### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

### Quarterly Report, Three Months Ending June 30, 1905.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted the quarterly report of the designs for improvement, work accomplished and finances of the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, for the three months ending June 30, 1905.

Bronx Park.

The bridge over the Bronx river at the crossing of the Bronx and Pelham parkway has been completed, and final estimate was rendered on May 31, 1905.

The work on contract for addition to the green-houses will probably be completed before the end of August of this year. All the masonry work is completed, the iron work is in place and most of the glass work has been put in.

Four hundred feet of 12-inch drain pipe was laid in the ball field.

Rock was removed, and the approach to the Zoological Park terraced.

Three hundred feet of walk on the Boston road was finished.

In the green-house the usual work was carried on, such as preparing soil for potting, propagating plants for use in the various parks and squares, preparing hotbeds and repotting various plants as the season required.

One new clay tennis court was constructed

One new clay tennis court was constructed. In the workshops all tools were kept in repair, also the iron work on sprinklers, carriages, carts, etc.; carriages, monitors and carts were painted, and repairs were

Trees and shrubs were cultivated in the nurseries.

### Botanical Garden in Bronx Park.

The entrance to the Botanical Garden from Mosholu parkway has been com-ted, and final estimate was rendered on May 15, 1905.

Work on the five-arch stone bridge, just north of the Blue Bridge, was resumed on April 1 and has progressed very satisfactorily ever since. The contract will probably be completed about August 1 of this year.

The arch on the one-arch stone bridge, just north of the Museum Building, has been turned; the wing walls and facings on same have been finished to the bottom line of the cornice; the foundations for the bridge are in, and the contract will probably be completed before September I of this year.

A handsome bronze fountain has been erected in the Botanical Garden, in front of the Botanical Museum, and has been very much admired by the many visitors to

At the Mosholu entrance to the Botanical Garden the abutments were not completed in the last contract, and a contract has been let to continue the wing wall of this abutment and fill in between these wing walls, and construct the telford approach to the bridge, making this approach complete. The work is now in progress. In the same contract it was arranged to make the approach to the Woodlawn Bridge more complete, that is, to make a telford macadam road, with retaining wall and a flight of granite steps, so as to make a more direct entrance to the main part of the Botanical Garden.

### Zoological Park in Bronx Park.

Plans and specifications have been prepared, and contract advertised, for the erection of a small camel house in the Zoological Park. This contract will be awarded on July 6, and the work will be commenced at once.

For the elaborate improvement of the approaches to Baird Court, plans and specifications have been prepared. The walls will be faced, a handsome entrance built at the northerly end, a flight of granite steps, etc. This improvement will cost in the neighborhood of \$80,000.

Plans and specifications have also been prepared for the erection of a glass court addition to the bird house which has just been completed. This will consist of a glass house addition, with cages for the birds; and it is designed to build these cages in such a way, furnishing plenty of light and air, that the surroundings may be as realistic and comfortable as possible for the birds.

On the contract for the pheasants' aviary, the concrete work, the plastering and rough casts, and the roofing are finished; the half-timber work is in place, and the cages are now being set. The work will be completed this month.

Plans and specifications are also in the hands of the printer for the following improvements in the Zoological Park, and the work will be commenced as soon as the contracts are awarded: Public comfort station, men's and women's toilets, and a flight of granite steps.

### Bronx and Pelham Parkway.

Broken stone and screenings are now being delivered for the resurfacing of this roadway. The enormous traffic of automobiles, etc., wears away the screening surface very rapidly, and it requires frequent resurfacing. We have purchased a steam scarifier and road roller for the purpose of putting the surface of this important parkway in

This parkway has been terraced; the sidewalk regulated and graded; borders and gutters sodded east of White Plains avenue; and a bicycle path 600 feet in length has been constructed.

At the foot of the river, a dry wall 250 feet long has been built.

At Pelham avenue and White Plains road, 200 feet of wire fence has been con-

structed.

A walk 150 feet long and 18 feet wide has been laid out at the approach to the

bridge, and the bank terraced.

At the west side of Bronx River Bridge, 100 feet of rock has been excavated and used for filling in the walk at One Hundred and Eighty-second street and Southern

The approach to the Zoological Garden has been terraced, 300 feet of walk on Boston road finished, and all washouts repaired.

### Pelham Bay Park.

An addition is being made to the bath houses for the purpose of doubling their capacity. This work is being done by park labor, and will probably be completed in the course of a week or two. These bath houses have proven to be a most popular improvement. They are visited by hundreds of people daily, and the capacity has been entirely inadequate

A trotting track has been laid out in this park, near Bronx and Pelham parkway. It varies from 50 to 80 feet in width, and, when completed, will add very greatly to the attractiveness of this Park, which is yearly becoming more and more popular with the people from all parts of the Greater City.

The Shore road, leading from the Eastchester Bridge around Glover's Rock, is being widened to 30 feet, its present width, 16 feet, being inadequate to the great traffic. This work is being done by park labor, and will be completed about September 1 of this year. The surfacing of the road with stone received from the park crusher will be completed about December 1, of this year. The stone crusher has been in operation for the past three months preparing broken stone for the surfacing of this road.

Owing to the difficulty encountered on account of low tides, the work on the wooden bridge from the mainland to Hunter Island has progressed very slowly. All that remains to be finished now, however, is the removal of the old causeway below low water, and this will be completed within the present month.

Plans and specifications have been prepared, and are in the hands of the printer, for the erection of a toilet house in this park, near the present bath houses, and the work will be begun as soon as the contract has been awarded.

The nine-hole golf links in this park have been extended to an eighteen-hole course. This work, which has been done by park labor, is practically completed. The course is now in use, and is very popular among the residents of the neighborhood.

The old drinking fountain for horses, at Pelham parkway, was removed, and a new

fountain erected.

