

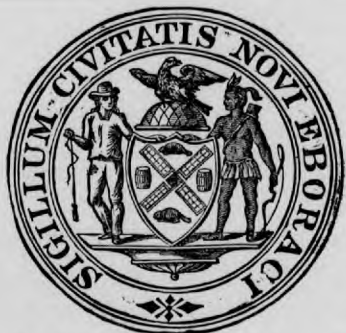
THE CITY RECORD.

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BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met at the Mayor's office on Friday, October 17, 1890, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to the following notice:

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT,

SIR—You are respectfully requested to attend a regular meeting of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York, to be held in the Mayor's Office, at the City Hall, on Friday, October 17, 1890, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which it is proposed to consider unfinished business, with such other matters as may be brought before the Board.

The roll was called and all the members were present and answered to their names.

The minutes of the meeting of October 3, 1890, were read and approved.

The following report and resolutions, relating to the opening of a new park on the grounds known as St. John's Cemetery, in the Ninth Ward of the City of New York, were presented and read:

OFFICE OF THE
BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

To the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York:

SIRS—I have to report that on the 6th of October, 1890, at the office of the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, at the City Hall, in the City of New York, I have caused to be delivered to the Clerk of said Board, and left with him, copies of resolutions adopted by this Board on the 3d October, 1890, copies of said resolutions being hereto annexed. They provide for the altering of the map or plan of the City of New York, by laying out and opening certain pieces or parcels of land, in the Ninth Ward of the City of New York, for the purpose of a public park.

I do also report that I caused to be published in the CITY RECORD the notice required by law, a copy of which, together with the proof of the publication thereof, is hereto annexed.

Whereas, At a meeting of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York, held on the 3d October, 1890, the following resolutions were adopted by said Board:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York deem it for the public interest to take and acquire certain pieces or parcels of land, located in the Ninth Ward of the City of New York, for the purpose of a public park, pursuant to chapter 320 of the Laws of 1887, and to alter the map or plan of the City of New York, by laying out and opening said pieces or parcels of land, for the said purpose of a public park, the said pieces or parcels of land being bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of Leroy street, distant 364.58 feet easterly from the intersection of the southern side of Leroy street with the eastern side of Hudson street; thence—

1. Running westerly along the southern side of Leroy street, for 364.58 feet, to the eastern side of Hudson street;
2. Thence running southerly along the eastern side of Hudson street, for 208.0 feet, to the northern side of Clarkson street;
3. Thence running easterly along the northern side of Clarkson street, for 340.62 feet, to the northern side of Carmine street;
4. Thence running easterly along the northern side of Carmine street, for 20.41 feet;
5. Thence running northerly for 208.2 feet more or less, to the point of beginning.

This plot has been heretofore used in part as a burying-ground.

Resolved, That such proposed action of this Board be laid before the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, and that full notice of the same be published for ten days in the CITY RECORD.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he is hereby directed to transmit to the Board of Aldermen a copy of the foregoing resolution, and to cause to be published the notice required by law.

And Whereas, Said proposed action of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement has been duly laid before the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York and full notice of the same has been published for ten days in the CITY RECORD, as appears by the report of the Secretary of this Board and the papers thereto attached; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York, by locating, laying out and opening certain pieces or parcels of land, situated in the Ninth Ward of the City of New York, for the purpose of a public park, as aforesaid;

Does hereby alter the map or plan of the City of New York so as to locate, lay out, and open said certain pieces or parcels of land, as aforesaid, and does hereby locate, lay out and open the same, as follows:

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of Leroy street, distant 364.58 feet easterly from the intersection of the southern side of Leroy street with the eastern side of Hudson street; thence—

1. Running westerly along the southern side of Leroy street, for 364.58 feet, to the eastern side of Hudson street;
2. Thence running southerly along the eastern side of Hudson street, for 208.0 feet, to the northern side of Clarkson street;
3. Thence running easterly along the northern side of Clarkson street, for 340.62 feet, to the northern side of Carmine street;
4. Thence running easterly along the northern side of Carmine street, for 20.41 feet;
5. Thence running northerly for 208.2 feet more or less, to the point of beginning.

This plot has been heretofore used in part as a burying-ground.

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York does now proceed to certify two similar maps showing said pieces or parcels of land, as located, laid out and opened, as aforesaid, and that the Secretary of this Board be and he is hereby directed to file one of said maps so certified in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, and one in the office of the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York.

