MINUTES OF MEETING OF BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK,
HELD IN ROOM 16, CITY HALL, FRIDAY, MAY 17, 1907.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

After disposing of the public improvements calendar the following financial and franchise matters were presented.

The following matters not on the calendar were considered by unanimous consent:

RAPID TRANSIT RAILWAY.

Brooklyn Loop Lines.

The Secretary presented the following:

BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS, }

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Pursuant to the provisions of law, the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York herewith transmits to your Honorable Board the form of a proposed contract for the construction of a part of the proposed Brooklyn Loop Lines in the new extension of Delancey street, between Centre street and the Bowery, Borough of Manhattan, and requests your approval of the said contract for advertising for bids to perform the work therein specified.

The contract is identical in form with the one for that portion of the Brooklyn loop lines in Centre street, between Pearl and Canal streets, which was approved by your Board by resolution adopted March 8, 1907, with the exception only of such changes as are necessitated by the difference in section.

The said proposed contract has also been transmitted, as required by law, to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

The following was offered:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the proposed form of contract submitted by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, with a communication dated May 16, 1907, for the construction of a part of what are more particularly known as "Brooklyn Loop Lines" (Centre street to the Bowery).

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, and the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx—16.

Atlantic Telephone Company, New York Telephone Company and New York and New Jersey Telephone Company.

By resolution duly adopted by the Board December 7, 1906, the Atlantic Telephone Company was requested to submit plans and estimates of cost of the system which it proposes to install; and the reply of the New York Telephone Company and New York and New Jersey Telephone Company, submitted to the Board at its meeting of September 14, 1906, relative to the Empire City Subway Company, Limited, and the grant of an exclusive franchise, was referred to the Corporation Counsel to secure a settlement, if possible, of the suit of the City against the Empire City Subway Company, Limited, and also inform the Board whether, in his opinion, the local authorities have power to grant an exclusive franchise, as requested by the New York Telephone Company and the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company, or make any arrangement equivalent thereto.

The President of the Borough of Brooklyn moved that the Corporation Counsel be requested to submit his opinion as early as possible, so that the Board might take action on the pending applications.

Which motion was adopted.

The financial calendar was then considered.

The Secretary presented the following report and resolution of the Board of Education and report of the Comptroller, to whom on September 14, 1906, was referred said report and resolution, rescinding action taken June 27, 1906, which requested the acquisition of school site located on Stillwell avenue and West Thirteenth street, 100 feet north of Avenue S, Brooklyn, and requesting in lieu thereof the acquisition of property on the same street and avenue, beginning 80 feet north of Avenue S:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Sites respectfully reports that on June 27, 1906, the Board of Education selected as a site for school purposes a plot of land 200 feet by 200 feet on Stillwell avenue and West Thirteenth street, beginning 100 feet north of Avenue S, Borough of Brooklyn. The Appraiser of Real Estate of the Department of Finance reports that the lines of the site as selected will cut up certain plots of land as now laid out, and suggests that property beginning 80 feet north of Avenue S and running either 180 or 240 feet along Stillwell avenue and West Thirteenth street be selected. Your Committee approves of this suggestion and recommends that the action taken on June 27, 1906, be rescinded, and that a plot of land 180 feet by 200 feet on Stillwell avenue and West Thirteenth street, beginning 80 feet north of Avenue S, be selected as a site for school purposes.

The following resolutions are submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That the action taken by the Board of Education on June 27, 1906 (see Journal, pages 1050-51), in selecting and determining as a site for school purposes certain lands and premises on Stillwell avenue and West Thirteenth street, beginning 100 feet north of Avenue S, Borough of Brooklyn, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Resolved, That the Board of Education hereby selects and determines as a site for school purposes the following-described lands and premises on Stillwell avenue and West Thirteenth street, beginning 80 feet north of Avenue S, in Local School Board District No. 38, Borough of Brooklyn, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$4,500:

Beginning at a point on the easterly line of Stillwell avenue distant eighty (80) feet northerly from the northerly line of Avenue S, and running thence northerly along the easterly line of Stillwell avenue one hundred and eighty (180) feet, thence easterly and parallel with Avenue S two hundred (200) feet to the westerly line of West Thirteenth street, thence southerly along the westerly line of West Thirteenth street one hundred and eighty (180) feet, thence westerly and again parallel with Avenue S two hundred (200) feet to the easterly line of Stillwell avenue, the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the lands and premises above described.