In the cutting away of a large bank, 1,100 yards of earth was removed and used for filling in and grading the roadway. Six hundred feet of wall was built on one side of the road to hold the fill. Eight new culverts were made and five hundred feet of bank was terraced. Rock was excavated and crushed and used for covering 1,000 feet of road with gravel.

Seven flower-beds were planted with pansies.

Fifty acres of new ploughed lands were harrowed and grass seed sown.

A rustic fence was built around the athletic field.

### Mosholu Parkway.

Work was resumed on the contract for the improvement of Mosholu parkway early in the spring and has progressed rapidly ever since. The contract will be completed about October 1 of this year.

On the bridges over the railroad tracks and Webster avenue on this parkway the work has been completed, and final payment will be rendered in a day or two.

### Van Cortlandt Park.

The work of surfacing Vault Hill road has been completed, and a road has been built about 800 feet in length, leading to the tremper house. This was a very necessary improvement, as it was impossible for automobiles to reach the restaurant in the park on the old road.

The work of eliminating the dangerous grade crossing at Van Cortlandt station, which is being done jointly by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and the Department of Parks, is rapidly approaching completion and should be finished by August 1 of this year.

A new set of eighteen-hole golf links has been laid out in this park. This entailed considerable work in the way of preparing the grounds for these links, but they will be ready for use before the end of the season.

In the Colonial Garden forty dead trees and shrubs were removed and replaced

One thousand plants, twelve spruce trees and sixteen white birch trees were planted to replace those killed by the frost. Five flower beds were planted.

A new cricket ground was laid out and prepared for use.

Two hundred and sixty feet of 6-inch sewer pipe was laid under the new road. Also three cross drains of 8-inch sewer pipe, each 36 feet long, were laid, with catch basins, for drainage.

Three thousand feet of stone wall was removed and carted away.

### Crotona Park.

Plans and specifications have been prepared for two toilet buildings in this park, one to be erected near the Municipal Building, back of the grand-stand at the base-ball field. This building will be of brick, with green tile roofing. The other toilet will be built nearer the centre of the park, near Crotona avenue; this will be built of cobblestone and one-half timber work.

It is proposed to remove the rock on the north side of the Municipal Building, on Tremont avenue, in Crotona Park, so that the slopes will be similar to those on the Third avenue side; also to continue the wall now built on Third avenue around

Tremont avenue for a distance of about 350 feet from the corner. It is also proposed to build a flight of stone steps, and an approach to the tax office in the Municipal Building from Tremont avenue. This would obviate the necessity of going all the way around to the Third avenue approach to reach the tax office. Plans and specifications have been prepared, and application has been made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for funds to put through this important and essential improvement.

A path 10 feet wide and 470 feet long was constructed on the north side of the Municipal Building, Tremont avenue; also a road 20 feet wide and 350 feet long.

A road 25 feet wide and 700 feet long was constructed from the south side of the Municipal Building to One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street.

Banks east of the Municipal Building were graded; also the slope on the west

side of Arthur avenue.

A stone wall has been built along the road and under the grand-stand.

A bridge was built across Crotona lake.

In the improving of this park various paths and roads have been widened or repaired, curbs set, culverts built, drains laid and new tennis courts laid out, necessitating much work in carting earth and stone.

#### Macomb's Dam Park.

In this park seven lawn tennis courts were made and graded. Grass courts were

converted into clay courts.

A new athletic field is now in course of construction, east of Cromwell's creek,

on which is being laid out a quarter-mile running track.

A scow-load of ashes has been delivered and is used for filling along the Harlem river. The filling in of the low land under Central Bridge also continues.

#### St. Mary's Park.

Eighteen dead trees were removed from One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, east of St. Ann's avenue.

Fourteen elm trees were removed from One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, east of St. Ann's avenue, and planted on St. Ann's avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-third and One Hundred and Forty-sixth streets.

From the west side of the park 150 dead shrubs were removed, and 150 shrubs were transplanted on the west side of the park.

Fifty loads of ashes and fifty loads of screenings were carted to repair walks, 200 feet of walk and 300 feet of gutters were repaired.

The rustic hand-rail at the stables has been completed.

### Claremont Park.

Roads, walks, gutters, culverts, lawns, flower beds and comfort house have been cared for and repaired. Trees and shrubs have been pruned and rustic benches have been repaired.

### Franz Sigel Park.

Grass has been mowed, flower beds cared for and trees pruned. Vines were planted around the rocks.

Grass has been cut, walk edged and flower beds attended to. A terrace was constructed in the northern part of the park.

Sixteen elm trees and forty shrubs were removed and taken to the Van Cortlandt Park nurseries because of the work of regulating and grading now going on at that park.

### Miscellaneous.

The small parks and squares, also the unnamed plots, which number about 23, were given the care necessary to maintain a neat and attractive appearance. Flower beds were laid out and planted, grass seed sown and grass cut.

In the general maintenance work of the past quarter, trees and shrubs were pruned

In the general maintenance work of the past quarter, trees and shrubs were pruned and dead trees and stumps removed.

Twenty-three large ash trees were received, brought to the nursery and planted. Forty thousand pansies were planted in the various parks.

Sand was carted from Pelham Bay Park to the Bronx Park nursery to be used for potting plants and flowers.

Grass seed was sown where needed, grass plots were trimmed and weeded, tennis courts, polo fields and baseball diamonds kept in good condition, culverts cleaned, paths edged, washouts filled in, lawns mowed, low lands filled in, rubbish removed and golf links improved.

Five new lawn tennis courts were laid out in Crotona Park; 116 post holes were dug and the posts set, as these courts are to be enclosed.

Stone piers were built at the dock in Pelham Bay Park, and the bathing heach.



Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the Contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
