Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending April 24, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,977, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 967 tenement-houses, 44 private dwellings, 124 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 30 stores and warehouses, 44 stables, 37 slaughter-houses, 1 lime kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 3 lodging-houses, 1 stock yard, 27 sunken, and vacant lots, 1 smoke house, 1 dyeing establishment, 3 uninhabitable dwellings, 78 yards, courts and areas, 114 cellars and basements, 93 waste-pipes and drains, 251 privies and water-closets, 17 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 29 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 5 cesspools, 24 other nuisances, together with 66 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 859.

During the past week 97 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 121 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

165 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 88 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 79 houses, 79 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Two cases of measles were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending April 24, 1980, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending April 17, 1980.

SIR.—There were 565 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, April 24, 1880, which is a decrease of 63, as compared with the number reported during the preceding week, and 14 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending April 17, 1880, was 622, which is 89.4 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 29.16 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,108,995.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 479 births, 44 still-births, 160 marriages, and 565 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 24, 1880. This shows a decrease of 27 births, 7 still-births, and 63 deaths, and an increase of 1 marriage, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 74 births and 10 still-births, and a decrease of 16 marriages and 14 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 3; diphtheria, 3; whooping cough, 4; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 6; inanition, 2; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 3; cancer, 6; pneumonia, 23; marasmus, tabes, mesenterica, and scrofula, 12; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 9; meningitis and encephalitis, 7; convulsions, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 9; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; premature and preterm births, 10; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 1; drowning, 3; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 2; erysipelas, 2; puerperal diseases, 6; diarrhoeal diseases, 7; phthisis pulmonalis, 9; heart diseases, 9; aneurism, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5. The number of deaths from bronchitis, apoplexy, cyanosis and atelectasis, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 117 were in institutions, 273 in tenement houses, 161 in houses containing 3 families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 101 on the first, 166 on the second, 92 on the third, 52 on the fourth, 23 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 557 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 8 non-residents. 52 were stated to be single, 147 married, 82 widowed, and the condition of 284 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 565; still-births, 44; bodies in transitu, 34. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 58 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 479 births, 160 marriages, 44 still-births, 565 deaths, 34 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 78 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 12 transcripts of the birth record, 6 of marriage, and 33 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending April 24, 1880, was 40.9 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.998, the mean humidity was 71, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 993, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.64 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 529 deaths and still-births, or 86.86 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 24; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 234; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 48; Greenwood (undenominational), 43; Lutheran, (undenominational), 74; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 27; Evergreen (undenominational), 38; Woodlawn (undenominational), 16; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 5; Union (Methodist Protestant), 0; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 1; Macphelah, L.
