## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

*Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held October 22, 1878.*

Present—Hon. Smith Ely, Jr., Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; Nelson J. Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Patrick Keenan, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted the following report and accompanying statement, viz.:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, {  
October 21, 1878.

*To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Section 7 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, provides as follows:

"Section 7. From the said sinking fund for the redemption of the city debt shall be paid and redeemed all preferred bonds and stocks of said city for the payment or redemption of which said fund is pledged, as aforesaid, and other bonds and stocks of said city as by this statute authorized; and whenever and as often as the commissioners of said sinking fund shall certify to the board of estimate and apportionment of said city that the accumulations in said sinking fund shall not be sufficient to meet the payment of any bonds or stocks falling due in the next following calendar year, it shall be the duty of said board, and it is hereby required, to include in the annual estimate for such year, to be raised by tax on the estates, real and personal, in said city, subject to taxation, such an amount to be applied to the payment of said bonds or stocks as shall be certified by said commissioners, and the amount so included in said estimate shall be paid into said sinking fund and applied as in this section specified; provided, however, that the amount so to be raised by tax and paid into the sinking fund, as in this section provided, shall not in any one year be less than the sum of one million dollars, nor more than two million dollars."

Herewith I submit a statement of the bonds and stocks of the City of New York, payable in the year 1879, from taxation, under the statutes authorizing their issue, amounting to \$4,447,155.35.

The accumulations in the Sinking Fund in the year 1879 are estimated as follows:

From Revenues pledged by law to said Fund	\$2,800,000 00
From surplus revenues of Sinking Fund for payment of interest of city debt, to be transferred in pursuance of section 2, chapter 383, Laws of 1878	1,000,000 00
Total	\$3,800,000 00

The surplus amount of these accumulations, after providing for such investments as the Commissioners may make in the interests of the city, will not be sufficient to meet the payment of said bonds and stocks falling due in said year. It will be necessary, therefore, to include in the annual estimate for that year, and raise by tax, at least the minimum amount authorized by said section, the sum of one million dollars, which sum, I recommend, be certified to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to be raised by tax in the year 1879, and submit a resolution for that purpose.

Whereas, Section 7 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, provides that—

"Whenever, and as often as the commissioners of said sinking fund shall certify to the board of estimate and apportionment of said city, that the accumulations in said sinking fund shall not be sufficient to meet the payment of any bonds or stocks falling due in the next following calendar year, it shall be the duty of said board, and it is hereby required, to include in the annual estimate for such year, to be raised by tax on the estates, real and personal, in said city, subject to taxation, such an amount to be applied to the payment of said bonds or stocks as shall be certified by said commissioners, and the amount so included in said estimate shall be paid into said sinking fund, and applied as in this section specified; provided, however, that the amount so to be raised by tax and paid into the sinking fund, as in this section provided, shall not in any one year be less than the sum of one million dollars, nor more than two million dollars;" and

Whereas, It appears from a communication to this Board, from the Comptroller, dated October 21, 1878, that the amount of bonds and stocks of the city, payable from taxation, falling due in the year 1879, is \$4,447,155.35; and that the estimated accumulations of the Sinking Fund during the said year will amount in the aggregate to \$3,800,000; therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby certify to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that the accumulations of the Sinking Fund in the year 1879 applicable to the redemption of bonds and stocks of the City of New York, which are payable from taxation by the provisions of the statutes authorizing their issue, and which fall due in said year, will not be sufficient to meet the payment thereof; and they do further certify that the amount to be raised by tax and paid into the Sinking Fund in the year 1879, to be applied to the payment of such bonds and stocks, as provided in section 7 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, shall be the sum of one million dollars.

