

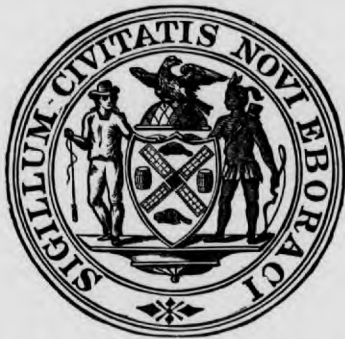

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## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Report for the Quarter ending June 30, 1894.

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS,

Hon. THOMAS F. GILROY, Mayor:

SIR—Pursuant to the provisions of section 49 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Department of Public Parks hereby submits the following statement of its transactions during the three months ending June 30, 1894:

During the past quarter changes have taken place in the personnel and the organization of the Board governing the Department by the appointment of Edward Bell, Esq., as a Commissioner of Public Parks, in the place of Commissioner Paul Dana, resigned, and the election of Commissioner George C. Clausen, as President, in the place of Commissioner Tappen, whose term as President had expired. Commissioner Tappen was elected Vice-President for the ensuing year.

In addition to the routine work of conducting the affairs of the Department and the maintaining of the park system, the several works of important construction commenced during previous quarters have been carried on toward completion, including the number of works inaugurated in the early part of the present year under chapter 11 of the Laws of 1894, known as the "Million Dollar Act."

On the first section of the Harlem River Driveway the work has been pushed forward as rapidly as possible. A contract for the second section, lying between High Bridge and Dyckman street, has been executed and work is now in progress on that portion of the driveway also, having been commenced on the 23d of April.

The Department having been served with an injunction to stop work on the driveway, the Board, on the 9th of May, adopted the following:

Whereas, In the action in the Supreme Court in which F. Augustus Schermerhorn is plaintiff, and the Commissioners of Public Parks in their official capacity and others are defendants, an injunction has been granted to stop the construction of the Harlem River Driveway; and

Whereas, The contracts theretofore awarded are now in progress of vigorous prosecution on the part of the contractors, and the dispute involved in the injunction case affects only five hundred and fifteen feet of sidewalk on the easterly side of the driveway; this Board does hereby

Resolve, That, in conformity with the existing law, it is and has been the intention of this Board to carry out such law and to construct the said easterly sidewalk, not only with respect to the five hundred and fifteen feet, but with respect to the entire length of the drive, and that the contracts in force under the Engineer, Mr. Charles H. Graham, contain a provision whereby such sidewalks may and shall be constructed.

The injunction being modified to apply to only the small portion of the driveway which might be affected, little or no delay was occasioned thereby.

The work has since proceeded rapidly, due provision being made for two sidewalks of not less than ten feet in width, as prescribed by the new law. Plans have been made for constructing a tunnel and drain under the driveway and building an elevator tower and appurtenances west of the driveway at High Bridge for the use of the Department of Public Works, in connection with the pumping station at that point.

The work accomplished by the contractors under the two contracts now in force is shown by the following table:

Steady progress has been made in the construction of the new Macomb's Dam Bridge and its several approaches. The work done upon the bridge this quarter has been the iron and steel superstructure, and on the approaches foundation work and masonry.

The work of fitting up the Aquarium in Castle Garden Building is also progressing favorably. During the quarter just passed the construction of continuous tanks, pools, gallery floors, rooms for the boilers and filters has been receiving attention and advancing as fast as work of this new character will permit. The improvement of the exterior and grounds adjoining, such as shaping and grading the plots, planting and seeding the grounds has been pushed toward completion.

The enlargement of the American Museum of Natural History Building in Manhattan Square and the equipping, etc., of the new wing of the Metropolitan Museum of Art in Central Park have also been satisfactorily progressed.

In the erection of the new boiler-house at the Art Museum considerable delay and other difficulties have arisen which necessitated the serving of notice upon the contractor to discontinue all work under his contract. Steps have been taken to properly complete the work at the expense of the contractor.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has been requested to authorize the following expenditures under chapter 11, Laws of 1894:

For constructing a stone substructure surfaced with asphalt or pavement of Portland cement a width of ten feet on the walks adjoining Manhattan Square, along the northerly side of Seventy-seventh street and the southerly side of Eighty-first street, between Central Park, West, and Columbus avenue, \$6,000.

To complete the work of rock and earth excavation for the improvement of Cathedral Parkway, from Seventh avenue to Riverside Drive, \$10,000.

