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BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

Minutes of Special Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment Held in Room 16, City Hall, Tuesday, January 15, 1918.

The Board met in pursuance of the following call:

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, January 14, 1918.
A special meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby called for Tuesday, January 15, 1918, at 3:30 o'clock p. m., in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor.

REPORTS.

From Standing Committees.

Committee on Salaries and Grades.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment (Bureau of Personal Service)—Procedure with Regard to Filling Vacancies in Positions (Cal. No. 1).

(On January 11, 1918 (Cal. No. 83), the request of the Bureau of Personal Service in this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated January 8, 1918, from the Bureau of Personal Service, as to the procedure to be followed by said Bureau under the provisions of paragraph Second (C) of the terms and conditions of the Budget for 1918, affecting the filling of vacancies in positions; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades relative thereto:

January 14, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Under date of January 8, 1918, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment received the following communication from the Assistant Director of the Bureau of Personal Service:

January 8, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"Gentlemen—Permit me to call your attention to certain features of the payroll procedure at present in operation in the Bureau of Audit of the Department of Finance. As these features involve the co-operation and assistance of the Bureau of Personal Service, it is necessary that specific instructions be given by you regarding their continuance.

"Paragraph Second (C) of the terms and conditions of the Budget for 1918 (page 2) reads, in part, as follows:

"(c) That vacancies existing on January 1, 1918, or occurring thereafter * * * shall be filled only after certificate by the Committee on Salaries and Grades of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"(1) That the position is required:

"(2) That the title and compensation for such vacant position conform to the standard titles, work specifications and compensation grades fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment where there has been such fixation; or

"(3) In the event of there having been no such fixation by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that the title and compensation for such vacant position are apparently proper."

"Under the present procedure each department submits to the Finance Department, in advance of its regular payrolls, a report of changes of personnel since the last preceding payroll. This report in charge of personnel has in the past been sent to the Bureau of Personal Service in order that such changes as have apparently been made without compliance with the terms and conditions of the budget should be noted. The enclosed certificate has been used in the space provided on the personnel change sheet in order that the Department of Finance might take such action as appeared proper to the Comptroller in dealing with subsequent departmental payrolls.

"War Service and Supplementary payrolls are also sent for similar inspection.

"The personnel change sheets for the payrolls for the first half of the month of January, 1918, are now being received by the Bureau of Personal Service from the Finance Department. Naturally, there are a great many changes incident to the operation of the new budget and the changes in administration. Pending definite instructions from you regarding the continuance of the existing procedure, I have instructed the Examiners of this Bureau to place a check mark on the personnel change sheets with the following handwritten note:

"Check marks indicate positions apparently filled without certificate of necessity by the Committee on Salaries and Grades—changes approved pending definite instructions from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

"Will you kindly advise me at your convenience whether or not you wish the Bureau of Personal Service to continue the scrutiny of the payrolls.

"Respectfully, EDWARD FEENEY, Acting Assistant Director."

At the direction of the Comptroller the question of the enforcement of paragraph second (C) of the terms and conditions of the budget for 1918 was placed upon the calendar of this Board for January 11 and referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.

Recommendation—The Committee at its meeting on Saturday, January 12, decided to recommend no change in the existing procedure regarding the enforcement of paragraph second (C) of the terms and conditions. The question of the procedure for the audit of payrolls under these terms and conditions being entirely in the hands of the Comptroller should be determined by him. Respectfully,

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, and the Acting President of the Borough of Richmond—12.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment (Bureau of Records and Minutes)—Modification of Schedule (Cal. No. 2).

(On January 11, 1918 (Cal. No. 82), the request in this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated January 8, 1918, requesting modification of schedule to meet present payroll conditions; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommending approval thereof:

January 14, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 8, 1918, the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment requested modification of salary schedule No. 20 for 1918. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Proposed Action—To increase the rate for a position of Clerk from \$1,080 to \$1,320, and a position of Stenographer from \$1,200 to \$1,320, and to change a position of Stenographer at \$1,650 to Typewriter Copyist at \$900, scheduling \$390 in balance unassigned.

"Result of Investigation—These changes are necessary in order that the salaries of the present incumbents may agree with the rates received by them in 1917. After the adoption of the 1918 Budget the Budget for 1917 was modified providing for the above changes for the remainder of the year."

