

Report for the Quarter ending March 31, 1885.

CITY OF NEW YORK-DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS, (No. 36 Union Square, April 4, 1885.

SIR: In accordance with section 49, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Department of Public Parks hereby submits a statement of its transactions for the quarter ending March 31, 1885:

During the past quarter the personnel of the Commission governing the Department has been changed: first, by the resignation of Egbert L. Viele and the appointment of Jesse W. Palvers in his place, and again on the 9th of March by the death of William M. Olliffe, who had served for over four years as a Commissioner of this Department.

At a meeting held on the 11th of March, the President announced officially to the Board the death of Mr. Olliffe, at his residence in this city on Monday the 9th instant, and stated that the flags of the Department had been ordered to be placed at half mast and the Departmental office suitably draped in mourning, and that it was fit and proper at that time for the members of the Board to take suitable action and record upon its minutes an evidence of their high appreciation of their late colleague.

Whereupon, Commissioner Wales offered the following:

The sad death of William M. Olliffe, a Commissioner of this Department, though not an unexpected event, occurred on Monday night the 9th instant, at the residence of his father-in-law, Mr. Jordan L. Mott.

Moved by this untimely death, the members of this Board deem it fitting to record upon its minutes their high appreciation of his character and many virtues. We bear witness to his unbending integrity, his conscientious discharge of duty, his watchful devotion to the interests of the city and to his kind, courteous and considerate demeanor toward all. Thus has he left behind him a record of

as honorable and useful life.

As a suitable recognition of our respect and esteem for the memory of our late associate, we extend to his bereaved family our sincere sympathy and condolence.

Ordered, That a copy of this minute, suitably engrossed, be transmitted to the family; that the flags of the Department be placed at half mast, and the Department office closed on the day of the

On motion of Commissioner Powers, the minute as offered by Commissioner Wales was unani-

mously adopted.

The President, as a further mark of respect to the memory of the late Commissioner Olliffe,

The President, as a further mark of respect to the memory of the late Commissioner Olliffe, declared the Board adjourned.

At a meeting held on the 18th of March, Henry R. Beekman was present as the successor of the late Commissioner Olliffe.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment having consolidated under one heading a number of the appropriations of the Department, it has already been found to work favorably, and it is believed that the expiration of the year will show marked efficiency and economy resulting from it.

The Department having approved of the proposition of the American Museum of Natural History, for the enlargement of the Museum building in order to provide suitable accommodations for public instruction furnished by the State, and in order to facilitate this most desirable end, a committee has been appointed to confer with the trustees of the Museum.

Plans having been adopted and proposals advertised for the improvement of Jeannette Park at Coenties slip, by erecting foundation walls and granite coping, preparatory to laying the walks, and surfacing and ornamenting the grounds.

Plans have been ordered for the erection of a new monkey house, and for the enlargement and improvement of the conservatory near the new refreshment house in Central Park.

The license of Carl Schultz to occupy the Mineral spring on the Central Park has been extended for a term of three years from the expiration of his present license, also that of William Hall to maintain the floating bath at the Battery during the coming two seasons.

The Department is now considering the proposition of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, for the erection of a drinking fountain for the accommodation of man and beast, at the Plaza, Fifty-eighth street and Fifth avenue.

The new skate building erected at the lake on the Central Park was found to be a great accommodation to the increased numbers who visited the park to witness and participate in the sport of skating.

Skating.

During the past season there was skating on the park twenty-five days, and on some of these days as many as 50,000 people were estimated to have been on the lakes at the same time, with 25,000 on the drives, banks and walks witnessing the sport; the average daily attendance was about 25,000.

The Harlem Meer was visited this winter by greater numbers than ever before.

The curlers enjoyed the free use of Conservatory Lake for the practice of their favorite game.

Notwithstanding the immense throngs of people on the ice during the skating season, it is gratifying to state that not a single accident of a serious nature occurred, and while the largest liberties were allowed the visitors the strictest order was maintained.

Great care was taken to keep the ice clear of snow and make it inviting for skating. This has

Great care was taken to keep the ice clear of snow and make it inviting for skating. This has been done by sweeping it every night. The cleaning of all the ice on the different lakes and ponds in the Central Park during the past quarter was done at an expense of \$2,195.86, an insignificant sum when considering the amount of enjoyment it has afforded to the thousands of visitors.

