A review of the accounts of the department at the present time indicates that additional funds will be required and the Trustees have the honor to request an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$23,100, as follows:

President, Borough of Brooklyn—Request for Permission to Enter Into Contract Without Public Letting for Constructing a Portion of the Central Library Building at Flatbush Avenue and Eastern Parkway.

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, Brooklyn, November 5, 1917.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—On November 15, 1916, bids were received for constructing a portion of the Central Library Building, at Flatbush avenue and Eastern Parkway, in the Borough of Brooklyn. The lowest bid exceeded the appropriation for the work. The bids were all rejected under the advice of the Corporation Counsel. Subsequently changes were made in the plans and specifications eliminating certain portions of the work so that the absolutely necessary part could be done within the funds allowed. Bids were received upon the changed plans on March 7, 1917, and the contract was awarded to the lowest bidder. A balance of \$55,000 now remains in the fund.

Part of the work eliminated was the battery room, in the front of the building. The contractor has agreed to do this work now for a certain amount, and copy of his estimate is attached hereto. In order to finish the Flatbush avenue side of the building and grade the lot properly this work should be performed now.

I would therefore request permission of the Board of Aldermen to enter into an agreement with the contractor to perform this work without public letting, at a cost not to exceed \$23,000, the exact amount to be determined after a conference with the Bureau of Contract Supervision of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Department of Public Charities—Request for Permission to Enter Into Contract Without Public Letting for Installing Cement Plaster Work on Walls and Floors at the Sea View Hospital.

Department of Public Charities of The City of New York, Municipal Building, Tenth Floor, November 17, 1917.

Re Permission to Enter into Contract.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Gentlemen—We request your permission to enter into a contract for \$9,000, without public letting, with A. L. Guidone & Son, Inc., 52 Vanderbilt Avenue, New York City, for installing two coats of cement plaster work on all walls from floor to ceiling of locker room, toilet room, stair case, hall and vestibule, and the two dormitory rooms on each of the two floors of the 21 pavilion buildings now under construction at the Sea View Hospital. This also to include the construction of the new wood bucks to suit the new condition of opening at the different partitions where this change occurs.

A. L. Guidone & Son, Inc., are the General Contractors for the construction of 21 pavilion buildings, one group building and one dining hall building at the Sea View Hospital. When the plans and specifications for these buildings were prepared, the plaster work, which is the subject of this request, was intentionally omitted in order to reduce the cost of construction. When the bids were opened it was found that there was sufficient balance available to perform this plaster work, which is very necessary for the comfort of the inmates. Very truly yours,

Bureau of Personal Service, Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Report Showing Cost of Increasing Wages of Laborers and Salaries of Labor Positions Based Upon a Minimum Rate of \$3 Per Day for All Laborers Provided in the Tax Budget at \$2.75 a Day and Others at Rates Between \$2.75 and \$3; Also Rates for Annual Employees in the Labor Class at Correspondingly Higher Rates.

City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment; Bureau of Personal Service, Municipal Building, November 26, 1917.

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen, City Hall:

Sir—At its meeting on November 20 the Board of Aldermen adopted the following resolution:

"Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has included in the tax budget, as recommended to the Board of Aldermen, an item of \$1,500,000 as a Contingency Fund for labor to be apportioned by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment among departments, the rates of compensation to be fixed by the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to section 56 of the Charter; and

"Whereas, Economic and industrial conditions are such as to warrant the recognition of rates for laborers in the City service higher than those provided in the proposed tax budget; be it

"Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen hereby requests the Bureau of Personal Service to prepare schedules for all departments, boards, bureaus and offices of the City and County governments, based upon a minimum rate of \$3 a day for all laborers provided in the tax budget at \$2.75 a day, and others at rates between \$2.75 and \$3; also rates for annual employees in the labor class at correspondingly higher rates, the report to include a calculation of the amount required for each department to place the rates in operation for the year 1918."

Permit me to submit herewith the report requested in the resolution. For a clear understanding of this report, it should be pointed out that the sum of \$1,500,000 recommended to your Board by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is against the general tax levy of the City and that increases in compensation for County employees cannot properly be charged to this fund, but must be County charges. The amount involved in the application for the proposed rates in the County offices is relatively insignificant and will probably not amount to more than \$5,000 at the outside. This amount, if required, could be provided by special revenue bonds chargeable to the separate counties.