Recommendation—In view of the above facts the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommends the adoption of the attached resolution approving the request. Respectfully, ALFRED E. Board of Estimate and Apportionment (Committee on the City Plan)—Leave of Absence for John P. Fox, Consultant on City Planning (Cal. No. 3).

(On January 11, 1918 (Cal. No. 84), the request of the Secretary of the Committee on the City Plan in this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades, for report in one week (January 18, 1918) as to whether there is any need for the position of Consultant on City Planning.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated December 29, 1917, from the Secretary of the Committee on the City Plan, recommending that the request of John P. Fox, Consultant on City Planning, at \$4,140 per annum, for leave of absence without pay for a period of three months be granted; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades relative thereto:

January 14, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On December 29, 1917, the Secretary of the Committee on City Plan recommended the request of John P. Fox, Consultant on City Planning, for leave of absence without pay for a period of three months. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon, as follows:

"On June 30, 1917, George B. Ford, a Consultant on City Planning at \$5,000 per annum, resigned. At the time the work of making investigations and reports in relation to building zone amendments was in large part completed. However, it was proposed to fill the position in view of anticipated studies to be made under a Traffic Commission in relation to traffic regulations and the improvement of traffic routes. In consequence, John P. Fox was appointed on August 28, 1917, to the vacancy at \$4,140 per annum, pending the promulgation of a civil service eligible list. On December 20, 1917, Mr. Fox was permanently appointed to the position as a result of being number one on the list resulting from the competitive examination."

In view of the above report the Committee recommends that the request for leave of absence without pay be granted for a period of one month and that a further extension be requested at the expiration of that time if necessary.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, and the Acting President of the Borough of Richmond—12.

Department of Finance—Transfer of Appropriation and Modification of Schedules (Cal. No. 4).

(On January 11, 1918 (Cal. No. 61), the request of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller in this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated January 8, 1918, from the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, requesting modification of schedules for the Department of Finance; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommending approval thereof and transfer of appropriation:

January 14, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 8, 1918, the DEPUTY AND ACTING COMPTROLLER requested modification of five salary schedules for 1918 involving a cash transfer of \$1,080. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Proposed Action (1)—In No. 82, Engineering, it is proposed to eliminate a position of Assistant Engineer at \$1,920 and to add one of Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving at \$1,920.

"Result of Investigation (1)—This change is necessary in order that the schedule line may conform to the present title of the incumbent. It was the intention to change the title of this employee, but on account of civil service complications this cannot be done for the present.

"Proposed Action (2)—In No. 83, Current Taxes, it is proposed to change a position of Clerk at \$1,200 to Financial Clerk at \$1,200, and to eliminate a position of Clerk at \$1,080, transferring the position and money to No. 87, Accounting.

"Result of Investigation (1)—This change is necessary in order that the schedule line may conform to the present title of the incumbent and to provide for a Clerk in the schedule for the Bureau he is now assigned to.

"Proposed Action (3)—In No. 84, Assessments and Arrears, it is proposed to change a position of Financial Clerk at \$1,200 to Clerk at \$1,200.

"Result of Investigation (3)—This change is necessary in order that the schedule line may conform to the title of the present incumbent.

"Proposed Action (4)—In No. 86, Auditing, Accounting and Disbursing, it is proposed to increase the number of Clerks at \$1,200 from 10 to 11 and the number at \$540 from 8 to 10, and to decrease the number of Clerks at \$1,050 from 9 to 8, the number at \$360 from 15 to 12, and the number of Bookkeepers at \$1,200 from 13 to 12, and adding a line for Bookkeeper at \$840, scheduling \$210 in Balance Unassigned.

"Result of Investigation (4)—These changes are necessary in order that the salaries of the present incumbents may conform to the rates received by them after the Budget of 1918 was adopted.

"Proposed Action (5)—In No. 87, Accounting, it is proposed to change a

position of Bookkeeper at \$1,320 to Clerk at \$1,320, and to add a position of Clerk at \$1,080, the necessary funds being transferred from No. 83.

"Result of Investigation (5)—These changes are necessary in order that the schedule line may conform to the title of the present incumbent and to provide for an employee in the code which he is properly chargeable to."

Recommendation—In view of the above facts, the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommends the adoption of the attached resolutions approving the request.

