

A table prepared in the Bureau of Vital Statistics, showing for each week since 1866 the total weekly mortality, the mortality from diarrhoeal diseases of children under five years of age, and of persons more than five years of age, the mean range of temperature and of humidity in each week, from which it appears that there is no material increase in deaths from diarrhoeal diseases during the present month as compared with the same period in 1874, and that the number is less than in 1873.

From the President: Report of Milk Inspectors Gardner & Jepson, who were detailed to visit dairy farms on Harlem Railroad, in order to institute a comparison of the milk on sale in New York City and the milk produced upon the dairy farms. The result of the investigation has proved that the standard of purity adopted by this Board, and represented by too° on the Lactometer used, is from 10° to 20° lower than the milk actually produced on farms. This fact fully sustains the position of the Board of Health on this subject, and warrants the conviction of every dealer in milk who offers for sale any milk below 100° on the Lactometer used.

To melt fat at corner Elton avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-third street.

That application be and is hereby respectfully made to the Board of Police for the use of two garbage carts with drivers, and of two policemen of the Sanitary Company for the purpose of removing from the city, unripe, unsound, unwholesome, and decayed fruits and vegetables, with the privilege of using the garbage scows for dumping the same; a similar application to the Board of Police having been granted in 1873, and having proved greatly beneficial as a sanitary measure.

That, for reasons stated in report of the Sanitary Committee of this date, a copy of which is hereto appended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the use of this Department for the purpose of continuing the Special Corps of Vaccinators in the service of this Board during the months of August and September 1.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 24, 1875: The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,403, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 1,293 tenement houses, 168 private dwellings, 49 other

dwellings, 16 manufactories and workshops, 20 stores and ware-houses, 88 stables, 63 slaughter-houses, 4 fat-rendering establishments, 10 dumping grounds, 2 dangerous buildings, 5 public sewers and drains, 30 sunken and vacant lots, 92 yards, courts, and areas, 74 cellars and basements, 77 waste-pipes and drains, 209 privies and water-closets, 60 street gutters and sidewalks, 21 dangerous stairways, 1 cistern and cesspool, 2 dangerous and smokey chimneys, 3 violations of Code, 21 other nuisances, together with 91 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors are 8.8

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors was 848.

63 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

200 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 98 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and tumigated 79 houses, together with clothing, bedding, etc. They have also disinfected 1,952 privy-sinks, 98 cellars, 228 yards, and 197 miles of street gutters.

49 persons sick with small-pox were removed to the Hospital, and 2 dead bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending July 24, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 955 burial permits for city deaths, 35 for bodies in transitu, and 41 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 955 deaths, 142 marriages, 510 births, 41 still-births, 35 applications for transit permits, and 70 returns from Coroners. There were 22 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth-record, 3 of marriage, and 18 of death were issued from this Bureau. 2 cases of death were referred to the Coroners.

The following report shows the names of the owners of milk farms where we tested the quality and temperature of milk in the springs on the different farms located on the line of the Harlem Railroad, in the vicinity of Purdy's, Golden's bridge, Katonah and Bedford stations, and the towns of North Salem, Sommers and Lewisborough. Also the quality and temperature of milk taken from each cow separately while being milked, morning and evening, in the different cow stables, testing the milk with the Lactometer adopted by the Board of Health, and using a thermometer to note the temperature of each cow's milk when examined.

It will be seen that a far larger number die of those treated at home compared with the number It will be seen that a far larger number die of those treated at home compared with the number dying under hospital treatment. It also shows that it is not safe to discontinue the Vaccinating Corps as yet, and that it will be necessary to obtain money from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in order to continue the corps for the month of August. The report of Dr. Taylor, inclosed, shows some of the obstacles with which the Vaccinators meet, the success attending the distribution of circulars by this Board, and the necessity of repeating visits to tenement houses in order to vaccinate the inhabitants; and also, that if small-pox is to be eradicated, the necessity of a compulsory vaccination act. Table No. 2 shows the condition of Riverside Hospital for the past two months.

Dr. Janes, Assistant Sanitary Superintendent, also presents a report on the condition of the Hospital from January 1 to May 1, 1875.

