





license is not extended by this act. It remains only where it has been previously conferred by law, and does not, of course, belong to every institution which may grant a diploma. The graduates of chartered medical schools, however, are permitted to practice without the certificates from the Censors before mentioned. There are, therefore, only these three classes of practitioners recognized by the law, viz.:

1. Those licensed by some competent and legally authorized body.

2. The graduates of chartered medical schools.

3. Those who have obtained a certificate from one of the several medical societies of the State.

The certificates of the last mentioned class must mention the branches of the medical act their possessors are authorized to practice. This provision of the law is not entirely new. It in a measure restores the force and effect of sections 14 to 21 inclusive of the Revised Statutes Vol. 1, Part 1, Chap. 14, Title 7, to which reference should be had for a clearer understanding of the intent, and of the use of this law. In so far, it is a repeal of section 3, of Chap. 275 of the Laws of 1844, which declared, that "no person shall be liable to any criminal prosecution or to an indictment for practicing physic or surgery without license, except in case of malpractice, or gross ignorance or immoral conduct in such practice." It will be seen by section 3, of this Act of 1874, that a failure to comply with the requirements of this law is made a misdemeanor. But it is to be remembered that at no time has any immunity been granted by law in this State in the cases above mentioned of malpractice, gross ignorance, and immoral conduct, to persons prescribing or administering medicines or specifics to or for the sick, without a license—cases such as that recently brought to public notice, occurring in a so-called private hospital. A new and additional measure of relief against the evils of unlicensed practice is given in the new legislation. How far it may be found adequate, experience alone can determine, after a persistent and courageous attempt to enforce the law as it now stands. An examination is required of all practitioners who have not the legal sanction of some authority recognized by this act to show.

Second.—The Censor of each medical society aforesaid shall notify all practitioners of medicine and surgery of the laws and requirements of this act, etc. The powers and duties of Censors, and the manner of their appointment have been long established, so that no further description is necessary upon this head.

They are to give notice of the time and place of such examinations as will enable them to grant the certificates mentioned in the first section. It were better that a copy of the law accompany each notice, and in case a prosecution for disobedience is intended, I would advise that a personal service of the notice be made, and regular proof thereof obtained. If within the time prescribed the persons liable do not comply with the law, and present themselves for examination, "the president of the society making such request shall, and he is required to, at once commence the proceedings authorized by this act against such person."

The offense is declared by the third section to be a misdemeanor, and fines are also prescribed. The fines are to "go into the County Treasury of the county bringing such action." These proceedings are to be in the name of the people, and will begin in the criminal and police courts, upon the complaints of the presidents of the societies above mentioned, or by others.

When the defendants are held for trial the District Attorney should be notified, and his co-operation, if possible, be procured. The responsibility of making up the case and of procuring the necessary evidence will, however, rest to a great degree upon the complainant. If an indictment be found, the charge of the case will necessarily devolve upon the District Attorney.

Third.—It will be readily seen that the more perfect the registration of physicians and surgeons by each of the above-mentioned medical societies, and the more complete and regular the communication between them, the more thoroughly and effectually can the interest of this law, which cannot be mistaken, be realized, and its provisions enforced. No distinction between the different schools of medicine can be recognized, except just so far as they are to be found in the statute books.

Fourth.—No difficulty can arise as to the particular forms to be used. Their substance is sufficiently set forth in the first and second sections, and already some have been adopted by several of the societies. Those prepared, with suggestions upon the subject, by George S. Hastings, Esq., the Chief Clerk of this Department, at the request of the Sanitary Committee, I have great pleasure in inclosing herewith as well adapted to the purpose.

Fifth.—It is not to be denied that the law itself is not what many of its friends hoped it would be, and that it has occasioned considerable disappointment in the medical profession. It entails a large responsibility and considerable expense upon the medical societies. It is difficult to describe with accuracy all that may be attained under it, which is yet to be proved by actual work. So many questions may arise, and such attention to the prosecutions that may be ordered will be requisite, that it is hardly to be expected, unless the societies have their own counsel and make a strong effort, that they can secure success in establishing these new rules for the regulation of the practice of medicine and surgery in the State of New York. All of which is respectfully submitted.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—In the week ending on Saturday, the 29th of August, there were 618 deaths reported in New York, against 735, which were verified as occur-

ring during the previous week. The saving of lives was noticed chiefly in the zymotic class of fatal causes, and 75 per cent. of this saving was of infants under a year old, and 55 per cent. of the saving was in the class of causes charged as diarrhoeal disease. There was a decrease of fatality from diphtheria and only five deaths from small-pox, three being in the Island Hospital. Puerperal fever and pulmonary phthisis gave an increased mortality.

The death-rate last week was equal to 30.90 per 1,000 yearly. It was at 36.75 in the week ending August 22. But in these weeks only 36.87 and 44.49 per cent. respectively of the deaths occurred in persons of five years of age and upward; and the rate of mortality in all that portion of the city inhabitants thus past the first five years period of life was equivalent to only 15.47 in the 1,000 annually. The death-rate in the past eight weeks has been in that portion which is five years of age and upward a little over 15 per 1,000 yearly; while in the portion under five years of age (estimated at 122,720 in the whole city) the rate has reached nearly 196 per 1,000 annually. The mean temperature last week was 64.8 degrees, and in the week ending August 22 it was 73.9 degrees Fahr. The average degree of humidity was 56-100 of total saturation in the two weeks. The mean temperature in the eight midsummer weeks ending August 29 was 72.2 degrees, and the average humidity 61-100 of total saturation.

The death rates of several American cities have, in the past six weeks, considerably exceeded the rate in New York; and in Berlin, Breslau, Munich, Rome, and Venice, the death-rate has steadily been higher during the past six months than the rate in New York. The rate in London, the second week in August, was 21 per 1,000, but in the twenty-one chief towns of Great Britain, including London, the average death-rate was 26 per 1,000. The death-rate was 27 per 1,000 in Glasgow and Dublin, 35 in Liverpool and Sheffield, and only 19 per 1,000 in Edinburgh and Bristol. The mean temperature in these cities was at 58 degrees and below. The cities of Europe which this summer have the smallest death-rates are those in which the greatest mortality not many years ago prevailed, and in which the most unsparing sanitary efforts have recently been put forth. The cities of the United States begin to present similar examples. The mortality in Philadelphia, Boston, Providence, Washington, Cincinnati, New Orleans, and New York, in all, except the infant population under 2 years of age, has, in this and the previous summer, had a lower death-rate than in past years. The excessive fatality of the midsummer weeks to infants has been but slightly diminished during the progress of sanitary improvement in these cities, but in all other ages there has been marked advantage to human life.