The Counsel to the Corporation has been requested to initiate proceedings for acquiring title wherever the same has not been heretofore acquired to that portion of East One Hundred and Fifty-

seventh street, between Elton and North Third avenues.

The Department has approved of the general plan indicated in a bill before the Legislature entitled "An act to define and establish the boundaries and lines of Riverside Park, and Twelfth avenue, between Seventy-ninth and One Hundred and Twenty-ninth streets.

Proposals for doing the following works have been advertised for:

1. Regulating, grading, laying sidewalks and paving with granite block pavement, with asphaltic joints, the approaches to the Madison Avenue Bridge over the Harlem river.

2. For the erection of granite steps, platforms, brick arches, iron beams, etc., etc., required at the seven octagonal bays and three entrances on Morningside Park, adjoining Morningside avenue.

3. For furnishing and delivering, where required, broken trap-rock stone and trap-rock screenings along certain roads, avenues and streets in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

4. For furnishing and delivering screened Roa Hook gravel, where required on the Central Park and Riverside avenue. seventh street, between Elton and North Third avenues

Park and Riverside avenue.

5. For the erection of a wall on the easterly side of Eighth avenue, between Seventy-seven and Eighty-first streets.

Hook to any person desiring to purchase it, the sale and delivery of the same in this city to the Department became open to competition, and acting under the advice of the Counsel to the Corporation, who was appraised of the facts above stated, this Department invited proposals for such gravel by advertisements in the CITY RECORD.

Of the bids received in response, the lowest, \$2.37 per cubic yard, has been accepted. The following assessment lists have been forwarded to the Board of Assessors:

The Board, on November 21 last, having adopted the following:

Whereas, A sewer has been constructed in Brook avenue, between tide-water and One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, in the Twenty-third Ward, at an expense of \$305,230.93; and Whereas, The assessment list for said work was prepared and sent to the Board of Assessors on January 15, 1884, and on February 5, 1884, returned by said Board of Assessors with a communication from its Chairman stating that it would be unwise to levy any assessment until the whole improvement is completed: and provement is completed; and
Whereas, The contract for the second section of this sewer, between One Hundred and Sixty-

fifth and One Hundred and Eighty-fourth streets, has just been commenced, and will require in all probability two years to complete it; and

Whereas, Title to the land for a further section of this sewer has not yet been acquired by the

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be requested to furnish this Department with his opinion whether an assessment cannot be levied for the work already done, and for which assessment lists have been prepared, in order that the city may be reimbursed for its outlay, and the city debt reduced to that extent.

In response to this resolution the Counsel to the Corporation expressed an opinion, that there was no reason why this assessment should not be levied at this time, whereupon the following resolution was adopted by the Department:

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to transmit to the Board of Assessors, the assessment list for the construction of the Brook avenue sewer, from a point in tide-water to a point in One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, together with a copy of the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation

The subject of procuring a supply of gravel for use on the Central Park roads is one that has annually occupied the attention of the Department.

Years of experience has satisfied the Department that the best results have been attained by the use of the gravel taken from the beds at Roa Hook.

The subject of procuring a supply of gravel for use on the Central Park roads is one that has annually occupied the attention of the Department.

The assessment list has been accordingly forwarded again to the Board of Assessors.

The subject of the alterations of the grades of Washington and Brook avenues, has been urged upon the Department by the property-owners, and plans have been prepared showing such proposed alterations, and notices inserted in the CITY RECORD inviting the attention of persons interested.

The width and grade of Trinity avenue, between East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street and East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, in the Twenty-third Ward, have been finally settled upon, and three similar copies of the plans have been certified to by the President, and filed according

Permission has been granted the Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Railway Company to lay their tracks through One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, commencing at their track on North Third avenue, and running east to Long Island Sound.

This permission was given after taking the advice of the Counsel to the Corporation, under authority granted this company by chapter 892 of the Laws of 1867.

The subject of drainage in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards being one of great solicitude to this Department, the Board on February 4 adopted the following:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, appointed for the purpose of acquiring title to the lands for the opening of certain streets and avenues and the taking of lands under the order of the Board of Health for the construction of drains under action of this Department as follows:

—be notified that the sanitary condition of the neighborhoods in which these streets and avenues are located, demand, as a preservation of the public health, that sewers and drains be constructed through said streets, avenues and lands, and that this Department is prevented in the construction of such severs and drains, until said streets and avenues are regularly opened according to law, and requesting said Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment to use all diligence and speed in their power to hasten the prosecution of the duties intrusted to them, in order that this Department may construct the sewers and drains required.

