

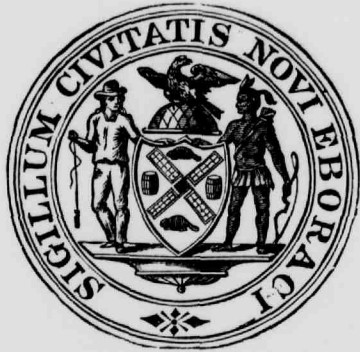

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, January 14, 1892.

Present—President Cram.

Commissioner Post.

Phelan.

The minutes of the meeting held the 7th instant were read and approved.

Robert Maclay, president of the Knickerbocker Ice Company, appeared, respecting the offer dated October 2, 1891, to purchase his company's interest in and to the Pier, foot of West Forty-third street, North river, together with the adjacent rights and easements thereat, and requested to be advised when the final negotiations will be completed.

President Cram stated that, owing to an error in the description of the property, he offered the following preambles and resolutions, which were adopted, Commissioner Post voting in the negative:

Resolved, That the resolution of this Board adopted October 2, 1891, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Whereas, Robert Maclay, president of the Knickerbocker Ice Company, has this day signified his willingness on behalf of said company to accept the sum of one hundred and twenty thousand (\$120,000) dollars for the purchase by the City of the Pier at the foot of Forty-third street, North river, as hereinafter described; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That pursuant to section 715 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, this Board enters into an agreement with the Knickerbocker Ice Company for the purchase and acquisition for the sum of one hundred and twenty thousand (\$120,000) dollars, of the Pier foot of Forty-third street, North river, including all the right to wharfage, cranes, advantages and emoluments from said pier, together with all the easements, tenements, hereditaments and appurtenances thereunto belonging and covered by the deed from the City to Caleb F. Lindsey, dated November 11, 1852, and all the right, title and interest of said company in and to the land and land under water, lying westerly of Twelfth avenue, between Forty-third street and the centre line of the block on each side of said pier; said agreement and purchase to be subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as provided by section 715, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882.

"Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Department agrees to lease, grant and assign to the Knickerbocker Ice Company all and singular the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law for the use and occupation of a pier to be built by this Department at the foot of Forty-third street, North river, together with the privilege of shedding and maintaining a shed thereon, for the period of ten years from the date when said pier shall be constructed and completed by this Department, for the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department during the continuance of the lease; the said lessee shall have the privilege of two renewals of ten years each; the annual rent for the first renewal term of ten years to be five thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$5,250); the annual rent for the second renewal term of ten years to be five thousand seven hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$5,725); the rental for the renewal terms to be paid quarterly in advance as above; the said lease or any renewal thereof shall contain the usual terms and conditions as at present embodied in the lease of wharf property now used by this Department; provided, however, that this resolution shall not be binding or of any force or effect unless the said lessee shall, within twenty days after receipt hereof accept in writing the terms and conditions contained herein, and agree to execute a lease when prepared and ready for execution; and provided further, that unless the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund consent to and approve of the purchase of said above-mentioned property, this resolution shall be of no force or effect."

John S. Sutphen and J. M. Requa, executors of the estate of Charles Spear, were present and reiterated their proposition of the 31st ultimo, to sell the southerly side of Pier, old 12, North river, and one-half of the adjoining bulkhead, which offer was rejected, and in view of their declination of the offer made by the City July 16, 1891, for the purchase of said property,

On motion of the President, the following preambles and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, This Board on the 16th day of July, 1891, adopted preambles and resolutions, offering to purchase in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, all title and interest in and to the right of wharfage from the southerly side of Pier, old 12, North river, and one-half the wharfage from the end of said pier together with all the right, title and interest of the estate of Charles Spear in and to said pier, also the bulkhead and water rights opposite West street, running along the westerly side thereof fifty-eight feet three inches, southerly from the southerly side of Albany street, projected at right angles to said westerly side of West street; and

Whereas, Said offer was on the 24th day of July, 1891, served upon John S. Sutphen, executor of and in charge of the estate of Charles Spear, owner of said premises hereinbefore described; and

Whereas, Said offer has been declined by said John S. Sutphen and J. M. Requa, executors, etc., of the estate of Charles Spear; and

Whereas, It is deemed that no price can be agreed upon between the owners of the said property and this Department for the purchase thereof; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation of the City of New York be and is hereby requested to institute legal proceedings for the immediate acquisition of said property, rights, terms, easements and privileges for the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, as required by law in such cases made and provided.

