

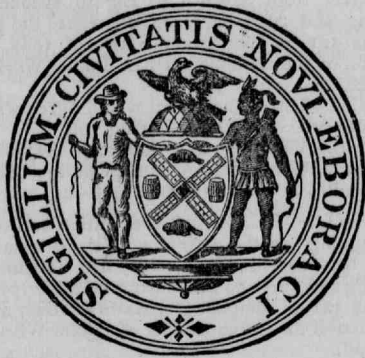

DEAR SIR—Replying to the letter of 22d ultimo, from your Secretary, and referring to mine of 15th ultimo, regarding the defective condition of the pavement at the foot of Twenty-seventh street, North river, which is within the limits of grants of lands under water, I beg to say I now have report from the Consulting Engineer on Pavements that the best remedy is to have Thirteenth avenue, from Twenty-seventh to Thirtieth street, paved with granite blocks on concrete foundation, and I herewith inclose a draft of an ordinance authorizing the work under the provisions of chapter 449, Laws of 1889.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—In accordance with the provisions of section 321 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 569 of the Laws of 1887, I hereby certify and report to your Honorable Board that the safety, health and convenience of the public require that the sidewalks on the south side of Ninety-second street, from Madison to Fifth avenue, be flagged full width, where not already done, and that all the flagging and the curb now on the sidewalks be relaid and reset where necessary, and that new flagging and curb be furnished where the present flagging and curb are defective; the materials to be used for said work to be flagging and curb of North river blue stone of the dimensions and according to the specifications now used in the Department of Public Works.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, December 21, 1893, at 11 o'clock A. M.

Present—Commissioner Phelan.

White.

Absent—President Cram.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 14th instant were read and approved.

A representative of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company was present and protested against the resolution adopted on the 14th instant, leasing twenty feet of bulkhead near the foot of Cortlandt street, North river, to John H. Starin.

On motion, said resolution was suspended, and the Secretary directed to notify John H. Starin together with the representative of said company to appear before the Board, Thursday, December 28, 1893, at 11 o'clock A. M.

The Pennsylvania Railroad Company also requested permission to build the bulkhead or river wall in front of Desbrosses Street Ferry premises, and the Department to build the wall in front of its property, excepting the portion occupied by said ferry premises.

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That a permit is hereby granted the Pennsylvania Railroad Company to build so much of the bulkhead or river wall in accordance with the new plan already adopted and approved, as lies between the southerly and northerly boundary of the Desbrosses Street Ferry, said improvement to be made by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, under the supervision of the Dock Department, at their own cost and expense, subject, however, to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as provided by chapter 397 of the Laws of 1893.

Resolved, That this Department will build the bulkhead or river wall in conformity with the plan adopted by the Department in front of the property claimed to be owned by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, from the point where the northerly line of Vestry street, if extended, would intersect the line of said bulkhead, to the point where the northerly line of Watts street, if extended, would intersect the line of said bulkhead or river wall; except so much of the same as lies between the southerly and northerly boundary of the Desbrosses Street Ferry; the work of building said bulkhead or river wall to be done by the Department of Docks at the expense of said company, under an agreement to be hereafter made and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as provided by chapter 397 of the Laws of 1893.

A representative of the Broadway and Seventh Avenue Railroad Company was present respecting the order of the 7th instant to show cause why a penalty should not be imposed for the dumping of snow and mud on the bulkhead south of Pier, new 42, and north of Pier, new 44, North river, by employees of said company. The Board being satisfied with the explanation made,

On motion, the matter was dismissed.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:

From Cantor & Van Schaick, Attorneys—Offering to sell to the city on behalf of their client, the property between Forty-seventh and Forty-eighth streets, beginning four hundred and seventy-five feet east of First avenue.

From the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company—Requesting permission to berth the steamboat "Albany" at the Pier foot of West Fiftieth street, and four steamboats at the Pier foot of West Fifty-fifth street, during the ensuing winter.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief and to be kept within the existing lines:

New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company:

1st. To repair their ferry rack foot of Twenty-third street, North river.