SIR—The Board of Education, at a meeting held September 12, 1906, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the action taken by the Board of Education on June 27, 1906 (see Journal, pages 1050-51), in selecting and determining as a site for school purposes certain lands and premises on Stillwell avenue and West Thirteenth street, beginning one hundred feet north of Avenue S, Borough of Brooklyn, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

"Resolved, That the Board of Education hereby selects and determines as a site for school purposes the following-described lands and premises on Stillwell avenue and West Thirteenth street, beginning eighty feet north of Avenue S, in Local School Board District No. 38, Borough of Brooklyn, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$4,500:

"Beginning at a point on the easterly line of Stillwell avenue distant eighty (80) feet northerly from the northerly line of Avenue S, and running thence northerly along the easterly line of Stillwell avenue one hundred and eighty (180) feet, thence easterly and parallel with Avenue S two hundred (200) feet to the westerly line of West Thirteenth street, thence southerly along the westerly line of West Thirteenth street one hundred and eighty (180) feet, thence westerly and again parallel with Avenue S two hundred (200) feet to the easterly line of Stillwell avenue, the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less.

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the lands and premises above described."

An examination of the property shows that the title is held by a number of owners who acquired the property some time ago. The nine lots on Stillwell avenue are owned by two persons, and the nine lots on West Thirteenth street are owned by three persons. After negotiation with the owners they have offered to dispose of their holdings to the City for the sum of \$17,100, which would be equivalent to \$1,900 for every 20-foot lot running through the block. I am of the opinion that this price while full value cannot be considered excessive, in view of the fact that if it were attempted to be acquired by condemnation proceedings, it would cost the City more money.

I would respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the selection of the site by the Board of Education and authorize its acquisition at private sale at a price not exceeding seventeen thousand one hundred dollars (\$17,100), the contract to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

The Committee on Sites respectfully reports that it has given careful consideration to sundry recommendations of the Local School Board of District No. 37 and the City Superintendent of Schools that a site be acquired for a new school building between Public Schools 131 and 134, Borough of Brooklyn, in which there are a large number of children on part time, and is of the opinion that property on Fourteenth avenue, Forty-second and Forty-third streets should be selected for this purpose. It is the intention to erect a new building on this property as soon as title thereto is acquired, provided sufficient funds are available therefor.

The following resolutions are submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That the Board of Education hereby selects and determines as a site for school purposes the following described lands and premises on Fourteenth avenue, Forty-second and Forty-third streets, in Local School Board District No. 37, Borough of Brooklyn, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$7,700:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the northerly line of Forty-third street with the easterly line of Fourteenth avenue, and running thence northerly along the easterly line of Fourteenth avenue two hundred (200) feet four and three-eighths ($4\frac{3}{8}$) inches to the southerly line of Forty-second street; thence easterly along the southerly line of Forty-second street two hundred (200) feet; thence southerly and parallel with Fourteenth avenue two hundred (200) feet four and three-eighths ($4\frac{3}{8}$) inches to the northerly line of Forty-third street; thence westerly along the northerly line of Forty-third street two hundred (200) feet to the easterly line of Fourteenth avenue, the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the lands and premises above described.

SIR—The Board of Education at its meeting held May 8, 1907, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Board of Education hereby selects and determines as a site for school purposes the following described lands and premises on Fourteenth avenue, Forty-second and Forty-third streets, in Local School Board District No. 37, Borough of Brooklyn, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$7,700:

"Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the northerly line of Forty-third street with the easterly line of Fourteenth avenue, and running thence northerly along the easterly line of Fourteenth avenue two hundred (200) feet four and three-eighths ($4\frac{3}{8}$) inches to the southerly line of Forty-second street; thence easterly along the southerly line of Forty-second street two hundred (200) feet; thence southerly and parallel with Fourteenth avenue two hundred (200) feet four and three-eighths ($4\frac{3}{8}$) inches to the northerly line of Forty-third street; thence westerly along the northerly line of Forty-third street two hundred (200) feet to the easterly line of Fourteenth avenue, the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less.