To complete the construction of a walk entrance to Central Park at Fifth avenue and Eighty-fifth street, \$5,000.

For covering the walks in Mount Morris Park with asphalt, and placing them in good condition, \$10,000.

The Board of Estimate has been requested also to make the following transfers:

The sum of \$4,000 from the appropriation for reconstructing the entrance drive at Fifth avenue and One Hundred and Second street, Central Park, to the appropriation for painting, etc., the inclosing walls of Central Park.

The sum of \$12,000, from the amount set apart for widening the bridle road, from One Hundred and Third street, East Drive, to Ninety-third street, West Drive, to the sum apportioned for the work of graveling the roads in the upper portion of the Central Park.

Plans for an entrance to connect Cathedral Parkway with Riverside Park have been presented and discussed and are now under consideration.

The Department, through the Counsel to the Corporation, has petitioned the Supreme Court to appoint Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in a proceeding to acquire title to the lands in the Twelfth Ward, designated by chapter 56, Laws of 1894, to be taken for a public park and parkway.

It being the duty of the Department, under chapter 248, Laws of 1894, to designate and set apart a plot of land in Crotona Park as a site for a public building, for the purpose of providing suitable accommodations for conducting the public business of the Department of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and for other uses, a plot consisting of six city lots has been so designated and set apart on said park, within the limits named by the law cited, viz.: not more than 300 feet easterly from Third avenue and not more than 300 feet southerly from Tremont avenue.

The Department has communicated to the Governor its disapproval of Assembly Bill No. 463, to provide for the better protection of public parks, based upon the objection that should the bill become a law it would prohibit the construction of a crematory, which is much needed on the parks.

Consent has been given to the erection of projections on buildings on streets adjoining or contiguous to the public parks, a fee being charged in each case, as follows:

On the front of the new Annex to the Hotel Savoy, at the southeast corner of Fifth avenue and Fifty-ninth street.

On a proposed six-story apartment building at the northeast corner of Fifth avenue and Fifty-ninth street.

On eight dwelling-houses to be erected at the northeast corner of Riverside Drive and Eighty-first street.

On the dwelling at the southeast corner of Madison avenue and Forty-first street.

On a proposed dwelling on lot No. 964 Fifth avenue, 76 feet 8 inches south of Seventy-eighth street.

On a proposed dwelling on the east side of Fifth avenue, 75 feet south of Sixty-fourth street.

On a proposed dwelling on the southerly side of Seventy-fifth street, 150 feet east of Fifth avenue.

On a dwelling at the northeast corner of Park avenue and Thirty-fourth street.

A drinking-fountain, erected at Battery place, has been presented to the city by Mrs. Clendenen Graydon and accepted by the Department.

A statue, by Sunol, of Columbus has been presented to the city and erected in the Central Park. The statue was unveiled with appropriate ceremonies on the 12th of May.

A renewal of the license for the sale of mineral waters at the mineral spring in the Central Park has been granted to Carl H. Schultz for a period of five years. Mr. Schultz pays the sum of \$500 per annum for the privilege and makes all repairs to the building occupied by him at his own expense.

The privilege of letting boats on the Bronx river at Pelham Bridge, in addition to selling refreshments, has been given to Otto Schwenck, and permission has been given to Joseph Murray to establish and maintain a stand for the sale of newspapers at Bedford Park Station in Bronx Park.

5. For furnishing and delivering one Harrisburg steam road roller. W. R. Fleming, contractor; American Surety Company and William E. Keyes, sureties. Amount, \$3,800.

6. For furnishing and delivering trap-rock screenings. George F. Doak, contractor; Louis D. Beck and I. Warren S. Dey, sureties. Amount, \$2,490.

7. For erecting foundation walls, granite work, iron railing, etc., for paddock inclosures for cattle sheds near the Arsenal building. Stephen Ruddy, contractor; M. McGrath and Matthew Biglin, sureties. Amount, \$2,500.

8. For slate tanks, carpenter work, plumbing, tiling, etc., for the Aquarium in Castle Garden. Dey & Somerville, contractors; Richard Webber and John H. Deever, sureties. Amount, \$20,150.

9. For telephonic service for the year 1894. Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company, contractor; Horace W. Chipman and W. H. Wolverson, sureties. Amount, \$5,200.

10. For building a woman's cottage in Stuyvesant Square. J. Andrew McCloskey, contractor; James McGovern and Hugh S. Kelly, sureties. Amount, \$2,875.