Resolved, That this Board, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby respectfully request the Counsel to the Corporation to take the necessary proceedings, in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, to acquire title, wherever the same has not been heretofore acquired, for the use of the public, to the lands required for the locating, opening and laying out of a public park in the Ninth Ward of the City of New York, which lands are more particularly bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of Leroy street, distant 364.58 feet easterly from the intersection of the southern side of Leroy street with the eastern side of Hudson street; thence—

1. Running westerly along the southern side of Leroy street, for 364.58 feet, to the eastern side of Hudson street;
2. Thence running southerly along the eastern side of Hudson street, for 208.0 feet to the northern side of Clarkson street;
3. Thence running easterly along the northern side of Clarkson street, for 340.62 feet, to the northern side of Carmine street;
4. Thence running easterly along the northern side of Carmine street, for 20.41 feet;

5. Thence running northerly for 208.2 feet more or less, to the point of beginning.

This plot has been heretofore used in part as a burying-ground.

And hereby determines that one-half of the entire cost and expense of said proceeding shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, and one-half upon the said City of New York.

All of which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen—5.

The following communication from the Department of Docks, relating to an exterior street from Sixty-fourth to Eighty-first street, on the East river, was presented and read:

SIR—At a meeting of the Board governing this Department, held this date, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement be and hereby is informed that the plan for an exterior street from Sixty-fourth to Eighty-first street, on the East river, provided for by chapter 697 of the Laws of 1887, as amended by chapter 272 of the Laws of 1888 and by chapter 257 of the Laws of 1889, was determined by the Department of Docks on the 27th of June, 1889, and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the 2d of July, 1890, and that the said plan is on file in the Department of Docks, and copies of the same certified and filed, one in the office of the Commissioner of Public Works in the City of New York and one in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, and that the grades of said street have been fixed by the Department of Docks, with the concurrence of the Commissioner of Public Works, and a copy of same certified by the Board of the Department of Docks and by the Commissioner of Public Works, has been filed in the Department of Public Works, in the office of the Secretary of State and in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, as required by section 4 of said act, amended as aforesaid; and that the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York be and hereby is requested to cause the necessary proceedings to be instituted to acquire title for the City of New York of all the property, rights, terms, easements, privileges or interests required for the said exterior street as soon as possible, in order that the work of improving this portion of the water-front may be proceeded with as quickly as possible.

The following communication from the Department of Public Parks, inclosing resolutions to lay out and extend East One Hundred and Seventieth street, from Prospect avenue to Bristow street, was presented and read:

SIR—I herewith transmit petition of Franklin A. Wilcox to lay out and extend East One Hundred and Seventieth street, from Prospect avenue to Bristow street, and submit a map or plan showing the proposed extension, also technical description thereof, and the necessary resolutions for the action of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement.

It is recommended that the prayer of the petitioners be granted.

The entire length of East One Hundred and Seventieth street, including the proposed extension, is about 2,500 feet.

Whereupon the President of the Department of Public Parks offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That this Board deem it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of New York City so as to extend and lay out East One Hundred and Seventieth street, from Prospect avenue to Bristow street, as a street of the first class, of the uniform width of sixty feet, in the Twenty-third Ward of said city, said extension being more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the western line of Bristow street, distant 210.74 feet southerly from the intersection of the southern line of Boston road and western line of Bristow street; thence

1. Southerly along the western line of Bristow street for 60 feet;
2. Thence westerly, deflecting to the right 90 degrees for 208.47 feet;
3. Thence northerly, deflecting 116 degrees 54 minutes 42 seconds to the right for 62.71 feet;
4. Thence easterly for 280.23 feet to the point of beginning.

And that this Board propose to alter the map or plan of New York City so as to lay out and extend said East One Hundred and Seventieth street as aforesaid.

Resolved, That such proposed action of this Board be laid before the Board of Aldermen, and that full notice of the same be published for ten days in the CITY RECORD.

And that the Secretary of this Board be and is hereby directed to transmit to the Board of Aldermen a copy of the foregoing resolutions, and to cause to be published the notice required by law.

Resolved, That the Department of Public Parks be and is hereby respectfully requested to furnish this Board with five similar maps or plans for filing, showing said extension of said East One Hundred and Seventieth street, as hereinbefore described.

Which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen—5.

The following communication from the Commissioner of Public Works relating to an extension of West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, and the opening of a new street between Claremont and Riverside avenues, in the Twelfth Ward, was presented and read:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to transmit herewith for the action of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement duplicate maps and technical description of land for the proposed extension of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, from the Boulevard to Claremont avenue, the new street to be known as Claremont place.

Whereupon, the Commissioner of Public Works offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York, under authority of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, deeming it for the public interest so to do, propose to alter the map or plan of the City of New York, by laying out, opening and extending One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, between the Boulevard and Claremont avenue, and laying out, opening and extending a new street, between Claremont avenue and Riverside avenue, in the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York, more particularly bounded and described, as follows:

Beginning at a point in the westerly line of the Boulevard, distant 725 feet 6 inches northerly from the northerly line of One Hundred and Twenty-second street; thence westerly and parallel with said street, distance 200 feet, to the easterly line of Claremont avenue; thence northerly along said line, distance 80 feet; thence easterly, distance 200 feet, to the westerly line of the Boulevard; thence southerly along the said line, distance 80 feet, to the point or place of beginning. Said extension of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street to be 80 feet wide between the lines of the Boulevard and Claremont avenue.