2d. To drive spring piles at the Pier foot of West Forty-ninth street.

The following applications were granted:

John W. Flaherty—For an extension of time until December 20, 1893, to complete the building of the Pier foot of West Fifteenth street, under Contract No. 454.

F. V. Smith—For an extension of time until December 20, 1893, to complete the work of paving between Franklin and Duane streets, North river, under Contract No. 452.

H. M. Loud—For an extension of time until February 20, 1894, to complete the deliveries of sawed yellow pine timber, under Contract No. 456, provided the written consent of the sureties is filed in this Department.

The following applications were denied:

F. & M. Schaefer Brewing Company—To build a crib-bulkhead from the north side of East Fifty-first street, a distance of about one hundred and twenty feet north.

Cornelius McMonagle—To occupy a portion of Pier, old 42, North river.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, ordered to be placed on file:

From the Mayor's Office—Enclosing a notice from the Department of Buildings, respecting certain work at the "Washington Pier." Transmit said notice to the International Navigation Company.

From the Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Requesting requisitions for expenses incurred in the examination of the title to the following premises:

Bulkhead rights seventy-five feet next north of Clarkson street, involved in the suit of Daniel D. Lord vs. The Mayor, \$13.80.

Bulkhead between Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets, North river, formerly owned by the Ray estate, \$368.93.

Bulkhead property commencing one hundred feet north of Spring street and extending northwesterly forty feet, involved in the suit of Walter F. Kingsland vs. The Mayor, \$272.05.

The Chief Clerk directed to make requisition for the above amounts.

2d. Respecting the settlement of the claim against Thomas Patten for rent of land under water north of Seventy-fifth street, East river. The Secretary directed to reply.

3d. Respecting the authority of the Department to rent the derrick "City of New York." The Secretary directed to reply.

4th. Transmitting quadruplicate copies of agreement for the purchase of certain bulkhead rights between Piers, old 28 and 29, North river, from the Old Colony Steamboat Company, with his approval as to form indorsed thereon. The officers of the Board authorized to execute.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—Protesting against the removal of the dump from Rutgers to Jackson street, East river, and suggesting the placing of the same foot of Market street. Notify said Department that this Board, under the provisions of chapter 470 of the Laws of 1885, is prohibited from locating a dump thereat.

From the Department of Public Works—Requesting to be informed when the Board intends building a new pier foot of West Twenty-third street. Notify said Department that the Board is considering the advisability of its construction.

From the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission—Requesting blue prints of West street, from the Battery to West Eleventh street, and South street, from South Ferry to Catharine Ferry. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to furnish same.

From the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company—Amending their proposition of the 16th ultimo, by including therein a price for the removal of piles and pile-points. Proposition accepted.

From Simon Stevens, attorney—Respecting the purchase of the property on South street in the vicinity of Old Slip. The Secretary directed to transmit copy to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, together with agreements for the purchase thereof when executed.

From Giovan B. Galotti—Protesting against the erection of a dump foot of East One Hundred and Tenth street.

On motion, the permit granted John Anton, November 29, 1893, was revoked.

From Richard Somerville—Stating that George Grossman claims the exclusive privilege of unloading boats at the bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, North river. Notify said party that no such privilege has been granted.

From the President:

1st. Recommending the extension of Pier, new 43, North river, when said pier is surrendered by the present lessee. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that no further dredging be done at present at Piers, new 44 and 45, North river. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the offer of the owners to sell the property between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, North river, west of Twelfth avenue, for \$550 per front foot, be accepted.

On motion, the owners of said property were requested to submit a written offer.

From the Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Report for the week ending December 16, 1893.

2d. Reporting the completion of building a new pier foot of West Fifteenth street, under Contract No. 454, and the completion of the work of paving between Franklin and Duane streets, North river, under Contract No. 452.

