Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Board of Health of the Department of Health, the following additional amendment to the sanitary code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a part of the sanitary code:

Section. No boat, scow or other receptacle used in transporting garbage to Breen Island, or the place of disposal, shall be permitted to remain unmoored or to be at any dock, wharf or place within the limits of the City of New York for a longer period than twelve hours from the time garbage is first placed thereon or placed thereon. Every boat, scow or other means of transporting garbage from said city shall be so constructed as to be capable of being tightly closed, and all air outlets sealed by water seals, and all garbage placed on any such boat, scow or receptacle for removal shall be deposited in a manner to the approval of the Board of Health.
