Gentlemen—The Commissioner of the Department of Bridges, in a communication to your Board under date of November 12, 1914, requests a renewal of the lease of certain property lying east of Westchester Creek and north of East 177th Street, Borough of the Bronx, used for the easterly approach to the temporary Unionport bridge, for a period of one year from March 1, 1915, at an annual rental of \$600. He states that it will be necessary to retain these premises until the new permanent Unionport bridge is built, and the temporary bridge removed.

Naval Militia Headquarters—Hiring by, of Premises at No. 2 Rector Street, Borough of Manhattan.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolutions:

December 30th, 1914.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—I am in receipt of a communication from Commodore R. P. Forshaw, Commanding Officer of the Naval Militia, stating that the space assigned to him on the 27th floor of the Municipal Building will not be available until May 1, 1915, at the very earliest, and also that the present premises occupied by him at No. 2 Rector Street, Manhattan, known as Room 1101, is inadequate for the proper transaction of the Naval Militia business, and he requests that a lease be secured of Rooms 1027 and 1029 in the same building in lieu of the present Room 1101.

The space at present occupied by the Commander of the Naval Militia in Room 1101 contains about 299 square feet, whereas the space assigned to him in the Municipal Building is approximately 1,100 square feet, therefore his request for the leasing of Rooms 1027 and 1029, containing about 496 square feet, seems reasonable.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay to John Auer, 648 Lexington Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, rent at the rate of fourteen hundred dollars (\$1,400) a year, for premises at No. 249 Manhattan Avenue, southwest corner of Powers Street, Borough of Brooklyn, consisting of a two-story and high basement brick dwelling 22 feet by 36 feet, with 1-story and high basement brick extension 22 feet by 30 feet, used for court purposes by the Fifth District City Magistrate's Court, said occupancy to be on a month to month basis for a period not exceeding one year from May 18, 1914, without the necessity of entering into a lease; said rent to be payable quarterly; the City to have the right to terminate the occupancy at any time upon giving thirty days' written notice of its intention so to do. The lessor to pay taxes and water rates, make inside and outside repairs and put and keep the premises in good and tenable condition; the lessee to furnish heat, light and janitor service.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Board of Elections—Hiring by, of Room in the Manhattan Storage Warehouse, 7th Avenue and 52nd Street, Borough of Manhattan.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

December 30th, 1914.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Secretary of the Board of Elections, in a communication to your Board under date of November 25, 1914, states that at a meeting of the Board of Elections held November 24, 1914, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York be requested to authorize the Comptroller of the City of New York to pay to the Manhattan Storage Warehouse Co., 52nd Street and 7th Avenue, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, the sum of \$12 per month, without the necessity of entering into a lease, until such time as the Board of Elections of the City of New York shall terminate the same, for the purpose of storing the ballots, etc., cast at the special election held April 7th, 1914, which is caused by an order signed by the Hon. Justice Philbin of the Supreme Court of the City of New York."

The room proposed to be leased in the Manhattan Storage and Warehouse Company's building at 52nd Street and 7th Avenue, Manhattan, is designated as Room 20 on the sixth floor, Section B, and contains about 1,000 cubic feet of storage space. The rent above mentioned is therefore at the rate of approximately 14.4 cents a cubic foot a year, which in my opinion is fair and reasonable.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing the Comptroller to pay to the Manhattan Storage and Warehouse Company, 7th Avenue and 52nd Street, Borough of Manhattan, the sum of \$12 a month, from November 24, 1914, for the storage of ballot boxes in Room 20 on the sixth floor, Section B, in the building at the northeast corner of 7th Avenue and 52nd Street, Borough of Manhattan, said payment to continue until such time as the Board of Elections of the City of New York shall terminate the same, or until the boxes are released by an order of the Court, without the necessity of entering into a lease therefor.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay to the Manhattan Storage and Warehouse Company the sum of twelve dollars (\$12) a month from November 24, 1914, for the storage of ballot boxes by the Board of Elections in Room 20 on the 6th floor, Section B in the building at the northeast corner of 7th Avenue and 52d Street, Borough of Manhattan, said payment to continue until such time as the Board of Elections of the City of New York shall terminate the same, or until the boxes are released by an order of the court, said payment to be made without the necessity of entering into a lease.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

President, Borough of Queens—Application of, for a Lease of Premises No. 331 Park Street, Richmond Hill.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

December 17th, 1914.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

Gentlemen—The Acting President of the Borough of Queens, in a communication to your Board under date of November 25, 1914, requests a lease of premises known as 331 Park Street, Richmond Hill, Borough of Queens, consisting of a frame shop next to brick store on corner of Railroad Avenue, with yardage in rear of same, with privilege of erecting shed thereon, at an annual rental of \$300, for use of the Bureau of Street Cleaning; the lessor to put premises in good order and install wash basin and pay water rent; the lessee to pay for heat, light and janitor service, and erect shed on said lot.