3d. Submitting specifications and form of contract for 8,000 barrels of Portland Cement. Approved, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and the Secretary directed to advertise for estimates.

4th. Reporting damage on the 15th instant to Pier, new 19, North river, by the ferry-boat "Susquehanna." The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair and report the cost for collection from the New York, Lake Erie & Western Railroad Company.

5th. Recommending the building of an incline from the pavement to the Pier at West Eleventh street. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Reporting the non-removal of the fence at One Hundred and Thirty-first street and Lexington avenue, and the filling in thereat by Henry Hart without a permit. Notify said Hart to appear before the Board Thursday, December 28, 1893, and show cause why said fence should not be removed and a penalty imposed for violation of the rules and regulations of this Department in filling in thereat.

No. 13360. As to the construction of a street along Sherman's creek and the erection of a pier. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare plans for the improvement of that portion of the waterfront.

No. 12338. Submitting the cost of removing a sunken canal-boat north of Pier, new 21, North river. The Treasurer authorized to collect.

No. 13058. Submitting cost of repairs to scow "R," damaged by the tug "William H. Vanderbilt." The Treasurer authorized to collect from John H. Starin.

No. 13379. As to the application of the Consolidated Gas Company for a yearly permit to repair and relay gas-pipe on the North river, between Twenty-third and Fifty-seventh streets.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Consolidated Gas Company to repair and relay their gas-pipes on land under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks, for a period of three months, provided that said Company notify the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department when they wish the pavement taken up and trenches excavated, and also agree to pay promptly to the Treasurer, upon presentation of a bill for the same, the cost of such work.

On motion, the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, This Board on the 29th day of November, 1893, adopted preambles and resolutions offering to purchase in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York

all riparian and wharfage rights, and all interests in or appurtenant to the bulkhead on the North river, extending one hundred feet south of Perry street as extended; and

Whereas, The said offer was on the 1st day of December, 1893, served upon the Farmers' Loan and Trust Company, trustees of the estate of Charles S. Miller, deceased; and

Whereas, Said offer has not been accepted by said owners although the time to do so has expired; and

Whereas, It is deemed that no price can be agreed upon between the owners of said property and this Department for the purchase thereof; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and is hereby requested to institute legal proceedings for the acquisition of said property, rights, terms, easements and privileges, for the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, as required by law in such cases made and provided.

The Secretary reported that the pay-rolls for the general repairs and construction force for the week ending December 15, 1893, amounting to \$12,278.05, had been approved and audited and transmitted to the Finance Department for payment.

The Secretary reported that the old material sold this date, pursuant to the resolution adopted December 7, 1893, realized the sum of \$93 83.

