McDonald and various supplemental, amendatory and modifying contracts, a rapid transit railroad was constructed by and at the expense of the petitioner which was and is known as the Manhattan and The Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad.

Third.—Thereafter said railroad was constructed and was and has continued to be in use and is now being operated by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, to which was assigned, with the consent of the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners for The City of New York, so much of said contracts as provided for the maintenance and operation of said rapid transit railroad including the equipment thereof and the right or obligation to maintain and operate the said road or roads in said contract described and all rights with respect to such maintenance or operation, or included in the leasing provisions of such contracts.

of rapid transit bonds issued by The City of New York, the proceeds of which have been applied to meet the City's obligations and to liquidate indebtedness incurred in the construction of the Manhattan-Bronx division of the Rapid Transit Railroad under the provisions and requirements of Contract No. 1, by and between The City of New York and John B. McDonald, dated February 21, 1900, subsequently assigned under date of July 10, 1902, to Interborough Rapid Transit Company, and the modifications thereof.

Up to December 31, 1909, there was bonds issued by The City of New York, the proceeds of which were applied to the construction of the Manhattan-Bronx Division of the Rapid Transit Railroad under the requirements of said Contract No. 1, dated February 21, 1900.

TENTH.—From January 1, 1910, up to and including August 31, 1917, the City issued the additional sum of \$2,265,864 23 of corporate stock, the proceeds of which were applied to the construction of the Manhattan-Bronx Division of the Rapid Transit Railroad under the Contract dated February 21, 1900, and the modifications thereof. These two amounts, viz. \$46,623,815 03 and 2,265,864 23

representing the bonds which were issued prior to January 1, 1910, and the bonds which have been issued subsequent thereto, make the grand aggregate of \$48,889,679 26 issued by the City, the proceeds of which have been applied to carry out the City's obligations and to liquidate indebtedness incurred under the terms and requirements of the rapid transit contract dated February 21, 1900, and modifications thereof.

ELEVENTH.—The said contract of February 21, 1900, requires the lessee, the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, as assignee, to pay to the City as rent for the railroad:

(1) An annual sum equal to the annual interest payable by the City upon all bonds which shall be issued by it in order to provide means for construction. The amount of such interest shall be ascertained as of the time when the Railroad shall be declared by the Board to be ready for operation; but it shall be increased from time to time by the amount of the annual interest payable by the City for all bonds which, after the date when the Railroad shall be so declared to be ready for operation, shall be issued in order to provide means for construction. The amount or amounts payable under this subdivision shall not be subject to decrease by reason of the refunding by the City at lower rates of interest of any of the bonds issued aforesaid. Bonds issued in order to provide means for construction shall be deemed to include bonds issued to pay interest on bonds theretoforesigned pursuant to this Contract under the provisions of section 34 of the Rapid Transit Act, but shall not be deemed to include bonds issued to pay for rights, terms, easements, privileges or property other than lands acquired in fee.

(2) A further annual sum which shall be equal to one per centum upon the whole amount of the said bonds (with the exceptions above mentioned).

"The Rental shall begin as to each Section with the date of the declaration of the Board that such Section is ready for operation and shall be payable at the end of each quarter on the first days of January, April, July and October."

Under the terms of said Contract No. 1, relating to rental, the City is receiving from the lessee annual sinking fund payments on \$46,623,815 03 and annual interest on \$46,685,207 93.

The City is carrying and providing in its annual tax budget for interest and sinking fund installments on all of the bonds which have been issued to provide the costs of rights-of-way and easements under the rapid transit contract, dated February 21, 1900. The amount which up to August 31, 1917, has been applied by the City from the proceeds of said rapid transit bonds to meet the cost of easements has aggregated \$2,290,004 61 of which \$2,204,471 33 was from the par value of the bonds sold therefor and \$85,533 28 from premiums received thereon.

TWELFTH.—As stated hereinbefore, the City has issued a grand aggregate of \$48,889,679 26 of rapid transit bonds, the proceeds of which, including the premiums thereon, have been applied to meet the obligations of the City under the provisions and requirements of the rapid transit contract, dated February 21, 1900. Of this amount the lessee is paying annual interest on \$46,685,207 93.

and amortization installments on a sum total of bonds aggregating \$46,631,066.09.