Upon investigation by the Division of Real Estate of this Department, it was found that the rental asked is excessive, and the matter was taken up with the owner of the premises who refuses to make any concessions.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the application of the Acting President of the Borough of Queens for a lease of premises No. 331 Park Street, Richmond Hill, Borough of Queens, be denied for the reason that the rental asked is excessive, and that the President of the Borough of Queens be notified of this action.

Resolved, That the application of the President of the Borough of Queens, for a lease of premises known as 331 Park Street, Richmond Hill, Borough of Queens, at a rental of three hundred dollars (\$300) per annum, be and the same is hereby denied, for the reason that the rental is excessive.

Rescinding Resolution Authorizing a Sale at Public Auction of Certain Lands Located in the Town of Somers, County of Westchester.

Discussion followed. The matter was then withdrawn from the calendar and not to be brought up again until it was learned what action the legislature might take in the way of merging the Court of Special Sessions and the City Magistrates Courts.

Petition of the New York County Association of the Criminal Bar for the Assignment of Room in the Criminal Courts Building.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller brought up the matter of petition of the New York County Association of the Criminal Bar, for the assignment of room in the Criminal Courts Building, for use and occupancy of said association and lawyers practicing in the Criminal Courts as well as for members of the bar generally, which was laid over for one month at meeting held December 2, 1914.

Withdrawn from the calendar.

City Clerk—Assignment to, of Additional Space in the Municipal Building.

The Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, brought up for consideration an application of The City Clerk for additional room in the Municipal Building.

Discussion followed.

The following resolution was then offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby assign to the City Clerk the triangular shaped room on the third floor of the Municipal Building, adjoining the Library on the south, containing 810 square feet of space.

Which resolution was adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Offer of Frank H. Tyler to Lease Certain Property to the City, at 269-271 State Street, Borough of Brooklyn, for Storage Purposes.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report:

December 17th, 1914.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

Gentlemen—There has been referred to me for consideration, a communication from Frank H. Tyler, offering for lease to the City certain premises which may be used for storage purposes, at 269-271 State Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Inasmuch as the City is not in the market for leasing space of this character, I respectfully recommend that this communication be placed on file, and that the Secretary of your Board be directed to notify him to this effect. Respectfully,

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

Gentlemen—In the premises known as 125-127 Worth Street, Borough of Manhattan, the 3d, 4th and 5th floors are occupied by the Standard Testing Laboratory of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, leaving vacant the basement, first and second floors thereof.

These premises were acquired by the City of New York on August 5, 1913, as a site for the new Court House, under Chapter 336 of the Laws of 1903 and amendatory acts. I believe that the floors occupied by the Standard Testing Laboratory should be formally assigned by your Commission, and that the President of the Borough of Manhattan should be requested to take charge of the building.

The report was accepted, and the resolutions severally adopted, all the members presenting voting in the affirmative.

Realty Trust—In the Matter of Conveyance to, of Certain Land Owned by the City, on the Southerly Side of 55th Street Between 18th and 19th Avenues, Borough of Brooklyn (Block 5494), in Consideration of a Deed to the City of Part of Its Property on the Same Block Free and Clear from All Incumbrances.