In calculating the amounts required for annual employees in the labor class in the various departments, an allowance of \$72 per annum has been made as most nearly approximating the proposed increase in the minimum rate for per diem labor of 25 cents a day from \$2.75 to \$3. This means that for full time labor on an annual basis, which is regarded as equal in value with per diem labor, a minimum rate of \$912 has been employed as a basis of calculation. For part time labor, such as women Cleaners employed in public buildings, increases have been allowed proportionate to the hours of labor. In the group of employees known as Laborer-Watchman, a rate of \$720 per annum has been provided in the budget as against a flat rate of \$600 at the present time. These positions are filled by Laborers who, by reason of advancing age or other physical disability, are unable to perform the full duties of regular Laborers. An increase in compensation from \$720 to \$792 is provided for them in this report. Similarly, an increase of 25 cents a day has been provided in this report for special classes of per diem employees whose services are not as onerous as those of regular Laborers. The following is a list of the Departments and Institutions which have not been included in this calculation:

Education (Manhattan Truant School, Brooklyn Truant School and New York Parental School). Nearly all the employees receive maintenance.

Libraries, New York Botanical Garden, New York Zoological Garden, New York Aquarium, Metropolitan Museum of Art, American Museum of Natural History, Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences, Brooklyn Botanic Garden and Arboretum, not scheduled.

Health (Otisville Sanatorium and Institutional Helpers such as Orderlies, Helpers, Domestic, etc., most of whom receive maintenance).

Public Charities (Institutional Helpers such as Hospital Helpers, Attendants, Laundry Helpers, etc., most of whom receive maintenance).

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals (Institutional Helpers such as Hospital Helpers, Attendants, Laundry Helpers, etc., most of whom receive maintenance).

Correction (Institutional Helpers such as Prison Helpers, etc., most of whom receive maintenance).

Public Service (paid from revenue bond issue).

County Government (\$1,500,000 included in City).

You will note from the report that the total required to put in operation the minimum rate of \$3 per day for regular labor and corresponding rates for annual employment is \$430,060.84, of which amount \$36,255.80 is chargeable to funds other than tax levy and not a charge against the proposed item of \$1,500,000. The total amount required from the fund of \$1,500,000 is \$393,805.04. This does not include any possible increases in prevailing rates for the various skilled trades which come within the provisions of the State Labor Law. Respectfully,

Resolution Authorizing Appointment of Committee to Prepare and Introduce Ordinance Providing for Establishment of Bureau of Milk Supply, Whereat Milk Will be Sold, at Cost, for Children's Use.

Whereas, The lives of fifty thousand infants in the City of New York depend upon the daily supply of wholesome milk; and

Whereas, the price of milk is prohibitive to thousands of parents of such infants; and

Whereas, the lives and health of such infants are greatly endangered by the lack of a supply of wholesome milk; and

Whereas, the price of milk may soon be increased, which will bring further distress to the residents of our City; therefore be it

The fire alarm apparatus and all other appliances placed or kept within any of said buildings for the purpose of preventing or extinguishing fires, or for affording means of escape therefrom in case of fire, shall be kept at all times in good working order and proper condition for immediate use, and any member of the uniformed force or authorized representative of the fire department may enter any of the said buildings at any time, for the purpose of inspecting such apparatus or appliances.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolution Endorsing Madden Reclassification of Salary Bill H. R. 1654, Increasing Salaries of Clerks and Letter Carriers in Post Office Department.

By Alderman Haubert—

Whereas, The maximum salary of letter carriers and post office clerks is \$1,200 per year, despite the number of years' service rendered; nor do they receive a pension after twenty or more years' service, and the law under which they are now receiving the amount of their present salaries was passed in 1907, and since that time no increase has been made thereof; and

Whereas, That prior to the past two years said salaries were adequate for the necessary needs and equipment of letter carriers and post office clerks; and

Whereas, as is well known to the people, during the past year at least, the cost of living and for clothing equipment and other necessities has been increased from 50 to 100 per cent., and therefore the present salaries above mentioned are entirely inadequate to provide for the necessary needs, wants and equipments of said carriers and clerks; and

Whereas, we believe the American people desire that the salaries paid government employees should be equal at least to those paid by private concerns; and