President, Borough of Manhattan—Compensation of Foreman Wireman, Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices (Cal. No. 7).

(On November 16, 1917 (Cal. No. 116), the application in this matter was referred to the President, Borough of Manhattan.)

(On November 23, 1917 (Cal. No. 121), communication from the former President of the Borough of Manhattan recommending favorable action on the application was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

(On January 11, 1918 (Cal. No. 64), the request of the Secretary of the Borough of Manhattan for consideration of the matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated November 13, 1917, from Ernest Mueller, a Foreman Wireman in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Borough of Manhattan, requesting that his compensation be fixed at the prevailing rate of \$6 per day, and a communication of the former President, Borough of Manhattan, dated November 19, 1917, recommending favorable action thereon.

A request to place this position on a per annum basis of \$1,800 was denied by the Budget Sub-Committee in the preparation of the 1918 Budget."

Board of Inebriety—Modification of Schedule (Cal. No. 11).

(On December 28, 1917 (Cal. No. 28), the report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades in this matter was laid over until January 4, 1918.)

(On January 4, 1918 (Cal. No. 18), the matter was referred back to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades, dated December 21, 1917, on the request of the Board of Inebriety, dated December 12, 1917, for modification of schedule; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades relative thereto:

January 14, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On December 12, 1917, the BOARD OF INEBRIETY requested modification of Code No. 2681 for 1917. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

“Proposed Action—To add a line Superintendent at \$3,500, the funds being secured by abolishing a vacant position of Correction Officer at \$960 and a vacant position of Trained Nurse at \$600, and using \$1,940 of an unassigned balance of \$2,520.

“Result of Investigation—The Board States as follows in support of this request:

“Referring to request for modification of salary schedules to permit the appointment of a Medical Superintendent at \$3,500, I have to state that it is simply impossible, with the conditions existing in the medical world to-day, to secure an incumbent qualified for the duties at a salary of \$2,500, as provided in the budget for 1918, particularly while the appointment is temporary. As you know, the position of Medical Director paid \$6,000 and maintenance. The budget for 1918, as passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, provided for a Superintendent at \$5,000 and maintenance. On November 26, 1917 the Board appointed Dr. Theron J. Vosburgh temporarily at a salary of \$3,500 and maintenance. The Board contracted with Dr. Vosburgh in good faith. Funds are available for this amount. He has endured considerable inconvenience on account of the lack of accommodations to which he would be entitled and it is the earnest hope of the Board of Inebriety that the schedules will be modified as requested.”

“The work of the position falls in the 4th grade of the Physician Group, as applied throughout the city departments, with a minimum compensation of \$2,520 per annum, with maintenance. This maintenance has previously been at the rate of more than \$5,000 a year. The present incumbent, however, lives at the institution and the maintenance cost to the city has been substantially lessened and will probably amount to from \$1,500 to \$2,000 a year. The position was recommended by the Budget Sub-Committee for 1918 at \$2,520, allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at \$5,000 and fixed by the Board of Aldermen at \$2,500.”

Recommendation—In view of the facts set forth above the Committee recommends the adoption of the attached resolution allowing the position at \$2,500, the rate allowed in the budget for 1918. Respectfully,

“Proposed Action (3)—To authorize a corporate stock schedule for a gang of 10 Dock Builders, one Foreman and one Engineer (Pile Driver) for 12 days.

“Result of Investigation (3)—To complete the inshore extension to the platform at the foot of Flatbush Avenue, Mill Basin, Brooklyn, in order that the improvement already completed may be available. The funds are to be provided from balances in Code C.D.D 25A.”

Department of Plant and Structures—Payments Under Prevailing Rate of Wages Law (Cal. No. 13).

(On January 11, 1918 (Cal. No. 57), the request in this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated January 4, 1918, from the Carpenters in the Department of Plant and Structures requesting payment of back pay under the prevailing rate of wages law and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades:

January 14, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 4, 1918, the Carpenters of the Department of Plant and Structures requested "pay due us dating back to August, 1916." Reported on by the Bureau of Personal Service.

"Proposed Action—The Carpenters request that they be given back pay at the rate of \$5.50 per day from August, 1916.

