COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held at the Mayor's Office, June 19, 1879.

Present—Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Nicholas Haughton, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and amended by adding the words "for steam" after the word "pipes" in the fourth line of the preamble submitted by the Mayor at the last meeting, and, as amended, were approved.

Edwards Pierrepont submitted a communication from Francis B. Spinola and associates, calling attention to the great benefit that the city and its inhabitants will derive by the introduction of steam for heating, cooking, and such other purposes for which it can be used when introduced upon the principle proposed by himself and associates.

The communication was received and ordered on file.

By unanimous consent the Computative modified the resolution fixing the percentage to be paid

The communication was received and ordered on file.

By unanimous consent the Comptroller modified the resolution fixing the percentage to be paid on the earnings of the Company, submitted by him and adopted at the last meeting, in order to express more clearly the meaning intended, so as to read as follows:

Resolved, That in each year in which the Company's earnings shall exceed ten per cent. on the amount invested, the next three per cent. earned in the same year, over ten per cent. on the amount invested, shall be paid into the City Treasury to the credit of the Sinking Fund for the redemption of the city debt

invested, shall be paid into the City Treasury to the credit of the Shaking Fund for the Teachiputor of the city debt.

The Comptroller offered the following as a substitute for amendment No. I to the resolution adopted December 28, 1878, submitted by the Mayor at the last meeting:

Resolved, That the grantees, before taking out such permit, shall file with the Comptroller of the City and County of New York a bond for \$50,000, with sufficient and adequate security, to be approved by the Comptroller, to be renewed from time to time as the Comptroller may require, as a guarantee that the pavements of the streets and sidewalks shall be restored in as good condition as they were found at the time they were disturbed to lay said steam-pipes and entirely to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works, and unless this be fully complied with, that the proper authorities shall be fully empowered to commence legal proceedings against the signers of the bond,

they were found at the thire they were distribed to fay said steam-pipes and entirely to the Sausaction of the Commissioner of Public Works, and unless this be fully complied with, that the proper authorities shall be fully empowered to commence legal proceedings against the signers of the bond, for the amount which it may have cost the city to restore said pavements in good condition. The pipes shall be laid under such regulations as the Commissioner of Public Works may from time to time establish, and under such part of roadway or sidewalk as he may prescribe on the permit, and if at any time the Commissioner of Public Works shall direct any changes to be made in the location or arrangement of said steam-pipes for the purpose of the laying, altering, or removing city water-pipes or sewers, or doing any other public work, such changes shall be made by the grantees at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and in no case shall the city be liable for any injury or damage to the said steam-pipes, and in laying said steam-pipes the grantees shall in nowise interfere with any sewers, water-pipes or other pipe theretofore laid, without the consent of the Commissioner of Public Works and the owners of said pipes.

On motion the resolution was adopted, the Comptroller, Chamberlain, and Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen voting in the affirmative, and the Mayor in the negative.

On motion of the Comptroller, the blank in the second amendment to the said resolution adopted December 28, 1878, submitted by the Mayor, at the last meeting, was filled with "25," and thereupon unanimously adopted, as follows:

The grantees shall supply all the steam required by the city for any purpose in the streets, or the parts thereof, in which the steam-pipes are laid, or for heating any public building now or here-

after located therein, at 25 per cent. less rates than steam is furnished by them to their most favored customer. And the grantees shall authorize the city to use for public purposes, without royalty, any patented appliances or apparatus for the use of the steam supplied by the grantees which the grantees shall authorize or license any person to use.

The Mayor submitted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the grantees shall pay to the city annually five per cent. of the gross receipts from the business of supplying steam, as compensation for the privilege of laying their pipes in the streets.

The resolution was not adopted; the Mayor and Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen voting in the affirmative, and the Comptroller and Chamberlain voting in the negative.

The Comptroller submitted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the limitation in the fifth condition of the resolution passed December 28, 1878,

Resolved, That the limitation in the fifth condition of the resolution passed December 28, 1878, be repealed.

The resolution was not adopted; the Comptroller and Chamberlain voting in the affirmative, and the Mayor and Chairman Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen proposed that the condition limiting the operations of the Company to the District lying below Chambers street should be so modified, that in case the proposed plan proved a success, the company be authorized to extend their operations throughout the limits of the entire city; whereupon the Comptroller submitted the following as an addition to the 5th condition of the resolution adopted December 28, 1878, viz.:

"And after having laid the pipes in said district to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, then the said Francis B. Spinola and his associates are hereby granted permission to lay pipes in all the streets, lanes, alleys, and places in the city, under such conditions as have been agreed upon and made in the said grant to heat that portion of the city already limited and described," which, on motion, was adopted.

The Comptroller, Chamberlain, and Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen voting in the affirmative, and the Mayor in the negative.

The Mayor submitted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the right to lay steam-pipes shall cease and determine at the expiration of three years from this date, unless they shall, within that time, have constructed the apparatus and laid the pipes necessary to supply steam in twenty-five miles of streets.

On motion, the resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Mayor moved that the last clause of the second condition in the resolution adopted December 28, 1878, viz., "and that all the appliances connected with the introduction of steam-heating in any of said buildings above referred to shall be furnished by the said Francis B. Spinola and his associates, at the actual cost thereof to them," be stricken out, which was unanimously adopted.
