Dear Sirs—I am informed that on April 24, 1906, a resolution was adopted by your honorable Board, that the No. 126-A shall be used on the property on the west, adjoining my property, which is located as above, to wit, 126 West 127th street. I beg to state that since taking title to my property, I have suffered a law suit, have had mail miscarried, and parcels and marketing left with my tenants, and afterwards claimed by the tenants next door; have been threatened with all kinds of suits for non-payment of bills (for coal, for gas, for repairs, for violations); tenants have threatened to break their leases on account of inconvenience and annoyance caused by the house not being properly numbered.

I beg to state that my premises occupy a full lot, 25 by 100; and as a taxpayer I am entitled from further annoyance; this can only be done by reconstructing the numbers, either to the east or west. I do not care which, I only ask for an exclusive number, be it 124 or 126, but I will not accept a half number, as such a course would depreciate my property, the tenants would not stand for it, and new tenants would not take an apartment and pay high rentals in a house not properly numbered. As for myself, I reside on the premises, and am about on the verge of nervous prostration on account of the annoyance and confusion caused by this unwarranted condition of affairs, which I am sure your honorable body will at once recognize (from my point of view) as being detrimental to my property and my interests. Your earliest and prompt attention to this matter will greatly oblige. Awaiting your rep

City Hall, New York: Dear Sir-Referring to the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted January 17, 1911, regarding the installation of suitable and substantial railings at the elevated stations in Brooklyn, I beg to say that after a full investigation and consideration the Commission is of the opinion that it would not be best to institute a proceeding looking to the adoption of an order requiring the company to install such railings. The considerations upon which this conclusion is based are that from an operating point of view

such railings would be particularly objectionable, and for the following reasons: (1) Many times the trains would run by their proper stopping points; this would produce confusion and delay because of the interference with embarking and disem-

(2) Again, the safety of passengers would not be fully safeguarded unless the that a court not less than 6 feet wide be railing openings were equipped with gates, because passengers would still be able to

(3) If the railing gates were installed in connection with the railings, another element of delay would be introduced in the train operation. The incidental delays due 1911, southwest corner Irving place and to opening the gates would tend to increase the station stops and thus retard the train

(4) The railings alone, or railings and gates combined, by introducing other elements of delay and interference with the train movement, would be so detrimental to the service during the rush hours that it is believed that it would undoubtedly result in a necessary reduction in the service, in order to permit the train movement to be

Gentlemen—It has been our custom for several years to purchase coal at public letting wherever we could take it in sufficient quantity to secure competition, but our experience is that through advertisement and public letting, we only secure the regular market rate; the City, therefore, actually pays more for the coal through public letting than by open order, for the cost of advertising and the time of various City officials, in handling the necessary legal and clerical work connected with the preparation of contract forms and the registration of final contract, must be added.

We expect to continue to call for bids by this method, whenever possible, but we have occasion to use in the aggregate a considerable quantity of the coal, where delivery is at varying places and in variable small quantities. We can get very much better terms by issuing an open market order to a small dealer in the immediate vicinity of where the coal may be needed than through a contract by public letting, entered into with some larger dealer, necessarily months in advance, and it is only the larger concerns who will bid and who then name prices high enough to cover any possible condition of delivery as to place and time and size of lot that may be called for.

We would ask, therefore, that as a measure of true economy we be permitted to purchase through the year 1911, without public letting, coal to the amount of \$4.000. Yours respectfully,


