

Amendments to Rules and Regulations. Pursuant to notice, the Rules No. 14 and 86 were amended to read as follows:

Rule 14. No appointment, transfer, or removal of any officer, clerk, or subordinate shall be made except by the Board, and such action shall require not less than three affirmative votes.

Rule 86. These rules and regulations shall not be altered, nor shall any new rule or regulation be made unless pursuant to a notice of a motion therefor, or to alter or repeal entered in the minutes at some prior regular meeting of the Board; and such alteration, repeal, or new regulation, shall require not less than three affirmative votes. votes.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 13, 1875. The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,306, as follows:

3 public buildings, 596 tenement houses, 110 private dwellings, 93 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 9 stores and warehouses, 41 stables, 1 market, 4 cemeteries, 1 manure dump, 1 dangerous building, 64 slaughter-houses, 5 fat-rendering establishments, 3 public sewers 5 fat-rendering establishments, 3 public sewers and drains, 16 sunken and vacant lots, 54 yards, courts, and areas, 19 cellars and basements, 67 waste-pipes and drains, 72 privies and water-closets, 5 street gutters and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 2 dangerous chimneys, 8 other nuisances, together with 116 visits to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received was

386.

During the past week 71 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

37 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

16 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 81 dwellings where contagious diseases existed, and have disinfected and fumigated 76 houses, 76 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

40 persons sick with small-pox were removed to the Riverside Hospital, and 2 bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending March 13, 1875:

Typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 8; scarlet fever, 35; measles, 2; diphtheria, 85; small-pox, 70; and cerebro-spinal meningitis 4.

126 tanks of night-soil were removed by the night-scavengers from the privy-vaults of the City.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food: Calves (bob), 22 carcasses; sheep, 9 carcasses; beef, 20 pounds; and fish 1,000 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending March 13, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 619 burial permits for city deaths, 36 for bodies in transitu, and 45 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 619 deaths, 94 marriages, 435 births, 45 still-births, 36 applications for transit permits, and 44 returns from Coroners. There were 38 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 6 transcripts of birth-record, 5 of marriage, and 34 of death were issued from this Bureau; 2 cases of death were referred to Coroners.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR-There were 619 deaths reported during the SIR—There were 619 deaths reported during the week that ended on Saturday, the 13th inst., against 653 verified for the previous week. The excess over the weekly mortality at the same period of the preceding year, continues to be from the special causes which have prevailed since December last. Pulmonary diseases, diphtheria, small-pox, and the diseases of old age, make up the total excess. The excess in the cold and inclemency has been as strongly marked as the increase of mortality the winter through.

Diphtheria was charged with 48 deaths last week

Diphtheria was charged with 48 deaths last week against 57 the previous week. Bronchitis and pneumonia are charged with 104 deaths last week against 119 the previous week, and against 87 in the first week of March, last year; 45 deaths of persons 70 years old and upwards were reported last week, and 38 occurred in the previous week, against 24 and 32 in the corresponding weeks of 1874. The public institutions reported 225 deaths in the past two weeks, against 179 in the same period last year.

The mean temperature last week was 37.2 degrees Fahr., and the mean degree of humidity was 80.100 of total saturation. The death-rate which, for the first week of March, was equal to 32.65 per 1,000 annually, when the mean temperature was at 26.7 degrees, decreased last week to 30.95. The mean death-rate in 21 chief cities of Great Britain, the third week in February, was reported as 29 per 1,000 annually, 34 per 1,000 in Glasgow, 33 in Dublin, 31 in Edinburgh, and 27 in London, where the mean temperature was 37.5 degrees; and, in the previous week, the death-rate in Munich was 43.7, in Vienna 32.5, and in Alexandria, Egypt, 56.1 degrees.