Whereas, Any increase permitted by law to said carriers and clerks would not mean an additional tax upon the people because of the fact according to the reports of the Postmaster General of the United States, the postal service is making a net profit of many millions of dollars every year; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York in the interest of humanity towards letters carriers and post office clerks and believing in the doctrine "that every laborer is worthy of his hire," and having due regard and consideration of the present high cost of living, hereby endorses the Madden Reclassification of Salary Bill, H. R., 1654, which principally, among other things, provides that after the passage of said bill clerks in first and second class post-offices and letter carriers in the city delivery service shall be divided into six grades, and receive salaries as follows: First grade, \$1,000; second grade, \$1,100; third grade, \$1,200; fourth grade, \$1,300; fifth grade, \$1,400, and sixth grade, \$1,500; thus providing a minimum salary of \$1,000 and a maximum salary of \$1,500 per year for said employees; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the House Post Office Committee, Hon. Martin B. Madden, of Illinois, Edward J. Cantwell, Secretary, National Association of Letter Carriers, Washington, D. C.

An inspection of the stone wall around the Court House discloses the fact that part of the wall located on Centre Street has already fallen into the street, and the balance of the wall, which is about 300 feet long and 4 feet high, is in such a condition that it will have to be removed, otherwise it also will fall. This wall is said to be about 70 years old.

Gentlemen—Request is hereby made for an issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the amount of \$720 for the purpose of rearranging and indexing Supreme Court, County Court, Common Pleas and Miscellaneous papers in the vault of the Queens County Clerk's Office.

There are about 73,000 of these papers, and great inconvenience has been experienced by Title Companies, Lawyers, Railroad Companies and other corporations, in securing papers desired. These papers were formerly put away in bundles containing about 1,000 papers each, and apparently no effort was made to so mark the bundles as to indicate their contents, or the years in which they were filed. Under present conditions it is almost impossible to honor a requisition for any of these papers.

The papers referred to run from the year 1804 to 1878, and it is imperative that an alphabetical list be made of them. It is thought that four men at \$3.00 per diem each, working for 60 days each, under proper supervision and direction, would be able to accomplish this work, and that a complete system could be installed, whereby any paper desired could easily be secured.

On April 20th, 1917, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution 823-T, allowing \$720 for the employment of a laboring force, to remove from the vault, and clean, number and index and replace on new shelving, about 300,000 books and papers in the Office of the Clerk of the County of Queens. Under this authority, the County Clerk of the County of Queens employed four laborers, and directed the work of sorting, cleaning and indexing, and placing on new shelves in numerical order, chattel mortgages from No. 1 to 65,149; mechanics' liens, from the year 1860 to 1910 inclusive; building loan agreements, from 1900 to 1910 inclusive; satisfaction of mortgages, from 1794 to 1898 inclusive; cancelled mortgages, from 1903 to 1915 inclusive; satisfactions of judgments, from 1837 to 1899 inclusive; transcripts of judgments, from 1837 to 1899 inclusive; Coroner's returns, from No. 1 to 8744 inclusive; Records of Convictions, from 1820 to 1905 inclusive; Records of Bonds, from 1857 to 1898 inclusive. In addition to this work, 1,600 libers and 350 law books were cleaned, rearranged and placed in numerical rotation, and naturalization papers, from 1794 to 1904 inclusive, were cleaned and rearranged.

If your Board will grant this request for an issue of Special Revenue Bonds, amounting to \$720, all of the old records in the vault will be so arranged as to meet the demands of the public without unnecessary delay. Yours very truly,

AN ORDINANCE regulating the sale and prescribing the weight and quality of bread in the loaf, and prescribing a standard loaf, sold or offered for sale within The City of New York.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. All bread made or procured for the purpose of sale, sold, offered or exposed for sale in The City of New York, shall be made in a clean and sanitary place, of good and wholesome flour or meal, and shall contain no deleterious substance or material.

Section 2. Every loaf of bread made or procured for the purpose of sale, sold, offered or exposed for sale in The City of New York shall weigh a pound avoirdupois (except as hereinafter provided), and such loaf shall be considered to be the standard loaf in The City of New York. Bread may also be made or procured for the purpose of sale, sold, offered or exposed for sale in half, three-quarter, double, triple, quadruple, quintuple or sextuple loaves, and in no other way.

Every loaf of bread made or procured for the purpose of sale, sold, offered or exposed for sale in the city, shall have affixed thereon in a conspicuous place a label at least one inch square, or, if round, at least one inch in diameter, upon which label there shall be printed in plain type, the letters and figures of which label shall be printed in black ink upon white paper, the weight of the loaf in pounds, or fraction of a pound, avoirdupois, whether the loaf be a standard loaf or not. The business name and address of the maker, baker or manufacturer of the loaf shall also be printed plainly on each label.

