If, in the framing and adoption of the ordinance, it was intended to obviate the difficulties and embarrassments incident to the contract system by public letting, the intention is frustrated by the public letting, the intention is frustrated by the absence of any authority to purchase the necessary tools and materials as the work progresses, and in such manner as the Commissioner of Public Works may deem best for the public interests. The ne-cessity of advertising for the tools and materials required on the work would lead to greater em barrassments, delays, and expense, than if the entire work was advertised and let in one con-tract tract.

I would, therefore, respectfully recommend that the ordinance be amended by striking out the provision in reference to day's work, so that the whole work may be advertised and let to the low-est bidder.
