BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending December 14, 1878, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending December 7, 1878.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., *Sanitary Superintendent and Register:*

SIR—There were 495 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 14, 1878, which is an increase of 40, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 40 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending December 7, 1878, was 451, which is 40.4 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.52 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,089,540.

WEDNESDAY, December 18, 1878.

The Board of Education held a regular session on Wednesday, at 4 P. M., at the Hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets.

Present—William Wood, LL.D., President, and Commissioners Beardsley, Bell, Cohen, Donnelly, Dowd, Goulding, Halsted, Jelliffe, Katzenberg, Kelly, Manierre, Place, Traud, Walker, Watson, West, Wetmore, Wheeler, and Wickham—20.

Absent—Commissioner Vermilye—1.

Commissioner Vermilye was excused for absence.

The President laid before the Board the following communications from the Trustees of the several Wards:
