Dear Sirs-Repeatedly myself and neighbors have complained to the Police and the Health Departments in reference to the nuisance at the New York Theatre every night after the performance is over of the calling of the numbers of the carriages.

I have lost through this noise a number of my best boarders, who were unable to sleep at night before twelve o'clock, as from eleven to twelve there is a continual din of noise and shouting of the calling of numbers in front of my house and all the way down the block.

I see that the Criterion Theatre has done away with this noise and nuisance, and the neighbors have informed me that there is no more noise or disturbance when the carriages are being called at that theatre, as they have some form of electric signaling which does away with the shouting.

You would oblige me very much if you will take steps to have this nuisance

stopped.

The Janitor's Society, assembled in special meeting, have formulated the following resolution as the expression of their earnest desires and sincere opinions that Whereas, The health and welfare of the people of The City of New York depend largely upon the conditions of the crowded centre of population, and

Whereas, Cleanliness is an essential requisite to the proper sanitary life of such district, and

Whereas, The population of the East Side is closely crowded into tenement

Whereas, We, as the custodians of these tenements, are keenly aware of the utter lack of facilities for bathing and personal cleanliness in the tenement houses of this quarter, and Whereas, We believe that an establishment of public baths on the East Side is

of the utmost crying necessity to the welfare of all the people of this district, and incidentally of the City at large; therefore be it

Resolved, That we, the Janitors' Association of the City of New York do hereby carnestly petition the Mayor of The City of New York, the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, the Comptroller of The City of New York, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, and also the President of the Borough of Manhattan, to take immediate action to establish on the lower East Side as large a number of public baths as the available funds of The Care can erect. Be it further

Resolved, That we call to the attention of the above officials that if a ratio baths to the population as exists in the city of London obtained in The City of New York to-day, the east side of the city should have 140 public baths, and that we earnestly petition these officials to work as rapidly as possible toward the final establishment of this proper number of public baths. Be it further

Resolved, That we urge upon the above officials that the establishment of these baths is of such importance that it should not be postponed to any other public enterprise, and that the project of the establishment of public baths on the East Side is of such prime importance that it demands immediate action on the part of

the officials of The City of New York and Borough of Manhattan. Be it further
Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Mayor of The City
of New York, to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, to the Comptroller of The City of New York, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of
The City of New York. and to the President of the Borough of Manhattan, with

The appropriation proposed for contingencies and emergencies is as small as is

consistent with safety and efficient administration.

From the Contingent and Emergency Fund must be paid the contingent expenses of the Bureau, such as postage on the thousands of letters and notices sent from the

item is likely to be large because of the extent of the inspection districts-cost of badges and miscellaneous office expenses. From this fund must also be paid the cost of necessary emergency work provided for by section 157 of the Building Code, in rendering temporarily safe buildings, or parts thereof, that from fire or other causes are threatened with immediate collapse, thus endangering life or property. The amounts thus paid are charges against the property and are subsequently colfected from the owners of the property.

I beg to state that the salaries proposed in accompanying schedule are made with a view of equalizing salaries in accordance with the character of the services rendered, as recommended in the communication of his Honor the Mayor, dated

January 6, 1902. To enable the Bureau of Buildings of the Borough of The Bronx to discharge with efficiency and promptness the duties devolved upon it by State statutes and the city Charter, and to properly entorce the provisions of the Building Code, a minimum force of eighty-one officials is necessary, divided as follows:

To pay the salaries of this force and the other necessary expenses of the Bureau for the ten months ending December 31, 1902, an appropriation of \$98,000 is needed. There has been expended for January and February for salaries...... \$10,892 65

Reasons why a smaller number of officials and a smaller appropriation than the one asked for will not suffice for the Bureau; Bronx Borough has an area of more than forty (40) square miles, twice the area

of Manhattan Borough. The present population of Bronx Borough is not less than two hundred and thirty thousand, and is increasing at the rate of from twenty-five thousand to thirty

thousand a year. The Bronx Borough is growing and developing more rapidly than any other community in the United States. The last Federal Census shows that in the decade from 1890 to 1900 the population of Bronx Borough increased 127.70 per cent as against an increase of 37.90 in the population of the entire City of New York. Iu the same period the population of Brooklyn increased 30.12 and of Manhattan 29.02 per cent. This great growth in population is, of course, accompanied by a corresponding increase in building operations of every character, and steadily adds to

the volume of work devolving upon the Building Bureau. More than two thousand applications are filed each year for new buildings, alterations, searches and examinations. To properly docket, examine and pass upon the plans for new buildings and alterations, and to exercise diligent supervision over the work of construction, and examine existing structures, so as to protect the interests and insure the safety of the people who inhabit them, requires the unremitting endeavor of the entire office force, examiners and inspectors, included in the appropriation asked for. The correspondence and outside service of papers entailed by this volume of business is a very large item.

In order that the supervision of construction work and alterations and the work of plumbing and drainage may be thorough and efficient, it is necessary to divide the borough into not less than twenty construction districts, and twelve plumbing and drainage districts; each district is in charge of an Inspector, who is held to a rigid accountability for the proper discharge of the duties devolving upon him.

One of the inspection districts contains nine square miles, another eight, and the

average is nearly four square miles.

Ninety per cent of the new buildings erected in The Bronx are tenement or apartment houses and manufacturies. The apartments and tenement houses are inhabited by from three to twenty families, and as many as a thousand people are employed in some of the factories.

Buildings of this character should be subjected to the closest scrutiny and inspection, because of the large number of people who live in them or are employed in them.

Especially important is this matter of vigilant inspection, while the work of construction is under way, for the reason that many of the structures are erected by of the Bureau, such as postage on the thousands of letters and notices sent from the Bureau, car fares of the Inspectors and Messengers incurred in their tours—this ing, and then sell out as quickly as possible. If Inspectors' districts are too large, the work of inspection will be superficial or neglected altogether, and faults in construction and deficient plumbing and drainage must result.

The increased and improved rapid transit facilities now assured to the Borough of the Bronx have already stimulated the growth of the borough, and augment the necessity for an efficient Bureau of Buildings. In order to make the bureau a practical advantage to the borough, and a benefit to the people, it must be properly manned.

Large building operations are already projected along the line of the Underground Rapid Transit Railroad, and apartment and tenement houses are now being crected so as to be ready for the new population which will move into the territory north and east of the Harlem river, when the underground road is opened and in operation from the City Hall to West Farms. It is certain that, beginning with the present year, there will be a very large increase in the number of buildings of every kind to be erected in The Bronx, and this will add to the work and responsibilities of the Bureau of Buildings.

The Borough includes more than one hundred former villages or districts, each

representing a centre of population and of building activity.

More than fifteen hundred cases of violation of the Building Laws and of unsafe buildings in Bronx Borough came to the new Building Bureau from the old City Department of Buildings; each of these cases requires re-examination and special report. This large number of violations and unsafes is mainly the accumulation of the year 1901, and is due to the fact that under the old regime, when building inspection in The Bronx was managed from the Borough of Manbattan, the work was not and could not be thoroughly done despite the best efforts of the district Inspectors and other officials of the Manhattan Building Department. Builders, and especially speculative builders, took chances. If fifteen hundred cases accumulated in a single year, it is safe to assume that a very large number of violations escaped notice.

The organization of the new Tenement House Commission will not substantially reduce the work to be done by the Building Bureau. The Tenement House Commission is responsible only for the supervision of the light and ventilation of new and old tenement houses and fire-escape provisions effecting old tenements. The Bureau of Buildings is responsible for the method of construction, the quality of materials and the plumbing and drainage of all new buildings, and for the safety of every building, new or old, within its territory.

The examination of light and ventilation plans for new tenements is the only work transferred to the new Tenement House Commission, which will effect the volume of labor performed by the old Department of Buildings. In the Borough of The Bronx this will amount perhaps to the labor of one Plan Examiner and two outside Inspectors.

The strictest economy will be exercised and enforced by the Superintendent of Buildings in the conduct of the business of the Building Bureau of the Borough of The Bronx. Not a penny of the public funds will be wasted, nor an unnecessary or incompetent official employed. The watchwords of the Bureau will be "integrity and efficiency," coupled with a determination to give good and prompt service to the citizens who have business with the Bureau, and protect the interests and assure the safety of the great public, which will find homes or employment in the thousands of houses, apartments and factories to be erected in Bronx Borough.

Department of Health, City of New York, Union Avenue, Jamaica, Borough of Queens, New York, March 12, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen-I have the honor to call your attention to the statement of salaries of officers, etc., of the Department of Health, Borough of Queens, which is embodied in the revised Departmental Estimates for 1902 now before you, and which appears on page 1434 of the "City Record" of March 11, 1902; and I hereby respectfully protest against the suggested reduction of my salary as Assistant Chief Clerk from \$2,500 to \$2,000 per year, for the following reasons:

First-That the position of Assistant Chief Clerk is classed by the Municipal Civil Service Commission in the Sixth Grade-Senior Clerks-Schedule B., the fixed limit of compensation for such positions being "more than \$2,000, but not more than \$2,500." Therefore, reduction to \$2,000 would be in violation of the Civil Service rules and would take from me a right which such rules vested in me.

The first clause of Rule 37 of the Civil Service rules says: "An increase of salary of other compensation holding an office or position within the scope of rules beyond the limit fixed for the grade in which such office or position is classified, shall be deemed a promotion." Two thousand dollars is below the limit fixed for the sixth grade, and should I be de-graded, the rules would compel me to take an examination for promotion back to my present grade. Section 15, chapter 195, Laws

of 1900, also applies in this case. Second-The suggested reduction would conflict with the spirit and intent of section 56 of the new Charter, which reads as follows: "Salaries need not be uniform thruoghout the several boroughs for positions of like character, but may, in the discretion of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be made to consist of two elements: First, remuneration for work done, which shall be the same throughout all the boroughs for positions of like character. Second, an additional sum based upon an estimate of the prevailing rentals and expenses of living in the borough

where the services rendered are performd, and which may vary in the several

No change is suggested in the revised estimates of the salaries of the Assistant Chief Clerks in Manhattan and Brooklyn, notwithstanding the fact that the duties of the positions in Queens are far more exacting, although the volume may not be so great; the former, however, are provided with adequate clerical help, while in Queens there is none.

There certainly is not \$500 a year difference in the living expenses and rentals of an Assistant Chief Clerk in Queens, Manhattan and Brooklyn; as a matter of fact, the cost of living in Jamaica, where your petitioner is stationed, is 10 per cent. greater than in Manhattan or Brooklyn.

Permit me also to call your attention to the fact that no reduction is proposed in the salaries of the Assistant Sanitary Superintendent and Assistant Registrar of Records of Queens, which are the same in all boroughs, and yet the same arguments for reduction should hold good in their cases as in that of Assistant Chief Clerk.

I respectfully request that I may be accorded a hearing before your honorable Board, before final action is taken in the matter of fixing the salaries of my position. Respectfully yours

The Justices of the Supreme Court at the Trial and Special Terms in the First Department ask that your Board make an appropriation of \$12,000 for supplies to be used in the building known as the County Courthouse. Gas, electric light, telephone and ice are included in the term supplies. As near as I make it we shall need an appropriation of at least \$12,000 for the supplies above mentioned. Heretofore the supplies have come through the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, and it is impossible for me now to tell what the exact cost of supplies has been.

Labor, Maintenance and Supplies,

The sums allowed in previous years for this purpose have been found totally inadequate to properly maintain the seven hundred and twenty-two (722) miles of streets in the borough, there being three hundred and eighty-eight (388) miles of macadam roadways alone, which require constant attention in the way of resurfacing and general repairs. The peculiar topography of the Borough of Queens, embracing as it does many miles of what may be termed country districts, with a well-defined system of macadam roads and at the same time important Summer resorts, such as Rockaway Beach, Far Rockaway, Arverne and Edgemere, having a large transient population, makes the maintenance of its macadam and Peekskill gravel roads a difficult and expensive process.

For the past four years this class of streets have not received the care due them. by reason of the small sum available, and they are, as a consequence, badly in need of resurfacing and in some instances should be practically rebuilt.

To carry out all the conditions contained in these various sections above stated, requires (as has been previously done in the Borough of The Bronx and with the apparent success in its development) a first class topographical survey to be made of nearly the entire borough (with the exception of Long City, which has had an official map established and monumented, including the grades of the street system and the sewers therein to be constructed, etc., all as based on a topographical survey before made in the manner and accuracy employed in Morrisania, and continued throughout the Borough of The Bronx to the Long Island Sound).

But it must, however, be stated that owing to the changes in the trunk sewer routes in Long Island City, and discharging of the sewer systems into Newtown creek being prohibited by the State Board of Health, an entire overhauling of the Long Island City official sewer system will have to be performed, necessitating

probable grade changes of the street system owing to this cause alone.

Other localities in the borough like Woodside, Winfield, Corona, Middle Village, Maspeth, Flushing, Richmond Hill, Jamaica, Hollis, College Point, Whitestone, Bayside, etc., have street systems, but very few official maps can be found giving the entire necessary dimensions, monument locations (if any), grades (not to mention sewer systems at all), neither can any topographical surveys be traced, with the exception of a part of Jamaica or Flushing, or College Point, where grade systems are established and on file, but the entire street systems, for instance, as enumerated, will have to be resurveyed, all dwellings, property lines, etc., located and connected together by one system for the future mapping of the final plan of the borough, which plan when completed will show:

A. The entire dimensions of each block, all its angles, radiuses of curves, when so bounded, length of arcs, etc.

B. The positions of all street monuments, as set, or to be set, at the necessary

corners, not less than one for each block. C. The elevations of all monuments with regard to the established datum line

of the borough.

D. The grade of each street or avenue, etc., by a figure written at the intersection of streets together with the necessary rates, to indicate the crowns in streets (if any), also all depressions or abrupt changes between street intersections.

The sewer system, to wit, the size and inclination of the sewer in each street its elevation above datum line or its depths with regard to the established street grade. The making of the grade maps of the street system and the establishing of the sewer system specially demands the knowledge of the entire present surface of the borough with some possible exceptions as before stated. Said surface is to be determined by leveling, extended over the same, and taken at the corners of squares a hundred (100) feet by one hundred (100) feet contained in a network of such connected by traverse surveying with the triangulation stations, etc. In hilly and steep places the levels are taken much oftener. By means of these levels, so described, original surfaces which may have been entirely excavated may be re-established in future times, also similarly a low stretch of land which may have been filled in can be traced to its original state (often of great value in public works in both cases).

The topographical maps are usually drawn at a scale of 80 feet to 1 inch, and, from a record of the present state of the borough, they are prepared by the Draughtsmen of the bureau, simultaneously, as the work of surveying progresses; the surveys for the present are referred to a system of "topographical" monuments intervisible from each other, of which a large number has already been set in the Second Ward, and some in the Third. The topographical surveys so far completed are referred to these monuments, which, when connected among themselves by traverses, are also connected with the triangulation stations, of which a number are already established and connected with said monuments.

The topographical maps, when completed, show by contour lines, usually vertically equally apart (lines of equal elevation above meant high water mark datum as established for the Topographical Survey of Queens Borough), the various division lines of the water sheds of utmost value to the exact determination of the drainage districts, and from them emanating the calculation of the size of the various conduits of the sewer system. The grades of the streets, of course, are established, simultaneously, using also the results of the topographical survey.

High and low water elevations are also established by actual surveys and recorded on the topographical maps in order to show the local influence of the tide with regard to the depth of sewers discharging in their vicinity into the sound or It seems, therefore, to be of the utmost importance to complete the topo graphical survey of the borough as soon as practicable, in order to get the necessary topographical maps upon which, as already stated, the street systems are based, in order to make the improvement permanent, and principally with regard to grades to be established, thereby saving all expenses due to later costly changes; it is only necessary to mention how important it is in what manner streets are to cross the numerous railroad lines on grade, under or over, and its influence on the adjacent territory; furthermore, there can be no doubt that the improvement of many a tract of land is delayed, owing to the lack of the established map, whereby, in addition to the loss of taxes, the city will frequently lose the ceding of the street beds to the same, and later expensive proceedings will have to be instituted to acquire the same, not to speak of damages which will arise if new private street lay-outs do not conform later with official map. Permanent important improvements depending on an official plan can only be economically carried out when forming a part of the whole map, and, if carried out disconnectedly, will surely sometime interfere more or less with others and create probably considerable extra expenditures.

Particular attention is called to section 439 of the Charter, which requires the

triangulation to be completed on or before the first day of January, 1907 The allowed appropriation for maps for street openings is also inadequate, as before stated in general, the fact being that up to date 28 proceedings are demanded to be immediately completed, the necessary damage surveys representing a total length of about 22 miles, of which about 13 miles longitudinal profiles have to be

length of about 38 miles. Taking into account the additional labor of drawing maps, making searches among records and filed maps, etc., computations of the damage areas, it may safely be stated that with the present force, comparing with the former results in furnishing and making damage maps for street openings, as to the time consumed, it would take more than this year's entire time left and even a great part of next year (not men tioning even the subsequent demands for final damage and benefit maps) to complete the maps now demanded.

The list of positions whose salaries amount to the aforesaid \$10,000 is comprised of Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Clerks and Stenographer, etc., and no provision for Inspectors is made.

It is needless to say that the utility of the Bureau of Buildings would certainly come to an end without the assistance of Inspectors.

With the inadequate appropriations for the boroughs of Queens and Richmond of \$23,500, including Contingency Fund and Commissioner's Salary, Queens should be entitled to 85 per cent. of the appropriation on account of doing 85 per cent. of fire was attended by an inexperienced man the work in Queens, which would be for-

For the past year the Department of Buildings in the Borough of Queens continually was overworked, both in the office and in the supervision of buildings. In order that a record of the approvals, modifications, fire-escape notices, unsafes, etc., be kept, the Superintendent, Inspectors and Clerks were often kept busy until 8 o'clock p. m., and necessarily many inspections could not be made on account of insufficient help.

The average inspections required for 1,458 new buildings, based upon two inspections a week and averaging 12 weeks for each building, would mean: Required inspections (2 tests)...... 24,992

4,165 Plumbing inspections (2 tests)..... This does not include inspections on alterations, which would mean 527 alterations; average inspections 8 for each building..... 4,216

In asking for two additional Carpenters, two Painters and two Plumbers, I believe a saying can be effected and the work done more expeditiously than at present on order. There are continually small repairs necessary to be made to the various buildings, and in many cases the estimates submitted by Carpenters, Painters and Plumbers for such work are excessive.

The additional male and female Cleaners asked for are absolutely necessary to keep the public buildings and offices in a cleanly condition, which they are not in at present, owing to the limited number of Cleaners at our command; we must therefore have the additional Cleaners to put the ofices in the proper condition and keep them so.

The additional Stokers are also necessary, as two of the large buildings under my care are without Stokers and the Janitors are unable to attend to the furnaces and properly perform their other duties.

During the past month the furnace in the Town Hall, Jamaica, was greatly damaged, owing to the fact that no Stoker is provided for in this building and the

This plan no doubt would be adopted in this borough is the baths were provided. I consider this question an urgent necessity and trust you may be able to afford the people that which they so much desire. The population of the First Ward of the Borough of Queens in 1900 was 48,272 and at the presen time probably exceeds 50,000.

Under the Commissioner of Public Works, it was found necessary to combine the bookkeeping of the several bureaus. William Chambers was therefore transferred from the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices and made General Bookkeeper, and Thomas F. Moran, from the Bureau of Sewers, as Bookkeeper.

An Office Boy is needed for the Assistant Commissioner and one for the Bookkeeper; \$2,250 is a moderate salary for the General Bookkeeper in view of greatly increased duties; it is the former figure and compares favorably with other boroughs. The salaries of Secretary to Commissioner of Public Works and Junior Clerk in his office are those now paid.

We succeeded, above five years since, in having the Public Dump removed from this pier and the pier repaired. It afterward was rebuilt and the upper part or second story used for a Recreation Pier. The first story can be used for steamboat traffic and not interfere with the full use of the upper part for recreation purposes. The population north of Eighty-sixth street and below the Harlem river is over 600,000. Any of these wishing to use the Hudson river steamboats are compelled to go either to Twenty-second or Desbrosses streets. If the owner, lessee, agent or other person in charge of any building in The City of New York shall fail to provide, place and keep such number or numbers upon such building, the President of the Borough shall send by mail to such person a copy of this ordinance, and if the same is not complied with within thirty days after said notice has been mailed to such owner, lessee, agent or other person in charge of the building, the said President of the Borough shall cause the proper number or numbers of said building to be provided, affixed or placed upon said building in the manner prescribed by this ordinance, the plate upon which the numbers are placed to be of blue or black porcelaine, or similar material, and the numbers thereon to be of white enamel, or other material.

Every owner, lessee, agent or other person in charge of any building in The City of New York, who shall fail or neglect to comply with the provisions of this ordinance within thirty days after the notice above provided for has been mailed to such person, shall be fined twenty-five dollars (\$25), which shall be duly sued for and

Sec. 4. The President of the Borough is authorized to determine what the proper number or numbers of each building are.