The balance of the par value of the bonds, viz. \$2,204,471 33 has been applied by the City towards meeting the cost of easements and rights-of-way necessary to be acquired to carry out the City's obligations under the Contract dated February 21, 1900, and the annual interest and amortization installments on this amount is provided for in the City's annual tax budgets.

THIRTEENTH.—The first application which was made to this Court for a determination of the amount of indebtedness incurred by the City for the Manhattan-Bronx Railroad which might be excluded in ascertaining the power of the City to become otherwise indebted, was made under date of June 17, 1910, and the Court, under a decision dated July 5, 1910, determined that \$4,883,225.18 were then self-sustaining and should be exempted.

FOURTEENTH.—The City of New York has now a total investment of \$50,870,934.36 in the rapid transit railroad constructed by it under the terms and provisions of the contract entered into on February 21, 1900, by and between the City and John B. McDonald. Of this investment \$48,889,679.26 was obtained, from the sale of said bonds and applied to the construction of said railroad and the acquisition of easements, rights of way, etc., in connection therewith.

FIFTEENTH.—In the application of June 17, 1910, to this Court the annual amortization installments required to redeem, at their respective dates of maturity, separate issues of rapid transit bonds aggregating a sum total of \$43,868,325.18, were stated in varying sums which set forth an annual amortization installment of \$465,500.69.

SIXTEENTH.—The principle under which these amortization installments were computed resulted in an overstatement of the aggregate annual interest so required of \$61,822.91. In other words, an analysis of these annual amortization installments and a consequent revision thereof, shows that the total annual sum required to amortize and provide for redemption, by it under said Contract No. 1, is \$43,868,325.18.

SEVENTEENTH.—The principle under which may be ascertained the proportion of the amortization installments of and interest on rapid transit indebtedness incurred under Contract No. 1 which the current net revenue received by the City from such investment is sufficient to meet, comprehends:

(a) The annual amount required to amortize a bond during the years which such bond has to run up to its date of maturity; such annual installment to be invested at not less than a stated rate of interest.

(b) The annual interest on such indebtedness.

The offset or credit to the foregoing is represented by—

(c) The total annual amount received by the City from the lessee of the Rapid Transit Railroad to be applied towards the amortization and ultimate redemption of the bonds.

(d) The annual interest received by the City from the lessee to be applied by the City towards paying the interest on rapid transit bonds issued under the requirements of Contract No. 1.

Second.—Pursuant to the said constitutional provision and statute hereinbefore recited, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the petitioner, by a resolution duly adopted on the 12th day of June, 1914, required the Comptroller of the petitioner to prepare and submit to said Board a statement showing detail indebtedness incurred and the bonds issued therefor by the petitioner for the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad, with the dates of maturity of such indebtedness, the terms of any and all agreements and contracts made by or on behalf of the petitioner with respect to such investment, the gross revenue received therefrom, the interest paid and to be paid by the petitioner on said indebtedness, and the annual instalments necessary for the amortization thereof, and the current net revenue derived from said investment, and pursuant to such resolution the said Comptroller did prepare and submit to said Board such statement, and thereupon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment did, by resolution adopted on the 5th day of October, 1917, direct that application be made to this Court for a determination of the amount of indebtedness incurred by said City for the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad, which may be excluded in ascertaining the power of the petitioner to become otherwise indebted under the provisions of said section ten of article eight of the Constitution of the State of New York.

Third.—The material facts relative to the construction of the said Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad are as follows: Pursuant to a contract made and entered into under date of July 21, 1902, between the petitioner, acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, and Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, and various supplemental, amatory and modifying contracts, a rapid transit railroad was constructed by and at the expense of the petitioner which was and is known as the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad.

Fourth.—Thereafter said railroad was constructed and was and has continued to be and is now being operated by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, to which was assigned so much of the said contracts as provided for the maintenance and operation of said rapid transit railroad including the equipment thereof and the right or obligation to maintain and operate the said road or roads in said contract described and all rights with respect to such maintenance or operation, or included in the leasing provisions of such contracts.


