CROTON PIPES.

Work laying Croton pipes for a better distribution and circulation of water throughout the city, expense of which is charged to Croton Water Main Fund, has been actively prosecuted.

The men employed repairing six-feet pipes on account of repairs to aqueduct are still retained. For repairing and renewals of pipes, stop-cocks, &c., the three gangs of men employed have been kept busy. This work has been well performed, and I am pleased to state that no serious losses have been sustained owing to leaks or breaks in the mains or service pipes.

The length of pipes, sizes, &c., are given in the report of the Chief Engineer of the Croton and the control of the Croton of the Cro

STREET PAVEMENTS.

The Belgian and cobble pavements of this city have been put in as good condition as the limited appropriation would admit of. The moneys appropriated for repairs are now about exhausted, and there are many localities where the pavements will have to be left in bad order until next season for want of funds to pay for materials and labor.

The appropriation for repairs to wooden and concrete pavements has been mainly expended on repairs to pavements in the lower part of the city, where the traffic is not only the greatest, but the weight transported on the vehicles the heaviest.

Some of the wooden pavements above Fourteenth street are now in very bad condition, and are daily becoming worse. Seventh avenue, between Fourteenth and Fitty-ninth streets, is at present in some places almost impassable, and will require a large expenditure to put it in a fair condition to give the necessary facilities for safe traveling of vehicles in that portion of the city.

The Aqueduct has been kept in repair and has delivered an uninterupted supply of water.

On the 8th avenue, between 85th and 96th streets, thirty-one of the six foot cast iron pipes cracked and broken by unequal settlement and contraction, have been replaced or repaired.

The very dry weather of June continued through July to the 15th August, during which time an average of 60,000,000 gallons of water per day was drawn from the storage reservoir and natural lakes of Putnam County, in addition to the supply furnished by the natural flow of the Croton River.

During the drought more than 3,000,000,000 gallons was drawn from the stored water. The gates of the storage reservoir and natural lakes were closed as soon as the natural flow of the river would furnish a full supply, and these sources of supply are again filling.

The work of extending the distribution of the Croton Water, and increasing the supply in the er part of the city has been vigorously prosecuted.

The laying of the large pipes on 10th avenue, between 93d and 113th streets, to carry the Croton Water in place of the Aqueduct directed to be removed, is rapidly approaching completion. During the last quarter 7,500 lineal feet of 48 inch pipe has been laid, 930 cubic yards of hydraulic stone masonry laid and 780 lineal feet of sewer built, including 100 feet across the avenue, at 98th

SIR-In accordance with the directions contained in your circular letter of the 18th ultimo I and 1873, during the quarter ending October 31st, 1873: herewith submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the quarter ending October 31st, 1873.

In Exhibit A will be found an abstract of all vouchers transmitted from the Bureau during the quarter, showing a total expenditure of ten hundred and forty-eight thousand three hundred and eleven dollars and thirty-seven cents (\$1,048,311 37), of which five hundred and seventy-seven thousand six hundred dollars and sixteen cents (\$577,600 16) was on account of the appropriation for 1872, and four hundred and seventy thousand seven hundred and eleven dollars and twenty-one cents (\$470,711 21) on account of the appropriation for 1873. In Exhibit B will be found a statement showing the amounts paid for gas to the various public markets, offices, &c., and for fitting, repairing, and lighting the public lamps, &c. In Exhibits C and D will be found a summary of the appropriations for lamps and gas for the years 1872 and 1873, showing a balance of the appropriations for 1872 of eight hundred and twenty-two dollars and seventeen cents (\$822 17), and of 1873 of one hundred fifty eight thousand four hundred forty-nine dollars and forty-four cents \$158,449 44). In exhibit D will also be found a list of liabilities against this Bureau for work done during the quarter, amounting to eighty thousand one hundred and forty-eight dollars and twentythree cents (\$80,148 23), leaving an available balance of seventy-eight thousand three hundred and (one dollars and twenty-one cents (\$78,301 21), which will hardly suffice to light the public lamps to December 10th, next.

The outlet sewer discharging at the foot of West 80th street, for the most part, has been built through solid rock at greater than average depth, in order to drain the low district in the vicinity of 88th street and 8th avenue, which is partially within the Central Park, the drainage of which was heretofore wholly unprovided for. The sewer is 5.570 feet in length and drains 350 acres.

The outlet sewer, discharging at the foot E. 110th street, has been built from the Harlem The outlet sewer, discharging at the foot E. 110th street; has been built from the Harlem River to Fifth avenue, and in Fifth avenue from 108th to 116th street; and in 116th street from Fifth to Seventh avenues. This sewer drained the largest area of any sewer in the City, containing some 1,100 acres, including a large part of the Central Park.

The sewer in Manhattan street has progressed rapidly, day and night, for the past three months; (the sewer crossing the Boulevard 34 feet below the surface) and will drain a very large area, (some 900 acres) that heretofore were dependant on evaporation and percolation for drainage.

The large outlet sewer in 17th street and North River, has made better progress in the last three months than at any time during the past three years. The connection was made with the old main sewer in 23rd street, (8 feet 6 inches in diameter) without any interruption in its discharge.

Great difficulty has been encountered in the construction of these sewers, owing to their great depth and the unusual large amount of water met with, which could only be overcome by using powerful steam pumps and hoisting machinery of the most approved kind.