Section 3. Every maker, baker or manufacturer of bread, every proprietor of a bakery or bakeshop, and every seller of bread in The City of New York, shall keep scales and weights suitable for the weighing of bread in a conspicuous place in his bakery, bakeshop or store, and shall, when ever requested by the buyer, and in the buyer's presence, weigh the loaf or loaves of bread sold or offered for sale.

Section 4. If any person, firm or corporation shall make, or procure for the purpose of sale, sell, offer or expose for sale within The City of New York any bread which is not made of good and wholesome flour or meal, any bread which contains a deleterious substance or material, any bread the loaf or loaves of which are not standard, half, three-quarter, double, triple, quadruple, quintuple or sextuple loaves, as defined in section 2 of this Ordinance, or any bread which is not made in a clean and sanitary place, or shall make or procure for the purpose of sale, sell, offer or expose for sale within The City of New York any standard loaf or loaves of bread which do not weigh one pound, or any bread the loaf or loaves of which do not have affixed thereon the label marked as hereinbefore provided, or any bread the loaf or loaves of which do not weigh as much as the weight marked thereon, contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, such person, firm or corporation shall be fined not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense.

The provisions of this ordinance, other than the provisions of section 1 and section 4 (so far as section 4 relates to violations of section 1), shall not apply to crackers, pretzels, biscuits, buns, scones, rolls, or loaves of fancy bread weighing less than one-fourth of a pound avoirdupois, or to what is commonly known as "stale bread," sold as such provided the seller shall at the time of sale expressly state to the buyer that the bread so sold is stale bread.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:
Section 1. Paragraph 1, section 44, article 4, chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to dealers in second-hand articles, as amended by ordinance adopted June 19, 1917, and effective July 3, 1917, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

1. Place, expired licenses. No dealer in second-hand articles shall carry on business without a license, or at any other place than the one designated in his license except that any dealer in or peddler of old clothes shall have the right to purchase or sell old clothes from house to house, and if he has no store, his home shall be designated as his place of business; but no such dealer or peddler shall purchase clothes from or sell clothes to a person or persons on the street; and such other dealer in and peddler of old clothes while soliciting business from house to house shall wear a badge to be supplied by the commissioner of licenses in such form and design as the commissioner of licenses shall prescribe. No dealer in second-hand articles shall continue to carry on business after his license is suspended, revoked or shall have expired. The annual license fee to deal in or peddle old clothes shall be \$5.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect [January 31, 1918.] immediately.

Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances Relating to Appointment of or Employment in any of the Departments, Etc., in the City.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on November 13, 1917 (Minutes, page 570), the annexed communication from the Commissioner of Public Charities suggesting an amendment to section 1, article 1, chapter 16 of the Code of Ordinances relative to appointment of or employment in any of the departments, etc., of the city, respectfully

REPORTS:

That the Committee, after hearing in favor of the ordinance Commissioner Howe and Dr. Conway, of the Department of Charities; Drs. O'Hanlon and Brannan, of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and Dr. Shipley, of the Health Department, and the Committee having drafted the annexed ordinance meeting the suggestions made, and believing that there is an absolute necessity for the employment of aliens in institutions for the care of the sick or infirm, and no one appearing in opposition to the same, it recommends the adoption of the accompanying ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 1 of article 1 of chapter 16 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to the municipal civil service.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:
Section 1. Section 1 of article 1 of chapter 16 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to the municipal civil service, is hereby amended to read as follows:

§1. Officers and employees to be residents.

