## REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

No. 1239.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment—City of New York,  
Office of the Secretary, No. 277 Broadway,  
October 30, 1906.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—In accordance with the direction contained in the following resolution adopted at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held this day, I have the honor to transmit herewith the Budget of The City of New York for the year 1907 for your consideration and action thereon:

"Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to forthwith transmit to the Board of Aldermen the Budget of The City of New York for the year 1907 for consideration and action thereon, in accordance with the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter."

## BUDGET FOR 1907.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, including State taxes, viz.: One hundred and twenty-two million seven hundred and fifty-six thousand six hundred and sixty-six dollars and sixteen cents (\$122,756,666.16); secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, viz.: Four million six hundred and sixty-four thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$4,664,839.50), and, thirdly, the amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1906, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, viz.: Three million dollars (\$3,000,000), amounting in the aggregate to the sum of one hundred and thirty million four hundred and twenty-one thousand five hundred and five dollars and sixty-six cents (\$130,421,505.66).

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1254.

It is the judgment of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that all children should be fully surrendered by their parents or guardians to the institutions to which they may be committed and the Commissioner of Charities is requested to secure such surrenders as far as possible.

Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and when judicious, no proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the Courts where no crime is proven against the child to the Commissioner of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a Court commitment.

The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide that the children of emigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

A petition from the New York City Undertakers' Association, requesting the recognition of undertakers who have been duly licensed as such, and also that the office for the issuance of burial permits be kept open day and night, which was referred to the Registrar of Records on August 22, 1906, was returned by the Registrar with the recommendation that the request for the recognition of undertakers, who have been duly licensed as such be referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion, and with the further recommendation that the office for the issuance of burial permits be kept open day and night be granted, and that two additional medical clerks be appointed for the purpose. The communication of the Registrar in so far as the second request of the petition was concerned was approved, and the Secretary was directed to request the Municipal Civil Service Commission to submit an eligible list from which to appoint two medical clerks.

A communication was received from the Assistant Sanitary Superintendent, assigned to duty in the Borough of Manhattan, recommending that sections 68 and 69 of the Sanitary Code relating to drugs, medicines, adulterants and poisons, be amended so as to read as follows:

Section 68. No person shall have, sell or offer for sale in The City of New York any food which is adulterated or misbranded. The term food as herein used shall include every article of food and every beverage used by man, and all confectionery.

Food as herein defined shall be deemed adulterated:

(a) If any substance or substances has or have been mixed and packed with it so as to reduce or lower or injuriously affect its quality or strength.

(b) If any inferior or cheaper substances have been substituted wholly or in part for the article.

(c) If any valuable constituent of the article has been wholly or in part abstracted.

(d) If it consists wholly or in part of diseased or decomposed or putrid or rotten animal or vegetable substance, or any portion of any animal unfit for food, whether manufactured or not, or if it is a product of a diseased animal, or one that has died otherwise than by slaughter.

(e) If it be colored or coated or polished or powdered, whereby damage is concealed or it is made to appear better than it really is.

(f) If it contains any added poisonous ingredient, or any ingredient which may render such article injurious to health; or if it contains any antiseptic or preservative not evident and not known to the purchaser or consumer.

(g) If in the case of confectionery it contains terra alba, barytes, talc, chrome yellow or other mineral substance or poisonous color or flavor, or other ingredient deleterious or detrimental to health; or any vinous, malt or spirituous liquor or compound or narcotic drug.

(h) If in the case of spirituous, fermented and malt liquors, they contain any substance or ingredient not normal or healthful to exist in such liquors, or which may be deleterious or detrimental to health when such liquors are used as beverages.

Food shall be deemed misbranded:

(a) If it be an imitation or offered for sale under the distinctive name of another article.

(b) If it be labeled or branded so as to deceive or mislead the purchaser, or purport to be a foreign product when not so; or if the contents of the package as originally put up shall have been removed in whole or in part and other contents shall have been placed in such package; or if it fails to bear a statement on the label of the quantity or proportion of any morphine, opium, cocaine, heroin, chloroform, cannabis indica, chloral hydrate or acetanilid, or any derivative or preparation of any such substances contained therein.

(c) If in package form and the contents are stated in terms of weight or measure, they are not plainly and correctly stated on the outside of the package.

(d) If the package or its label shall bear any statement, design or device regarding the ingredients or the substances contained therein, which statement, design or device shall be false or misleading in any particular; provided, that an article of food which does not contain any added poisonous or deleterious ingredients shall not be deemed to be adulterated or misbranded in the following cases:

First—In the case of mixtures or compounds which may be now or from time to time hereafter known as articles of food, under their own distinctive names, and not an imitation of or offered for sale under the distinctive name of another article, if the name be accompanied on the same label or brand with a statement of the place where said article has been manufactured or produced.

Second—In the case of articles labeled, branded or tagged, so as to plainly indicate that they are compounds, imitations or blends, and the word "compound," "imitation" or "blend," as the case may be, is plainly stated on the package in which it is offered for sale; provided that the term blend as herein used shall be construed to mean a mixture of like substances, not excluding harmless coloring or flavoring ingredients used for the purpose of coloring and flavoring only; and provided further that nothing in this section shall be construed as requiring or compelling proprietors or manufacturers of proprietary foods which contain no unwholesome added ingredient to disclose their trade formulas, except in so far as the provisions of this section may require to secure freedom from adulteration or misbranding.

Sec. 69. No person shall manufacture or produce or have, sell, or offer for sale in the city of New York any drug which is adulterated or misbranded. The term

drug, as herein used, shall include all medicines for external or internal use, or both. Drugs as herein defined shall be deemed adulterated:

(a) If when sold by or under a name recognized in the United States pharmacopeia or National formulary, it differs from the standard of strength, quality or purity, as determined by the test laid down in the United States pharmacopeia or National formulary official at the time of investigation; provided, that no drug defined in the United States pharmacopeia or National formulary shall be deemed to be adulterated under this provision, if the standard of strength, quality or purity be plainly stated upon the bottle, box or other container thereof, although the standard may differ from that determined by the test laid down in the United States pharmacopeia or National formulary.

(b) If its strength or purity falls below the professed standard under which it is sold.

A drug shall be deemed misbranded:

(a) If it be an imitation or offered for sale under the distinctive name of another article.

(b) If the contents of the package as originally put up shall have been removed, in whole or in part, and other contents shall have been placed in such package, or if the package fails to bear a statement on the label of the quantity or proportion of any alcohol, morphine, opium, cocaine, heroin, chloroform, cannabis indica, chloral hydrate or acetanilid, or any derivatives or preparation of any such substances contained therein.

—so as to conform to an act for the prevention of the manufacture, sale or transportation of adulterated or misbranded or poisonous or deleterious foods, drugs, medicines and liquors, and for regulating traffic therein, and for other purposes enacted by the Congress of the United States, was received and laid upon the table for one week.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interest of the City that such a lease

be made, the Comptroller be and hereby is authorized and directed to execute the same, when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter; and further
