



## THE CITY RECORD.

The Board of CITY RECORD, &c., met in the Mayor's office Monday July 14, 1873.

Present—The Mayor, Commissioner of Public Works and Corporation Counsel.

A communication from J. C. Pinckney, clerk of the Common Council, requesting authority, under the provisions of Sec. 19, of Chap. 757, Laws of 1873, to print one thousand copies of the City Charter and the supplementary acts amendatory thereof, was read, and on motion received; and, on motion of Mr. Smith, the Board, by a concurrent vote, granted the same.

On motion of Mr. Smith, it was ordered that the price of THE CITY RECORD be reduced to five cents.

In accordance with Sec. 110, Chap. 335, Laws of 1873, the Department of Public Works makes the following report of its transactions for the week ending this day:

No contracts were executed.

A certificate of the amount to be assessed for regulating and grading Seventy-ninth street, between Ninth and Tenth avenues, has been made out and transmitted to the Board of Assessors.

The regulating and grading of One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, between Sixth and Eighth avenues, and the fencing of vacant lots in Fifty-first street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues, have been completed.

The Telford-Macadam pavement on Seventy-second street, between Eighth avenue and the Boulevard, has been finished and the street open to public travel.

Croton water was introduced in Fifty-sixth street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues, and in Eighty-third street between Ninth avenue and the Boulevard.

Three hundred and sixty-nine receiving basins have been cleaned. New lamps were ordered to be fitted up in Seventy-first street, between Second and Third avenues; on the south side of Fifty-fifth street, between Third and Lexington avenues, and one lamp at southwest corner of Fifty-third street and Fourth avenues. One lamp at Eighth avenue and Sixtieth street was ordered removed and discontinued.

Permits have been issued for the following purposes—viz.: Two for flagging sidewalks, twenty-three for placing building material on streets, and two for erecting street signs. Twenty-four complaints as to obstructions on streets were received.

On account of the reductions in appropriations Hosea Purcell, watchman at croton reservoirs, was removed, and the following reductions of salaries were made:

M. A. Kellogg, engineer-in-chief, boulevard and avenues, from \$6,000 to \$5,000 per annum.

L. D. V. Mason, assistant engineer, from \$3,000 to \$2,500 per annum.

A. J. Miner, inspector of sewer connections, from \$4.50 to \$4 per day.

Julius Boh, inspector of sewer connections, from \$4.50 to \$4 per day.

O. N. Cunningham, inspector of sewer connections, from \$4.50 to \$4 per day.

Two foremen on croton repairs, from \$4.75 to \$4.00 per day.

One foreman of painters, from \$4 to \$3 per day.

The decrease in the laboring force of the Department is one foreman, fifty-eight men and one cart.

The total amount of requisitions drawn on the Comptroller by the Department during the week is \$254,735.33.