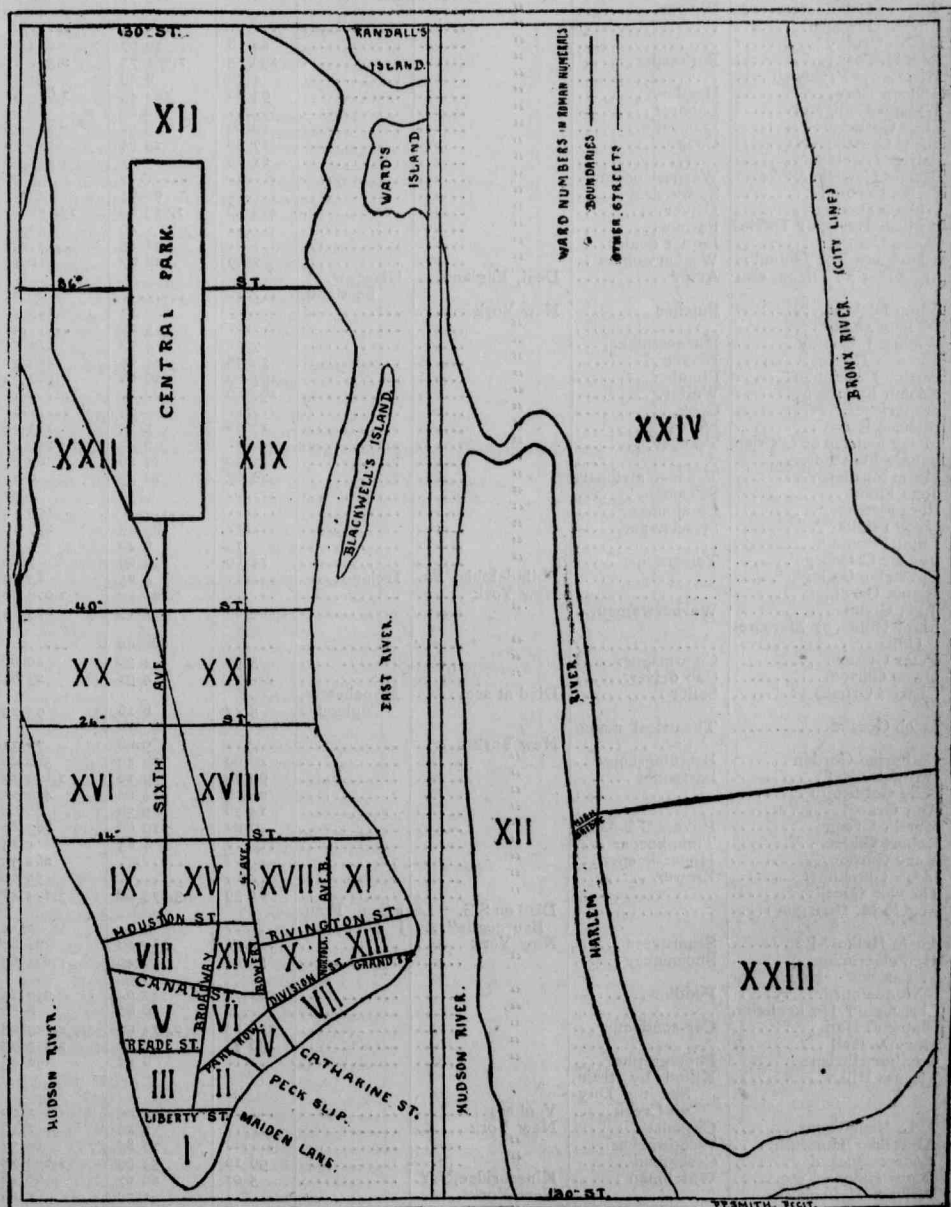

The 824 deaths represent a death-rate of 22.34 against 22.19 for the previous week, and 21.10 for the corresponding week of 1892.

Contagious and infectious diseases continue to increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 187, 292, 117, 8 and 14 against 180, 289, 94, 13 and 11 for the previous week, a total of 618 against 587. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Seventh, Thirteenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-first Wards, and the decrease in the Eighth, Ninth and Twelfth Wards. Measles increased most markedly in the Eleventh, Sixteenth and Twenty-first Wards, while there was a considerable decrease in the Twelfth and Twenty-second Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Tenth, Eighteenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards, and the decrease in the Ninth and Seventeenth Wards. Five of the 8 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 2 of the remaining 3 were below Rivington street. Six of the 14 cases of small-pox were in the Twenty-third Ward, and 5 of the remaining 8 were below Fourteenth street, mostly below Canal street.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 11, 1893, and December
19, 1893, adopted resolutions authorizing the issue of School-house Bonds to be known as "Con-
solidated Stock of the City of New York," pursuant to the provisions of chapter 264 of the Laws
of 1891 and chapter 282 of the Laws of 1893, amounting in all to one hundred and twelve thou-
sand two hundred and fifty-two dollars and seventy cents (\$112,252.70), and requested the Com-
missioners of the Sinking Fund to exempt said bonds from city and county taxation; therefore

Resolved, That the said Consolidated Stock of the City of New York, amounting to one hun-
dred and twelve thousand two hundred and fifty-two dollars and seventy cents (\$112,252.70) so

kin for a corrected deed of certain Old Aqueduct property:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—I present herewith an application of Mr. William Rankin for a new, or corrected
deed of certain Old Aqueduct property, purchased by him at the corporation sale on May 5, 1887,
on account of an error in the description of the deed given to him by the City.