The sewers in Sixth and Seventh avenues and avenue St. Nicholas, north of 110th street, have been pushed forward with all possible speed, and will be nearly completed before the winter sets in nected with the houses where built, without disturbing the fine pavements of these avenues.

The main outlet through 96th street is very near its completion, and the main collective sewers could be immediately constructed throughout the district if the streets in which they must be located were opened according to law. Drains have been built, following the old water courses, west of Eighth avenue, between 59th and 110th streets; the sanitary benefit to this whole district will be greatly improved, as for years back this portion of the city has been particularly unhealthy, owing to the frequent obstruction of the old water courses by streets that have been filled across them, without proper culverts being built at the time.

The extensive underground drains now in progress between Fifth and Eighth avenues, 110th and 125th streets, are several feet below the sewerage system of the district, and so low as to intercept and carry off all foul springs, water courses, and stagnant pools which have for so many years rendered this part of the city especially unhealthy.

A contract has been made for the construction of a main sewer in New avenue, between Eighth A contract has been made for the construction of a main sewer in New avenue, between Eighth and Ninth avenues, from 105th to Manhattan street, which will pass through the low, swampy disands some 44 feet below the surface of some of the streets, when graded.

The deep main sewer in 106th street, from Harlem River to Fifth avenue, with branches between 103d and 108th streets, and in First avenue, between 95th and 10st, and 95th and 98th, between First and Third avenues, for which contracts have been awarded, and are now awaiting the temperoval by the Comptroller of the sureties, will, in connection with the underground drains, effectually drain and reclaim the greater portion of the Harlem Flats lying east of the Third avenue, the Harlem and Yorkville, discharging from sewers and drains now terminating at the borders of the Flats.

Surveys are being made north of 155th street, to revise and correct the old topographical Surveys are being made north of 155th street, to revise and correct the old topographical maps, preparatory to making permanent plans for the sewerage and drainage of this portion of the maps, preparatory to making permanent plans for the laying out of the streets and roads, make it necestive. Its peculiar natural topography, and the laying out of the streets and which will best suit it is ry to embrace in one comprehensive plan both sewerage and drainage, and which will best suit the future semi-suburban character of the district. In making these surveys, much difficulty and delay has been experienced, from not finding the monuments designating the street lines in their proper position. proper position.

Pursuant to your order of June 2, 1873, "that in addition to the ordinary repairing and cleaning of sewers, a special and thorough examination be made of all sewers, drains, basins, and culverts in this city, in order to ascertain what measures were necessary to prevent the emission of bad odors from sewer openings, and the choking up of culverts with dirt and rubbish, and to remove every obstruction to a complete drainage," an examination was instituted at once, and as rapidly as the information could be obtained, the proper remedies were applied. The beneficial result of these measures would have been manifest had we been visited by the epidemic with which we were threatened, and in view of which they were adopted.

During the period referred to, 5,515 feet of sewers and 4,680 receiving basins were cleaned, and 1,100 feet of sewers, 200 feet of culverts, 160 receiving basins, and 137 manholes were repaired.

The total length of sewers in this city is 1,670,918 feet (316.46 miles), and 3,908 receiving

basins and appurtenances.

SIR:—Agreeably to your instructions of the 18th of October, requesting a report of the transactions of this Bureau for the three months ending October 31, ult., I respectfully submit the following report of the operations and progress of the work done for the construction of the roads and avenues north of 59th street; also tabulated statements showing the number of days of the force employed upon the several works in each month, the average working force per day, and the expenditures and liabilities incurred.

THE BOULEVARD FROM THE CIRCLE AT 59TH STREET TO 155TH STREET.

At the date of my last report, August 1, 1873, the principal work remaining to be done was the completion of the superstructure of about 150 lineal feet of roadway, 40 feet in width, and the laying of a portion of the flagging.

The roadway is now completed, and but 1,500 lineal feet of flagging remain to be laid. The principal items of work done since August 1 are:
667 square yards roadway, finished and completed.
10,800 square feet flagging laid, and sidewalks and cross streets trimmed and finished.
The gaslight company have also laid their pipe through the centre strip, from 85th street to Manhattan street, a distance of about 11,500 lineal feet, and set and lighted 86 lamps along the same.

Preparations are now being made to resume the planting of trees along the sidewalks, commencing at the Circle, and extending north as far as the sewers are built and the water pipes laid; also upon the centre piece north of 78th street.

MAINTENANCE OF THE BOULEVARD, STREETS, AND AVENUES NORTH OF 59TH STREET.

On August 1st the area of roadways to be maintained was 568,078 square yards, since which time it has increased to 610,143 square yards. The amount first appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was \$40,000, which sum was exhausted, and all work was suspended, on the 6th day of September last. On the 3d day of October a further sum of \$15,000 was allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and work was resumed on October 4th.

During the four weeks while without care and repairs, the carriageways, owing to the want of During the accumulation of loose stones, and the wash from the rains, etc., were materially damaged, being a source of inconvenience and complaint to those passing over them, and, upon resumption of the work, required a large force to place them in proper repair.

The force employed upon all the works under the direction of this Bureau on August 1 was 1,142 men and teams.

The present force is 1,115 men and teams.

The number of men and teams placed upon the work by appointment has been 70.

The number discharged for inefficiency, neglect of duty, and other causes, has been 21 men

The remainder of the decrease have left the work of their own accord, or have been suspended on account of their services being no longer required, caused by the completion of the work upon which they were engaged.