No person not a citizen and an actual resident and dweller, in good faith, in the state of New York shall be eligible to appointment or employment in any of the departments, boards, bureaus or branches of the government of the city [], *except in institutions which care for the sick and infirm.* Any person who now is or who shall become, after such appointment or employment, a citizen, resident or dweller outside the state of New York, shall thereby forfeit his said appointment or employment and shall be removed therefrom. The provisions of this section shall not apply to appointments or employments for services or work to be performed for the city outside the state of New York; nor to a temporary appointment or employment for a specific service or work, where peculiar or exceptional qualifications of a scientific, professional or educational character are necessary. Prior to such temporary appointment or employment, evidence in writing shall be furnished that the services or work to be performed cannot be well done by any citizen and actual resident of the state of New York who is available, and that the non-resident person proposed to be appointed is generally recognized as one possessing such exceptional qualifications in a high degree. No appointment or employment under this section shall be valid unless the consent of the mayor shall be first obtained. He may require the municipal civil service commission to pass upon the matter and certify whether such appointment or employment be necessary, and, also, whether the non-resident person proposed therefor be competent and necessary, for lack of a citizen and actual resident of the state of New York who is available for appointment.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Department of Public Charities of The City of New York, Municipal Building, Tenth Floor, November 7, 1917.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Owing to present conditions, due to the war, which has practically exhausted the supply of physicians, nurses and other hospital help, it is almost impossible to fill vacancies in necessary positions in our hospital and institutional service if we are to be confined to full-fledged citizens of the United States. Furthermore, we have been informed by the Municipal Civil Service Commission of the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court and of the intention of the Civil Service Commission to rigidly enforce the law, which would make it necessary for us to drop all persons now employed in this Department who are not citizens.

It has always been the policy of this Department to employ citizens in preference to non-citizens wherever it is possible to do so. In spite of our efforts to secure citizens we find there are 34 nurses, of approximately 110, in the Kings County Hospital who are not citizens; 52 nurses, of 90, in City Hospital who are not citizens; 39 nurses, of 88, in Metropolitan Hospital who are not citizens, and in our tuberculosis wards in Metropolitan Hospital we find that there are 51 attendants used as practical nurses who are not citizens, of a total number of 76; in Cumberland Street Hospital there are 18 non-citizens out of 30 nurses; 4 of 12, at Coney Island Hospital, and so on throughout all the institutions of this Department. Not only does this percentage apply to nurses but to the pupil nurses in our training schools who, at present, are about our only source of supply for trained nurses. It also applies to other help who are absolutely necessary in the operation of our hospitals.

If the present ordinance is rigidly enforced, as we have been given to understand it will be by the Municipal Civil Service Commission, and it becomes necessary to drop these people, it will be impossible for us to operate many of the wards of our hospitals, for, as shown in our efforts to fill vacancies, it is quite impossible to find citizens who will take the jobs. To close our hospital wards would be opposed to public interests, and not only would constitute a menace to the present or possible patients, but also would be a menace to the community at large, through the release of a large number of tuberculosis patients, who would be compelled to return to their homes, where they would be a constant menace of infection to children and others who would be exposed.

In view of the above facts, your earnest consideration and attention are requested, with a view of amending the present ordinance, at least for the period of the war, whereby it may be possible to employ and retain employees in the hospital or institutional service of this City without the present required qualifications of citizenship.

The following amendment to chapter 16, article 1, section 1 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York is respectfully proposed:

"No person not a citizen and an actual resident and dweller, in good faith, in the State of New York shall be eligible to appointment or employment in any of the departments, boards, bureaus or branches of the government of the City *except in institutions for the care of the sick and infirm, etc.*"

Note—The matter in *italics* is new.

A remedy is also suggested, provided the above proposed amendment is not satisfactory, that the present difficulty might be overcome by requiring all those employed or to be employed to take out first papers as a declaration of intent to become citizens.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on November 20, 1917 (Minutes, page —), the annexed ordinance to amend article 1 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, relating to amusements and exhibitions, respectfully

REPORTS:

The Committee held a public hearing on this ordinance, and there appeared in favor of the same President Dowling, the introducer; Mr. John D. Godfrey, of the Bureau of Charities, Brooklyn; Mr. B. F. Cross, Treasurer, Funds for War Children of Allies; Mr. J. D. Gluck, citizen; Mr. Vincent Ridder, of the Staats-Zeitung, and

Mrs. Laura Cogswell. No one appeared in opposition, and, in the light of recent scandals in connection with this subject, the Committee believes that persons who collect for charitable organizations should come under the jurisdiction of the License Bureau, and recommends the adoption of the said ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend article 1 of chapter 3 of the code of ordinances of the City of New York, relating to amusements and exhibitions.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows: Section 1. Article 1 of chapter 3 of the code of ordinances of the City of New York is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section, to be known as §6-a thereof, to read as follows:

§6-a. Charity Entertainments.

1. Definition. (a) "Manager of a charity entertainment." Wherever used in this section the term "manager of a charity entertainment" shall be deemed to mean a person who undertakes or assists in the management of any theatrical performance, concert, lecture, ball, athletic exhibition or other entertainment, publicly advertised as for charity, or for the benefit of any person, association or institution, except for the benefit of a subordinate lodge or branch of duly constituted or incorporated fraternities or kindred societies, and incorporated religious institutions, where an admission fee is charged or a collection taken up.