The work of maintenance of the parks has been, in consequence of the weather, naturally confined to the care of the stock and structures, clearing the roads and walks, pruning the trees, etc. The work of maintenance of the parks is very nearly the same annually, and varies during the year with the natural existence of each season.

with the natural exigency of each season.

The lateness of the past winter has afforded a most favorable opportunity, of which the Department has availed itself, in pruning work and the top-dressing of lawns. Much has been done in that direction which could not be done in the latter part of last year.

It is worthy of note that the end of the last quarter brought us to the completion of the work of pruning commenced in the fall of 1881, so that from that date to this the Central Park has been

This work was commenced when the shrubs had overgrown and become filled underneath with

Similar attention is being given to those shrubs which have grown since that work was com-

In addition to the pruning of trees and shrubs, all the deadwood has been removed, as well as those trees and shrubs that were in a decayed state from want of space or interfered with the growth

The work has been conservatively done hitherto, but should be proceeded with in future more unsparingly. Value of much less value. Valuable trees are suffering in growth and symmetry from overcrowding by others

A thorough system of thinning out is essential to the protection and development of what is really valuable in the park plantations, provided the same be done carefully and wisely.

Through the new growth resulting from the cutting back and pruning of shrubs, it is no exaggeration to say that the shrubbery of Central Park presents a healthier and more symmetrical condition than at any time since the formation of the park.

The continuation of the first in the ground has prevented the cultivation of the soil and the

The continuation of the frost in the ground has prevented the cultivation of the soil and the removal of roots and stumps. This work will be proceeded with as soon as possible.

About 4,500 cubic yards of compost manure has been hauled in the Central and City Parks during the past quarter, and the shrubbery in the Ramble and other places has been well supplied with leaf compost. Several of the lawns have had a top dressing of wood ashes, manure compost and lime or earth compost, according to the nature and requirements of the ground.

All this has been brush harrowed, which always proves beneficial to lawns, even when they have not been composted.

As the requirements for bedding plants and flowers increases the propagating department has been extended this year, and by the end of the season about 50,000 plants will have been propagated; about two thousand more than was ever before propagated in one year by the Department. The condition of all the plants is healthy, and the propagating houses present a most creditable appearance, proving the care and diligence which has been bestowed on them.

In view of the increase of flower beds and in order to have a larger variety of colors for parterres flower beds, borders and vases, a variety of plants has been added to the former collection for propagation, such as golden gem coleus, graphallium lannatum, new coleus, yellow, staria variegated best assorted double and single dalhias, gazareia splendens, althemanthera, parychoides, carnation pinks, variegated vinca, Mexican ivy, best assorted tea roses, hybrid remontant roses and escheveria glauca.

The work of the nurseries, like all other cultivations, has been retarded by the frost in th

The work of the nurseries, like all other cultivations, has been retarded by the frost in the ground, but will receive the necessary attention as soon as the season will admit of it.

The action of the water of the ponds and lakes has worn away the soil from the roots of surrounding trees, and formed cavities under the banks. About 2,500 yards of stone have been laid around these shores to prevent further abrasion of the banks, and all spaces filled in with good mould, which will be seeded down.

The filtering basins around the lakes, and the drains leading into the same, have all been cleaned out; about 1,000 pounds of rubbish being removed. The water course from the pool to the lock, and Harlem meer has also been cleaned of all debris.

Attention has been given to drives, walks, drains, basins, etc., which are all in a better condition than usual this time of the year.

The usual work has been done in the mechanical department, in caring for the Harlem river

The usual work has been done in the mechanical department, in caring for the Harlem rive bridges, the repairing of walling stock, mowing machines, implements, buildings, cottages, etc., a well as the tools for construction, work in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards and else where. Twelve new water barrels have been made and sixteen repaired; sixteen hand carts, fiv trucks, and forty-wheelbarrows have been repaired and the whole painted. Four hundred and twenty-two settees have been repaired; eight rustic benches have been made and eight repaired

eventy new signs have also been made.