"Result of Investigation—On October 6, 1916, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution as follows:

"Resolved, That City Departments in which Carpenters are employed be requested to include in their Budget schedules for 1917 rates for such employees as follows:

For the Borough of Manhattan, \$5.50 per diem.

For the Borough of The Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens, \$5 per diem.

For the Borough of Richmond, \$4.50 per diem.

"This resolution was adopted in pursuance of a request dated August 31, 1916, from the District Council of Greater New York and Vicinity, United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America.

"In the 1917 budget estimate the Department of Plant and Structures requested a rate of \$5.50 per day for all the Carpenters employed in that department. This request was denied by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

"On February 21, 1917, and again on June 21, 1917, the Department requested the establishment of the rate of \$5.50 per day for its Carpenters. These requests were not approved by the Committee on Salaries and Grades. In the Budget estimate for 1918 the Department again requested the \$5.50 rate and this rate was allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the Budget for 1918. On or about November 1, 1917, the Carpenters of this Department requested a rate of \$5.50 per day as of February 1, 1917. This request was denied by the Committee on Salaries and Grades on the ground that the granting of the request would act in the nature of giving a bonus of approximately \$130 to each man and would require an additional appropriation of \$3,439 Special Revenue Bonds and \$500 Corporate Stock. On November 9, 1917, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment denied a request of the Carpenters in all City departments to fix a prevailing rate in all Boroughs at \$5.50 per day on the ground that the existing prevailing rates as outlined above were established at the request of the Brotherhood of Carpenters and that there was no indication at that time of any change in the rates then set up."

Recommendation—In view of the above report, the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommends that the request of the Carpenters of the Department of Plant and Structures be referred to the Commissioner of Plant and Structures for whatever action he deems proper. Respectfully,

Chief Medical Examiner—Modification of Schedule (Cal. No. 14).

(On January 11, 1918 (Cal. No. 34), the report of the Bureau of Personal Service in this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a report of the Bureau of Personal Service, dated January 8, 1918, on the request of the Chief Medical Examiner, dated January 5, 1918, for modification of schedule for 1918; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommending approval thereof:

January 14, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 5, 1918, the CHIEF MEDICAL EXAMINER requested modification of 1918 Code No. 2960. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Proposed Action—To establish schedule lines supporting the lump sum appropriation of \$84,720 made for that office for the year 1918 in order to provide for the payment of the salaries of the force now existing and effective January 1, 1918.

"Result of Investigation—The proposed schedules as set up in the attached resolution are solely for the purpose of establishing schedule lines in order that the employees of the office may be paid for the current period. These do not comprehend any changes in the personnel or in the organization program which may later be determined by the new Chief Medical Examiner. Consideration of the request is urgent, as payrolls for the first half of January are involved."

Various City Departments—Transfer of Appropriation and Modification of Schedules (Cal. No. 16).

(On January 11, 1918 (Cal. No. 62), the request of the President of the Borough of Manhattan in this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated January 8, 1918, from the President of the Borough of Manhattan, requesting modification of schedules in various departments to put into effect as of January 1, 1918, a uniform minimum rate of \$3 for Day Laborers, and corresponding increases in rate of per annum employees in the labor group, involving transfer of \$393,182.79, from Code 3080, Contingency Fund for Labor; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommending approval thereof:

January 14, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 8, 1918, the President of the Borough of Manhattan addressed the following communication to the Board:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"Gentlemen—In the Budget for 1918 there was included a line 'Contingency Fund for Labor, \$700,000.' The purpose of this appropriation was to enable the City of New York to provide a uniform minimum rate for day laborers at \$3 per day, which represents an increase of twenty-five cents a day over the rate of \$2.75 allowed in the Budget. It was also proposed to provide a corresponding increase of \$72 per year for per annum employees on full time service in the Labor Group, such as Attendants, Cleaners, Watchmen and Drivers, and proportionate rates for part-time service. A minimum of \$912 per annum for full-time service of Laborers has been considered as the equivalent of \$3 per day. In accordance with this plan the Board of Aldermen, on December 28, 1917, on the recommendation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, established the necessary positions in the different City Departments. A list of these positions is printed in the City Record of December 31, 1917.

"Employees of semi-public institutions whose compensation is not fixed by the City, and various classes of Institutional Helpers in City Institutions, most of whom receive maintenance, were not included.