2. License, bond and fee. No manager of a charity entertainment, not having been connected, for a period of at least 3 months immediately preceding the undertaking, with the regularly incorporated charity or charities, for the benefit of which the entertainment is held, shall advertise any charity entertainment, or receive money from the promotion of same, without a license therefor, and without having given bond to the city with sufficient surety, to be approved by the commissioner of licenses, in the penal sum which shall be fixed by such commissioner conditioned for the due observance of the provisions of law or ordinance relating to such entertainments.

The license fee of each manager of any theatrical performance, concert, lecture, ball or other entertainment, or any consecutive series of such entertainments, shall be \$1.00.

3. Estimate of expenses. Every manager of a charity entertainment shall file with the bureau of licenses, with the application for such, a statement of estimated expenses, with the percentage of the gross proceeds or fixed amounts to be retained by the managers, or other conditions of employment. Every manager of a charity entertainment shall also publish a statement of the sum total of the estimated expenses of any entertainment or series of entertainments, or a statement of the percentage of the gross proceeds to be devoted to the charitable object or objects, or both, which shall appear in a conspicuous place on any advertisement, posters, programs, invitations, letters of credential or appeal, and on the license.

4. Records of receipts and expenditures. Every manager of a charity entertainment shall keep records of every such entertainment, in which shall be legibly written a list of all the receipts and expenditures, including the accruals, and this list shall be open at all reasonable times to the inspection of the commissioner of licenses, and shall be filed in the Bureau of Licenses within 10 days after such entertainment, or series of entertainments has taken place as a public record.

Sec. 2. Any violation of the provisions of this section shall be punishable by a fine of \$250 or by imprisonment for a term of 6 months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Report of the Committee on Markets in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Peddlers in Accordance with a Communication from the Mayor.

The Committee on Markets, to which was referred on March 27, 1917 (Minutes, page 809), the annexed communication from the Mayor relating to the push cart problem in New York City, recommended, respectfully

REPORTS:
That this matter was reported favorably on March 27, 1917, and recommended by the Board. On further examination the Committee is still of the opinion, that the relief sought should be granted, and recommends the adoption of the accompanying ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend subdivision 1 of section 13 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to Peddlers.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows:
Subdivision 1 of Section 13 of Chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 13. General Regulations.
No peddler, vender, hawker or huckster shall permit any cart, wagon or vehicle owned or controlled by him, to stop, remain upon or otherwise encumber any street in front of any premises, the owner of or lessee of the ground floor thereof objecting thereto. No peddler, vender, hawker or huckster shall permit his cart, wagon or vehicle to stand on any street, within 25 feet of any corner of the curb, or to stand at any time on any sidewalk, nor within five hundred feet of any public market except on Sunday.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
Note—New matter in italics. Sunday is excepted so as not to interfere with the Sunday morning market at Catherine Slip, which does not compete with the Manhattan Bridge Market.

Extract of the minutes of the meeting of Oct. 2, 1917, as published in the City Record of Oct. 26, 1917, was approved.

