APPROVED PAPERS.

Approved Papers for the Week ending September 17, 1892.

Resolved, That Thursday, the 8th day of September, 1892, at one o'clock in the afternoon, and the Chamber of the Board of Aldermen, be and they are hereby designated as the time and place when and where the application of the East and West Railway Company to the Common Council of the City of New York for its consent and permission for the construction, extension, maintenance, operation and use by the said petitioner of the surface railroad mentioned in the petition of said petitioner for such consent, through, upon and along the surface of the streets, avenues and highways set forth in said petition and therein described will be first considered, and that public notice be given by the Clerk of this Board by publishing the same daily for fourteen days in two daily newspapers published in this city, to be designated therefor by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of section 92 of chapter 565 of the Laws of 1890, known as the Railroad Law, being chapter 39 of the General Laws and the several acts amendatory thereof, such advertising to be at the expense of the petitioner.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, August 2, 1892.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 12, 1892, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That the heads of the several departments of the City Government be and they are hereby requested to close their respective offices on Saturday, September 3, 1892, and that all other offices not by law required to be kept open for the transaction of public business to be closed on that day.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 12, 1892, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Committee of One Hundred of the New York Columbian Celebration to affix to such lamp-posts and telegraph poles belonging to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York as may be selected and designated by said Committee, temporary sign-boards or transparencies announcing the programme of the celebration, the office of the Secretary and the official place of sale of tickets and programmes, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only until October 17, 1892.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, August 30, 1892.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 12, 1892, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Andrew Evans to place and keep a watering-trough in front of his premises, No. 105 Broad street, the work to be done and water supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That Lafayette Olney be and he is hereby appointed a City Surveyor.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to draw a warrant in favor of Samuel E. Warren for the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars, for engrossing and binding the preamble and resolution passed by the Common Council in relation to Captain F. J. Twomey, for presentation, on behalf of the Corporation of the City of New York, to the said Captain F. J. Twomey, and charge the amount to the appropriation for City Contingencies.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 6, 1892.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 14, 1892, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That Wednesday, the twenty-eighth day of September, at 11 o'clock A.M., and the Chamber of the Board of Aldermen, be and hereby designated as the time and place when and where the application of the Metropolitan Crosstown Railway Company to the Common Council of the City of New York, for its consent and permission for the construction and operation by the said petitioner of the union, extension and connection between the said company's railroad and the line of the Houston, West Street and Pavia Ferry Railroad Company to Desbrosses Street Ferry, the said petitioner desiring to extend, construct and operate a branch of its road in manner and form as set forth in said petition, as a new and continuous route of public travel, as provided in section 93, as amended, of the Railroad Law, will be first considered, and that public notice be given by the Clerk of this Board by publishing the same daily for fourteen days in two daily papers published in this city, to be designated therefor by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of section 92, as amended, of the Railroad Law, such advertising to be at the expense of the petitioner.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.
