SIR—There were 928 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 6, 1887, which is an increase of 114, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 152 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending July 30, 1887, was 849, which is 62.2 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 29.72 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,485,421.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water ents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occurants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
