Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 25, 1876: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,428, as follows, viz.: 5 public buildings, 703 tenement houses, 87 private dwellings, 96 other dwellings, 4 manufactories and workshops, 6 stores and warehouses, 34 stables, 53 slaughter-houses, 2 dangerous buildings, 1 bone-house, 3 roadways, 5 fat-melting establishments, 1 night-soil boat, 1 cistern, 21 sunken and vacant lots, 15 yards, courts, and areas, 53 cellars and second to the private and water closets. and basements, 193 waste-pipes and drains, 60 privies and water-closets, 21 streets, gutters, and side-walks, 4 dangerous stairways, 2 violations of the Sanitary Code, 3 public sewers, 6 other nuisances, 49 visits to contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 419. During the past week 59 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report. 52 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port. o permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 33 houses where contagious diseases were found, and have disintected and fumigated 29 dwellings, 29 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 20 persons sick with small-pox were removed to Hospital, and 1 dead body to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

865 cans and 52 tanks of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending March 25, 1876.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers during the week ending March 25, 1876: calves (bob), 91 carcasses; calves (case), 1 carcass; sheep, 8 carcasses; and

March 25, 1870: calves (bob), 91 carcasses; calves (case), 1 carcass; sheep, 8 carcasses; and fish, 5,030 pounds.

During the week ending Saturday, March 25, 1876, there were issued from this bureau 588 burial permits for city deaths, 24 for bodies in transitu, and 32 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 588 deaths, 112 marriages, 435 births, 32 still-births, 24 applications for transit permits, and 57 returns from Coroners. There were 31 searches of the registers of births marriages, and deaths, and 7 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriage, and 22 of death were issued from this bureau; 4 cases of death were reported to Coroners.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, March 28, 1876.

To W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—During the week ending March 25, 1876, there were 588 deaths reported in this city, being a decrease of 31, as compared with the preceding week, and 17 less than the number reported during the corresponding week of 1875. The actual mortality for the week ending March 18 was 623, representing an annual mortality of 30.64 in every 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,057,086. This decrease was in the following diseases, viz.: Small-pox 2; scarlatina, 12; diphtheria, 17; cancer, 4; marasmus and scrofula, 5; diseases of the heart, 13; pneumonia, 12. There was an increase of 3 deaths from measles; 5 from membranous croup; 7 from whooping-cough; 5 from diarrhoeal diseases; 1 from hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis; 11 from diseases of the nervous system; 7 trom bronchitis; 6 from Bright's disease and nephritis; 1 from puerperal diseases; 7 in children under 5 years of age, and 8 of persons 70 years of age and over. This table shows that during the past five weeks there has been a continual decline in the number of deaths from small-pox, diphtheria, and scarlatina, 23, or 60.5 per cent. of the deaths from diphtheria during the past week, 10, or 62.5 per cent of the deaths from scarlatina occurred in tenement

The mean temperature of the week was 32.5 degrees Fahr., with a range of 40 degrees, and the mean humidity 73.100 of total saturation, as reported by D. Draper, Director Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

From the most recent weekly returns of the following cities the annual rate of mortality, according to the estimated or enumerated population in Baltimore was 25.67; St. Louis, 21.07; Chicago, 19.85; Boston, 25.84; Philadelphia, 31.03; Richmond, 15.78; Newark, 38.60; Nashville, 34.17; Brooklyn, 22.78; New Orleans (yearly), 29.13; London, 21.8; Dublin, 34; Edinburgh, 26; Glasgow, 27; Liverpool, 32; Calcutta, 24.6; Bombay, 41.1; Madras, 39.1; Paris, 27.7; Brussels, 23.8; Amsterdam, 31.1; Rotterdam, 36.7; The Hague, 29.2; Copenhagen, 29.7; Christiania, 20.3; Berlin, 29.1; Hamburg, 24.1; Breslau, 32.8; Munich, 29.7; Vienna, 30.8; Buda Pesth, 41.4; Rome, 42.7; Naples, 36; Turin, 31.9; Alexandria, 42.6. From these reports it appears that small-pox caused 4 deaths in St. Louis, 4 in Chicago, 15 in Philadelphia, 1 in Richmond, 4 in Brooklyn, 142 in Bombay, 8 in Paris, 30 in Vienna, 10 in Naples, and 1 in London. Scarlatina caused 11 deaths in Baltimore, 3 in St. Louis, 8 in Chicago, 15 in Boston, 15 in Philadelphia, 3 in Newark, 6 in Brooklyn, 7 in Christiania, 2 in Breslau, 35 in London, 12 in Berlin, 3 in Liverpool, and 8 in Dublin. Diphtheria caused 1 death in Baltimore, 2 in St. Louis, 3 in Chicago, 14 in Boston, 12 in Philadelphia, 1 in Richmond, 8 in Newark, 1 in Nashville, 19 in Brooklyn, 18 in Berlin, 8 in Turin, 5 in London, 1 in Liverpool, and 1 in Dublin. Cholera caused 12 deaths in Calcutta and 33 in Madras; in Rome 39 deaths resulted from eruptive fever, and in Buda Pesth 5 from typhus fever.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks for three weeks ending March 25, 1876.