The following communications were received, read and

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, viz.:

From the Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Submitting for examination a draft of lease of the extension to Pier, new 26, North river. The Secretary directed to return the said draft as amended.

2d. Approving specifications and form of contract for dredging at sundry-named places on the North river, under Contract No. 407.

3d. Approving specifications and form of contract for preparing for and building a new steam launch, under Contract No. 408.

4th. Requesting to be informed as to the nature of the agreement between the Department and the Audubon Yacht Club, for the use of the premises between One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Fiftieth streets, North river. The Secretary directed to furnish the information.

From the Mayor's Office—Requesting a copy of the last annual report printed by the Department. The action of the Secretary in transmitting a copy of said report approved.

From the Finance Department—Returning the proposal of the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company for dredging at West Washington Market Section under Contract No. 406, with the approval of the adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties.

From the Department of Public Charities and Correction—Submitting a report from their Superintendent of the Workhouse, Blackwell's Island, objecting to locating the landing for the ferry to said island at the foot of East Seventy-third street, and suggesting the foot of Seventy-ninth street, East river, in lieu thereof. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report.

From the Supervisor of the City Record—Requesting a classified list of all the employees of the Department, together with their names, position, residences by street numbers, and salaries (except laborers) for publication in the CITY RECORD, as required by section 68, of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882. The Secretary directed to furnish the information.

From Cecil Campbell Higgins, attorney for James A. Striker:

1st. Declining the offer of the 31st ultimo, for the purchase of his client's interest in and to the premises from Fifty-third to Fifty-fourth streets, west of the easterly line of Twelfth avenue.

2d. Agreeing on behalf of his client to release to the City all rights in the lands and lands under water (as riparian owner or otherwise) lying to the west of the westerly line of Twelfth avenue, provided the City releases all its rights in the lands and lands under water lying to the east of the easterly line of Twelfth avenue, between Fifty-third and Fifty-fourth streets, and pays in addition thereto the sum of five thousand dollars, whereupon,

On motion of Commissioner Phelan, the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, By section 715 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New York is authorized to acquire for purchase, in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, wharf property in said city, and all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and agree with such owners upon a price for the same, and in case of failure to agree upon a price, to initiate legal proceedings to acquire the same for the improvement of the water-front of said city; and

Whereas, The Board is desirous of acquiring in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, all riparian and wharfage rights and interests in or annexed to or



appurtenant to the premises from the southerly side of Fifty-third street to the southerly side of Fifty-fourth street, North river, together with all rights in the lands and lands under water (as riparian owner or otherwise), lying to the west of the easterly line of the Twelfth avenue.

Whereas, It appears that James A. Striker is the owner in fee simple, with all its hereditaments, of the premises above-named, including the riparian and wharfage rights;

Resolved, That this Board offers to purchase the said riparian and wharfage rights, with all its hereditaments, and pay for a good and sufficient title therefor, free from all incumbrances, the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and upon the acceptance of said offer and the execution of the agreement of sale the city releases all its rights in the lands and lands under water lying to the east of the easterly line of the Twelfth avenue, between Fifty-third and Fifty-fourth streets.

Resolved, That a copy of these preambles and resolutions be served upon James A. Striker, or his legal representative, and he be and hereby is requested, within ten (10) days from receipt thereof, to notify this Board in writing whether he will sell his said riparian and wharfage rights and interests as aforesaid to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, for the price above mentioned; and in the event that he shall fail to notify this Board of his willingness to so convey his respective riparian and wharfage rights and interests as aforesaid, it shall be deemed that no price can be agreed upon for the said rights and interests between the owner thereof and this Department.

From the Southern Pacific Company—Stating that the repairs ordered on the 7th instant to Pier, new 25, North river, will receive attention.