The preamble of the said resolution recites that the Committee on Sites reports that it has given careful consideration to sundry recommendations of the Local School Board of District No. 37 and the City Superintendent of Schools that a site be acquired for a new school building between Public Schools 131 and 134, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in which there are a large number of children on part time, and is of the opinion that property on Fourteenth avenue, Forty-second and Forty-third streets should be selected for this purpose.

The site in question is situated on the easterly side of Fourteenth avenue, between Forty-second and Forty-third streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, the said property having a frontage of 200 feet $4\frac{3}{8}$ inches on Fourteenth avenue with a frontage of 200 feet on each of the said streets. An option has been obtained for the said property in the sum of \$30,000, which price, in my opinion, is not excessive.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the selection of the site heretofore described for the use of the Board of Education, and adopt a resolution authorizing the acquisition of the same at a price not exceeding thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000).

The Secretary presented the following report and resolution of the Board of Education and report of the Comptroller, to whom on May 10, 1907, were referred said report and resolution, requesting the acquisition of a strip of land 33.30 feet by 150 feet on Union Hall street, south of Pacific street, Jamaica, Borough of Queens, in addition to the plot 150 by 200 feet, authorized to be condemned by the Board of Estimate on October 26, 1906:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Sites respectfully reports that on October 10, 1906 (see Journal, pages 1672-73), the Board of Education selected as a site for school purposes a plot of land 150 feet by 200 feet, on the southwest corner of Pacific and Union Hall streets, Jamaica, Borough of Queens. On October 26, 1906, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of title to said land, and the necessary papers were forwarded to the Corporation Counsel on December 18, 1906. Your Committee is now informed by the Department of Finance that the land selected is part of a plot 150 feet by 233.30 feet, and that the owner thereof, while willing to sell the entire plot at a reasonable price, refuses to split the property. As the remainder of the plot can be readily utilized for school purposes, and the acquisition of the site by purchase will do away with the great delay and expense of condemnation proceedings, your Committee recommends that the additional plot, 33.30 feet by 150 feet, be selected.

The following resolutions are submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That the Board of Education hereby selects and determines as a site for school purposes the following-described lands and premises on Union Hall street, south of Pacific street, at Jamaica, in Local School Board District No. 43, Borough of Queens, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$250:

Beginning at a point on the westerly line of Union Hall street distant two hundred (200) feet southerly from the southerly line of Pacific street, and running thence westerly and parallel with Pacific street one hundred and fifty (150) feet, thence southerly and parallel with Union Hall street thirty-three and thirty one-hundredths (33.30) feet, thence easterly and again parallel with Pacific street one hundred and fifty (150) feet to the westerly line of Union Hall street, thence northerly along the westerly line of Union Hall street thirty-three and thirty one-hundredths (33.30) feet to the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less, being that part of Lot No. 214 not included in the proposed school site on Pacific and Union Hall streets selected by the Board of Education on October 10, 1906, and all of Lot No. 215, in Block 9, map of South Side Park, in the Village of Jamaica, Queens County, surveyed by Richard Evans.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the lands and premises above described.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held October 26, 1906, adopted, at the request of the Board of Education, a resolution authorizing the acquisition of a strip of land 200 feet on Union Hall street and 150 feet on Pacific street, in the Borough of Queens, for school purposes. At that time it was impossible to agree with the owners in regard to the price to be paid by the City, and the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment called for its acquisition by condemnation proceedings. Commissioners were appointed in the proceedings and testimony has been taken as to values.