It will be noticeable that the epidemic has been very severe this year, but yet not as severe as in Philadelphia in 1870 and 1872. It is also gratifying to know that, nothwithstanding the difference of the two cities, greatly in favor of Philadelphia, that the disease has not attained the proportions reached in that city. Your Committee think that the difference is due to the employment of a large force of Vaccinators and the work performed by them.

In Philadelphia, in 1871, there was 8,114 cases of small-pox.

Deaths were, 1871, 1,879; 1872, 2,585.

In New York, from October 1, 1874, to July 24, 1875, there was 3,306 cases reported; 1,228 deaths.

In Philadelphia, during one of these years, a little over 18,000 vaccinations were performed, while in this city a similar number were performed during a single week.

The Sanitary Committee, having noticed articles in some of the daily papers reflecting on the Ambulance Corps and the Vaccinating Corps, written by Drs. Fuller-Walker and C. F. Ringler, directed the Sanitary Superintendent to request their attendance, in order to make complaints and be examined with reference to their knowledge of these matters, and to allow these officers to present such defense as was right.

Dr. Walker simply writes referring to the papers and certain cases, but fails to give names or dates, so that the cases could be investigated. Dr. Ringler has failed to make any response. The Sanitary Committee regrets that these gentlemen are unwilling or unable to present any evidence which can be sifted, and that such reports, while doing no good, interfere with the efforts of this Board to prevent the spread of small-pox, and tend seriously, by prejudicing people against vaccination, to keep up the disease.

To W. De F. Day, M.D., Sanitary Superintendent:

Sir.—I have the honor to present the following report on the condition and management of the Riverside Hospital, formerly known as the Small-pox Hospital, from the time it came under the control of the Health Department to the present date.

This institution, prior to January last, was under the control of the Commissioners of Charities and Correction, at which time, by virtue of a law enacted by the Legislature in 1874, it was transferred to this Department.

Since the epidemic of small-pox that swept over the country during the years of 1871 and '72, the City of New York and its environs have not been completely free from the disease, although during the summer of 1873, and the early part of 1874, it began to increase in severity, visiting more generally the Nine-teenth and Twenty-first Wards, over which it spread to a considerable extent, making its way southward through the Eighteenth, Seventeenth, Tenth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Sixth, Seventh, and Fourth Wards, while on the west side of the city, the Twentieth and Twenty-second Wards, containing a large tenement population, furnished the disease with a large number of victims.

The hospital accommodations for presons suffering with small-pox, consist of a Reception Hospital at the river side, in front of Bellevue Hospital, where patients are received to await the departure of the boat for Blackwell's Island; a stone building on the south end of Blackwell's Island, in which there is a capacity for 61, and in the other for 80 beds, making in all comfortable accommodations for 159 patients. Over 200 have been accommodated at a time, but that number crowds the institution too much for the confort, or, I might say, for the safety of the patients. Immediately upon taking charge of this, on the 20th of January last, it was decided to reorganize the entire management, and place the institution on as high and broad a basis aso our limited means would allow, f

true Christianity.

The spiritual interests of the patients are provided for by the services both of a Catholic and a Protestant chaplain, that those adhering to either one of these divisions of the Christian Church may receive the consolations afforded through its officiating servant.

The ordinary hospital diet is furnished by contract from charity hospitals, while the "extra diet" and that for the attendants and help is supplied directly by the Health Department. Extra diet for patients consists of eggs, milk, beef tea, beef steak, whiskey, in the form of egg nogg or milk punch, rice, tapioca, etc. There is a private arrangement by which those who prefer it can have separate board by the payment of seven dollars per week. With this money such articles of diet as are needed are purchased for the use of such patients. All of the money so paid is expended for supplies, no profit accruing to any one; but articles not needed for the boarders are added to the general store for the use of all, thus contributing somewhat towards reducing the current expenses of the institution.

The question now arises—Has the change of many contribution to the institution.