The said property consists of two lots on the northerly side of One Hundred and Sixth street,
east of Tenth or Amsterdam avenue. The error consists in that portion of the description which
reads as follows: "Thence northerly 134 feet and 10 inches to the centre line of the block between
One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Seventh streets, at a point thereon distant 119 feet
and 7 inches easterly from the easterly side of Tenth avenue." The distance stated therein as 119
feet and 7 inches should, it is claimed, be 125 feet and 10 inches, more or less.

Mr. Eugene E. McLean, the Engineer of the Finance Department, has examined into the
merits of this application and reports favorably thereon. He states that the old official map shows
the distance in question as 125 feet and 7 inches, but a recent survey by an acceptable surveyor
makes the distance 125 feet 10 inches.

On November 25, 1893, I addressed a communication to the Counsel to the Corporation,
requesting him, in case he saw no legal objection to the granting of this application, to prepare a
new deed, to be submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their approval. This deed
is herewith submitted, together with a resolution authorizing its due execution as provided by law.

CHAPTER 288.

AN ACT to amend chapter five hundred and fifty-seven of the laws of eighteen hundred and
ninety-two, entitled "An act to authorize the commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New
York to cancel and annul certain assessments and sales to the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of
the city of New York, for assessments affecting property in the city of New York, and directing the
comptroller to mark such assessments accordingly."

Approved by the Governor April 4, 1893 Passed, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as fol-
lows:

Section 1. Section one of chapter five hundred and fifty-seven of the laws of eighteen hundred
and ninety-two, entitled "An act to authorize the commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New
York to cancel and annul certain assessments and sales to the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of
the city of New York for assessments affecting property in the city of New York, and directing the
comptroller to mark such assessments accordingly," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 1. The commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New York are hereby author-
ized and empowered, in their discretion, to cancel and annul all assessments and sales to the mayor,
aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, for assessments or any of them, prior to the
first day of January, eighteen hundred and ninety-three, affecting property in the City of New York
now belonging to the house of the good shepherd or Saint Joseph's orphan asylum in the twelfth
ward, New York city and the comptroller of the city of New York is hereby directed to mark such
assessments and sales for assessments upon the assessment books of the city of New York in accord-
ance with the determination of the said commissioners.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

therefore

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 62, chapter 299, Laws of 1883, as
amended by chapter 487 of the Laws of 1886, and as provided by section 9 of chapter 330, Laws
of 1887, the Comptroller be and he hereby is authorized and directed to issue Armory Bonds in the
name of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, which shall be
denominated "Consolidated Stock of the City of New York," as provided by section 132 of the
New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, to an amount not exceeding the sum of five thousand
two hundred and nine dollars and twenty-four cents (\$5,209.24), payable from taxation, and

redeemable in not less than ten nor more than twenty years from the date of issue, and bearing interest at a rate not exceeding three per cent. per annum, the proceeds of which shall be applied to the payment of the awards of the Commissioners of Estimate, amounting to one thousand four hundred and nine dollars (\$1,409) for certain rights, interests, privileges and easements, of, in and to certain lands on the northerly side of Fourteenth street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues, the title to which has been heretofore acquired by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, and such lawful interest thereon as may become due from October 11, 1893, the date of confirmation by the Supreme Court of the report of the said Commissioners of Estimate, to November 21, 1893, amounting to nine dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$9.39), together with the fees of the Commissioners of Estimate, clerk (services and disbursements), stenographers, room rent, surveyors, and advertisements, amounting to three thousand seven hundred and ninety dollars and eighty-five cents (\$3,790.85).