The property, as described in the resolution of the Board of Education, which was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, comprised Lots Nos. 205 to 213, inclusive, and part of Lot No. 214, on "Map of the South Side Park, in the Village of Jamaica, Queens County, New York," and the title submitted to the Commissioners in the proceedings showed that one man was the owner of Lots Nos. 207 to 215, inclusive, which would be 33.30 feet more than the resolution of the Board of Education called for, and had a tax sale title in Lots Nos. 205 and 206. In making the award the Commissioners would allow consequential damages for the destruction of the 33.30 feet remaining to the owner after the greater part was taken.

Mr. Mayo, of the Corporation Counsel's office, who had the proceedings in charge, suggested that we agree upon a price with the owner of the property and acquire the whole parcel at private sale. In order to do this the Board of Education would have to adopt an additional resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve the acquisition of the additional 33.30-foot strip. This was done at a meeting of the Board of Education held May 8, 1907, and the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the Board of Education hereby selects and determines as a site for school purposes the following-described lands and premises on Union Hall street, south of Pacific street, at Jamaica, in Local School Board District No. 43, Borough of Queens, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$250:

"Beginning at a point in the westerly line of Union Hall street distant two hundred (200) feet southerly from the southerly line of Pacific street, and running thence westerly and parallel with Pacific street one hundred and fifty (150) feet, thence southerly and parallel with Union Hall street thirty-three and thirty one-hundredths (33.30)

feet, thence easterly and again parallel with Pacific street one hundred and fifty (150) feet to the westerly line of Union Hall street, thence northerly along the westerly line of Union Hall street thirty-three and thirty one-hundredths (33.30) feet to the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less, being that part of Lot No. 214 not included in the proposed school site on Pacific and Union Hall streets selected by the Board of Education on October 10, 1906, and all of Lot No. 215, in Block 9, Map of South Side Park, in the Village of Jamaica, Queens County, surveyed by Richard Evans.

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the lands and premises above described."

The owner of the property has agreed to dispose of to the City at private sale Lots Nos. 207 to 215, inclusive, to which he has free fee title, and to give all his right, title and interest to Lots Nos. 205 and 206, the right, title and interest being a tax sale certificate.

Of course the proceeding now pending will only apply to Lots Nos. 205 and 206, and the City having a tax sale title, acquired from the present owner, it is up to the owner, after awards have been made, to prove the validity of his title against the City.

The price asked by the owner of the property, Mr. L. Gusthal, is \$6,000. The acquisition of the property at this price has the approval of the Assistant Corporation Counsel in charge of the proceeding. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution approving of the action of the Board of Education requesting the acquisition of property 33.30 feet in width in front by 150 feet in depth, situated on the westerly side of Union Hall street, 200 feet south of Pacific street, Borough of Queens, and authorize the acquisition at private sale, on the part of the Comptroller, of Lots Nos. 207 to 215, inclusive, in Block 9 on said map, and Lots Nos. 205 and 206 on said map, the said Lots Nos. 207 to 215, inclusive, being by full covenant warranty deed, and Lots Nos. 205 and 206 being by quit-claim deed, at a price not exceeding \$6,000, said contract to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

No action need be taken by the Board of Education rescinding the original resolution authorizing the acquisition by condemnation proceedings, for the reason that the Corporation Counsel will have had notice of the acquisition at private sale and will lay the matter before the Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal as to all the lots, with the exception of Lots Nos. 205 and 206. As to Lots Nos. 205 and 206, he can request the Commissioners to make the award in favor of The City of New York, leaving the question to be determined in the courts as to the validity of Mr. Gusthal's title to these two lots.

Beginning at a point on the westerly side of Union Hall street distant 200 feet southerly from the intersection of the southerly side of Pacific street with the westerly side of Union Hall street, and running thence southerly along the westerly side of Union Hall street 33.30 feet; thence westerly and parallel with Pacific street 150 feet; thence northerly parallel with Union Hall street 33.30 feet; thence easterly and again parallel with Pacific street 150 feet to the point or place of beginning.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment having heretofore adopted a resolution authorizing the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the site heretofore selected by the Board of Education, on Pacific and Union Hall streets; and