MEETING MARCH 18, 1876.

The specifications for sewers to connect with the closets of the Kinderberg, the Dairy, and of the Ball-ground house, with the sewer from the Arsenal, were approved, and proposals for the work were ordered to be advertised for.

It was directed that an examination of the pipes which convey the water to the engine of Third Avenue Bridge, be made by a diver, at a cost not exceeding \$50.

One Parkkeeper was detailed to patrol Riverside Park, and furnished with a horse for that

The plan for a fire-proof record vault, to be erected in the southeast corner of the Museum building, was approved, and specifications were ordered to be prepared for the iron and carpenter's

The contractors (D. C. Weeks & Son), for the mason work of the Museum of Natural History, were directed to do some extra work in the building-cutting out some grooves-at a cost not exceeding \$205.

The following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and hereby is requested to transfer the sum of \$1,709.26, being the balance of the appropriation made in pursuance of chapter 651, Laws of 1874, from said appropriation, to an appropriation to pay indebtedness existing and heretofore incurred by the Department of Public Parks in the matter of the improvements of the navigation of Harlem river, under authority of chapter 534, Laws of 1871, said sum being in excess of the amount required for the former appropriation, and that the Treasurer of the Department of Public Parks be and hereby is authorized to pay said claims when the above transfer has been authorized."

Application was directed to be made to the Common Council for an ordinance to enable Washington avenue, and also One Hundred and Sixtieth street, from said avenue to Elton avenue, to be regulated and graded.

The plan and profile of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, in the Twenty-third Ward, from Locust avenue to the State water grant line, on Long Island Sound, were filed.

The plan and profile of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, in Twenty-third Ward, from River avenue to the Harlem river bulkhead line, were filed.

The authorities of the town of Westchester, having failed to respond to the requests of this Department, for joint action in the matter of repairing the bridges over the Bronx river, some of which are in a dangerous condition, it was directed that each of said bridges be marked so as to show the line of the city limit, and that the New York City end of same be kept in proper order and repair.

The Commissioners of this Department and the Counsel to the Corporation, jointly, appointed Fordham Morris, William F. Hall, and John T. Hunt Commissioners to assess the expenses of regulating and grading One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, in the Twenty-third Ward, between Third and

The specifications for grading and setting the curb on Tompkins square were approved, and it was referred to President Stebbins and Commissioner Martin, with power to direct advertisements for proposals for the work.

It was directed that old, useless police uniforms be sold by auction.

The contractors for paving Third avenue were directed to proceed with the work when four inspectors are appointed.

It was directed that advertisements be inserted for proposals to light the public parks, etc., with gas or other illuminating material, from May 1 to December 31, 1876.

MEETING MARCH 20, 1876.

Mr. Howard Potter, on behalf of the American Museum of Natural History, submitted a draft of a bill to enable this Department to make and enter into a contract with said museum for its occupation of the building on Manhattan square. Which was forwarded to the Legislature with the endorsement of the Commissioners, and with a clause inserted making like provision with regard to the Museum of Art, in relation to the Art Museum on the east side of Central Park.