11. For furnishing and delivering forage. Theodore P. Huffman, contractor; William Y. Frazee and Herman Reher, sureties. Amount, \$7,745.

12. For repairing, casing, finishing and equipping the American Museum of Natural History. James Baker Smith, contractor; American Surety Company and United States Guarantee Company, sureties. Amount, \$184,750.

The work of cleaning and concreting the pond near Fifty-ninth street and Fifth avenue, in Central Park, has been prosecuted by contract. 1,390 cubic yards of gravel have been furnished in place, and 1,790 cubic yards of concrete have been laid.

The improvement of the grounds around the Metropolitan Museum of Art was in progress at the beginning of the quarter and has continued to completion with the exception of the surfacing of the walks.

On the extension to East River Park the work of improvement has been prosecuted with a small force of men. It consisted of the excavation to subgrade of the walks through Eighty-seventh street and paving the substructure of the same, the shaping of grounds between Eighty-sixth and Eighty-seventh streets, the sodding of slopes below Eighty-seventh street, and in laying 3,500 square feet of rock asphalt pavement on the walks.

The building of the retaining-wall on the westerly side of Riverside Park, between Seventy-ninth and Ninety-sixth streets, which was suspended in January on account of the severe weather, was resumed early in April and is still in progress. The work done during the quarter was:

660 cubic yards foundation masonry.

900 cubic yards wall masonry.

20 lineal feet granite coping set.

18 cubic yards concrete laid.

184 lineal feet of 12-inch and 18-inch sewer pipe laid.

On the Parade Ground in Van Cortlandt Park the work embraced in the contract for regulating, grading and improving the easterly portion has been completed. The quantities of work are:

5,200 cubic yards earth excavated.

71,200 cubic yards filling put in place.

9 9-10 acres of ground seeded.

Of the construction work done under chapter 11 of the Laws of 1894, the widening of the bridle road, from One Hundred and Third street, East Drive, to Ninety-third street, West Drive, in Central Park, has been pushed rapidly and is now completed.



The improvement of that portion of the park from Ninety-seventh to One Hundred and Second street, between Fifth avenue and the East Drive, is still in progress. About 15,000 cubic yards of filling has been put in place.

In reconstructing the entrance drive, etc., at Fifth avenue and One Hundred and Second street, the roadway has been paved, drainage changed and the other improvements in connection therewith have been completed.

The work of improving Central Park, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, One Hundred and Fourth and One Hundred and Tenth streets, has consisted of excavation for walks, shaping of grounds and slopes, construction of stone substructure of walks and finishing the grounds. It is still under way.

Work on the walk entrance to Central Park at Fifth avenue and Eighty-fifth street, and the walk connecting Seventy-ninth street and Fifth avenue with the Ramble, has been progressed and is now in readiness for the blue-stone steps and surfacing of the walks.

The improvement of Manhattan Square by constructing walks, drainage on the west side of the Museum building has consisted during this quarter of shaping grounds and excavating for the building of an area wall; walks are also being constructed.

The work of improving Morningside Park north of One Hundred and Twentieth street and laying walks south of One Hundred and Twentieth street has been continued, and is approaching completion.

A stone substructure has been prepared for walks along the easterly and westerly sides of this park.

The tree planting along Central Park, West, between Ninety-seventh and One Hundred and Tenth streets, commenced in the previous quarter, has been completed.

The work of shaping grounds, excavation and filling, construction of walks, etc., on Riverside Park, between Seventy-ninth and One Hundred and Twenty-ninth streets, has been prosecuted during the quarter and is still in progress.

The regulating and grading of the roadway and walks of Cathedral Parkway, from Seventh avenue to Riverside Drive, commenced during the preceding quarter, is still in progress. The stone not required for filling has been removed and utilized for substructure of walks.

The rock work on the gore of land north of One Hundred and Fifty third street, between Seventh avenue and Macomb's Dam road, has been continued during the quarter and is not yet finished.

#### MAINTENANCE WORK.

The gardening force cared for the tulip beds and cultivated them at the different points where located. After the bloom of the tulips had faded, the beds were replanted with pansies, daisies, geraniums and the usual bedding plants for the summer. Decorative plants, palms, etc., were arranged around the music stand on the Mall in Central Park, and at the Dairy, Menagerie and other points on Central Park. Water-lilies were also planted out in the fountain basin, in the Central and City Parks down-town.

A part of the gardening force was also engaged in cutting out dead wood and in some instances, replanting trees and shrubs which it was found necessary to remove. The men at the greenhouses were employed in caring for the plants, stock, etc., at that point.