Whereas, The Comptroller has reported to this Board that he can acquire all of the property within the area of the land heretofore approved to be acquired by said condemnation proceedings, with the exception of two lots, and also can acquire the 33.30 feet described above in this resolution at private sale for the sum of \$6,000; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he hereby is authorized to enter into contracts for the acquisition of the property first above described, being 33.30 feet in width, front and rear, by 150 feet in depth, and also the property which is bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the southerly side of Pacific street with the westerly side of Union Hall street and running thence southerly along the westerly side of Union Hall street 200 feet; thence westerly, parallel with Pacific street, 150 feet; thence northerly, parallel with Union Hall street, 100 feet; thence easterly, parallel with Pacific street, 50 feet; thence northerly, again parallel with Union Hall street, 100 feet to the southerly side of Pacific street, and thence easterly, along the southerly side of Pacific street, 100 feet to the point or place of beginning, together with all the right, title and interest of the owners of said premises of, in and to the streets in front thereof to the centre thereof, —for the consideration of six thousand dollars (\$6,000), said contracts to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

The Secretary presented the following report and resolutions of the Board of Education and report of the Comptroller, to whom on May 10, 1907, were referred said report and resolutions, rescinding action taken October 24, 1906, requesting the acquisition of property 200 feet by 200 feet 5½ inches, on the northerly side of Lott avenue, running from Hopkinson avenue to Amboy street, Brooklyn, and requesting in lieu thereof the acquisition of property 200 feet by 220 feet, on the southerly side of Lott avenue, running from Hopkinson avenue to Amboy street, Brooklyn:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Sites respectfully reports that on October 24, 1906, the Board of Education selected as a site for school purposes a plot of land 200 feet by 200 feet 5½ inches, on the northerly side of Lott avenue, running from Hopkinson avenue to Amboy street, Borough of Brooklyn, and the matter of authorizing the acquisition thereof is still pending before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Since the selection of this site its value has been greatly increased by the erection of buildings thereon, and as your Committee is informed that property, 200 feet by 220 feet, on the southerly side of Lott avenue, immediately opposite, can be purchased at a reasonable price, it is recommended that the resolution adopted on October 24, 1906, selecting the property on the northerly side of Lott avenue, be rescinded and that, in lieu thereof, the property on the southerly side of Lott avenue, running from Hopkinson avenue to Amboy street, be selected.

Resolved, That the Board of Education hereby selects and determines as a site for school purposes the following described lands and premises on the southerly side of Lott avenue, running from Hopkinson avenue to Amboy street, in Local School Board

District No. 39, Borough of Brooklyn, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$9,700:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the southerly line of Lott avenue with the westerly line of Hopkinson avenue, and running thence southerly along the westerly line of Hopkinson avenue two hundred and twenty (220) feet; thence westerly and parallel with Lott avenue two hundred (200) feet to the easterly line of Amboy street; thence northerly along the easterly line of Amboy street two hundred and twenty (220) feet to the southerly line of Lott avenue; thence easterly along the southerly line of Lott avenue two hundred (200) feet to the westerly line of Hopkinson avenue, the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the lands and premises above described.

SIR—The Board of Education, at a meeting held October 24, 1906, selected as a site for school purposes a plot of land 200 by 200 feet 5½ inches on the northerly side of Lott avenue, running from Hopkinson avenue to Amboy street, Borough of Brooklyn, and requested that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve the selection and authorize the acquisition thereof. An examination of the property showed that there were two two-story brick buildings on the rear portion of the site to be acquired on Hopkinson avenue, and after consultation with Mr. March, Chairman of the Committee on Sites of the Board of Education, it was decided to rescind this resolution and approve the selection of a site across the street, on the southerly side of Lott avenue. Thereupon the Board of Education, at a meeting held May 8, 1907, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Board of Education on October 24, 1906 (see Journal, pages 1746-47), selecting and determining as a site for school purposes certain lands and premises on the northerly side of Lott avenue, running from Hopkinson avenue to Amboy street, Borough of Brooklyn, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

"Resolved, That the Board of Education hereby selects and determines as a site for school purposes the following described lands and premises on the southerly side of Lott avenue, running from Hopkinson avenue to Amboy street, in Local School Board District No. 39, Borough of Brooklyn, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$9,700:

"Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the southerly line of Lott avenue with the westerly line of Hopkinson avenue, and running thence southerly along the westerly line of Hopkinson avenue two hundred and twenty (220) feet, thence westerly and parallel with Lott avenue two hundred (200) feet to the easterly line of Amboy street, thence northerly along the easterly line of Amboy street two hundred and twenty (220) feet to the southerly line of Lott avenue, thence easterly along the southerly line of Lott avenue two hundred (200) feet to the westerly line of Hopkinson avenue, the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less.