Also, Beginning at a point in the westerly line of Claremont avenue, distant 370 feet northerly from the northerly line of One Hundred and Twenty-second street; thence westerly and parallel with said street, distance 200 feet, to the easterly line of Riverside avenue; thence northerly along said line, distance 80 feet; thence easterly, distance 200 feet, to the westerly line of Claremont avenue; thence southerly along said line, distance 80 feet, to the point or place of beginning. Said new street to be 80 feet wide, between the lines of Claremont avenue and Riverside avenue.

Resolved, That such proposed action of this Board be laid before the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, and that full notice of the same be published for ten days in the CITY RECORD.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he is hereby directed to transmit to the Board of Aldermen a copy of the foregoing resolution, and to cause to be published the notice required by law.

Which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen—5.

The following petition from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, together with a petition signed by many residents and property-owners in the Twenty-third Ward, to discontinue the proceedings now pending for the opening of Alexander avenue, from the Southern Boulevard to the Harlem river, was presented:

SUPREME COURT—CITY AND COUNTY OF NEW YORK.

In the Matter
of

The application of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, relative to acquiring title to that part of Alexander avenue extending from Harlem river to the Third avenue in the Twenty-third Ward in the City of New York.

To the Honorable the Board of Street Opening and Improvement:

The undersigned, the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, respectfully represents and petitions as follows:

A proceeding has been instituted and is now pending for the opening of the street called Alexander avenue in the Twenty-third Ward, from Harlem river to Third avenue. Your petitioner is the owner in fee of a large amount of land in the immediate vicinity of said Alexander avenue, and also is the lessee of a large amount of land through which it proposes to open said avenue. It leases from the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad Company all the land within the limits of the proposed Alexander avenue, from the Harlem river to One Hundred and Thirty-second street, as well as the lots on both sides of the said proposed street between One Hundred and Thirty-second street and the Harlem river. The land through which the said avenue is laid out and proposed to be opened is occupied, and has since the year 1873, been occupied as a railroad yard by your petitioner. If carried through the said yard, Alexander avenue will have to be carried across fifty tracks of your petitioner. Over some of these tracks trains of freight cars, passenger cars and engines are moving almost constantly. Upon One Hundred and Thirty-second street and across the proposed avenue is located the petitioner's local freight platform. These tracks and platforms are necessary for the transaction of your petitioner's railroad business, and are demanded for the necessity and convenience of the public.

Your petitioner heretofore, by petition dated February 8, 1889, represented the above facts to your Honorable Board, and prayed that the said proceeding then pending, should be discontinued. After consideration, the said petition was denied. Your petitioner now respectfully requests your Honorable Board to reconsider its determination not to discontinue the proceeding pending for opening the said avenue.

The said proceeding is pushed to a conclusion by the Counsel to the Corporation, and the Commissioners of Assessment have made their preliminary report. Your petitioner believes that there is no public demand for the improvement of Alexander avenue below the Southern Boulevard, and now presents a remonstrance, signed by many residents and property-holders in the Twenty-third Ward, requesting the discontinuance of the said proceeding.

Your petitioner, therefore, respectfully prays that the resolution of your Honorable Board denying its application to discontinue the said proceeding to open Alexander avenue be discontinued, and that its petition to have the same discontinued be granted.

To the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York:

The undersigned, residents and property-owners of the lower portion of the Twenty-third Ward, New York City, respectfully request your Honorable Body to take such steps as may be necessary to discontinue the proceedings for the opening of Alexander avenue, from the Southern Boulevard to the Harlem river, for the following reasons:

I.—That, if opened, said avenue would be useless as a street, as it crosses the freight yard of the New Haven Railroad Company, in which there are now upwards of sixty tracks in constant use crossing the proposed extension, and it would be dangerous in the extreme to passengers or vehicles attempting such crossing, and the same would be very little used on account of such danger.

II.—There is no dock at the foot of said street, but only a bulkhead owned by said company, and that all benefits which could be derived from such bulkhead can be obtained by a passage along said bulkhead entering upon the same through another avenue already opened.

III.—That, if said Alexander avenue is opened across said freight-yard and is used as a public highway, it would seriously interfere with the business of said company, and might result in the removal of said freight-yard and depot, which would throw many of our citizens out of employment and cause great injury to our tradespeople and would be an irreparable injury to our ward, as we look upon said depot and the business growing out of it as one of the greatest future benefits to the commercial prosperity of the upper part of the city.

