

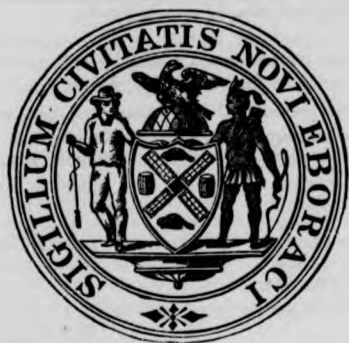

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

STATED SESSION.

MONDAY, August 2, 1875, {

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

RESOLUTIONS.

(G. O. 427.)

By Alderman McCarthy—

Resolved, That Eighty-first street, from Second avenue to the East river, be regulated and graded to conform to the new grade established under authority of chapter 528, Laws of 1873, in such manner as the Commissioner of Public Works may deem expedient, and for the best interest of the city and property owners, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

By the same—

Resolved, That One Hundred and Twelfth street, from Third avenue to Harlem river, be paved with granite-block pavement, and that at the several intersecting streets and avenues crosswalks be laid where not now laid, and relaid where those now laid are, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works, not in good repair, or are not upon a grade adapted to the grade of the proposed new pavement, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Street Pavements.

By the same—

Resolved, That the sidewalks on the east side of Madison avenue, between Seventy-ninth and Eighty-sixth streets, be flagged four feet wide through the centre thereof, where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Streets.

By Alderman Seery—

Whereas, The Common Council has learned, with the most profound sorrow, of the death of ex-President Andrew Johnson, and, as the sad event is one that should call forth a proper expression of the sentiments and feeling of the Common Council, the representatives of the people of this city, in view of the exalted character and public services of the deceased patriot and statesman; be it

Resolved, That a Special Committee of three members of this Board be appointed to prepare and present resolutions expressive of the regret of the people of this city for the death of the illustrious deceased, and to take such other and appropriate action as to them may appear best calculated to manifest our sorrow for the death and respect for the memory of the deceased ex-President of the United States.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

And the President appointed as such Special Committee, Aldermen Seery, Gross, and Purroy.

(G. O. 428.)

By the same—

Whereas, The city is now and for years past has been paying the sum of \$8,000 per annum for offices for the Counsel to the Corporation, No. 117 Nassau street, in addition to an annual rental of \$5,000 for the offices to the Corporation Attorney, and \$5,000 for offices for the Public Administrator, and it appears the offices so rented for the office of the Counsel to the Corporation are not now occupied by the said Counsel, notwithstanding the said amount of rental has been annually paid by the Comptroller; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby directed to remove to, and at once occupy the said premises at No. 117 Nassau street, which was so leased for his use and occupation as public offices.

Tweed, as Commissioner, on the first day of July, 1871; and the completion thereof is unnecessarily delayed, and that you are willfully violating the conditions and covenants of said contract; and that the work is not being done, and is not progressing according to the terms of said contract, and that the work contemplated by said contract has not been fully completed in the time named in said contract for its completion; and I hereby notify and require you to fully and entirely complete the work contracted to be done by you under the contract aforesaid, on or before the fifth day of August, 1875; and hereby notify and require you, on and after said fifth day of August, 1875, to discontinue all work under said contract, and the whole thereof, and from and after the day last aforesaid to remove all persons employed by you from said work; and that I, as Commissioner, will thereafter complete said work in the manner provided for in such case by the statute, and in case the expense shall exceed the sum payable to you under said contract, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty will hold you and your securities responsible for such excess.