The property described in the above resolution is part of a tract of land which was cut up into building lots and laid out and sold to individual parties. This office has been enabled to enter into negotiations with the owners, and the City can acquire the entire property, 200 feet on Lott avenue by 220 feet on Amboy street and Hopkinson avenue, for the sum of \$24,650. This price while full value is not, in my opinion, excessive. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the selection of the site by the Board of Education and authorize its acquisition at private sale at a price not exceeding twenty-four thousand six hundred and fifty dollars (\$24,650).

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Comptroller, requesting the appointment of a Commission to consider the establishment of the prevailing rate of wages in the various City Departments:

May 14, 1907.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—In view of the fact that there have accumulated in the Finance Department between nine and ten thousand claims, aggregating approximately \$10,000,000, under the prevailing rate of wages law, I issued on May 1, a circular-letter, of which the inclosed is a copy, to the various heads of Departments, with a view, in the first place, of guarding against similar claims in future in case any of the Departments were paying less than the prevailing rate of wages for various trades. As Comptroller, I have no desire to in any way nullify or circumvent the operation of the prevailing rate of wages law, and do not deem it right that any other official should do so.

The discussion aroused by the circular indicates that the law is being violated in various Departments, and in order to rectify this and guard against future violation, I suggest that a Special Committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, a representative of the Corporation Counsel's office and the Chairman of the Committee on Salaries and Offices of the Board of Aldermen be appointed to consult with representatives of the various trades and report their conclusions and recommendations to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, so that the prevailing rate of wages may be established and paid, pursuant to the requirements of the law.

NEW YORK, April 29, 1907.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

DEAR SIRS—To fill the vacancies caused by some recent resignations among the Assistants in this Department, I desire to make certain promotions of other Assistants in lower grades. There are in the schedule of positions as now fixed grades at \$5,000, \$6,000 and \$7,500, but no intermediate grades at \$5,500, \$6,500 and \$7,000. Instead of making a few promotions with increases of salary of \$1,000 or \$1,500, I would prefer to make more promotions, with increases of \$500 each.

I inclose herewith a resolution establishing five new positions of Assistants at \$7,000; five new positions of Assistants at \$6,500; five new positions of Assistants at \$6,000, and one additional position in the clerical schedule of Assistant Chief Clerk at \$4,500, there now being no grade in the clerical schedule between \$4,000 and \$5,000.

Although on its face this application may appear to create fifteen additional positions of Assistants in this Department, you are doubtless aware that I cannot increase the number of Assistants because of the refusal of the State Civil Service Commission to allow more than seventy-five Assistants in the Law Department, neither is it my purpose at the present time to fill all of the newly created positions by promotion, but the addition of these intermediate grades will make the salary schedule more elastic than at present, and will enable me to arrange the salaries of the Assistants upon a more equitable basis.

In the Budget for 1907 the Board of Estimate and Apportionment provided a sufficient sum to pay all of the increases in salary which are provided for by this resolution, and after filling the vacancies caused by the recent resignations there will be a balance in the salary appropriation, which may be used for promotions, amounting to about \$10,000. This money was asked for by my predecessor, and granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for that express purpose.

It has not been possible for me to bring this matter before your Board at an earlier date, for the reason that I have found it necessary to make a very careful study of the needs of the various offices and bureaus of the Department, and I have not been able until the present time to fully decide on the proper adjustment of the salaries of the Assistants.

When this matter comes before your Board for consideration I would be very glad to appear and explain at length the details of this application.