"The total amount required to put in operation the rates as indicated above is \$429,794.84, of which amount \$36,612.05 is chargeable to funds other than tax levy. The amount required to be transferred from the Contingent Funds of \$700,000 to the various departmental codes is \$393,182.79, in amounts as indicated in the accompanying resolutions.

"The preparation of the modified schedules, together with the proper resolutions to accomplish the changes, have been prepared at my request by the Bureau of Personal Service.

"I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution by the Board making the new rates effective as of January 1, 1918. Respectfully,

Gentlemen—On January 6, 1918, the Register of New York County requested modification of 1918 salary schedules Codes Nos. 3105, 3107 and 3109. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:	
"Proposed Action—In Code 3105 to change the line Certified Copy Clerk at \$1,560, to read \$1,500; Assistant Block Index Clerk at \$1,560, to read \$1,500, Examiner, 2 at \$1,560 to read Examiner, \$1,560 and Examiner, \$1,440; to eliminate the lines Examiner in Charge at \$1,980 and Custodian at \$840, and to add the line Chief Satisfaction Clerk at \$3,060, in order to provide for the restoration of position of Chief Satisfaction Clerk, abolished in the 1918 budget by reducing the lines above indicated, and by eliminating the position of Custodian at \$840 per annum, now vacant.	
"In Code 3107, to establish the schedule lines supporting the lump sum allowance made in this appropriation in accordance with agreement reached with the Bureau of Personal Service of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. In Code 3109, to establish schedule lines supporting the lump sum appropriation to read Typewriting Copyist at one cent per index entry (2,200,000 entries), \$22,000. This will provide for the payment of the salaries of the employees engaged on the work of reindexing.	
"Result of Investigation—The request is proper and reasonable. No reductions in salaries are to be made. The reduction in the items of Examiner, Certified Copy Clerk and Assistant Block Index Clerk is for the reason that the individuals occupying these positions would be unable, under the State Civil Service Law, to enjoy this higher rate, inasmuch as they have failed to qualify in a promotion examination. The position of Chief Satisfaction Clerk, which is requested restored, was abolished by the previous Register, and, in the opinion of the present Register, would work to disadvantage in his contemplated reorganization plans. This is a position of very great responsibility and one which would be, under the contemplated reorganization, under the personal observation and jurisdiction of the Register himself. The man now performing or partly performing the duties of this position, namely, Examiner in Charge, is not to be dropped, as the elimination of the position would apparently indicate, but is to be taken care of in the schedule lines supporting Code 3107, Block Reindexing Force. The purpose of this transfer is to provide for the employment on this work of a man who up to this time and within the past few months, acted as the chief of one of the subdivisions of the reindexing force, and as his title would indicate, is to be placed in charge of the force of Abstractors now engaged on the work of reindexing. It is requested that the sum of \$5,000 to carry this program into effect, be transferred from Code 3109 to Code 3107. This sum requested transferred within the block reindexing accounts is for the reason that a more careful study has been made of the exact work to be performed by the Typewriting Copyists, and also owing to the fact that a more equitable rate of compensation is provided for this Typist force. This extra money, if transferred, will provide for a longer tenure of position for the Abstractors for whom only a partial appropriation was made for the year 1918."	
Recommendation—In view of the above report, the Committee recommends granting the request by the adoption of the attached resolutions. Respectfully,

Register, Kings County—Modification of Schedules (Cal. No. 20).

(On December 28, 1917 (Cal. No. 30), the report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades herein was presented and laid over until January 4, 1918.)

(On January 4, 1918 (Cal. No. 17), the matter was referred back to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades, dated December 26, 1917, on the request of the Register of Kings County, dated December 18, 1917, for transfer of funds within appropriation; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommending denial thereof:

January 14, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On December 18, 1917, the Register of Kings County requested a transfer of funds within the 1917 and 1918 appropriations and modification of a salary schedule. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Proposed Action—To increase the salaries of twenty-two employees of the office in Code No. 3395 and provide funds therefor.

