The following report was received from the Committee on Repairs and Supplies, and the preamble and resolution, as recommended by said Committee, unanimously adopted:

NEW YORK, November 23, 1874.

To the Honorable Board of Police Commissioners:

The Committee on Repairs and Supplies, to whom was referred the bill of F. C. Stolley, for the construction of stables in Eighty-seventh and Ninety-ninth streets for the use of the Police Department, would respectfully report that it appears upon examination that the Board of Police by resolution bearing date the 22d March, 1873, authorized the construction of two stables therein mentioned, to wit: Of a stable in Eighty-seventh street, between Avenue A and First avenue; and a stable in Ninety-ninth street, in the rear of the Thirty-first Precinct Station-house—both stables were erected by Mr. F. C. Stolley, pursuant to orders and directions received by him from the Board of Police, and are now in the possession of the Police Department of this city. Your Committee would therefore recommend the adoption of the following preamble and resolution.

Whereas, F. C. Stolley has, by direction of the Board of Police constructed a stable in Eighty-seventh street, between Avenue A and First avenue, and also a stable in Ninety-ninth street, between Ninth and Tenth avenues, and has presented a claim against the Police Department for buildings the stable in Eighty-seventh street, amounting to \$13,543.46, and for the stable in Ninety-ninth street, amounting to \$14,506.23, making a total for the two stables of \$28,049.23.

And whereas, Said claims of F. C. Stolley were referred to two competent and practical builders, viz., Messrs. Havilah M. Smith and Freeman Bloodgood, each doing business at the present time in this city, to examine and report as to the character, quality, and value of the work and materials rendered and furnished in the construction of said stables, together with a fair and a just relation thereof.

And whereas, Said Havilah M. Smith and said Freeman Bloodgood have, as per their report herewith submitted, made a careful examination and valuation of the labor and materials used in the construction of said stables, which is as follows, viz., for the stable in Eighty-seventh street, a valuation of \$12,412.00, and for the stable in Ninety-ninth street, \$12,850.00, making a total for the two stables of \$25,262.00, being \$2,787.23 less than the amount claimed by Mr. Stolley, as per his bills rendered.

And whereas, The counsel to the Corporation, in an opinion addressed to the Board of Police, bearing date October 27, 1874, and which is herewith submitted, declares the claim of said Stolley to be valid and lawful, and advises that the same should at once be paid.

And whereas, The Board of Appointment, by resolution of June 29, 1874, set apart and appropriated certain moneys for the payment of the cost of construction of said stables.

And whereas, The Board of Police, through its Treasurer, has heretofore paid said Stolley, or his agents, on account of the cost of constructing the stable in Eighty-seventh street the sum of \$5,840.46, and on account of the stable in Ninety-ninth street, the sum of \$3,519.08, and holds receipts therefor, making a total heretofore paid on account of said stables of \$9,359.54, and to be deducted therefrom, therefore be it

Resolved, That the Treasurer be and hereby is directed to pay F. C. Stolley, upon his furnishing a certificate from the County Clerk that no lien rests upon or attaches to either of the premises and stables, for labor or material furnished in their construction, the following sums, viz., as payment in full for balance due on account of constructing the stable in Eighty-seventh street, between Avenue A and First avenue, the sum of \$6,571.54; and in full for balance due for constructing the stables in Ninety-ninth street, the sum of \$9,330.92, making a total of \$15,902.46, All of which is respectfully submitted.

To the Honorable the Police Commissioners of the City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—A communication to me of the 26th ultimo from the Chief Clerk of the Police Department, incloses a copy of an agreement between the Board of Police of the City of New York and Mr. F. C. Stolley, for the erection of a stable, which agreement was executed on the 18th day of April, 1873. It is stated in the letter of Mr. Hawley that this contract was not awarded in pursuance of any public advertisement, but was an agreement resulting from negotiations between the Board and the contractor; that the work has been completed in accordance with the provision of the contract, and without objection or hindrance on the part of the Department; that the Board of Apportionment last year made an appropriation for the payment of the claim for the building of such stables, in pursuance of said contract; and that the money so appropriated is now in the possession of the Treasurer of the Police Department, and is sufficient to pay the whole of said claim. My opinion is requested whether the Board of Police had the legal power to make said contract without public competition.

This contract was made before the passage of the act of the Legislature of April 30, 1873, known as the "charter" of that year. To determine, therefore, whether the Board of Police had the power to make it, we must look, not to that charter, but to the laws in force at the time the contract was made, the Charter of 1870, and the acts amendatory thereof. The 104th section of the Charter of 1870, required that when any work was to be done for the Corporation involving the expenditure of more than \$1,000, such work should be done by contract, founded on sealed bids or proposals, made in compliance with public notice, duly advertised in newspapers of the city, for at least ten days. There may be some question as to whether this provision applied to those contracts alone made by authority of the Common Council. If such was the case, then this provision would not apply to the contract with Mr. Stolley, because that was not made by authority of the Common Council. It is, however, unnecessary to determine this question, for this general provision of the Charter of 1870, so far as it affected the Police Department, was superseded by the provisions of section 19 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1870. This latter section contained among others, the following provisions: "All work to be done and supplies to be furnished, or other expenditure made for or on behalf of the said Police Department, shall be done, furnished or made by the Commissioners of said Department, who shall provide the necessary Station and sub-Station houses and establish such regulations for furnishing such supplies and performing such work as in their judgment they may deem necessary and proper." I am informed that the provision was drawn for the express purpose (and I have no doubt it had the effect) of excepting the Police Department from the provisions of section 104, above referred to, of the Charter of 1870, and of authorizing the Commissioners of the Police Department in their discretion to make contracts for the work to be done and supplies to be furnished for their department, without advertising for bids. I am of opinion, therefore, that the contract with Stolley was valid and lawful, and inasmuch as the same had been performed on his part, and the stables have been accepted and are now used by the City, and as the Board of Apportionment has appropriated sufficient funds, Mr. Stolley's claim should at once be paid.