SIR—In the matter of a communication addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Corporation Counsel, under date of April 29, 1907, relative to the establishment of certain additional grades of positions in the Law Department, which communication was presented to said Board on May 3, 1907, referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and President of the Board of Aldermen for consideration, and by you referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to submit the following report:

Under date of May 8, 1907, the Corporation Counsel addressed a further communication to the Committee on Salaries of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment amending his original request. From these two communications it appears that the new grades of positions which the Corporation Counsel desires to establish are:

Assistant, at \$7,000 per annum for four incumbents;
Assistant, at \$6,500 per annum for four incumbents;
Assistant, at \$5,500 per annum for four incumbents;
Assistant Chief Clerk, at \$4,500 per annum for one incumbent,

—and also the increasing of the number of incumbents in the position of Assistant at \$4,000 per annum, from four incumbents to seven incumbents.

The Corporation Counsel states that the salaries in force in the Law Department (not including the Bureau of Street Openings) on April 27, 1907, were in part as follows:

Four Assistants, at \$10,000 per annum each;
Four Assistants, at \$7,500 per annum each;
Ten Assistants, at \$6,000 per annum each;
Thirteen Assistants, at \$5,000 per annum each;
Two Assistants, at \$4,500 per annum each;
Four Assistants, at \$4,000 per annum each;
Five Assistants, at \$3,500 per annum each;
Eight Assistants, at \$3,000 per annum each;
Five Assistants, at \$2,500 per annum each;
Four Assistants, at \$2,000 per annum each;
Three Assistants, at \$1,500 per annum each;
One Chief Clerk, at \$5,000 per annum;
One Assistant Chief Clerk, at \$1,400 per annum.

—and that to fill the vacancies caused by recent resignations among the Assistants in his department he desires to make certain promotions of other Assistants in lower grades.

It appears that among said resignations are those of Hon. Arthur C. Butts, former Assistant Corporation Counsel, at \$7,500 per annum, and Hon. Charles M. Harris, former Assistant Corporation Counsel, at \$6,000 per annum, both of whom have been appointed City Magistrates. The Corporation Counsel states that instead of making a few promotions, at increases of \$1,000 or \$1,500 in annual salary, he prefers to make a larger number of promotions with increases of but \$500 each.

The present number of Assistants (including the Bureau of Street Openings) is 75 and the Corporation Counsel states that the State Civil Service Commission will not permit him to increase the number of said positions, and that therefore it is not his purpose to fill all of the positions he desires to establish by promotion, but that such schedule being more elastic than that at present in force it will enable him to arrange the salaries of his Assistants upon a more equitable basis.

Since the Budget appropriation for the Law Department for 1907 provides ample funds to meet all the changes in salaries contemplated by the Corporation Counsel, and since in his opinion such changes will make the compensation of his Assistants more equitable, it would appear to your examiner that the desired changes should be made.

In regard to the new grade of Assistant Chief Clerk at \$4,500 per annum, it appears that Andrew T. Campbell, Chief Clerk of the Law Department at a salary of \$5,000 per annum, has been in the City's employ for nearly half a century, and that he will celebrate his fiftieth anniversary in such service on June 1, 1907. The present Assistant Chief Clerk, J. R. Greener, has been in the City's employ for about 22 years, and it would appear to your examiner that the important nature of the duties performed by him and the long service he has rendered properly entitle him to the increased compensation contemplated.

Your Examiner would therefore respectfully recommend that the amended request of the Corporation Counsel receive approval at the hands of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the adoption of the resolution hereto attached.

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held May 10, 1907, a communication was presented to said Board from the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York, transmitting a certified copy of a resolution adopted by said Board of Trustees relative to the purchase of the lot and building on the northwest corner of One Hundred and Forty-first street and Convent avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the college, and at that meeting the communication was referred to you for consideration and report.

Under date of May 15, 1907, Honorable Edward M. Shepard writes that he has been given an option on the property for \$39,000, which price, he has been informed, is fair and reasonable; that the option expired on the 15th, but that he would endeavor to have it renewed for a few days.