All of the water barrels, sprinkling wagons, carts, etc., have been repaired and painted; sixty seven mowing machines have been painted and two hundred and ninety-three signs lettered fifteen rustic benches stained, two hundred settees painted and one hundred and twenty-seven square

The new building in course of erection on the Central Park, west of Conservatory Lake, to b

used as a ladies cottage, is nearing completion. Designs and working drawings are now being prepared for the improvement and completion of Riverside Park from One Hundred and Fifteenth to One Hundred and Twenty ninth streets. The construction at this point is nearly completed and will be opened to the public in a short

Attention should be drawn to the results accomplished by the Department during the past year

in a field of park work of the utmost importance. It had been noticeable for several years how great a devastation had been made upon the park vegetation by the ravages of insect parasites. Not only were whole landscapes disfigured by their attacks, but in many instances considerable plantations had been denuded of foliage and irretrievably injured. The presence of the insects being frequently not noticeable till their work had advanced to far as to be beyond results.

The evil at length assumed such alarming proportions, and threatened such wholesale destruction of the most essential elements of the beauty of the parks, that the Board felt it imperative to take the promptest measures to check it.

The matter was put into the charge of an entomologist of approved experience and ability, with instructions to devote his best attention to the eradication of the pest and the redeeming of the areas afflicted.

To that task he applied himself with results that are fully compensatory of his efforts. The work was enormous in extent, involving the closest scrutiny of the vegetation upon every park within the city. Much of it was found in a most lamentable condition, covered with scale insects, riddled

with borers, and sometimes literally draped with cocoons. This last was especially the case in the restricted area of the East River Park, the trees of which, being chiefly ailanthus, were filled with the Chinese silk worm, whose cocoons, depending from the branches of the trees in great numbers, imparted a most singular appearance to the park in the winter season. The destructive bag-worm was very prevalent upon the Central Park. On the East Drive, at Ninety-sixth street particularly, they were present in such numbers that the foliage had the appearance of having been swept by a fire. Seven bushels of their cases were removed. A similar state of affairs existed upon the city

This whole field has been scrutinized and cleared. With the exception of Washington square, where the termination of the season made it necessary to postpone the work, every city park has been relieved. Even so early as last summer the results of the work were plainly appreciable. Many patches which had been affected by insects resumed their normal condition, and the foliage generally showed a decided recuperation. It is gratifying to note that while the parks of the West and of Europe have suffered during the year from this annoyance, the comparative immunity of our own during the same period, has been a matter of remark in domestic and foreign publications. This season will show more marked results than the last, as the work of extirpation has been persistently carried on. The research the subject involved has disclosed facts of considerable value to the science of entomology in general. Seven hundred and twenty-four species of insects were found upon the parks, including many rare ones, many entirely new, and many heretofore supposed to be indigenous only to localities far distant from this city. The explanation of this last fact is to be found in New York's cosmopolitan commerce. Her imports from every quarter of the land, and from transatlantic countries, bring with them the insect life of the places from which they come. These insects when released instinctively seek the fields most fitted for their support, and the parks, furnishing the most convenient vegetation, became a sort of storage warehouse for their deposit and increase. This whole field has been scrutinized and cleared. With the exception of Washington square,

Here may be found the cotton worm of the South, and the wood-borer of the West. It would be difficult to find compressed into limits so restricted, a field so diversely interesting for the study of

the scientific observer, and so difficult of clearing for the practical arboriculturist.

In consequence of the severity of the weather during the period covered by the past quarter, the works of construction have necessarily been somewhat limited.

The following will show what has been done.

CENTRAL AND CITY PARKS.

By reason of the extreme severity of the weather during the past three months, but little work of construction could be prosecuted with economy and consequently but a small force has been employed, which was engaged upon entrances Central Park at Eighth avenue, Seventy-seventh and Eightty-first streets, Retaining Wall of Transverse Road No. 2, Drainage and Irrigation, and Riverside avenue and Barks. side avenue and Park.

Entrances Central Park at Eighth Avenue, Seventy-seventh and Eighty-first Streets.

During the quarter the small amount of masonry remaining to be done for the bay wall adjoining the bridge at Seventy-seventh street has been completed and the coping for the same dressed and put in readiness for being set. The force employed thereon was suspended on February 4.