The following communication was received from the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting resolution concurring in the action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Gentlemen—The Secretary of the Department of Health, in a communication to your Board under date of December 2, 1914, states that at a meeting of the Board of Health held November 24, 1914, a resolution was adopted requesting that a lease be authorized of the single store at the easterly side of and adjoining the present milk station, located at 508-510 West 47th Street, Borough of Manhattan, and to be used by the Department of Health in connection with said milk station, for a period of one year from January 1, 1915, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions, at a rental of \$180 per annum, payable quarterly.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of the single store on the first floor of premises located at 508-510 West 47th Street, Borough of Manhattan, with cellar underneath, said store being located at the easterly side of and adjoining the two stores now used as an Infants' Milk Station, for use of the Department of Health, for a period of one year from January 1, 1915, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions, at a rental of \$180 per annum, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, make inside and outside repairs, furnish steam heat; cause door opening to be cut in wall dividing the stores; cause gas fixtures to be placed on gas outlets after present tenant removes his fixtures; cause all walls and ceilings to be cleaned, plastered and repaired, and repaint entire interior of store with white paint; have all glass of show window and door cleaned of all lettering, signs, etc., and leave all glass clean and whole; cause all other repairs to be made to floors, etc., as required, and will replace sink removed by present tenant, if same is required. Lessor will grant the lessee the privilege of making slight interior alterations and repairs as the same may be required during occupancy. Lessor, Model Fireproof Tenement Company, 567 Tenth Avenue, Borough of Manhattan. Respectfully, ALEX. BROUGH, Deputy and Acting Comptroller.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City, from the Model Fireproof Tenement Company, of the single store on the first floor of premises located at 508-510 West 47th Street, Borough of Manhattan, with cellar underneath, said store being located at the easterly side of and adjoining the two stores now used as an Infants' Milk Station, for use of the Department of Health, for a period of one year from January 1, 1915, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions, at a rental of One hundred and eighty dollars (\$180) per annum, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, make inside and outside repairs, furnish steam heat, cause door opening to be cut in wall dividing the stores, cause gas fixtures to be placed on gas outlets after present tenant removes his fixtures, cause all walls and ceilings to be cleaned, plastered and repaired, and repaint entire interior of store with white paint; have all glass of show window and door cleaned of all lettering, signs, etc., and leave all glass clean and whole; cause all other repairs to be made to floors, etc., as required, and replace sink removed by present tenant, if same is required. Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

An adjourned regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, December 22nd, 1914.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President in

the chair; Messrs. Paulding, O'Keeffe, Sachs, Stern and Farley. Excused: Mr. Robbins, Trustee, and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities. The minutes of the meeting of December 15th, 1914, were held as read and approved.

Bills, amounting to \$12,134.84, were approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon

and if used for this purpose the money for the general worker becomes available.

The contract with the Croker Engineering Company expires the latter part of January, and as the service rendered by this company has not recently been satisfactory, I would ask your authorization to secure estimates for this work for the year 1915 from other fire prevention companies or engineers.

By reason of having to provide heat for pavilions I and K, and the extreme cold weather of last week, we shall have exhausted our supply of coal, and as there is not sufficient time to advertise, request has been made of the Committee on Public Letting of the Board of Aldermen for permission to purchase coal in the open market, not to exceed one thousand tons, to carry us through the remainder of the year and the first few days of 1915. Hearing was given on this request at one o'clock to-day. Your authorization for the approval of this procedure in advance of the meeting is requested.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The request of Miss Wadley for permission to use the salary now paid to the worker in the Children's Service for the general worker in pavilions A and B was approved.

The General Medical Superintendent was directed to ascertain what terms and conditions could be obtained from other firms rendering service similar to that of Croker Engineering Company.

It was resolved to approve the action of the General Medical Superintendent in bringing before the Committee on Public Letting of the Board of Aldermen the Department's request for permission to purchase coal in the open market.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The Gouverneur Conference Committee recommended the adoption of a rule whereby the Visiting Physician and Surgeons of Gouverneur Hospital will be permitted to call upon the Physicians and Surgeons in the Out-Patient Department for assistance in Ward service, subject in each case to the approval of the General Medical Superintendent, and in the Laboratory Service subject to the approval of the Director of Laboratories. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this rule was approved.

While the Board was in session an informal communication was received that the Board of Aldermen that afternoon had authorized the purchase, without public letting, of six motor ambulances at a cost not to exceed \$15,000. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to appoint a committee composed of Mr. Stern, Mr. Sachs, Mr. O'Keeffe and Mr. Farley to select these motor ambulances.

The appointment of an X-ray Photographer to Fordham Hospital, provided for in the 1915 budget, was considered. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to instruct the General Medical Superintendent to appoint the first available man on the Civil Service List, in this instance Dr. I. J. Landsman.

