

REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's Office, in the New Court-house, on Tuesday, August 11, 1874, at 4:15 o'clock P.M.

Present-Andrew H. Green, Comptroller; John K. Hackett, Recorder.

The minutes of July 21, 31, August 4, 6, and 7 were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists received from the Board of Assessors, and transmitted with communication of August 4, 1874, viz.:

1. One Hundred and Fourth, One Hundred and Fifth, and One Hundred and Sixth streets— Regulating, grading, curbing, guttering, and flagging Eighth avenue to Public Drive.

2. One Hundred and Eighteenth street-Regulating and grading Seventh to Eighth avenue.

3. Sixty-ninth street—Flagging Third to Fourth avenue.

4. Fifty-sixth street—Sewer, Fourth avenue and Hudson river.

vard and Ninth avenue. The foregoing lists being in proper form, and no objections having been filed, on motion, they were severally confirmed.

NEW COUNTY COURT-HOUSE COMMISSION.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the New County Court-house Commission.

MAY 15, 1874 The Commissioners of the New County Courthouse met in the Comptroller's office, at 12 M., Friday, May 15, 1874.

The roll was called, the following Commissioners being present, viz.: Wyllis Blackstone, John P. Cumming, and Smith E. Shaw.

The minutes of the meetings held May 9 and May 13, 1874, were read and adopted.

The Chairman presented sundry correspondence with the Janitor of the New County Court-house, under resolutions adopted by the Commission.

Which was ordered on file.

Commissioner Cumming presented a copy of the pay-roll of the employees in the New County Court-house, which had been obtained from the Comptroller's office. On motion, it was ordered on file.

The Secretary *pro tem*. presented Volume IV, of Senate Documents for the year 1872, containing reports by Hon. Andrew H. Green, Comptroller, relative to the moneys expended for the erection of the New County Court-house.