Resolved, That the said stock shall be and hereby is exempted from taxation by the City and County of New York, in accordance with the provisions of section 137 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 and an ordinance of the Common Council, passed October 2, 1880.

I am therefore willing to delay the enforcement of the injunction granted by Judge Ingraham on the 14th instant, for the removal of the dump, and to allow the Department of Street Cleaning to continue its use to February 1, 1894; conditioned, that the City of New York will, on or before December 29, 1893, pay the entire back monthly rental from May 1, 1885, to February 1, 1894, as per the late agreement with the Department of Street Cleaning approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the 20th day of October, 1884, together with the interest upon the several monthly payments until the day of payment, such payment to be in full of all claims for damages.

Hon. J. SERGEANT CRAM, President, Department of Docks :

SIR—I received last Thursday, by direction of your Board, the "form" of agreements submitted by the Counsel to the Corporation, without his approval, in relation to the sale by my clients of their respective interests in Piers 12 and 13, East river, together with the 224 feet and 1/2 inch of bulkhead on South street next easterly of Old Slip, pursuant to a resolution of your Board passed the 11th day of May, 1893. These drafts of agreements are in the identical terms and conditions specified in my letter to your Board of May 10, 1893.

I have had said agreements duly executed by my clients, and return them herewith for execution by your Department, and transmission to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their action, as required by section 715 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882.

I have before me copies of letters to you from the Counsel to the Corporation under date of August 22 and December 13, 1893, in which he protests against allowing your Department, even with the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to be judges of the value of the property it is proposed to purchase. Section 715 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882 would seem to define the province of all action to be taken in the matter of acquiring property by the Department of Docks.

In reply to that part of Mr. Clark's letter relating to the ownership by the City of one-half of Pier 12, East river, I am inclined to the opinion that he has not made a personal study of either the law or title to the property referred to; therefore, for your and his information, I presume to state it here. It is as follows : That Piers 12, 13, 14 and 15, East river, between Old Slip and Wall street, were sunk and built about the years 1809-1813, pursuant to law, by the proprietors of lots on the opposite or westerly side of South street, and belong to the owners of the upland and no part belongs to the City.

The wharf or bulkhead in front of Old Slip, on the westerly side of Pier 12, and the wharf and bulkhead in front of the foot of Wall street, on the easterly side of Pier 15, belongs to the Corporation of New York, and by virtue of this ownership and of the City paying one-third of the expense of building said Piers 12 and 15, the City became entitled to the slippage of the westerly side of Pier 12, and to the same on the easterly side of Pier 15, respectively, with the right also to collect one-half of the wharfage to arise from the outermost end of said piers.

About the year 1842, Pier 12 was rebuilt by the proprietors of lots on the opposite side of South street, numbered 40, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 47, 48, each of whom paid his share or proportion of two-thirds of the expense thereof, as provided by sections 230 and 231 of the Laws of 1813, and the Corporation paid the other third of said expenses of reconstruction; and in the same manner all repairs and expenses of said Pier 12 were paid up to May, 1856, in proportion to the breadth of their lots, and said private proprietors have received the wharfage derived from the eastern side of the pier, and one-half of its outer end, and the Corporation is in the enjoyment of the slippage collected from the westerly side and the wharfages on one-half of the outer end of the Pier, built by their joint money.

The westerly side of Pier 12 broke down in 1880. Upon a survey afterwards made, the Pier was condemned by the Department of Docks, and with the adjoining bulkhead belonging to the City, on the westerly side of said Pier in front of Old Slip, was repaired or rebuilt in 1881, under a contract (No. 126) made by the Department of Docks representing the Corporation and David Whipple, as agent of Moses Taylor and others, owners of the lots on the westerly side of South street, above referred to, with Warren Rosevelt, contractor, dated February 28, 1881, at a total joint expense of \$23,867.50, of which amount the private proprietors paid \$11,935, and the Corporation of New York paid \$11,932.50 for these reasons alone.