From Borden & Lovell, agents of the Old Colony Steamboat Company—Agreeing to sell to the City for the sum of five hundred dollars a front foot (the price offered by the Board, December 24, 1891) the bulkhead between Piers, old 28 and 29, North river, provided they be granted permission to extend Pier, old 28, North river, out to the pier-head line of 1871, and provided they be granted a lease of the land under water fifty feet in width adjoining said bulkhead and also a lease of Pier, new 19, when completed, at the rate of \$27,500 per annum, together with privilege of shedding the same.

The President stated that in view of the fact that the offer submitted by said company is not an acceptance of the proposition made by this Board on the 24th ultimo, he offered the following preambles and resolution, which were adopted:

Whereas, This Board on the 24th day of December, 1891, adopted preambles and resolutions offering to purchase in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York all riparian and wharfage rights, and all interests in or appurtenant to the following described premises, to wit: the bulkhead between Pier, old 28, and Pier, old 29, North river, the same being in length about one hundred and seventy-eight feet measured along the westerly line of West street as laid out by law; and

Whereas, Said offer was on the 6th day of January, 1892, served upon Messrs. Borden & Lovell, agents of the Old Colony Steamboat Company, owners of said premises hereinbefore described; and

Whereas, Said offer has not been accepted by said owners, although the time to agree to the terms and conditions of the preambles and resolutions of this Board offering to purchase the same has expired; and

Whereas, It is deemed that no price can be agreed upon between the owners of the said property and this Department for the purchase thereof; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation of the City of New York be and he is hereby requested to institute legal proceedings for the immediate acquisition of said property, rights, terms, easements and privileges for the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York as required by law in such cases made and provided.

The Secretary was directed to inform said agents that this Department is compelled to decline their offer, as the same is not an acceptance of the proposition made by this Board.

From Graves & Steers—Requesting an extension of time until March 1, 1892, to complete the deliveries of sawed yellow pine timber under Contract No. 383, whereupon,

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of all work to be done under Contract No. 383, Graves & Steers, contractors for furnishing sawed yellow pine timber, be and hereby is extended to the first day of March, 1892.

From T. & A. Walsh—Requesting, on behalf of John F. Doyle, agent for the westerly half of Pier 15, East river, permission to refasten some fender piles on said pier. Permit granted.

From John D. Crummins—Requesting on behalf of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, that the order dated December 10, 1891, directing the painting of the sheds on Piers, old 4 and 5, North river, be postponed until April 1, 1892. Time extended as requested.

From Oliver Bryan—In reference to and concerning his claim to certain lands foot of One Hundred and Fourteenth street, Harlem river, and acknowledging receipt of a communication relative thereto, whereupon,

On motion of Commissioner Post, the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, Under section 715 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New York is authorized to acquire by purchase in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, wharf property in said city, and all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and agree with the owners thereof upon a price for the same, and in case of failure to agree upon a price, to initiate legal proceedings to acquire the same for the improvement of the water-front of said city; and

Whereas, Said Board is desirous of acquiring in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, in fee simple all the title and interest and all riparian and wharfage rights in or appurtenant to the following-described premises, to wit—Land under water in the City of New York bounded and described as follows: Beginning at a point in the northerly line of One Hundred and Fourteenth street, distant about two hundred and thirty feet easterly from the easterly line of Avenue A or Pleasant avenue, thence running easterly along said northerly line of One Hundred and Fourteenth street about twenty-seven feet; thence southeasterly along the northerly line of land under water formerly granted by the City to Philip Milledoler, November 1, 1808, about ten feet; thence southwesterly along the westerly line of the street of forty feet reserved in aforesaid grant about thirty feet to the centre line of One Hundred and Fourteenth street; thence westerly along said centre line of One Hundred and Fourteenth street, about twenty-five feet to the easterly line of the property of Philip Milledoler taken by the City for the legal opening of East One Hundred and Fourteenth street, November 14, 1824; thence along last mentioned line about thirty feet to the point or place of beginning, be said several dimensions more or less, together with all the right of wharfage, crange, advantages and emoluments and all the riparian rights, titles and easements incident thereto or connected with said premises, same being a portion of the water grant made by the City to Philip Milledoler, November 1, 1808, and being all that portion of One Hundred and Fourteenth street not now owned by the City of New York;

Whereas, It appears that Oliver Bryan is the owner in fee of above-described premises, together with all the appurtenances therewith connected;

Resolved, That this Board offers to purchase the above-described premises and pay for a good and sufficient title therefor, to be approved by the Corporation Counsel of the City of New York, the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund as prescribed by law;

Resolved, That a copy of these preambles and resolutions be served upon the aforesaid Oliver Bryan, and that he be and hereby is requested, within ten days from receipt hereof, to notify this Board in writing whether he will sell the rights and interests as aforesaid in the above-described premises, to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York for the price above-mentioned. And in the event that he shall fail to notify this Board of his willingness to so convey his rights and interests as aforesaid, it shall be deemed that no price can be agreed upon for the said premises between the said owner thereof and this Department.