The regular maintenance force on the Central, City and Riverside Parks has been engaged on the routine work of cleaning, rolling, graveling and watering the drives, cleaning walks, lawns, basins, etc., and mowing lawns. The borders of the walks in the most frequented sections of the park have been sodded, many thousand feet of sod being used in this work. The cottages have been kept open in charge of attendants from 7 A. M. to 7 P. M., and many of the small parks down-town have been kept open until 12 midnight.

During this period the lawns of Central Park were opened for the use of those holding permits to play croquet, tennis, etc. During the months of May and June the lawns were used principally on Saturdays for children's picnic parties, thousands of children on each occasion availing themselves of the opportunity for these outings.

The season of park concerts also commenced during this quarter, the system being so arranged that a concert occurred daily in some park, and in many cases in more than one park. These concerts, except those in Central Park, were given at night and were attended by large numbers of people.

The asphalt walks of nearly all that portion of Central Park below Seventy-ninth street were repaired during this period.

The mechanical force of the Department has been engaged in the general repairs of buildings, settees, rolling stock, etc., the shoeing of horses and the operation of the bridges over the Harlem river.

The force at the Park Stables was engaged in caring for and grooming the Department horses and in making general repairs to the light wagons, harness, etc.

#### THE NEW PARKS AND PARKWAYS.

The regular maintenance work, including the care of roads, bridges, buildings, culverts, etc., has received proper attention, and a force of men and teams has been constantly at work upon the several works of construction, commenced during the previous quarter.

On Moshulu Parkway nearly 3,000 lineal feet of roadway 30 feet in width have been completed, including culverts for drainage.

The Old Boston Post road, where the same passes through Bronx Park for about the same length, has been converted into a macadamized road, 30 feet wide, of a durable character, with reconstructed sidewalks and cobble-paved gutters.

The work on Pelham avenue and Lorillard lane in Bronx Park has been completed and this avenue and lane are now in good condition.

About 1,800 feet of roadway has been constructed on Van Cortlandt lane and Grand avenue in Van Cortlandt Park, culverts rebuilt and the roads put in good condition generally.

On Crotona Park about 500 feet of the roadway of Franklin avenue have been reconstructed, holes and washouts filled up and culverts rebuilt.

About 70,000 cubic yards of stone have been broken up for macadamizing purposes and distributed where required on the roadways of the various parks and parkways north of Harlem river.

The work of cutting out and removing dead trees, underbrush, etc., on the new parks and parkways has left them in a much cleaner and safer condition. The wood is being utilized as fuel instead of coal wherever practicable, and the unused wood is being stored for future use.

At St. Mary's Park there has been under construction a roadway 15 feet in width and about 1,500 feet long.

During the quarter the work of erecting new fences around the cattle paddocks and painting the elephant, deer and monkey houses has been in progress and is now nearing completion.

#### PARK POLICE.

The Police force has been distributed over the Central and City Parks, including the New Parks over the Harlem river and beyond the city limits in the usual manner as best calculated to meet the needs for Police protection and for protecting the property of the city. At the close of the quarter the force, including all grades, numbered 304. Of this number 27 are mounted, 174 perform duty on Central Park, 25 on Riverside Park, 68 on the small parks on Manhattan Island, and 28 on the new parks and parkways.

105 lost children, 78 boys and 27 girls, were taken to Police Headquarters or restored to their homes during the quarter.

66 lost articles were found on the parks, which were subject to reclamation and sold if not claimed.

42 accidents, 2 of which were fatal, have occurred in the parks; one man was thrown out of his wagon in Central Park and killed, and one man was killed by the railroad in Van Cortlandt Park.

43 collisions have occurred on the drives in Central Park; 87 runaways during the quarter, 57 of which were stopped by Mounted Police, 20 by Police on foot and 12 by drivers, or escaped from the park.

1 team and truck, 3 teams and wagons, 23 wagons, 5 horses, and 30 horses and wagons were taken to the Park Stables during the quarter.

2 horses and wagons, 1 horse and cab, 2 ponies and 9 dogs were impounded in the Park Stables and 13 horses and 11 cows in the Public Pound at Fordham.

10 men committed suicide during the quarter; 6 in Central Park, 1 in Pelham Bay Park, 1 in Van Cortlandt Park, 1 in High Bridge Park and 1 in Battery Park.

5 persons have attempted suicide during the quarter, 2 men and 1 woman in the Central Park, 1 man at East River Park and one woman at City Hall Park.