Mr. Sachs reported that on December 17th he had visited Gouverneur Hospital and found the engine room and laundry in a badly kept condition. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

The President stated that he had attended a fire drill at Gouverneur Hospital on December 18th and found that a number of the nurses did not close the windows as prescribed in the rules formulated several years ago. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, that the fire drills be held under the direction of the General Medical Superintendent at each one of the hospitals of the department, and that he present a report on the efficiency of these drills to the Board at their first meeting in January. It was further resolved to instruct the General Medical Superintendent to formulate fire rules and display them on large placards in prominent places, and take such other means as he sees fit to promulgate these rules throughout the Department.

Mr. O'Keeffe, on behalf of the Conference Committee of Fordham Hospital, reported that the appointment of Dr. Ivy Pelzman to the place of House Surgeon and Dr. Rubin Alpert as Senior will provide for the proper surgical services at Fordham Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

The Building Committee reported that they had considered the bids opened on December 4th for (1) alterations to the power house and ambulance station at Harlem Hospital and (2) alterations to the main building at Harlem Hospital, and presented a list of references of the low bidders. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To award the general contract for the alterations to the power house and ambulance station to the lowest

bidder, the Tower Construction Company, who bid \$39,577 for this work, and it was further

Resolved, In the best interests of the city, to reject all bids for the plumbing and heating and ventilating work for the power house and ambulance station, and it was further

Resolved, to reject all bids for the construction and plumbing work for the alterations to the main building of Harlem Hospital, and it was further

Resolved, to defer action on the bids for the heating and ventilating work to the main building.

The President reported that there appeared to be no uniformity in the hospitals of the department in the number of operations allowed to the surgeons of the house staff, and that it appeared that the house staff are permitted to do more operating under the Assistant Visiting Surgeons than under the Visiting Surgeons themselves. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to appoint the President and General Medical Superintendent a special committee to formulate a plan to obtain a better control of the number of surgical operations performed by the members of the house staff in the various hospitals of the department.

The plan suggested by the Medical Board for the reorganization of the medical and surgical service of Harlem Hospital, as set forth in their minutes of November 25th, were presented for consideration. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the changes in the organization of the Supervisory Board of the Out-Patient Department whereby the Assistant Visiting Physicians and Surgeons will be given ward service exclusively, a new staff of Adjunct Visiting Physicians and Surgeons created, Admitting Physicians and Surgeons appointed to the Out-Patient Department, and the rearranging of the service in the wards and dispensary, as set forth in the first four paragraphs of the plan, were approved.

The construction of a new room in the Out-Patient Department for the use of admitting physicians and surgeons was referred to the General Medical Superintendent and the Chairman of the Building Committee for proper disposition.

The arrangement whereby the admitting physician or surgeon of the Out-Patient Department shall be allowed to have assigned to him two members of the staff of that department for service in the admitting room was approved.

The proposals set forth by the Board for the special services relating to (1) skin and syphilis, (2) the diseases of the eye, (3) the diseases of the throat, ear and nose, were approved, except that the title shall be "Dermatologist to the Hospital," "Ophthalmologist to the Hospital," and "Otolaryngologist to the Hospital," and the services shall include the Out-Patient Department, the incumbents to have charge of these special services, but without seat in the Medical Board, in the same manner as set forth by the Trustees on December 1st in regard to the "Otolaryngologist to the Hospital."

The recommendation that a permanent curtain be placed in the room used by the tuberculosis clinic was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for attention.

The resolution in the minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for November 25th, asking whether it was permissible for the physicians and surgeons of Harlem Hospital to accept a fee from patients at the hospital provided for in the Workmen's Compensation Law was discussed, and on motion, duly seconded and carried, action thereon was deferred pending the receipt of an opinion from the Corporation Counsel.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter was presented from McKim, Mead and White, dated December 21st, reporting that the walls of Gouverneur Hospital are only strong enough to carry one additional story, and submitting two sketch plans indicating the possibility of adding additional wards by constructing separate buildings to the west or to the south of the hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to refer this communication to a Special Committee composed of the President, Secretary, Mr. Farley and Mr. Sachs.

A letter was presented from McKim, Mead and White, dated December 19th, transmitting plans and specifications for the lighting fixtures of pavilions I and K at an estimated cost of \$10,000 chargeable against the Corporate Stock fund C. B. H. 10 F. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was resolved to transmit them to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

A communication was presented from McKim, Mead and White under date of December 21st recommending the award of the contract for the lighting fixtures of pavilions L and M to the lowest bidder, the Wahle-Phillips Company, this firm having complied with the requirements of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. A communication thereon was

also presented from that department under date of December 16th. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to award the contract to the Wahle-Phillips.