From Dock Master Woods:

1st. Reporting a fender-chock broken and displaced on the north side and near the outer end of Pier, new 14, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

2d. Reporting that Pier, old 42, North river, requires cleaning.

From the Erie and Western Transportation Company—Requesting a renewal of permit for two derricks and one tally-house on Pier, old 6, East river. Permit granted.

The President moved that Pier, new 22, North river, be built by the force of the Department. Which was lost by the following vote:

Affirmative—President Cram and Commissioner Phelan.

Negative—Commissioner Post.

Commissioner Post stated that he was willing to vote on the usual unanimous resolution as soon as the City was placed in actual legal possession of the premises, whereupon further action in the matter was for the present postponed.

On motion of the President, the application of the Providence and Stonington Steamship Company for a lease of Pier, new 22, North river, when the same shall be completed and ready for occupancy, submitted October 15, 1891, was referred to Commissioners Post and Phelan.

The notice given by Commissioner Cram on the 31st ultimo of his intention to amend article 3, section 1 of the By-laws was withdrawn, and the President appointed as the Auditing Committee Commissioners Post and Phelan.

On motion of the President, the Counsel to the Corporation was requested to advise the Board as to its legal right to purchase steam derricks to be used on the unleased piers and bulkheads within a prescribed district along the water front.

The report of the Treasurer respecting the shedding of two of the City's piers on the North river, and two on the East river, was taken from the table, and,

On motion of the President, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for the erection of sheds on the Pier foot of Thirty-fourth street, and Pier, new 15 (when built), North river, and upon the Piers at foot of Thirty-third and Third streets (when the latter is built), on the East river, in accordance with the recommendation contained in said report.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Phelan, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending January 13, 1892, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

From the Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Report for the week ending January 9, 1892.

2d. Reporting that in order to proceed with the work of dredging at West Washington Market Section and complete the same within the time specified in the contract, it will be necessary to cause the occupants of Pier, old 20, and the bulkhead north of the same to vacate the premises.

On motion of the President, the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company was directed to vacate the said premises February 1, 1892, and the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the permit granted April 2, 1891, to the Providence and Stonington Steamship Company to use and occupy Pier, old 29, North river, be and the same is hereby revoked, to take effect February 1, 1892.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby granted to the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company to use and occupy, from and after February 1, 1892, during the pleasure of the Board, Pier, old 29, North river, provided they agree to pay therefor compensation at the rate of two thousand and eighty-three dollars and thirty-three cents (\$2,083.33) per month, payable at the end of each month to the Treasurer of this Department.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to remove, February 1, 1892, all sheds, decks, platforms, etc., upon Pier, old 20, North river, and the bulkhead north of said pier.

3d. Reporting repairs required to the bulkhead platform between Piers 50 and 51, East river. The owners and occupants directed to repair.

4th. Reporting that on the night of December 29, 1891, the south side of the Pier at Eighteenth street, East river, was damaged by the tug "F. W. Vosburgh." The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair, and report cost for collection from the owners of said tug.

5th. Reporting repairs required to Pier 50, East river. The owners directed to repair.

6th. Reporting the completion of the work of dredging for a new pier at foot of Twentieth street, North river, under Contract No. 402.

7th. Reporting that the work of dredging the slips on both sides of Pier No. 47, East river, as directed by the Board, June 18, 1891, has not been commenced. Order revoked.

8th. Reporting that the work of dredging at the bulkhead between Piers 48 and 49 and the half slips adjoining the westerly side of Pier 49, East river, as directed by the Board, October 8, 1891, has not been commenced. Order revoked.

9th.