The only right of the City in Pier 12 is the right to the slippage on the westerly side, and one-half of the wharfage of the outermost end, by virtue of its owning the bulkhead at the foot of Old Slip, adjoining the pier, and contributing one-half of the cost of reconstructing said pier for the benefit of said bulkhead.

As to the marketable valuation of the property I would say, the lease of the private interests in said property to Messrs. Dumois & Co., at \$14,000 per annum, besides taxes, assessments, repairs, dredging and insurance, is at the rate of a little over six per cent. per annum on the valuation at \$1,000 per lineal foot measured on the bulkhead-line, including Piers 12 and 13. The City's rental for dumping purposes at \$4.80 added to the Dumois lease, would bring the rental to \$18,800 per annum, or say six per cent. on a valuation of \$300,000.

SIR—With your letter of May 11, 1893, you transmitted a copy of a certain preamble and resolutions adopted at a meeting of the Board of Docks, held on that day, in reference to the proposed purchase of certain bulkhead and wharf property on South street, being Piers 12 and 13, and the bulkhead next northerly of Old Slip.

It is proposed to make this purchase from Simon Stevens, as attorney of Moses Taylor, deceased, and others, at the rate of \$1,000 per lineal foot.

Although your Board has passed a resolution accepting the proposition to purchase the property at the rate mentioned, I cannot refrain from advising you that in my opinion it is not for the interest of the City to make this purchase.

The price is much in excess of any sum that has heretofore been given by the City for dock property. To establish such a precedent voluntarily and before the Courts have passed upon the value of other similar property in that locality is taking a great responsibility.

It would be urged to be an admission upon the part of the City that one thousand dollars per foot was a reasonable price for dock property in that locality.

I take the liberty to suggest that a reconsideration of this subject be had.

Whereas, The said parties of the first part are the proprietors of all the riparian rights, titles, easements and privileges not now owned by the People of the State of New York or the Corporation of the City of New York, incident to and in front of and opposite to the respective stores and land on the westerly side of South street, next northerly of Old Slip, known by street numbers 40, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 47 and 48 South street, and nine feet ten and one-half inches in front of the southerly part of Gouverneur Lane, together with certain interests in Piers 12 and 13, East river, as hereinafter specified or excepted, having a total frontage or bulkhead-line on South street of two hundred and twenty-four feet and one-half of an inch (224 1/2").

Whereas, By section 715 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of the Department of Docks is authorized to acquire by purchase, in the name of and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, wharf property in said city, and all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto, not now owned by the Corporation of the City of New York, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and to pay such owners the price agreed upon, and in case of failure to agree upon a price to initiate legal proceedings to acquire the same for the improvement of the water-front, as provided in said section; and

Now therefore, this agreement witnesseth, That the said parties of the first part, each for himself and herself, and not for another, for and in consideration of the sum of one dollar, lawful money of the United States of America, paid to each of the parties of the first part by the parties of the second part, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, hereby severally agree to sell and convey by good and sufficient deed or deeds of conveyance unto the said parties of the second part, all and singular the riparian rights, terms, easements and privileges on the easterly side of South street, not now owned by the People of the State of New York or the Corporation of the City of New York, commencing at a point on the bulkhead where the line of the northerly side of Old Slip, if extended, would intersect the said easterly side of South street, and running along said bulkhead to a point on the bulkhead opposite to a point four and a half inches northerly of the centre of Gouverneur Lane, a distance of two hundred and twenty-four feet and one-half of an inch (224 1/2"), together with the bulkhead, docks, wharves and their respective interests in Piers 12 and 13, in front thereof, and the land under water and the wharfage and other advantages accruing therefrom or pertaining thereto, or from the water or river opposite the said stores, and opposite the southerly part of Gouverneur Lane, and any and all existing right and rights to any and all future water grants in front of their several lots or stores as hereinafter mentioned, for the just and full sum of two hundred and twenty-four thousand and forty-one dollars and sixty-six cents (\$224,041.66), divided as follows, to wit:

To Moses Taylor Pyne, sole surviving executor of the last will and testament of Moses Taylor, deceased, for ninety-five feet and four inches of the bulkhead in front of and opposite to his stores known by street numbers as 43, 44, 45 and 47 South street, in the City of New York, together with the riparian rights, title, easements and privileges incident or pertaining thereto, not now owned by the People of the State of New York or by the Corporation of the City of New York, including his interest in Piers 12 and 13, East river, the sum of ninety-five thousand three hundred and thirty-three dollars and thirty-three cents (\$95,333.33).

To Herman C. von Post, sole surviving executor of the last will and testament of William Whitlock, Jr., deceased, lessee, and the Trustees of the Sailors' Snug Harbor in the City of New York, owners, for twenty-three feet three inches of the bulkhead in front of and opposite to their store known by street number as 46 South street, in said city, together with the riparian rights, title, easements and privileges incident or pertaining thereto, not now owned by the People of the State of New York or by the Corporation of the City of New York, including their interest in Piers 12 and 13, East river, the sum of twenty-three thousand two hundred and forty-nine dollars and ninety-nine cents (\$23,249.99).

To Henry Lewis Morris, as attorney in fact for Mrs. Anne Caroline Dering, for twenty-five feet of bulkhead in front of the store known by street number as 48 South street, and nine feet ten inches and a half in front of the southerly part of Gouverneur Lane, in the City of New York, together with the riparian rights, title, easements and privileges incident or pertaining thereto, not now owned by the People of the State of New York or by the Corporation of the City of New York, and including her interest in Piers 12 and 13, East river, the sum of thirty-four thousand eight hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$34,875).

It being stipulated by the parties of the first part each for himself and herself, and not for another, and of the essence of this agreement, that the said several parties have good title to and full right to convey their several rights, titles and interests in and to the two hundred and twenty-four feet and one-half of an inch of bulkhead with the land under water and riparian and other rights in front thereof and connected therewith, not now owned by the People of the State of New York or by the Corporation of the City of New York, and each agrees for himself and herself, and not for another, that each of said parties has good title to and full right to convey his or her interest in said piers and the wharfage and other rights connected therewith, excepting any interest of the parties of the second part in Pier number 12, and excepting such interest as the estate of Peter Schermerhorn, deceased, may have in said Pier number 13, by virtue of said Peter Schermerhorn or his predecessors in title, or said estate having joined in the expense of constructing the same by virtue of their right as owner of the lot known by street number as 49 on the north side of Gouverneur Lane.

In witness whereof, the said parties of the first part have hereunto set their respective hands and seals, and the said Department of Docks has caused its seal to be affixed to these presents, and these presents to be signed by its President, Treasurer and Secretary, for and on behalf of the said parties of the second part, the day and year first above written. And these parties hereto have executed this agreement in four parts, one of which is to remain with the executor of the estate of Moses Taylor, deceased, one with the Department of Docks, one with the Counsel to the Corporation, and one with the Comptroller of the City of New York.

 shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving,
 repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and
 discharge such owner from any and every covenant and
 obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, con-
 tained in the water grant under which the premises are
 held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on
 such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or
 avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of
 the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners
 of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of

 shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to
 pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot
 in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable
 to assessment accordingly.

 the following explanation of the operation of this act:
 When notice, as above described, is given to the
 Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or
 lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are
 forever released from all obligation under the grant in
 respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in
 front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assess-
 ment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Com-
 mon Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made
 thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants

 authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and
 when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be
 paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their
 desire and make their application to the Board of Alder-
 men and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who
 has no authority in the matter until directed by
 ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the
 pavement, repavement or repairs.