The work done has been,

35 cubic yards masonry in Bay wall laid. 116 lineal feet, 24 by 8 inches coping dressed.

Transverse Road Retaining Wall.

On the 9th of February a small force was placed upon this work and employed in dressing stone procured from within the Central Park.

982 superficial feet of face stone, or 58 cubic yards have been dressed.

Drainage and Irrigation.

The force upon this work was reduced to one gang of thirteen men and have been employed, when the weather would permit, in closing up the work of cleaning pipes, and completing tile and pipe drainage in progress previous to January 1.

The contract for the outlet sewer across Eighth avenue at Eighty-eighth street, and in the park, was completed on February 9. The work done was:

18 lineal feet of 24-inch pipe sewer laid.

RIVERSIDE AVENUE.

The rebuilding of the wall near One Hundred and Second street, and a stone culvert in connection therewith, which was in progress, has been completed, and the small force engaged was removed on February 5.

The work done has been

14 cubic yards of wall rebuilt.51 lineal feet of coping reset.36 lineal feet of stone culvert built.

RIVERSIDE PARK IMPROVEMENT.

The weather having been such as to prevent the prosecution of grading or other earth work, but a small force has been engaged in preparing, hauling and placing stone in the foundation for the

The work done has been :

675 cubic yards of stone (generally procured from sources exterior to the park) sledged, hauled, and placed in roadway.

About 15,600 cubic yards of filling has been procured from sources outside of the park, and deposited near Ninety-sixth street, without cost, except for man in charge of dump.

MADISON AVENUE BRIDGE APPROACHES.

During this quarter the lamp-posts for the approaches have been completed and are in readiness for being placed upon the parapet walls.

The contract for the laying of the sidewalks and paving the approaches was awarded on the 18th of March, and the work will be commenced as soon as the weather will permit.

TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS

The works in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards intrusted to the care of this Department are varied in character, and their magnitude not realized by the public generally.

They consist in the care and maintenance of 146 miles of country road, 42½ miles of macadam roads, 4½ miles of paved streets, 10½ miles of regulated and graded streets, making a total of 203½ miles of streets and avenues to maintain; 2c miles of sewers and the cleaning and building of drains, culverts, etc.; the maintenance and care of all the bridges over the many streams and water-courses in these wards; the removal of incumbrances and the care of all street openings for water, sewers and gas; the construction of sewers, paving of streets and avenues; the regulating and grading, guttering, curbing and flagging of streets and avenues; the surveying, monumenting and laying out the entire district; the preparation of tax maps, also rule and damage maps used by the Commissioners of Assessment in the matter of street openings.

The maintenance work is one requiring the greatest watchfulness and care. With 146 miles of unpaved streets and avenues, constructed on heavy, steep grades, subjected to the wash of every storm, rendering them at times dangerous to travelers, must necessarily be one of care and responsibility.

The construction of sewers and improvement of streets, are works requiring great foresight and much thought. This district, comprising 15,317 acres, with a population of 43,000, and an assessed valuation of \$25.521,065, requires the judicious improvement of its highways in order to make it desirable for residences.

desirable for residences.

These improvements have steadily progressed, plans have been prepared, and the works in accordance with them were contemplated to be commenced this spring.

The Constitutional Amendment adopted last fall has put a stop to all these new and contemplated works, and if allowed to continue must seriously interfere with improvements so much required in this district, and for the future render uncertain the carrying out of the perfected plans of this Department. Nothing can be done until sewers are built. This is necessary in order to render the sanitary condition assured. They are necessary before the roads and avenues can be properly regulated and graded, and smooth, well-paved roads and streets are great inducements toward an increase of the population. After years of care and thought in the preparation of plans for these improvements, this Department is now fully prepared to urge them forward rapidly, so soon as the necessary authority can be obtained.

The works when completed are all matters of assessment, chargeable to and paid for by the

The works when completed are all matters of assessment, chargeable to and paid for by the property-owners.

The details of work in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards during the past quarter are as follows:

During the quarter, masonry, including the construction of sewers, has generally been suspended, only those sewers where the excavation was in rock being allowed to be prosecuted, the laying of pipe and brick being done only when the thermometer was above freezing, and then only where the same could be securely protected from frost.

METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVATORY.