A letter, dated December 12th, was presented from McKim, Mead and White, enclosing an estimate of \$100 for changing the location of the lightning rod cables on the chimneys of the boiler house. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, who had inquired into the matter, it was moved, seconded and carried, to accept this estimate.

A communication, dated December 16th, was presented from R. F. Almiral transmitting a credit allowance of \$52.04 made by the Mitchell Vance Company on account of changes in the lighting fixtures for the Nurses' Residence at Harlem Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this estimate was accepted.

A letter, dated December 8th, was presented from Joseph Di Benedetto claiming an allowance of \$1,566.16 for extra work allowed to have been performed on the roof wards of Fordham Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this was referred to the Building Committee.

A letter, dated December 12th, was submitted from Doctors Cohen, Fox and Hubby, presenting an outline for reorganizing the services of the Visiting Specialists to Harlem Hospital. After discussion, on motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for recommendation.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital for December 2nd were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to inform the Medical Board at Gouverneur Hospital that Dr. Henderson, having accepted the salaried place, could no longer be considered a member of the Visiting Staff, as the Charter provides that the Visiting Staff of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals shall render service without receiving compensation.

The Minutes of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital for December 4th were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendations that Dr. Rubin Alpert continue as Senior and that Dr. Ivy Pelzman be advanced to House Surgeon on January 1st, 1915, were approved; the nominations of Dr. Gustave A. Fried as Assistant Pathologist and Bacteriologist, Dr. Kenneth W. Buell as Assistant Physician to Out-Patients (Gynaecology), Dr. Brock McGeorge Dear as Assistant Surgeon to Out-Patients, having been recommended by the Conference Committee, were approved and appointments made accordingly; the resolution of your Board relative to the advisability of sending to the medical profession of the Bronx cards notifying them of the clinics at the hospital was considered, but action thereon was deferred.

A letter, dated December 9th, was presented from Dr. Benjamin S. Barringer applying for appointment as Adjunct Assistant Genito-Urinary Surgeon to the Second Division of Bellevue Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the Executive Committee of the Medical Board for recommendation.

A letter, dated December 18th, was presented from the M. B. Brown Printing and Binding Company requesting permission to give a quotation on and print one hundred copies of the Bellevue Hospital Nomenclature of Diseases, 1911 edition, for the Hospital Department of the City of St. Louis. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this request was approved.

A letter was presented from the Mayor, dated December 17th, asking the heads of City departments to give a holiday to their employees on the Saturday after Christmas and the Saturday after New Year's day so far as the statutes and official business will permit. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to comply with this communication.

A communication, dated December 16th, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitting copy of three resolutions adopted on December 11th: (1) revising salary schedule 2062, (2) approving the issue of special revenue bonds in the amount of \$76,000, (3) revising supply schedules. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

A letter, dated December 19th, was presented from Dr. Edwin W. Holladay, resigning from the place of Resident Obstetrician to the Bellevue School for Midwives. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this resignation was accepted with regret.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to adjourn until Tuesday, December 29th, 1914, at 3.30 P. M.

An adjourned regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held Tuesday, December 29th, 1914, at 3.30 P. M.

Present: Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, O'Keeffe, Farley, Robbins and Stern. Excused: Mr.

Sachs, Trustee, and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meeting of December 22nd, 1914, were held as read and approved.

Bills amounting to \$48,393.68, were presented for approval, and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

A few days ago I took two sailors from the Seamen's Home to work on awnings, etc. They receive their maintenance and work without pay until January 1st. As they promise to be satisfactory, I should like to continue them after January 1st, but there are no funds for this purpose unless you authorize the creation of two additional hospital helper positions and take the money from the appropriation for "hospital helpers." We exceeded this appropriation by \$8,000 in 1914 and to continue the present staff of employees for 1915 this amount will be exceeded. I ask your authorization to assume this additional expenditure.

The Interboro Decorating Company have begun work on the contract of painting pavilions L and M.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, action was taken on the request of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was resolved to authorize the creation of two additional hospital helper positions, effective January 1st, 1915.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The President reported that he opened bids on December 28th for food supplies for the first three months of 1915. The Committee on Supplies presented a tabulation of these bids and recommended that awards be made to the lowest bidders, and where tie bids occur, that the contract be divided evenly between the low bidders. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, the report of the Committee on Supplies was approved and its recommendations adopted.

