Messrs, the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

GENTLEMEN-I believe to-day is to be decided the question how the new Boulevard, beyond

Gentlemen—I believe to-day is to be decided the question how the new Boulevard, beyond Fifty-ninth street, is to be called.

You have now a splendid opportunity of doing credit to the City of New York, for by calling this Boulevard by the official name, as Broadway—a continuation of which street it really is—the entire street will become one, from the Battery to Spuyten Duyvil Creek, and will be, without doubt, the longest street in the world. It is not only for the sake of exalting New York before the world, though this alone should be an object to every patriotic American, but to call the whole street by one name is the most reasonable and popular way.

It is the most reasonable because it is in reality but one street; and that it is popular is evident, because most persons do already speak of it as the Broadway Boulevard. The word Boulevard is, too, but a title, and in no way militates against its being called Broadway too; the houses, of course, will be numbered in continuation of Broadway, and so will cause no confusion.

It is an idea so in accordance with the spirit of Americans to be able to say that they have the longest street in the world, that I feel sure you will see the immense preponderance in favor of calling it by this name, and as the street seems to go diagonally from one end of the island to the other, on purpose, it seems, as if to measure the greatest possible length, it seems like throwing away a golden and almost providential opportunity not to call the whole length by the one great name of Broadway, a name already so famous throughout the world, that the Boulevard ought to be only too proud to share in its glory.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE DEPARTMENTS AND CORPORATION OFFICES.

Gentilemen—I have the honor to call your interested attention to the subject of the Appropriation necessary to cover the salary of the Surrogate, his Clerks and Attendants, for the ensuing year, and particularly to my estimate under date of August 25, 1876, addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the application made by me, under date of May 20, 1876, copies of which are herewith transmitted. You will observe, on reading the statement of my Chief Clerk, Mr. Minor, that a very large amount of unrecorded matter has been allowed to accumulate in this office for several years, to the great jeopardy of the records and proceedings in this office, and to the interest of numerous estates, notwithstanding the appropriations for several years past were about twice the amount appropriated for the present year. The magnitude of the peril to estates growing out of the failure to record the matter referred to, cannot be exaggerated, and I could not excuse myself if I should neglect to call the attention of the proper authorities to the subject. When I had the honor to enter upon the duties of this office I encountered an overdraft of \$2,249.86 beyond the due proportion of the year then past, and I now find, after the most rigid economy, and considerable personal sacrifice, the appropriation for this year will fall short of paying Clerks and Attendants absolutely necessary to keep up the current work by a sum of over \$5,000. Though this prospective deficit was foreseen by me when I had the honor to present the communication of May 20th to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, yet I felt it to be my duty to the public to avoid those vexatious delays resulting from the current business falling in arrear. I am gratified to be able to say that the current work of the office has been promptly performed, and the business has not been permitted to accumulate. I have made a careful estimate of the amount required to record the matt

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to present the accompanying statement of my experienced and trusty Chief Clerk to your Honorable Body, for such action as to you may seem appropriate, but I cannot forbear expressing my surprise, and deep anxiety, that the matters entrusted to this office of such vast importance to the property interests of our people, should have been so long endangered, by their non-record.

I am profoundly sensible of the urgent need there is at the present time of rigid but wise economy in our public expenditures, and would most reluctantly seek to impose unnecessary burdens upon the tax-payers of this city, but the condition of things in this office, so clearly set forth in Mr. Minor's communication addressed to me, greatly endangers the public documents entrusted to the care of this office, which relate to many estates, concerning many millions of dollars of property, forbids that I should keep the appropriate authorities in ignorance of this great jeopardy, so long as a small expenditure would secure the proper record of all such matters within the current year.

If you shall be pleased to meet this emergency, as its great importance seems to require, I will cheerfully undertake to forward the reform, so urgently demanded, with all practical economy and dispatch.

DEAR SIR—Allow me to call your attention to the condition of the records of your office, which may be concisely stated as follows:

It is, therefore, obvious that unless the appropriation shall be materially increased, you will not be able to complete the unfinished work, but must diminish the clerical force of your office, and let

the work get in arrear to a greater extent than at present.

The present pay-roll, which has been reduced to the extreme limit, is \$42,200, showing an excess

The present pay-roll, which has been reduced to the extreme limit, is \$42,200, showing an excess for the remaining eight months of the year of \$391.63 per month, or for the whole period \$4,133.04, to which must be added the present overdraft of \$2,249.86, amounting to \$6,382.90 deficit, which will afford barely force sufficient to keep up the current business of the office, while there is very urgen need that the unrecorded matter, so long omitted, should be speedily recorded.

In former years, the appropriation for clerk hire has been much greater, and a glance at the difference in the amount thereof, from 1870 down to the present year, will, it seems to me, convince any one of the inadequacy of the present appropriation, particularly when we take into consideration the increase in the business of the office, in consequence of the annexation of the lower part of West-bestes County to your jurisdiction, the increase and growth of the city, and the enlargement of the chester County to your jurisdiction, the increase and growth of the city, and the enlargement of the judicial powers of your Court.