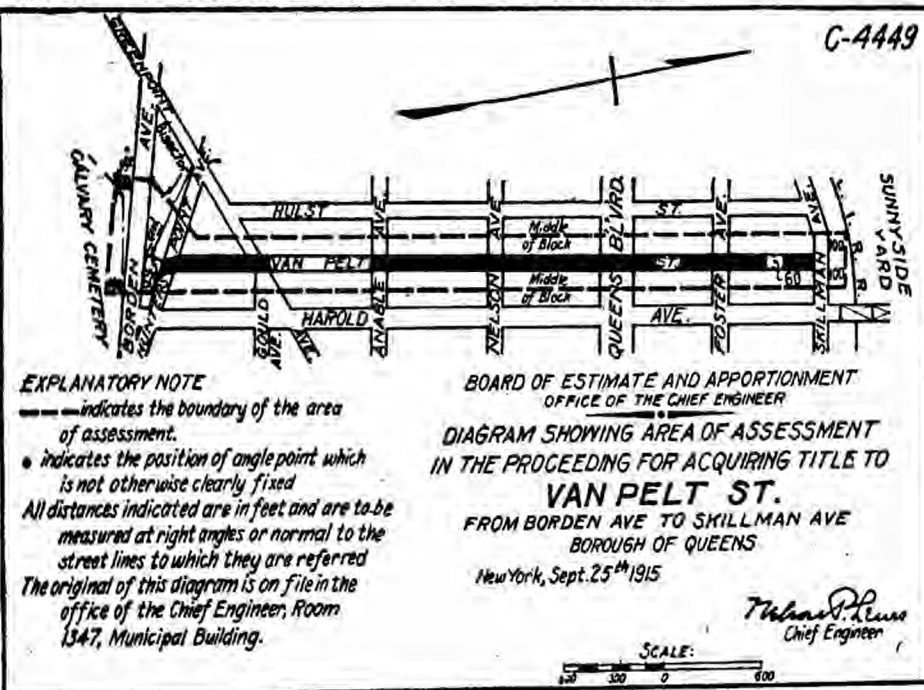

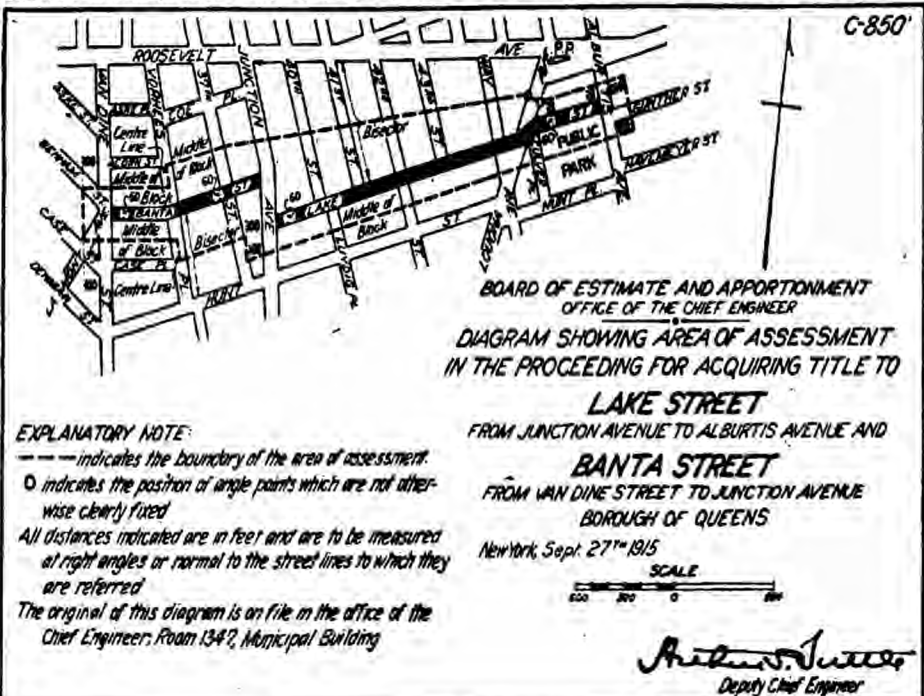

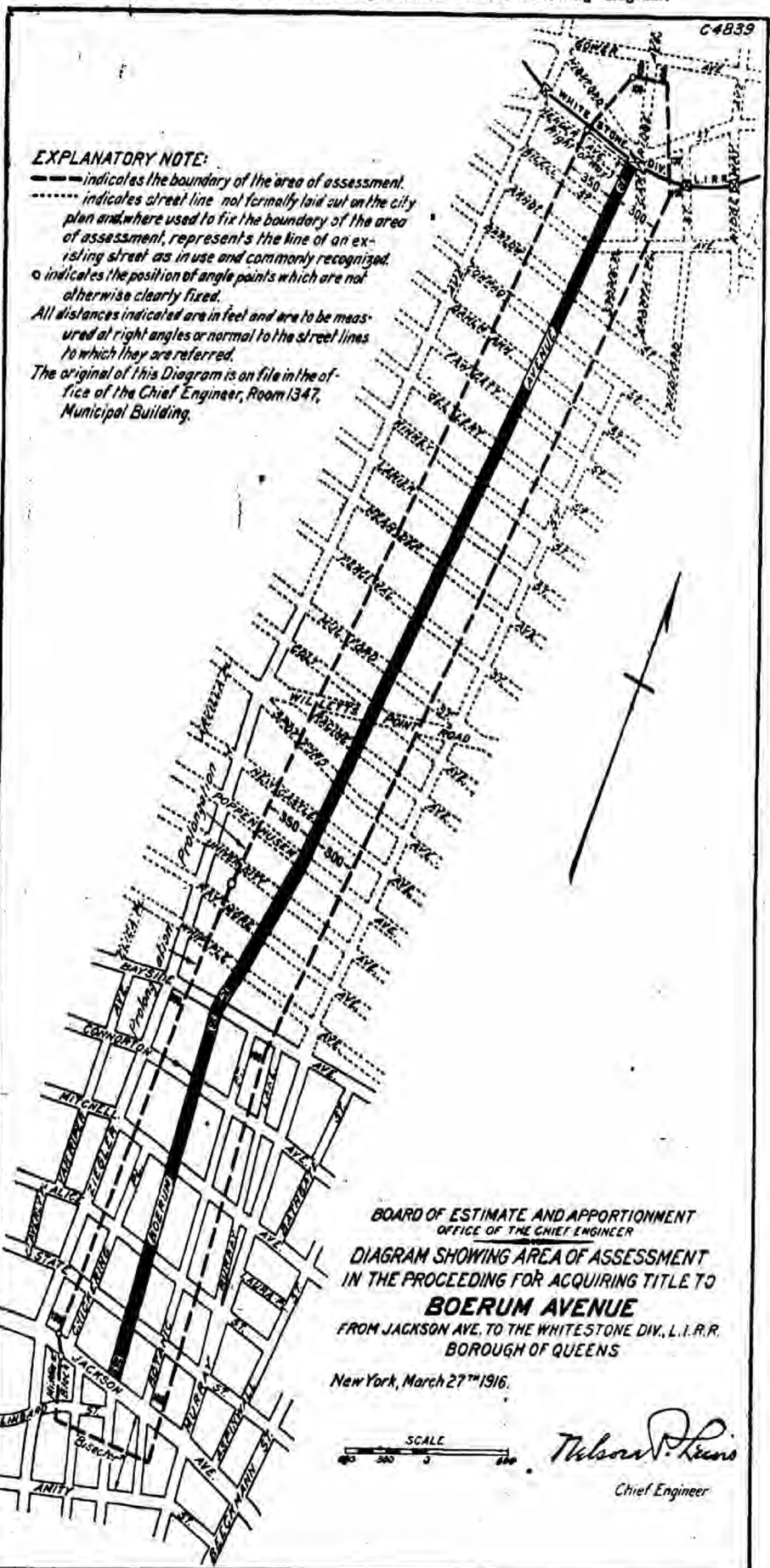