The President reported that on December 24th he had attended, with representatives from the Departments of Charities, Corrections, Health and Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, at the Office of the Central Purchasing Committee, a joint opening of bids for meats and poultry for the first three months of 1915. The Committee on Supplies presented a tabulation of the bids received which showed an increase of approximately 6 1/2% over the cost of meats obtained for the corresponding period of 1914 by this department. The Committee also presented a letter dated December 29th from Strauss Brothers, setting forth that on account of the various points of delivery required in the specifications of the joint contract for meats, they were unable to bid, but offered to supply fresh meats to this department at an average at least 1/2 cent a pound below the quotations received at the joint opening. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to award the contracts to the lowest bidders, except lines 8 and 9, which were rejected. It was further

Resolved, to lay before the Mayor the fact that the bids were accepted so that awards could be made for the joint contracts, and that the prices appear to be higher than those that could be obtained for this department alone.

The Building Committee reported that they had made further inquiries into the responsibility of the bidders for the steam heating and ventilating work for the alterations to the main building at Harlem Hospital, action on which was deferred at the last meeting. On the recommendation of that committee it was moved, seconded and carried, to accept the estimate of \$3,057 of the E. Rutzler Company, the lowest bidder.

The Building Committee recommended that action on the plans and preliminary specifications for changes and additions to pavilions I and K, referred to in McKim, Mead and White's letter of September 22nd be deferred until after all the contracts for furnishings and lighting fixtures are awarded in order to determine what amounts of corporate stock will be available. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported that the request of the P. F. Kenny Company, dated May 4th, for an extension of time to complete the contract for the plumbing work at Harlem Hospital is necessarily dependent upon the finishing of the main building by the contractor, and as no extension was given to P. J. Brennan and Sons, he recommended that this be taken into consideration when making up the final certificate of completion. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

The Building Committee reported that they had considered the request from McKim, Mead and White, and also from J. H. Freedlander to include in the contracts for professional services 2 1/2% commission for the employment of an engineer specialist for elevators, and that he had received information informally

from the Bureau of Contract Supervision that it is the contention of that Bureau that additional engineering service for this purpose is unnecessary, as all companies that build elevators have their own engineering specialists. After consideration, on the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, not to allow this fee for the present.

The President referred to the visiting to the wards by the members of the attending staff at meal times, resulting in delaying the serving of meals to the patients, which, by that time are often cold. After discussion it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Executive Committee to instruct the visiting staffs, as far as possible, to refrain from visiting the wards during meal time.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Rules, it was moved, seconded and carried, to approve the rules formulated by the General Medical Superintendent and presented at the meeting of December 15th, relative to the transfer of patients from one hospital to another.

COMMUNICATIONS.
A petition was presented, dated December 8th, signed by thirty-seven physicians to the Out-Patient Department at Gouverneur Hospital, protesting against the rule requiring them to fill out blanks adopted for that hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this petition was referred to a Special Committee, composed of Mr. Paulding, Mr. Farley and Mr. Robbins.

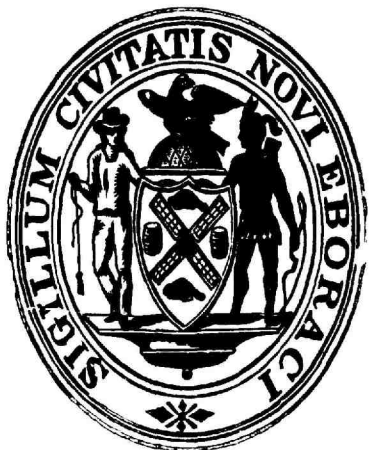

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby consents to certain modifications in the terms and conditions of the said contract of July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract of December 2, 1913, said modified terms and conditions being fully set forth and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying such terms and conditions as modify or alter said contract of July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract of December 2, 1913, which said contract as amended otherwise remains unchanged as to all the other terms and conditions expressed therein, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

THIS CONTRACT, made and executed in duplicate this day of 191, by and between THE CITY OF NEW YORK (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the MANHATTAN BRIDGE THREE CENT LINE (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, By a contract dated July 10, 1912, the Company was authorized to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn and upon and across the Manhattan Bridge from the Desbrosses Street Ferry, Borough of Manhattan, to the Long Island Railroad Depot, Borough of Brooklyn; and

WHEREAS, By a contract dated December 2, 1913, said contract of July 10, 1912, was amended by extending the times for commencement and completion of construction; and