SIR—I am in receipt of your letter of 8th instant, inclosing, for report thereon, a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen requesting that Rutgers Slip be laid out as a public park, under chapter 320 of the Laws of 1887.

I herewith submit a map showing Rutgers Slip, in the Seventh Ward. Rutgers Slip is a portion of Rutgers street, the title to which is vested in the city, and it would seem that it is for the Board of Street Opening and Improvement to decide whether the street should be closed. I inclose a resolution to be adopted in case it is decided to lay out the park, after the boundaries have been determined.

SIR—I inclose herewith resolutions in the usual form, determining the amount of the cost and expense attending the opening of the street and avenues referred to in the resolutions, to be assessed upon the property benefited by each respective opening. The resolutions refer to proceedings now pending in the Supreme Court of this State for the opening of Webster avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street to Middlebrook Parkway; and Bremer avenue, from Jerome avenue to Birch street, and Devoe street, from Bremer avenue to Ogden avenue.

The Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of opening Bremer avenue and Devoe street have assessed the entire cost and expense of the proceeding upon the property benefited. The Commissioners in the matter of opening Webster avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street to Middlebrook Parkway, find that such avenue is over one mile in length, and have, under sections 677 and 958 of the Consolidation Act, assessed one-half of the cost and expense of the proceeding, amounting to \$70,947.95, upon the city.

Kindly present the resolutions to the Board for adoption at its meeting on to-morrow, Friday, the 17th instant.

Whereupon the President of the Department of Public Parks offered the following resolutions: Resolved, That this Board, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby determines that the whole amount of the cost and expense attending the opening of Webster avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street to Middlebrook Parkway, in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York, be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, except that any part not exceeding one-third of the estimated value of any building or buildings required to be removed, and which the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment heretofore appointed for the opening of the said avenue, in their discretion, if they deem it equitable and just so to do, but not otherwise, may be assessed upon the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York; provided that if the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment are of opinion that the avenue is over one mile in length not more than one-half of the cost and expense of the opening shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited.

Which was adopted by following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen—5.

Resolved, That this Board, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby determines that the whole amount of the cost and expense attending the opening of Bremer avenue, from Jerome avenue to Birch street, and Devoe street, from Bremer avenue to Ogden avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, unless the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, heretofore appointed for the opening of the said avenue and street, are of the opinion that the same are over one mile in length, in which case not more than one-half of such amount shall be so assessed.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen—5.

POLICE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, No. 300 MULBERRY STREET, }
BUREAU OF ELECTIONS, NEW YORK, October 6, 1890. }

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, and by virtue of the authority therein conferred upon the Board of Police, the division of the several Assembly Districts in the City and County of New York into Election Districts and the boundaries of said Election Districts are hereby fixed by said Board, as follows:

First Assembly District.

The First Assembly District shall be altered and divided into twenty-four election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Beaver street, Broad street, Stone street, Coenties alley, Coenties slip, East river, and Whitehall street.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Wall street, Pearl street, Maiden lane, East river, Coenties slip, Coenties alley, Stone street, Broad street, Beaver street, and Broadway.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Ferry street, Peck slip, East river, Maiden lane, and Gold street.

We are credibly informed that the Park Commissioners recently adopted a resolution inserting in their Departmental Estimates the insignificant and totally inadequate sum of \$1,000 to meet the requirements of the Annexed District for the year 1891.

At a recent meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners, President Gallup of that Board offered a resolution that the sum of one million dollars be inserted in the Provisional Estimates of that Board for next year to meet the requirements of the new Street Commissioner, in accordance with law, but his colleagues refused to consider this resolution.

You are undoubtedly familiar with the many crying evils from which our district has suffered in the past from lack of proper local improvements, and which the act aforesaid was intended to remedy, and hence must appreciate the importance and necessity of a proper sum being inserted in the final estimate for 1891 to meet the exigencies of the situation.

The undersigned therefore request that an opportunity be afforded them to present their views to the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment, of which you are Chairman, before the final appropriations, above referred to, shall be passed upon by the latter Board.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK:

It becomes my duty as Commissioner of Public Works and custodian of the many and immense interests involved in the City's water supply, to briefly present to the people of the City the present condition of the supply, and the extreme necessity for care and economy in the use of the water.

For a number of years past and up to the present time, the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit have delivered in the City all the water which they are capable of carrying, the supply thus remaining stationary when the City has been constantly growing in population, buildings, manufactures and commerce, creating new and additional demands upon the water service. The consequence is that at certain seasons of the year, notably in extreme cold weather, when the habit of wasting water from faucets to prevent freezing in the pipes prevails, and in warm and dry weather, when various methods of waste are in vogue, the daily consumption exceeds the supply which can by any possibility be received through the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit, the excess of consumption being drawn from the