117 persons were taken sick or injured in the parks and were cared for.

5 persons were rescued from drowning during the quarter.

1 boy was drowned in Harlem Meer.

The dead bodies of 6 infants were found and taken to the Morgue, 3 from Central Park, 1 from Crotona Park, 1 from Morningside Park and 1 from the Battery Park.

1 Roundsman and 1 Patrolman have died during the quarter.

3 officers have been injured during the quarter.

#### METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVATORY.

Monthly tables have been printed for distribution to home and foreign observatories and libraries; weekly reports have been published in the CITY RECORD and issued to the newspapers; weekly and hourly reports to the Health Department, and meteorological information has been supplied to the Law Department and the courts.

The Board proceeded to open estimates for furnishing sawed spruce timber under Contract No. 490; for furnishing and delivering about 600 tons of anthracite coal under Contract No. 491; for dredging north of West Thirty-fourth street, on the North river, under Contract No. 492; and for dredging on the East and Harlem rivers, under Contract No. 493, a representative of the Comptroller being present.

Resolved, That the contract opened this day for dredging north of West Thirty-fourth street on the North river, under Contract No. 492, be and hereby is awarded to Charles Du Bois, he being the lowest bidder, subject to the approval of the sureties by the Comptroller.

Resolved, That the contract opened this day for dredging on the East and Harlem rivers, under Contract No. 493, be and hereby is awarded to the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company, it being the lowest bidder, subject to the approval of the sureties by the Comptroller.

The bids of John C. Orr and Bell Brothers for furnishing sawed spruce timber being a tie.

On motion, the awarding of said contract was postponed.

A representative of Stokes & Thedford appeared and submitted an application to use the bulkhead between Piers, new 59 and 60, North river.

On motion, permission was granted Stokes & Thedford to use and occupy said bulkhead during the pleasure of the Board until May 1, 1895, provided they pay as compensation for said privilege the sum of \$3.50 per day and wharfage, and agree also to pay the arrears of rental and wharfage due from Charles L. Whitman at said bulkhead.

Howard Carroll appeared and submitted a communication from John H. Starin declining to sign an agreement prepared by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company.

On motion, the matter was tabled for one week.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 10th instant were read and approved.

The communication from the George Ringler Brewing Company, requesting permission to extend their salt-water pipe through the bulkhead foot of East Ninety-first street, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The communication from the Department of Public Charities and Correction, complaining of interference by vessels with the landing of their steam launch at East Sixty-fourth street, was referred to the Dock Master.

The application of Duryea Brothers to construct a platform near the foot of Jackson street, East river, and to erect a shed thereon, in accordance with plans and specifications submitted, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief.

The following permits were granted:

New Haven Steamboat Company—To repair Pier 26, East river, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief; the work to be kept within existing lines.

Occident Dock Company—To repair a leak in the water-pipe connecting with Pier, new 59, North river, the work of taking up and relaying the pavement to be done by this Department at the cost and expense of said company.

L. E. Blake—To load one scow-load of cellar dirt at the bulkhead near the foot of West Seventy-ninth street, under the supervision of the Dock Master.

On motion, ordered to be placed on file:

From the Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Approving form of Contracts Nos. 490, 491, 492 and 493.

2d. Inclosing blank form of lease for use where the right to collect wharfage and cranes is sold at public auction, with his approval as to form indorsed thereon. The Secretary directed to have a sufficient number of copies printed.

3d. Inclosing duplicate copies of lease to Candee & Smith of the bulkhead between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets, East river, with his approval as to form indorsed thereon. The officers of the Board authorized to execute.

4th. Requesting three copies of maps of premises sought to be acquired between Bank and Bethune streets, North river, from Augustus W. Cruikshank, agent, and between Watts and Canal streets, North river, from the Kingsland estate. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to furnish the same.

From the Department of Public Charities and Correction—Requesting repairs to the dock at East One Hundred and Fifteenth street. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair if necessary.

From the Police Department—Stating that the request of the 10th instant, to detail an officer to prevent illegal dumping of snow and ice at the various places designated, was referred to the Superintendent.

From the International Navigation Company—Submitting plans for a shed on the sixty-five feet of bulkhead in the vicinity of Dey street leased June 26, 1894. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report.

From Sherman Petrie—Agreeing to raise the sunken barge at the foot of East Eighty-sixth street for salvage, if the Department will locate it. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to furnish the information.
