

Resolved, That Thursday, the 8th day of September, 1892, at one o'clock in the afternoon, and the Chamber of the Board of Aldermen, be and they are hereby designated as the time and place when and where the application of the East and West Railway Company to the Common Council of the City of New York for its consent and permission for the construction, extension, maintenance, operation and use by the said petitioner of the surface railroad mentioned in the petition of said petitioner for such consent, through, upon and along the surface of the streets, avenues and highways set forth in said petition and therein described will be first considered, and that public notice be given by the Clerk of this Board by publishing the same daily for fourteen days in two daily newspapers published in this city, to be designated therefor by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of section 92 of chapter 565 of the Laws of 1890, known as the Railroad Law, being chapter 39 of the General Laws and the several acts amendatory thereof, such advertising to be at the expense of the petitioner. the expense of the petitioner.