On motion the report was accepted, and the preamble and resolution submitted by the Comptroller unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller submitted the following preamble and resolution; which, on motion, were unanimously adopted, viz.:

Whereas, Section 3 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, provides as follows:

"Section 3. All moneys now in the treasury of said city heretofore collected and received in payment or on account of assessments made and confirmed for local improvements in said city, and all moneys which shall hereafter be collected and received in payment or on account of assessments made and confirmed or which may be made and confirmed, for local improvements completed prior to the passage of this act, shall be paid into the said sinking fund for the redemption of the city debt; and the same is hereby, in addition to the revenues and moneys aforesaid, pledged and appropriated to said last mentioned sinking fund for the payment of the bonds and stocks of said city to be paid and redeemed therefrom, as hereinbefore provided;" and

Whereas, Pursuant to the authority conferred upon the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by section 7 of said act, the Comptroller was authorized and directed, by a resolution of this Board, dated September 16, 1878, to issue \$6,900,000, Consolidated Stock of the City of New York, for the purpose of paying and redeeming that amount of bonds of the city issued for the expense of local improvements in said city, falling due November 1, 1878, the proceeds of which Consolidated Stock has been partly and will all be paid into the Sinking Fund; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed, to pay from the Sinking Fund and redeem the bonds issued on account of said local improvements falling due on the first day of October and November, 1878, out of moneys received from collections of assessments under said section 3 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, and the proceeds of said Consolidated Stock, said bonds amounting in the aggregate to \$7,885,500, as follows:

The Comptroller submitted a statement of amount to be refunded on account of Assessment Sales vacated by order of the court; when, on motion, the following resolution was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That a warrant be drawn in favor of J. Nelson Tappan, Chamberlain, against the "Sinking Fund for Redemption of the City Debt," and for deposit to credit of "Assessment Sales—Moneys Refunded," for refunding moneys paid on account of sales vacated by order of the court, and payable from assessments collected on account of, viz.:

The Comptroller submitted the appraisal made by William Kennelly, of the value of the real estate to be sold at public auction, November 2, 1878, and terms of sale of the same; whereupon, the following resolutions were, on motion, adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby approve of the appraisal of the value of the premises—

Nos. 9 and 11 Franklin street;  
No. 49 Leonard street, and  
House and lot, northeast corner of Eighty-fifth street and Third avenue,

as made by William Kennelly, herewith attached.

Resolved, That this Board do hereby fix the terms of sale of real estate of the City of New York, to be sold on November 2, 1878, as follows:

*TERMS OF SALE.*

Ten per cent. of the purchase money and auctioneer's fees of \$25, on each lot, to be paid at the Comptroller's Office immediately after the sale.

Thirty per cent., on November 20 next, when the deeds will be ready for delivery, and the balance, sixty per cent., on any portion thereof, at the option of the purchaser, may remain on bond and mortgage for five years from November 20, 1878, with interest at the rate of six (6) per cent. per annum, payable half-yearly.

Mortgages to include the customary thirty days' interest clause.

The amount on bond and mortgage may be paid off at any time within five years, on giving one month's notice to the Comptroller; or it may be paid in installments of not less than \$500, on any day when interest is due, within the five years.

The bonds and mortgages will be prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation, and \$12.50 will be charged for the expense of drawing, acknowledging, and recording each separate mortgage.

Sundry applications for return of court fees paid into the Treasury, and ordered by the courts to be refunded, were received; whereupon, the following resolutions were, on motion, adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the sum of four (\$4) dollars be returned to Messrs. Cook & Schenck, attorneys, in the action of Thomas Johnson and others against Isaac Binns, trial fee collected in such action and paid into the City Treasury in May, 1877, by the Clerk of the Marine Court.

Resolved, That the sum of four (\$4) dollars be returned to E. J. McGean, attorney, in the action of John M. Glover against Anthony McReynolds, note of issue fee collected in such action and paid into the City Treasury on June 4, 1878, by the Clerk of the Marine Court.

Resolved, That the sum of four (\$4) dollars be returned to Albert Englehart, note of issue fee collected in the matter of Murray Hill Bank, of the City of New York, against George W. Archer, and paid into the Treasury in September, 1878, by the Clerk of the Marine Court.

Resolved, That the sum of four (\$4) dollars be returned to Hart & Bamberger, calendar fee collected in the action of Grace G. Mayfield against George Frederick, and paid into the Treasury October 11, 1877, by the Clerk of the Marine Court.

Resolved, That the sum of four (\$4) dollars be returned to J. A. Hyland, attorney, stenographer's fee collected in the action of Mina G. Schirmer against William H. Codey, and paid into the City Treasury July 1, 1878, by the Clerk of the Marine Court.