"Result of Investigation—It is proposed to give thirteen increases of \$60 per annum each, seven increases of \$90 per annum each, and two increases of \$180 per annum each. Of these twenty-two employees six are now receiving \$1,200, seven \$1,350, seven \$1,500, one \$1,650, and one \$1,800. This adjustment of force and proposed increase of salaries has been investigated by the present Register, who has given his approval. It is proposed that these changes date from December 1, 1917, and that accruals in Code No. 3395 for the month of December, 1917, be used to provide for the proposed increases for that year. The increases for 1918 are proposed to be met from the war service accruals anticipated for 1918. In the 1918 budget, increases in salary were granted to 86 employees of the Register's force of 124 regular employees. Requests were made for increases for the 22 employees now under consideration, but they were denied in the 1918 budget on the grounds that their present compensation represented the maximum salary for the work performed. In the event the employees now on war service return to their duties it will be necessary to make an additional appropriation to provide for the purposes of these increases."

Recommendation—In view of the above facts, the Committee recommends the adoption of the attached resolution denying the request. Respectfully,

The Secretary presented a report of the Bureau of Personal Service, dated January 7, 1918, on the communication dated November 9, 1917, from the Surrogate of Queens County notifying the Board of the fixation of salaries of various employees and requesting an appropriation of \$3,833.33 to provide means therefor; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades relative thereto:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On November 9, 1917, the SURROGATE OF QUEENS COUNTY requested modification of a salary schedule. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Proposed Action—To increase the salaries of the incumbents of the follow-

ing positions in the Court: Clerk of Court, from \$3,500 to \$4,500; Clerk (to Surrogate), from \$2,100 to \$2,500; Index Clerk, from \$1,500 to 1,800; Probate Clerk, from 1,500 to \$1,800; Accounting Clerk, from \$1,500 to \$1,800; Copyist, from \$1,200 to \$1,500; two Copyists, from \$900 to \$1,200 each; and to make provision for a new position of Guardianship Clerk at \$2,000.

"Result of Investigation—On June 26, 1917, the Board of Aldermen adopted a resolution increasing the salaries of the foregoing stated positions, to be effective January 1, 1917, and its action was approved by the Mayor on July 10, 1917.

"Section 249 of the Code of Civil Procedure authorizes the Board of Aldermen to fix the salaries of the employees of the Surrogate's Court. The Acting Corporation Counsel, in an opinion to the Bureau of Personal Service, dated December 18, 1917, in connection with the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, states, in part, as follows: 'I am of the opinion that the City should pay the increases in salary in question from the date of the approval by the Mayor of the resolution of the Board of Aldermen.' Payment of the increases in salary being a mandatory county charge, provision for funds to meet them from July 10, 1917, may be made by the Comptroller in the necessary sum of \$2,141.39 by an issuance of special revenue bonds, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter. The positions at the increased rates are provided for in the 1918 budget. Consideration of the request is urgent, as payrolls are involved."

Recommendation—In view of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommends adoption of the attached resolution modifying Code No. 3605 for 1917, effective from July 10, 1917, to include the increases.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York

Held Wednesday, Nov. 28, 1917, at 10:30 A. M.

Present—Benjamin Patterson, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by including in the Competitive Class, Part I (Ungraded Positions), Group 3 (Positions of a Special or Miscellaneous Character), the positions of First Assistant Chief Examiner, Civil Service Commission, and Assistant Chief Examiner, Civil Service Commission. John T. Condon appeared and requested an adjournment of the hearing for one week. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the adoption of the proposed resolution waiving the provisions of clause 18 of Rule XV., as follows:

Whereas, in order to correct the inappropriate assignment of certain butchers in the Department of Correction to perform the work of inspectors of supplies (foods), provision has been made in the budget of the Department of Correction for the year 1918 for the employment of inspectors of supplies (foods) at a salary of \$1,200 per annum, which positions are in the Competitive Class; and

Whereas, because of long continued service of such butchers in the performance of inspection work it is in the interest of best administration and the spirit and intent of the civil service law that all butchers who have served with fidelity for at least three years be allowed to enter a promotion examination for the position of inspector of supplies (foods), grade 2, in the competitive class, in order to meet the conditions of the budget of the Department of Correction for the year 1918; therefore be it

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, the provisions of clause 18 of Rule XV. of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission be waived, and the Municipal Civil Service Commission be empowered to hold a competitive promotion examination for the position of inspector of supplies (foods), grade 2, Department of Correction, in the competitive class, which shall be open to all butchers in the non-competitive class who have served with fidelity for not less than three years.

Frederick T. Newell, Secretary of the Department of Correction, appeared in favor