-Has the change of management, with the increased expenditure incurred The question now arises—rias the change of management, with the increased expenditure incurred to carry on the institution, had the effect to reduce in any degree the percentage of mortality? This question cannot be satisfactorily answered by comparing our present death-rate with that of previous years, as we have had, during the past year, to contend, not only with a more than usually severe type of the disease, but have also met with a much larger number of complications than usual, especially pneumonia, which has been very prevalent and fatal, and to which patients suffering with small-pox are very susceptible.

The nearest approximation to which we can arrive towards the solution of this question is by comparing the mortality of the last three months with that of the three months next preceding. By consulting the accompanying tabulated statement of discharges and deaths, it will be seen that, from the 20th of January to the 30th of April inclusive, there were 598 discharges and 226 deaths, which gives us a death-rate of 27.4 per cent. Now, by consulting the annual report of the Chief of Staff for the year 1874, we find that, up to the 31st day of December there were discharged from the Small-pox Hospital 734, and 285 deaths, which gives a mortality of 27.9 per cent. If we examine still nearer, we find, by the hospital records, that, during the three months ending December 31st

there were 315 discharges and 143 deaths, giving a mortality of 31.2 per cent. for the three months mmediately preceding the change of administration. These death-rates are all heavy, and yet, as we shall presently see, they are not far in excess of what has been suffered in other cities during pre-

we shall presently see, they are not far in excess of what has been suffered in other cities during previous years.

A good deal of discussion has arisen in regard to the relative mortality in hospital and private practice, many physicians quoting their experience in former years, with the disease in a much milder type than now prevails, as arguments in favor of their patients being treated at their homes. With a view of endeavoring to settle this question as nearly as practicable, I have taken pains to collect all of the cases treated at home during the last three months, all cases first reported dead, those who have absconded, and concealed cases that have come to our knowledge after recovery, amounting in all to 298, including 146 deaths, 48.9 per cent., as near an approximation as our information will afford. Although these figures may not give us the exact percentage of deaths from small-pox in private practice, as there are doubtless from time to time concealed cases that never come to our knowledge, yet the experience of other cities may aid us in the solution of this question.

During the year 1872, there were treated in the small-pox hospital at Chicago 572 patients, of whom 145 died, or 25.3 per cent.; while, during the same period, 1,810 were treated at their homes, of whom 510, or 28 per cent. died. In 1873 the percentage of mortality in the same city was 25 in hospital, and 30.6 in private practice. The percentage of mortality from small-pox in Cincinnati, during the year ending February 29, 1872, was in hospital 22.4, and in private practice 26. In each of these cities the disease was not so frequently attended with the serious complication of pneumonia which has been so prevalent with us during the past winter and spring.

In Philadelphia, during the year 1871, there were returned to the Board of Health 8,114 cases of small-pox, of whom 1,879 died, or a percentage 23.1. In 1872 there were returned 7,515 cases, of whom 2,585 died, or a percentage 34.3, a much more severe and fatal epidemic than we

The percentage of hospital mortality during the epidemic of 1871 and 1872 in Philadelphia was 31.25.

In comparing hospital mortality with that occurring in private practice, we are compelled to include in the former many cases which properly belongs to the latter. In order to illustrate this, I must again ask you to refer to the tabulated statement—item, sudden deaths—where it will be seen, that four died on admission, eight died twelve hours after admission, and the whole number that died within forty-eight hours after admission was forty-six. These were cases that had been concealed, and treated at home until death was inevitable, when the physician, to save his reputatinn with the Board, or the friends, to save the mortification of a coroner's inquest, where there had been no medical attendance, would report the case for removal. Indeed, I have known a physician to ask that his patient might be allowed to remain at home for treatment, promising to assume all responsibility in regard to quarantine, disinfection, etc., and in the course of a week or ten days to return and ask that the same patient be removed to the hospital, the result of which was that the doctor was relieved from the necessity of signing a death certificate. All of these cases properly belong to private practice, and could we eliminate them from our calculations, it would considerably reduce the percentage of our hospital mortality. If we are allowed to deduct these cases for which there is little or no opportunity for treatment, our percentage of mortality is reduced from 27.4 to 23.1.

A tabulated statement of the expenses incurred in repairs and daily supplies, will be found appended.