The property located on the corner above described is known as Lot No. 11, in Block 2058, Section 7, on the land maps of The City of New York, for the purposes of taxation, and for said purpose is assessed at \$20,000, being \$7,600 for the land and \$12,400 for the building. The property is known by the number 280 Convent avenue, and has on it a four-story American basement stone private house, with entrance on One Hundred and Forty-first street. The cellar is about ten feet in height, light, perfectly dry and well ventilated, contains two Nugeit furnaces, both in perfect condition, a dry storeroom for furniture and two wine cellars partitioned off, as well as coal bins, said bins containing about fifteen to twenty tons of coal. The basement floor contains a large billiard room, trimmed in quartered oak, entrance hall also quartered oak; large, well appointed kitchen furnished with Defiance range, and ample closet and kitchen dresser space. In the rear of this, in extension, is a laundry, fully appointed with porcelain tubs. The parlor floor contains large front parlor, trimmed in white mahogany, elegant mantel, large foyer trimmed in quartered oak; dining room, quartered oak, containing sideboard and cabinet; smoking room in the extension, trimmed in red mahogany. Floor above parlor is trimmed throughout in white and bird's-eye maple and contains large front bedroom and large rear bedroom, with good size dressing room between, and bath in extension. The third floor contains five rooms, three for servants, with ample closet room, medium size bedroom in centre and large bedroom in front.

The trim throughout the house is cabinet mantels in all bedrooms and foyer rooms. Grates and fixtures in three lower floors, inlaid floors throughout, with the exception of top floor, elegant chandeliers, with electric appliances for lighting same, and burglar alarm throughout, with large clock attachment. House is in first-class condition and is nicely decorated. Double shades in all windows, fitted with curtain poles with patent pulls for portieres. The house contains three baths and three toilets; two of the baths are tiled and one common one for servants. The building is 20 feet wide by 55 feet in depth, with a two-story extension 18 feet in depth by 13 feet in width. The property is owned by Mr. Schwartz.

I am of the opinion that the price named by Mr. Shepard, \$39,000, is reasonable and just, and I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution approving of the resolution of the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York, and authorizing the acquisition of the property at private sale at a price not exceeding \$39,000. This value of \$39,000 has also been approved by Mr. John T. Duff, a real estate expert in the vicinity, and by Mr. Bryan L. Kennelly, of No. 156 Broadway, Manhattan.

GENERAL SPECIFICATIONS, RECONSTRUCTION OF THE WESTERLY OR MANHATTAN TERMINAL OF THE NEW YORK AND BROOKLYN BRIDGE.

Scope.

The reconstruction of the present terminal for the purpose of connecting the bridge railway traffic with a subway station on Centre street to the north of the present bridge terminal, and to afford better facilities for trolley railway and elevated railway traffic at the bridge.

Subway Approach.

The construction of a depressed approach through the present bridge terminal, to include changes in direction and grade of the present elevated railway tracks and alterations in the present steel and masonry construction to permit carrying elevated railway or subway trains under the present station on a descending grade to Park row and Centre street.

Ground Floor.

The ground floor of the terminal will provide a clear passageway for pedestrians without the necessity of crossing railway tracks. There will be numerous stairways from this floor to the trolley railway terminal on the floor above.

Trolley Terminal.

On the first floor above the ground floor will be constructed an eight-loop trolley terminal, involving changes in the direction and grade of the present trolley railway tracks in the terminal, and changes in the present structure.

Foot Bridge Across Centre Street.

Crossing Centre street and Park row will be a foot bridge, permitting entrance to the station from the westerly side of Centre street and City Hall Park. Stairways will be constructed, leading from this foot bridge to the bridge elevated railway terminal above, and means of access will also be provided to the City Hall station of the Third avenue elevated railway line.

Bridge Elevated Railway Terminal.

On the floor above the trolley terminal will be constructed a four-pocket stub-end terminal, for the use of elevated railway traffic originating at the bridge. This terminal will accommodate trains of six-car lengths and will involve changes in the construction of tracks, switches and signals. This, with the subway connection will provide for the maximum traffic capacity of the bridge.

Facade.

An ornamental facade will be constructed on the Park row face of the station structure.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