During the past quarter monthly tables have been printed for distribution to home and foreign observatories and libraries; weekly reports have been issued to the CITY RECORD, Health Department, and newspapers, and meteorological information has been supplied to the law courts. The Director of the Observatory has been subprenaed on several occasions, by the Counsel to the Cor-

poration of the City of New York, to testify in the courts in suits against the City. On one occasion the meteorological information desired dated as far back as 1874.

For some time past the question has been agitated as to the advisibility of moving the meteorological observatory from its present temporary quarters in the top of the old arsenal building to the belvedere in the centre of Central Park. It is considered a thing most desirable to be done. The belvedere as it now stands is incomplete, and at a small expense could be changed into a very suitable observatory. It would have the additional advantage of being perfectly fire-proof. The advisibility of this for the safety of the self recording instruments and records of the past sixteen years need not be enlarged upon. If these records should be destroyed they could never be replaced, and on the evidence which they alone supply, depend the event of litigations, involving in many cases large amounts.

large amounts.

The temperature of February this year has been colder than the average for several years. On the night of the 10th and 11th there was a fall in thirteen hours of 47 degrees, or nearly one-half of

the annual range.

March 16, a partial solar eclipse occurred. Its effects on the readings of the sun thermometer at

March 16, a partial solar eclipse occurred. Its effects on the readings of the sun diffininheter at this observatory was as follows:

At mid-day, just before the commencement of the eclipse, Draper's self-recording sun-thermometer indicated a sun-temperature of 92 degrees, Fahrenheit, while the self-recording thermometer, in the shade at the same time, indicated 33 degrees, Fahrenheit.

When the eclipse was at its maximum obscuration (1.30 P. M.), the sun temperature had fallen to 69 degrees, while that in the shade was still 33 degrees.

At the end of the eclipse (2.50 P. M.) the sun temperature had risen to 82 degrees, and that in the shade to 34 degrees.

It is interesting to note from the above facts that one-half of the difference between the sun temperature and that in the shade at the beginning of the eclipse is 29½ degrees, while the actual fall of temperature during the eclipse, as is shown by the sun instrument, was 2.3 degrees. This is as it should be, for only about one-third of the sun was obscured. It is probable that if the eclipse had been total the reading of the two instruments would have been the same.

The past quarter having been of long continued cold, the records of the observatory herewith submitted, show the exact number of times, or hours, the different degrees of temperature had been experienced. These show the number of hours for every ten degrees, from the coldest to the warmest temperature. These results have been derived from Draper's continuous self-recording thermometer.

The following tables show the comparison of temperatures for the years 1884 and 1885, for the months of January, February and March, and also the number of hours the temperature was below and above 30 degrees, which has been taken as a temperature of neither freezing nor thawing.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending April 18, 1885:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 8,081.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,656.

During the past week 250 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 73 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 7 permits.

There was issued, under the Sanitary Code, I miscellaneous permit.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks, 267 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 69 visits were made, and 55 disinfections and 21 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 15.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,260, of which 471 were primary and 789 re-vacci-

There were seized and condemned 11,205 pounds of meat and 1,520 pounds of fish.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 98, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 70.

The certificates of 598 births, 50 still-births, 303 marriages, and 696 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 18, 1885. This shows an increase of 73 births and 109 marriages, and a decrease of 9 still-births and 44 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was an increase of 58 births, 103 marriages, and 71 deaths, and a decrease of 10 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 1; diphtheria, 3; malarial fevers, 6; diarrhocal diseases, 7; inanition, 2; cancer, 4; bronchitis, 5; pneumonia, 13; ancurism, 4; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, I; meningitis and encephalitis, I4; apoplexy, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 18; cirrhosis and hepatitis, I; gastritus, enteritis, and peritonitis, 3; premature and preternatural births, 3; suicide, 3; while the deaths from croup increased, 11; whooping cough, 2; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, I; puerperal diseases, 2; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 15; heart diseases, 2; convulsions, I; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; surgical operations, I. The number of deaths from measles, erysipelas and suicide was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 162 were in institutions, 366 in tenement houses, 161 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 0 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 114 on the first, 202 on the second, 110 on the third, 66 on the fourth, 28 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 696 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-residents; 91 were stated to be single, 178 married, 82 widowed, and the condition of 345 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

A PPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 10 to 3 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between suxt and seventy vears of

their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt. Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