WHEREAS, By resolution adopted by the Board October 7, 1914, and approved by the Mayor October 7, 1914, the times for the commencement and completion of construction were further extended; and

WHEREAS, The Company has by a petition dated November 19, 1914, applied to the Board for certain modifications and amendments in and to said contract dated July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract dated December 2, 1913, to wit:

First: By permitting the Company to abandon and relinquish all portions of the route described in Section 1, First, and Section 1, Second, of said contract of July 10, 1912, except those upon and over the Manhattan Bridge and its plazas, terminals and approaches, and upon and along Flatbush Avenue Extension, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Second: By amending Section 2, Sixth, of said contract of July 10, 1912, by permitting the use of overhead electric power upon the Manhattan Bridge, its plazas, terminals and approaches.

Third: By providing for the installation of appropriate terminal loops and other terminal facilities by the City to be used by the Company without expense to it.

Now, THEREFORE, In consideration of the Company agreeing to relinquish and abandon certain portions of the routes granted by said contract dated July 10, 1912, as hereinafter in Section 2, Second, more particularly described, and of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

SECTION 1. The parties hereto hereby consent, subject to the provisions and conditions hereinafter set forth, to certain modifications and amendments in and to said contract of July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract of December 2, 1913, said modifications and amendments to be as follows:

1. All of Section 1, First, of said contract of July 10, 1912, is hereby stricken out and the following substituted therefor:

"First—To construct, maintain and operate a double track street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment for the purpose of conveying passengers and property in the Borough of Brooklyn, in the City of New York, upon the following route:

Beginning at a point on the northerly side of Nassau Street, where a connection can conveniently be made with the tracks constructed or to be constructed by the City upon the Manhattan Bridge, its approaches and terminals; thence in, upon and across Nassau Street to Flatbush Avenue Extension; thence in, upon and along said Flatbush Avenue Extension to its intersection with Fulton Street, and to cross such other streets and avenues, named and unnamed, as may be encountered in said route, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract, may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

2. All of Section 1, Second, of said contract of July 10, 1912, is hereby stricken out, and the following substituted therefor:

"Second—To operate the cars of the Company upon two (2) tracks when constructed upon the Manhattan Bridge and the terminals thereof and approaches thereto, such tracks to be assigned to the Company by the Commissioner of Bridges.

Beginning upon the land acquired by the City for bridge terminal purposes, in the Borough of Manhattan; thence in, upon said bridge terminal to the approach to the Manhattan Bridge in the Borough of Manhattan; thence upon and along said bridge approach to the Manhattan Bridge; thence upon and along said bridge to the approach thereto in the Borough of Brooklyn, to land acquired for the Manhattan Bridge terminal in the Borough of Brooklyn; thence upon and along said land to Nassau Street, and there connecting with the above-described tracks in Nassau Street. The said route is to be operated by the Company as a continuous route in connection with the route hereinafter described."

3. All of the first paragraph of Section 2 of said contract of July 10, 1912, is hereby stricken out and the following substituted therefor:

"Section 2. The grant of the right or privilege to construct, maintain and operate said railway upon the route hereinafter described upon and along Flatbush Avenue Extension, in the Borough of Brooklyn, is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company."

4. All of Section 2, Sixth, of said contract of July 10, 1912, is hereby stricken out and the following substituted therefor:

"Sixth—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Brooklyn, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York."

5. So much of Section 2, Ninth, of said contract of July 10, 1912, reading as follows:

"In case of the neglect of the Company to make pavement or repairs in the Borough of Manhattan after the expiration of thirty (30) days' notice to do so from the President of the Borough of Manhattan, or to make pavement or repairs in the Borough of Brooklyn after like notice from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, then such Presidents, or either of them, may make such pavement or repairs in their respective boroughs, at the expense of the Company."

"Section 4. The grant of the said right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway from the Brooklyn terminal of the Manhattan Bridge to the intersection of Flatbush Avenue Extension and Fulton Street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, upon the route hereinafter described, and the grant of the said right and privilege to operate across and upon the Manhattan Bridge and the terminals thereof and the approaches thereto, are both subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company."

7. All of Section 5 of said contract of July 10, 1912, is hereby stricken out.

8. After the paragraph in Section 4, Second, of said contract of July 10, 1912, reading as follows:

"The Commissioner of Bridges shall determine such amounts due the City and certify the same to the Comptroller."

add a new paragraph reading as follows:

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
