SANITARY BUREAU.

Work of the Sanitary Inspectors.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 19,388 the number of causes of complaint was 7,617, as follows:

During the three months ending September 30, 1882, ten thousand three hundred and ninety (10,390) permits were granted for burials. During the same period two hundred and ninety-eight (298) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; six hundred and forty-seven (647) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; one thousand and thirty-three

(1,033) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; nine hundred and sixteen (916) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and five hundred and sixty-six (566) transcripts of the records of deaths, seventy (70) of marriages and eighty-three (83) of births from said records were issued. There were four thousand nine hundred and ninety-four (4,994) persons registered as married during the quarter, and six thousand eight hundred and ninety-four (6,894) children were born during the same period.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY-NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending September 30, 1882, the number of notices issued by the Board was 5,877. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees, and agents as to violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents, under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

No. 27 Chambers Street, Tuesday, December 19, 1882—2.30 o'clock p. m.

The Commission created by chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880, to revise, vacate, or modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, met pursuant to adjournment.

Present-All the members, viz.:

Commissioners Edward Cooper, John Kelly, Allan Campbell, George H. Andrews, and Danie Lord, Jr.

The Clerk presented copies of the CITY RECORD and "Daily Register" of December 18 and 19, 1882, showing due publication of notices of the meeting.

The minutes of the meeting held on December 13, 1882, were read and approved.

The Clerk reported that he had filed in the Finance Department, on December 15, 1882, certificates reducing assessments in the cases specified in resolution adopted December 13, 1882. MOTIONS

H. A. Shipman, Esq., attorney, renewed his motions made at the meeting, on December 13, 1882, that the decisions made by the Commissioners, on January 31, February 9, and November 14, 1882, reducing the assessments for Seventh avenue regulating, grading, etc., and Seventh avenue paving, etc., from One Hundred and Tenth street to Harlem river, and Boulevard regulating, grading, etc., from Fifty-ninth to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, be made applicable in the following strike access proof of title having been furnished viz. similar cases, proof of title having been furnished, viz. :

No. 2084. William A. Cauldwell, Sci William A. Cauldwell, Seventh avenue paving, etc. No. 2099. William A. Cauldwell, Seventh avenue paving, et No. 2103. William A. Cauldwell, Boulevard regulating, etc.

After hearing T. H. Baldwin, Esq., attorney, in opposition, decision on the motion was reserved. DECISIONS.

Taking the fair value of earth filling at 90 cents per yard, the total cost of the work would be \$11,164.53. The amount assessed on the property-owners for the improvement was \$19,616.27. The assessment on the lots of the petitioner should therefore be reduced forty-three

In matter of John H. Sherwood (Nos. 553 and 606), assessment for One Hundred and Twenty-first street regulating, grading, etc., from Seventh to Eighth avenues; confirmed January 30, 1874.

This case is also identical with that of Anderson, decided September 26, 1882. The evidence shows that the work was done under a special contract, at the price of \$1.59 per yard for filling, which was entirely excessive. We think that the fair value of filling at that locality would be about ninety cents a yard. Computing the assessment on the basis of this price makes the total cost of the work \$16,492.42. The amount assessed on the city was \$1,139,42, and the amount assessed on the property-owners \$27,891.68. Hence the reduction of the assessment should be \$11,399.26, or forty per cent., to which extent the assessment on the lots of the petitioner should be reduced.
