

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending December 27, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,425, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 725 tenement houses, 96 private dwellings, 85 other dwellings, 4 manufactories and workshops, 8 stores and warehouses, 27 stables, 14 slaughterhouses, 1 lime-kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 fat-rendering establishment, 1 fertilizing works, 1 railroad tank, 5 sunken and vacant lots, 1 smoke-house, 1 street dump, 45 yards, courts, and areas, 53 cellars and basements, 70 waste-pipes and drains, 177 privies and water-closets, 31 street gutters and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 4 smoky chimneys, 1 cesspool, 7 other nuisances, together with 68 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 660.

During the past week 48 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 42 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

56 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy vaults.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 74 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 67 houses, 67 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 473 births, 53 still-births, 186 marriages, and 511 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, December 27, 1879. This shows a decrease of 60 births, and an increase of 17 still-births, 22 marriages, and 12 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was a decrease of 17 births and an increase of 6 still-births, 69 marriages, and 9 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 2; typhoid fever 1; cerebrospinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 10; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 8; surgical operations, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 2; diphtheria, 2; croup, 9; whooping cough, 5; malarial fevers, 3; alcoholism, 3; cancer, 6; bronchitis, 7; aneurism, 1; convulsions, 3; apoplexy, 9; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 10; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 7; Bright's disease and nephritis, 19; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and preternatural births, 4. The number of deaths from erysipelas and suicide was the same as that reported for the past week.

The ages of 106 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 150 under two years; 202 under five years, and 46 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 11 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 39.53 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 94 were in institutions, 266 in tenement-houses, 142 in houses containing 3 families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 2 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 118 on the first, 149 on the second, 84 on the third, 44 on the fourth, 13 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 505 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 6 non-residents. 71 were stated to be single, 133 married, 64 widowed, and the condition of 243 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 511; still-births, 53; bodies in transitu, 10. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 68 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 473 births, 186 marriages, 53 still-births, 511 deaths, 10 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 16 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and o transcripts of the birth record, 2 of marriage, and 14 of death were issued during the week.

I. (Jewish), 5; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 5; Washington (undenominational), 7.

SIR—There were 511 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 27, 1879, which is an increase of 12, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 9 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1878. The actual mortality for the week ending December 20, 1879, was 506, which is 12.2 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.82 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,104,320.
