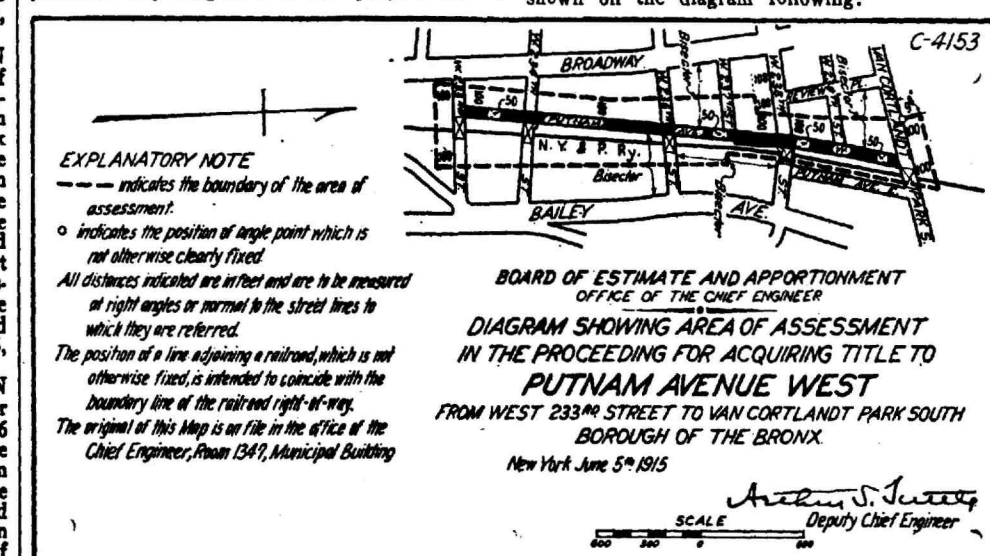

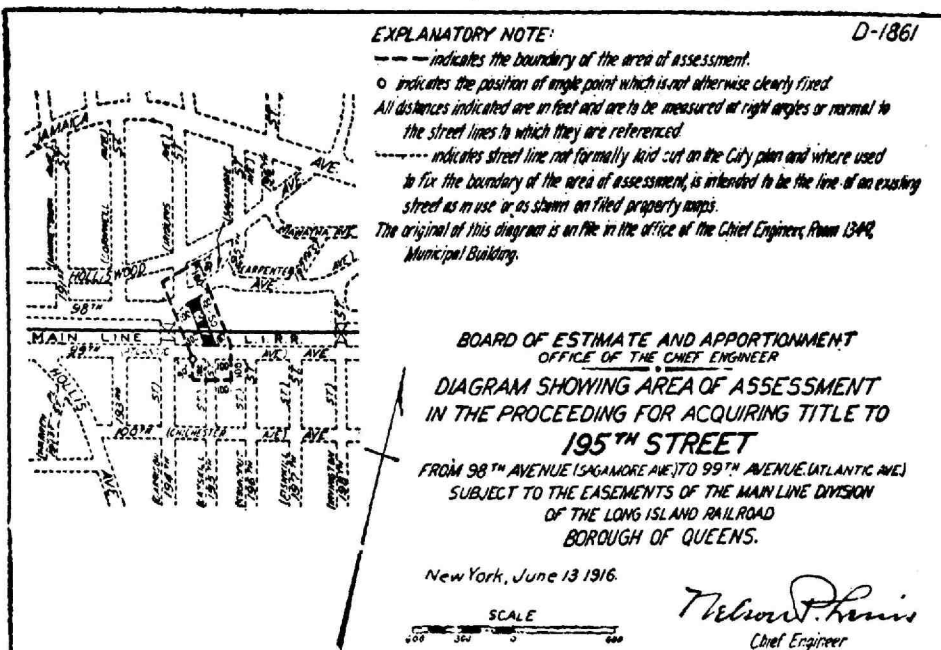