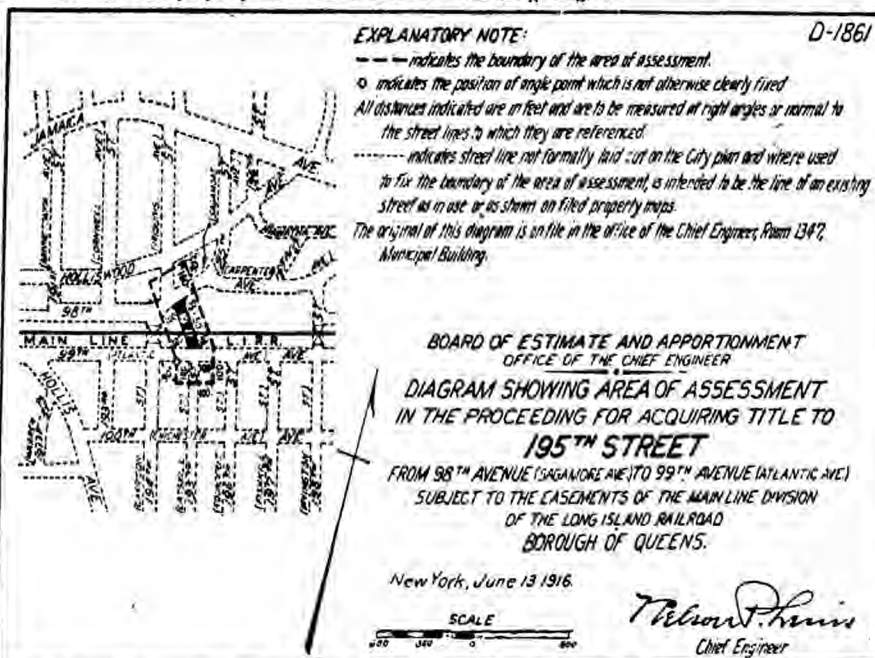

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
